Tishomingo County Sheriff's Dept. And MBN Combine Efforts To Make Local Drug Bust

After an ongoing investigation by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, a major drug arrest was made in the county on Wednesday, January 15.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, this arrest brought down a major drug supplier, which had been operating locally for some time.

Sheriff Smith stated that those arrested were brothers Ronald Merrill Tigner, 38, of 616 County Road 992, Iuka, and Randy Eugene Tigner, 38, 195 A County Road 225. Ronald Tigner was charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute and felon in possession of a firearm. Randy Tigner was charged with conspiracy to sell schedule II narcotics.

The investigation by the Sheriff's Dept. and the MBN, gave the authorities information

on the possible sale of narcotics in the area by the two men, which led to Wednesday's bust, according to Smith. Search warrants were obtained for both men's residences. A search turned up controlled substances and firearms at each

of the homes.

At press time, both men had made bail and were released from the Tishomingo County Jail. The case will be presented to the county grand jury in March of this year, according to the Sheriff.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Stops Interstate Drug Traffic

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department officers, working from a tip they received from Colbert County, Ala. authorities, stopped a vehicle entering Tishomingo County Wednesday night, January 15, located drugs inside and arrested the occupants.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, his department received information that a car, which was headed into Tishomingo County from Alabama, was occupied by a subject who had

an outstanding warrant with the county. After locating the vehicle, the stop was made. During the stop, the officers discovered that the men were transporting drugs in the vehicle.

Arrested were father and son, Charles Edward Wilson, Jr., 23, of Tuscumbia, Ala. and Charles Edward Wilson, Sr., 48, of Florence, Ala. Also arrested was Dorothy Diane Wilson, 43, of Florence, Ala., wife of Wilson, Sr.

Both Wilson, Jr. and Wilson, Sr. were charged with

possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. Dorothy Wilson was charged with conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance.

All three subjects were jailed, but have since been released on bond awaiting their court date.

Assisting in the arrests were Sheriff David Smith, Chief Deputy Rodney Pannell and Deputies John David Murphy, Jon-Denver Tapp, and Scott Woodruff.

Benefits Of Family Meals

Even though the holidays are over and the large family gatherings are past meal times can still be special.

If the laughter and conversation around holiday meals were worth enjoying, families should know that they have a chance at every meal for creating good memories. These meals do not have to be elaborate, and they can be special if only two people are there. When adults eat with children, they should use good eating behaviors so that children see and develop healthy eating habits.

As I talk with young people about table manners, I ask about meals in their homes. This includes questions about table setting and how food is served. Most say the table is set only for special occasions. For most meals the food is served

out of the pans it was cooked in while they are still on the stove. Many of the teens say they eat in front of the television and that eating as a family is rare. Food is a basic human need and that need can be met in many ways, but family meals together meet other important psychological and emotional needs.

A lot of time is spent eating on the run and in separate rooms in front of television sets, but eating together at the table is healthier and more nourishing in the long run. The time preparing a meal can add to the family time together, especially on weekends when time is more flexible. Thankfully, meal preparation does not have to be complicated or time-consuming. It can even be educational for young children learning about measuring, or for older children who just need to learn how to cook.

Family meals can be simple and still be healthy. Grocery stores are making family meals even easier by selling baked chicken and other pre-cooked items so all consumers

have to do is take them home and serve them. Additional side items can be added at home.

Parents should be willing to eat many different foods and practice controlling the amount of food as good examples for their children. Rather than avoiding a dish completely, they should get at least a small amount. It is tempting to rule out certain foods forever because you tried them once and didn't like them, but our taste in food changes. Also different cooking methods can improve a food from one time to the next. At the same time, no one should eat too much of a favorite food, but practice getting smaller portions and save some for leftovers.

Even the simplest meals can provide physical and mental nourishment when shared with one or more family members. Some of the best conversations take place when there are only two people sharing a table. Just because other family members are not present, sitting together at the table opens

doors to conversations that would not open if families choose to eat in front of the television or in separate rooms. Meals can help soothe hurt feeling and help people find common ground instead of differences.

Families should use meal times to talk about their activities of the day, plans for the future or any concerns they may have. It may help to ask open-ended questions that begin with what, why or how. If a lull in

the conversation occurs, people could consider unusual topics for discussion. Topics don't have to be deep or revealing, they just need to offer a chance for families to hear one another's thoughts. Listening and talking to each other are two of the greatest gifts we can give family and friends. Mealtime is a perfect chance for doing these things.

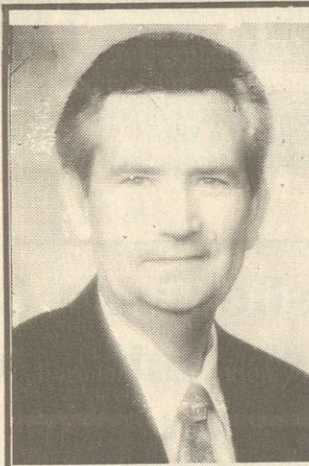

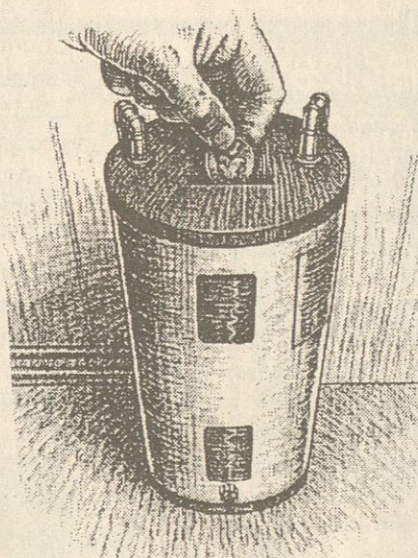

Who Needs Bifocals?

When we move into midlife, our bodies lose elasticity and the eyes are no exception. When the lens in your eye becomes less flexible, there is reduced ability to focus clearly on objects at various distances - near and far (also called intermediate distances). This is why you have to hold your newspaper further away to reduce the blurring. This is a normal condition called presbyopia. It can be corrected with single strength reading glasses or with bifocals with the reading correction on the bottom portion.

Can you be nearsighted or farsighted and still need bifocals?

Yes! You can have other vision problems and still develop presbyopia which is a normal maturing process. More than one vision correction may be prescribed for one lens.

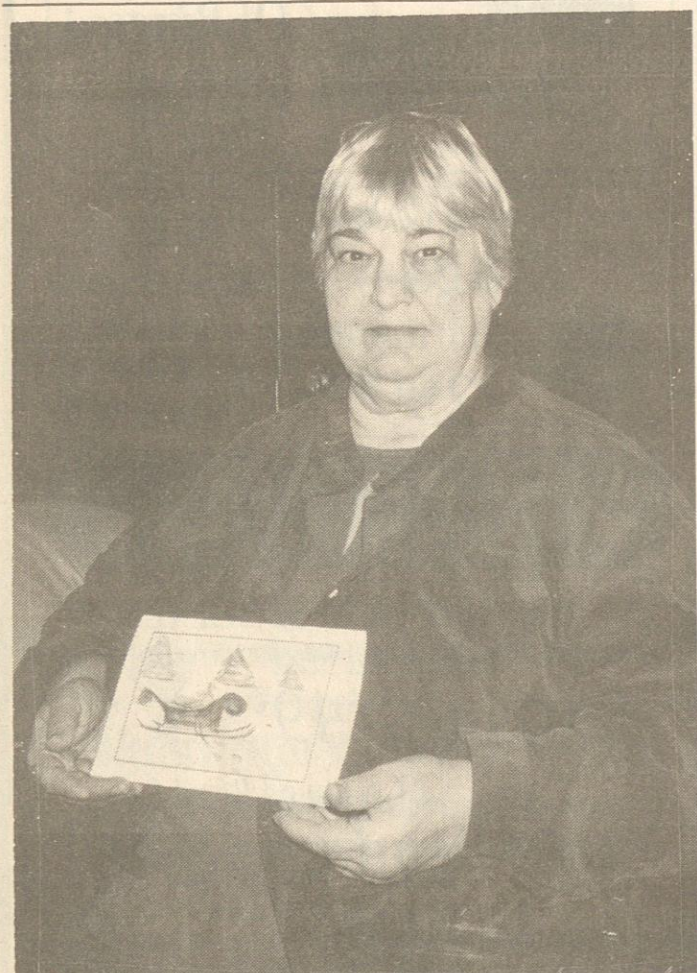

Gus Sims, Iuka's Superbowl Connection

It is one of the most covered television events in the world, THE SUPERBOWL!

Over a billion people will watch the telecast worldwide. Think about this when you tune to ABC this Sunday night and realize that a local native is one of the men behind the camera broadcasting this international event.

Gus Sims, a native of Iuka, is a subcontracting sports cameraman. He works from his home in Indianapolis, Indiana, for both ABC Sports in New York and Fox Sports Network in Los Angeles. (Most of his work is done with ABC).

Sims is the son of the late Robert and Edith Sims of Iuka and is the stepson of Jean Curtis Sims who resides in Iuka.

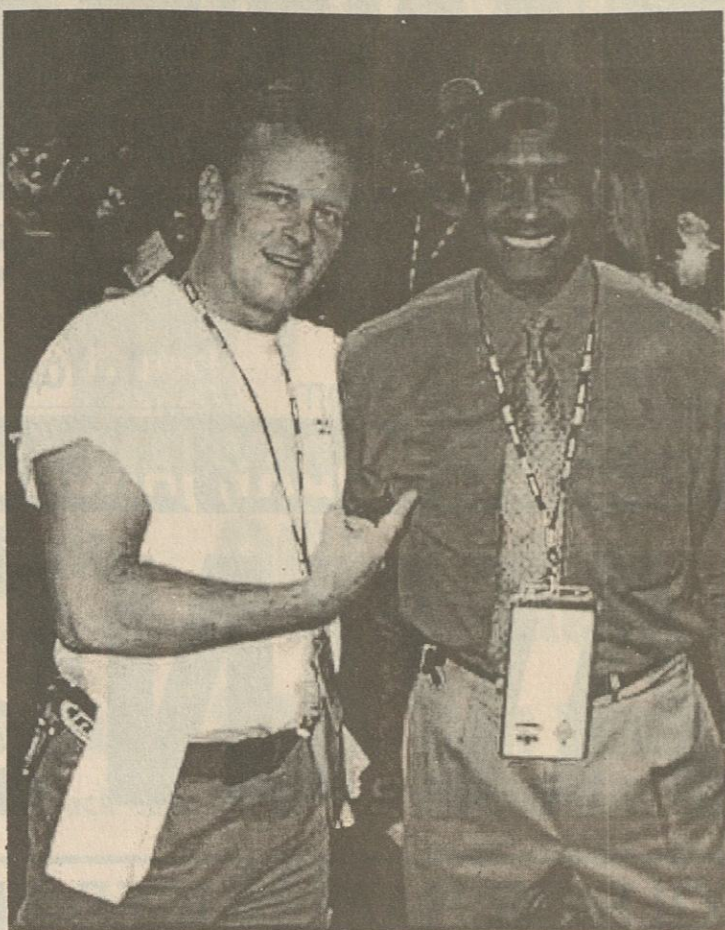
Gus is a 1981 graduate of Iuka High School where he first took an interest in photography. "I shot stills for the high school yearbook (thank you Mrs. Harrelson!) and it was cool seeing your work in print when the annual came out."

He remembers when he first came interested in video production. "One night my Dad and I were watching the news and the camera moved when it wasn't supposed to. I told Dad, 'I could do a better job,' the next thing you know, I was working for an ABC affiliate in Hoxi, MS. I worked there for three years."

From there, Sims moved to Memphis where he worked for WVA for several years. He then moved to a job for a station in Nashville.

He noted, "One of the major stories I was assigned to at that time was covering the 88 Republican National Convention in New Orleans." It is where Gus caught the "traveling bug" and wanted to see his video camera on the road.

Gus makes his home in Indianapolis where he and his

wife, Valerie, make their home. Valerie is a director for a local NBC station in Indianapolis and keeps the home fires under control. "Val is my HERO! She does so much and manages to keep the house and take care of the children while I am only there a day or two most weeks of the year. I could not do this kind of work without the stability of my family. I give

many kudos of thanks to Val for EVERYTHING she does so that I can be on the road!" ("KUDOS"? Gus, you have been out of the South WAY too long!)

The Sims' have three children. Twelve year-old Chloe is a champion traditional Irish Step Dancer (as popularized by "Riverdance" and "Lord of the Dance"). She competes at both national and international

competitions...AND WINS! She is also on the cheerleading squad, kickball and volleyball teams and is a Girl Scout.

Gus and Val wanted their son to have a truly "southern" name. The four-year-old is named after his grandfather and other noted "southerners". His full name is Robert Lee Beauregard Sims. They call him "Bo".

Bailey is the Sims' 15-month-old baby girl. "She loves her family more than anything in the world," says the proud father of three.

Having a family makes it hard being on the road so much. Gus says, "you might think being a traveling cameraman is glamorous but when you put in 12 to 16 hour days of running full speed, flying who knows where, and grabbing a few hours sleep on

the plane, living on fast food, it gets to you after a while."

Gus tells one true story that has happened more often than you would think, of how this routine can get plain silly. "I am in a city, let's say Los Angeles for a seven day stint. I check out of room 505 and rush to the airport to catch a plane to Miami. When I get there, I pick up a car, go straight to the hotel and check in (let's say room 712), freshen up and head out for a workday. Sixteen hours later I arrive back at the hotel exhausted, just wanting a shower and to go to bed. I get on the elevator and go to my room. I go to the room and the KEY DOES NOT WORK!

Now I get a bit upset. It is at that time the door opens and a startled couple wants to know what I am doing at their door at 2:30 a.m. Sims is in shock too. Why is somebody already in my room? Gus looks at the door. Room 505, the room he had the night before in L.A.!

Gus travels all over the country and the world. With his hand held video camera, he covers NASCAR races for ABC and FOX with Jack Arute, Football games accompanying Lynn Swann and IRL racing to college playoffs.

Over the course of the year, Gus covers many different events in the area of sports. More likely than not, if there is a big sports event anywhere, Gus Sims is catching it from behind the camera for the fans at home.

Sometimes the stories are just sports related. One year in May, there was a charity fashion show in Indianapolis where Indy car drivers, their wives, and other celebrities, served as models.

Gus recalls, "I was at the buffet table backstage. As I moved my camera around the room catching the festivities, my camera ends up on none other than Jim Nabors who we all recall as our favorite Marine, Gomer Pyle.

This was the second time I had spotted him on camera that

day so he felt it MUST be a slow news day. He proceeded to demonstrate on camera, the correct way to make a "good ol' Southern mater sammach". It was PERFECT! From that day on, whenever I run into Jim, he always has to stop and talk to me about the South and "mater sammaches".

You may see Gus on the sidelines of a college or pro football game, trotting down the side of the court at an NBA tournament or trotting down the fairway to film an interview with Tiger Woods. He goes from season to season, sport to sport.

Gus never forgets where he came from and says he gives all the credit for his success to his parents. "Dad and Jean put up with a lot in my rebellious years and now that I am a father I finally understand. I want to say here a heartfelt sincere THANK YOU to BOTH OF THEM!" (I wish I could have told Dad when he was here). Thank you Jean! If not for them and their rules, help and guidance, I would never be where I am now in life or doing what I love to do today!"

While Sims is always on the lookout for "the perfect shot" on any given event, he stresses it's not as easy as it looks,

"batteries die, things fall out of the sky on camera lenses and folks get in the way when you need a shot the most." He says with a laugh, "but I try to do the



best job I can do and thank God most of all for what he is letting me do and my family for their support in letting me do it!

The highlight of this football season for Gus is covering Superbowl XXXVII. The Iuka native promises, "I will be running up and down the sidelines trying to get the best shots for everyone, especially my friends and family back in Tishomingo County!"

Gus knows how lucky he is to have this kind of life. He readily admits it could not last. "It's like surfing a great wave," he told me over the phone, "I am going to ride it as long as I can! When I wash up on the sand, I will swim out and find another one, that's what life is all about!"

The Evans family will be watching the game Sunday a little differently this year knowing it is being brought to us in part by an old friend who is and always will be a brother and my hero. (Oh, and to Gus, get a good shot of Shania at halftime for me and HANG TEN!)

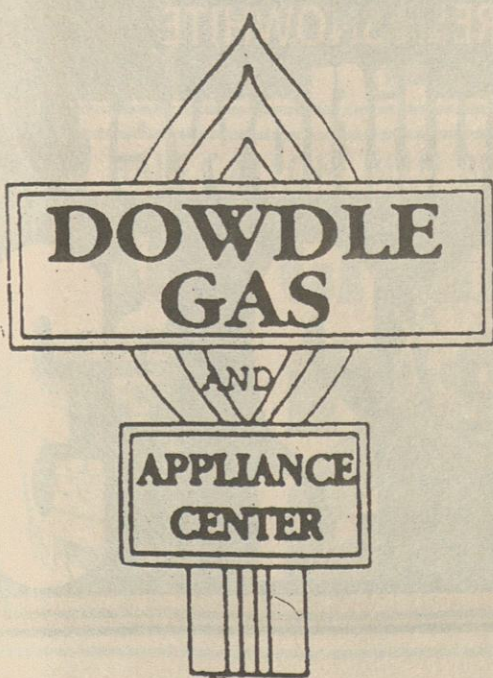

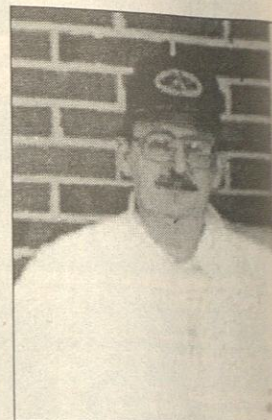
Billy Alton Biggs, age 58 of Taylor, Michigan, died January 19, 2003 following a short illness.

One female cat can be responsible for 450,000 kittens in 7 years. One female dog can be responsible for 67,000 puppies in 7 years. Can you imagine how many puppies and kittens 1 male dog and 1 male cat can be responsible for? An estimated 20,000,000 animals were put to sleep last year in the USA.

With these facts in mind we must be made aware of pet birth control. Female cats can be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) when they reach at least 2 1/2 pounds of weight. This is before they come into heat. Female dogs need to be spayed (ovariohysterectomy) before 6 months of age. Some dogs will begin their heat cycle at 6 months of age.

Male cats need to be neutered (castrated) as early as 7 months of age.

Male dogs can be neutered (castrated) as early as 6 months of age. Remember these ages are the earliest dogs and cats need to be neutered (castrated or ovariohysterectomy). After these ages surgery can be performed at anytime or ask your veterinarian what is best for your cat or dog.

Just remember to be a responsible pet owner and not allow unwanted animals to be brought into the world.

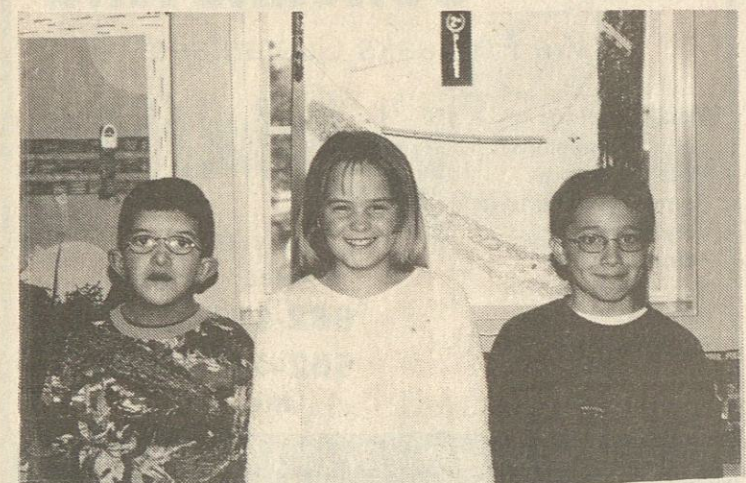

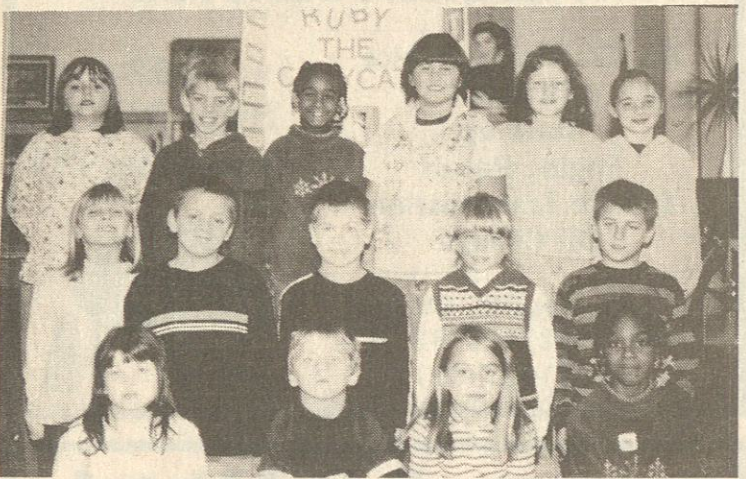

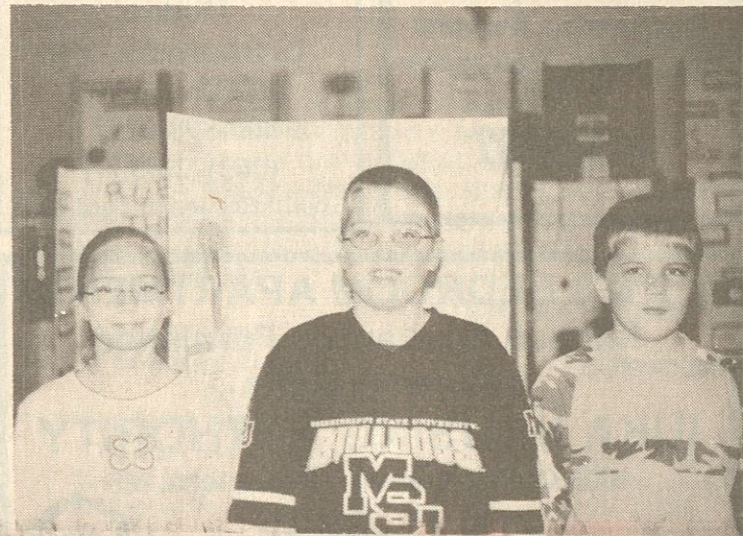
