Tishomingo County Sheriff's Dept. And MBN Combine Efforts Home of the Braw To Make Local Drug Bust

investigation by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, a major drug arrest was made in the county on Wednesday, January

According Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, this arrest brought down a major drug supplier, which had been operating locally for some time.

Sheriff Smith stated that those arrested were brothers Ronald Merrill Tigner, 38, of 616 County Road 992, Iuka, and Randy Eugene Tigner, 38, 195 A County Road 225. Ronald Tigner was charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute and felon in possession of a firearm. Randy Tigner was charged with conspiracy to sell schedule II narcotics.

The investigation by the Sheriff's Dept. and the MBN, gave the authorities information

ongoing on the possible sale of narcotics in the area by the two men, which led to Wednesday's bust, made bail and were released according to Smith. County Tishomingo Sheriff's Department officers, working from a tip they received from Colbert County, Ala. authorities, stopped a vehicle entering Tishomingo County Wednesday night, January 15, located drugs inside and arrested the occupants.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, his department received information that a car, which was headed into Tishomingo County from Alabama, was occupied by a subject who had county. After locating the vehicle, the stop was made. During the stop, the officers discovered that the men were transporting drugs in the vehicle.

Arrested were father and son, Charles Edward Wilson, Jr., 23, of Tuscumbia, Ala. and Charles Edward Wilson, Sr., 48, of Florence, Ala. Also arrested was Dorothy Diane Wilson, 43, of Florence, Ala., wife of Wilson, Sr.

Both Wilson, Jr. and Wilson, Sr. were charged with

an outstanding warrant with the possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. Dorothy Wilson was charged with conspiracy to distribute controlled substance.

All three subjects were jailed, but have since been released on bond awaiting their court date.





Sims is the son of the late obert and Edith Sims of Iuka d is the stepson of Jean artis Sims who resides in ka.



She does so much and manages to keep the house and take care of the children while I am only there a day or two most weeks of the year. I could not do this kind of work without the stability of my family. I give

many kudos of thanks to Val for EVERYTHING she does so that I can be on the road!" ("KUDOS"? Gus, you have been out of the South WAY too long!)

The Sims' have three children. Twelve year-old Chloe is a champion traditional Irish Step Dancer (as popularized by "Riverdance" and "Lord of the Dance"). She competes at both national and in ternational and

competitions...AND WINS! She is also on the cheerleading squad, kickball and volleyball teams and is a Girl Scout.

Gus and Val wanted their son to have a truly "southern" name. The four-year-old is named after his grandfather and other noted "southerners". His full name is Robert Lee Beauregard Sims. They call him "Bo".

Bailey is the Sims' 15month-old baby girl. "She loves her family more than anything in the world," says the proud father of three.

Having a family makes it hard being on the road so much. Gus says, "you might think being a traveling cameraman is glamorous but when you put in 12 to 16 hour days of running full speed, flying who knows where, and grabbing a few hours sleep on

the plane, living on fast food, it gets to you after a while."

Gus tells one true story that has happened more often than you would think, of how this routine can get plain silly. "I am in a city, let's say Los Angeles for a seven day stint. I check out of room 505 and rush to the airport to catch a plane to Miami. When I get there, I pick up a car, go straight to the hotel and check in (let's say room 712), freshen up and head out for a workday. Sixteen hours later I arrive back at the hotel exhausted, just wanting a shower and to go to bed. I get on the elevator and go to my room. I go to the room and the KEY DOES NOT WORK!

Now I get a bit upset. It is at that time the door opens and a startled couple wants to know what I am doing at their door at 2:30 a.m. Sims is in shock too. Why is somebody already in my room? Gus looks at the door. Room 505, the room he had the night before in L.A.!

Gus travels all over the country and the world. With his

hand held video camera, he covers NASCAR races for ABC and FOX with Jack Arute, Football games accompanying Lynn Swann and IRL racing to college playoffs.

Over the course of the year, 'Gus covers many different events in the area of sports. More likely than not, if there is a big sports event anywhere, Gus Sims is catching it from behind the camera for the fans at home.

Sometimes the stories are just sports related. One year in May, there was a charity fashion show in Indianapolis where Indy car drivers, their wives, and other celebrities, served as models.

Gus recalls, "I was at the buffet table backstage. As I moved my camera around the room catching the festivities, my camera ends up on none other than Jim Nabors who we all recall as our favorite Marine, Gomer Pyle.

This was the second time I had spotted him on camera that

day so he felt it MUST be a slow news day. He proceeded to demonstrate on camera, the correct way to make a "good ol' Southern mater sammach". It was PERFECT! From that day on, whenever I run into Jim, he always has to stop and talk to me about the South and "mater sammaches".

You may see Gus on the sidelines of a college or pro football game, trotting down the side of the court at an NBA tournament or trotting down the fairway to film an interview with Tiger Woods. He goes from season to season, sport to sport.

Gus never forgets where he came from and says he gives all the credit for his success to his parents. "Dad and Jean put up with a lot in my rebellious years and now that I am a father I finally understand. I want to say here a heartfelt sincere THANK YOU to BOTH OF THEM!" (I wish I could have told Dad when he was here). Thank you Jean! If not for them and their rules, help and guidance, I would never be where I am now in life or doing what I love to do today!"

While Sims is always on the lookout for "the perfect shot" on any given event, he stresses it's not as easy as it looks,

"batteries die, things fall out of the sky on camera lenses and folks get in the way when you need a shot the most." He says with a laugh, "but I try to do the



best job I can do and thank God most of all for what he is letting me do and my family for their support in letting me do it!

The highlight of this football season for Gus is covering Superbowl XXXVII. The Iuka native promises, "I will be running up and down the sidelines trying to get the best shots for everyone, especially my friends and family back in Tishomingo County!"

Gus knows how lucky he is to have this kind of life. He readily admits it could not last. "It's like surfing a great wave," he told me over the phone, "I am going to ride it as long as I can! When I wash up on the sand, I will swim out and find another one, that's what life is all about!"



and handling facilities What are the eligibility requirements? An eligible borrower is any person who is a landowner, landlord, leaseholder, tenant

or sharecropper who: has a satisfactory credit rating as deter-

mined by CCC owes no delinquent Federal debt. is a producer of corn, grain sorghum, rice, soybeans, oats, wheat, or minor oilseeds harvested as whole grain. Also eligible is corn, grain sorghum, wheat, oats or barley harvested as other than whole grain. Producers of sugar, dry peas, lentils, and chickpeas are also

demonstrates a storage need based on the borrower's share of production, minus any current storage available. provides proof of multi-peril crop in-

surance from FCIC or a private company for the life of the loan.

is in compliance with USDA provisions for highly erodible land and wetlands. demonstrates the ability to repay the debt for the facility loan.

a 15% cash down payment is required; thus, CCC's loan is limited to 85% of the net cost of eligible storage facility and permanent drying and handling equipment (subject to the storage needs test described below). The down payment cannot include any trade-in, discount, rebate, deferred payment or post-dated check.

loan term is seven years interest rate is fixed for the loan term based on the rate in effect during the month the loan is approved. The interest rate is derived from comparable 3-8 year T-bonds.



2. Peace with self (v. 6-9. If we lack peace, it is because we are not at peace within ourselves. We can check our attitude (v.6), and discover "the peace of God" (v. 7). We also must meditate within godly boundaries (v. 8). High thinking is essential for holy living. We need to think true thoughts; focus on Jesus. Our thoughts should be honest, just pure, lovely, virtuous, of good report and of praise.

Peace circumstances (v. 11-13). We are to "be content" and at peace with God's plan and at peace with God's power. Paul said "I can do all things through Christ" (v. 13). God provided for Paul what he couldn't provide for himself.




