More Guns, More Dope Confiscated In County

Arrest At Goat Island Home

Two nights of intense investigation resulted in the apprehension and arrest of two suspects in the theft of guns and distribution of drugs in two separate cases in Tishomingo County.

After being under surveillance for several weeks by the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Robert Pinner, 42, of 72 CR 346, Iuka, was arrested at his Goat Island residence on January 23, 2003. According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, Pinner, a convicted felon, was charged with possession of several firearms, two of which were believed to have been stolen from a Memphis man in 1985.

Pinner's arrest also resulted in the recovery of .5 lbs. of crystal meth and .5 lbs. of marijuana.

Pinner has been released from the Tishomingo County jail on bond.

Deputies Rodney Pannell and John David Murphy and MBN officers assisted Sheriff Smith in the apprehension of Pinner.

Burnsville Man Arrested

According to Sheriff Smith, in the second case, a spin-off of last week's Bedrock drug bust, Tim A. McKee, 17 CR 296, Burnsville, was arrested and charged with possession of .5 pounds of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. McKee was arrested after a search warrant was executed at his residence.

MBN also worked with Tishomingo County Deputies Pannell and Murphy on this arrest. McKee is currently out of jail on bond.

These two cases have taken a considerable amount of drugs off the streets of Tishomingo County. Operation "Bedrock" continues to lead to more arrests

Burnsville Lady Mustangs End Season On Top By Making History

The Burnsville Lady Mustangs made history by winning the five-county tournament on Saturday night, Feb. 8. This is the first time since the history of the five-county tournament that a team from Tishomingo County has ever won the tournament.

The Lady Mustangs finished their regular season by defeating Iuka for the Tishomingo County Championship. They then played their first game in the 5-County Tourney February 5th against Hills Chapel. The Mustangs defeated them 44-35 to advance to the semi-finals. They played Kossuth on Saturday morning and defeated them 36-27. They played on Saturday night in the championship game against Biggersville, and they defeated them in overtime 35-33.

"Two of our goals at the beginning of the year were to win the County Tournament and the Five-County Tournament," said Coach Chris Higginbottom. "I am very proud of these girls. They are a very hardworking group of girls. They

By: Langston Hughes James Langston Hughes was born on February 1, 1901. To celebrate the centennial of Langston Hughes' birth, on February 1, 2002 the United States Postal Service issued the above stamp. This was 25th stamp in the Black Heritage Series. The stamp art is a 1946 black-and-white photograph taken in New York City by his friend, the renowned photographer Henri Cartier-Bresson. Although Hughes considered himself a poet first, he wrote in many literary genres, from short stories to drama. His innovative poetry combined jazz, blues and the black vernacular with the traditions of poetry in English. Admired in his own time, Hughes is now considered one of the most important American writers of the 20th

Langston Hughes wrote during the period known as the Harlem Renaissance; he said, "I tried to write poems like the

songs they sang on Seventh Street...(these songs) had the pulse beat of the people who keep on going." In 1926, The

Nation published Langston Hughes' essay "The Negro Artist and the Racial Mountain" which boldly proclaimed:

For over forty years Langston Hughes devoted his life to writing and lecturing. He wrote sixteen books of poems, two novels, three collections of



short stories, four volumes of "editorial" and "documentary" fiction, twenty plays, children's poetry, musicals and operas, three autobiographies, a dozen radio and television scripts and dozens of magazine articles and edited seven anthologies. Langston Hughes died on May 22, 1967. His residence in Harlem, New York has been given landmark status by the New York City Preservation Commission and the East 127th Street was renamed "Langston Hughes Place."

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





Cleaning out closets and cabinets, I ran across your Laby book. Stated you looked like a football player at birth. Big chest, big baby. Dark curly hair.

By the time you were 1 year old, your hair was nearly to your shoulders. Your daddy, Joe Ledbetter, demanded that you get a hair cut. I finally agreed that you should at least look like a little boy, even if you were too pretty for that.

Then as I flipped through the pages I found your Grandfather's obituary. He died when you were only two weeks Vold. Joe, was torn between staying with me after you were V born, to wanting to be with his father while he was dying. IV vent Joe to his father. I told him that I, Nichole and now you, v Casey, would be here when he got back. He took a picture of you in hopes your Grandfather would know that Joe Ledbet-

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Valentine's Day Recalls WWII Crash **Memories for Jourdan Browning**

This article was written by Lynn West, an associate editor, and appeared in the New Albany Gazette in 1995. It was submitted to the Tishomingo County News by Charles Browning, a nephew, just in time for Valentine's Day.

This past week most people have been thinking about Valentine's Day.

Jourdan Browning's thoughts, however, have gone back to a Valentine's Day 50 years ago, when he was a navigator for a B-17 making bomb runs into Europe and even Hitler's Germany in WWII.

Browning was a part of the air group known as the "Bloody 100th," because of the extensive losses they suffered. The group lost 200 aircraft and 86 percent of its original crew by war's end, so Browning was beating the odds everytime he returned to the East Anglia, England base safely.

And on that Valentine's Day in 1945, the odds were getting worse for Browning; he was only six days away from finally having to bail out of his burning Flying Fortress, watching it crash into the Southern France

landscape.

Browning survived, unhurt and ended up back in the air, flying 17 more missions-including over Berlin-before being shipped out but some memories do not fade.

Browning, who retired and helped his son, CPA Jim Browning, during the tax season was a native of Tishomingo County, MS. (TCN note: He still has many relatives who live in Tishomingo County.)

He was 26, older than many other volunteers, when he joined the service in 1943. "I figured I was about to be drafted, but the job turned out to be easier than it was in the beginning, when we were just starting to bomb there," he said. "One day only one plane out of 18 came back."

"We had to do 25 missions before we could be shipped back," he said, "but the losses were running four percent. That's one out of 25 so it made it almost impossible to come out alive."

He had just gone back to school after working 10 years, (in Tishomingo County) and married his wife, Eva, a few months before being sent over-

"Our basic training was at Miami Beach, then we went to Indianapolis to school," he said. "I got blistered in Miami and then nearly froze in Indianapolis."

Next came a stint in Nashville for classification.

"They wanted pilots, but I wanted to be a navigator or nothing," Browning said. He got his wish; out of 100 candi-

cates he was one of only two elected for navigator training.

After training he was sent to Thorp Abbott in East Anglia where the 100th operated out of. Soon, he was a navigator for the lead plane.

"We used to lead up to 300 planes and I would think, "300 planes all being led by a boy from Tishomingo, MS," he said. The entire bombing group could include as many as 1,000 planes, and the group often stretched in the air as far as from New Albany to Jack-

Browning's Flying Fortress was only slightly different from others in that it contained radar equipment and devices to confuse enemy detection. Because of the limited space, his plane

carried only 2,000-lb bombs.

"There were 10 in the crew, and later, nine," he said. "There was the pilot, co-pilot, navigator, bombadier and six gunners (later only five), plus the radar on board."

Athough the B-17 was large, Browning had to crouch on a catwalk only 18 inches wide and work at a low, small plywood table. The aircraft bombed from an altitude of 25,000 feet where temperatures were sometimes as low as 55 degrees below zero, so crews had to wear electrically heated suits and use oxygen.

"Some days we were in the air 10 to 12 hours on a mission; we carried 3,100 gallons of fuel," Browning said.

As a lead navigator he only had to fly 30 missions (compared to the 35 for others at the time) before being relieved. Those missions were hardly "milk runs," though. Munster, Bremmen, Cologne, Dresden, Nurnbery, Hannover and Weimar were only a few of the targets, and then there was Berlin toward the end.

While his plane was often shot up with flak and some fellow crew members killed, Browning was lucky. "I was never wounded at all," he said. "I was one of only four from our navigator school who didn't go down and not come back."

When his plane did go

down, it was not the Germans, but plain old fatigue from wear and tear. "We were about eight miles this side of the enemy lines and there was a fire in the No. 3 engine," he said. The fire was apparently the result of a broken oil line and could not be put out by diving, so crew members knew they would have to jump.

He wrote a full account of this to his wife two days later and part of the letter said, "I quickly grabbed my dear old parachute that I have petted like a baby all these months,

and I snapped it on the back of my harness at the chest."

were enough There parachutes, but they were manually operated and some of the crew had had to put them on

Everyone hesitated to jump, especially when he yanked the hatch open beneath his feet to see the layer of clouds below.

"I had a slight sensation of falling through the air and then I seemed to be hanging in space on my back as the plane moved out of sight," he wrote.

When Browning jumped, it wasn't over quickly. "It took me 10 minutes to fall about 15,000 feet," he said.

He landed in forest and found other crewmen, some of whom had landed looking into the rifle barrels of three Free French. Once the French knew the airmen were American,

they took the crew to their homes and fed them, later guiding them to Allied positions amid much cheering, waving, and kissing from local resi-

They eventually went to the crash site: and because the pilot had left the plane on autopilot, it had almost landed itself with comparatively minor damage. Browning was able to get some of his equipment that the Germans had left because they had had to be more concerned about shooting at the approaching Russians on the ground than from the air strike.

After May 1945, he was returned to the United States and given a ground job until the war ended. "I was holding my breath, afraid I would be sent to the Pacific, but I made it," he said, and he returned to his life here.

TCNews note:

According to his nephew Charles, Mr. Jourdan Browning died about a year ago (in 2002). Before his death, he served as a Supervisor for the ASCA office over many counties in North Mississippi.

Browning's parents were Tom and Molly Jourdan Browning, and they lived on a farm just outside of the town of Tishomingo. Browning has many relatives who still live in

Conservation Corner

President Bush has been criticized more times than not about his lack of knowledge about the environment. I was even concerned about his actions. But over lunch at The White House two weeks ago, I was made aware of a transcript of a recent tour of his ranch in Crawford, Texas. It was not a scripted speech TelePrompTers and did not include a team of speech writers hiding behind every rock and tree. It was genuine. It was from the heart. President Bush spoke extensively, knowledgeably and passionately about natural resources and their management. Let's further explore his comments.

The President made almost 100 references to natural resources (trees, wildlife, plants and soil) and their management. He mentioned hardwood or a hardwood species 33 times. He indicated that there are at least 18 different hardwood species on his property and he specifically identified 10 species (hackberry, ash, pecan, burr oak, live oak, chinkapin oak, sycamore, willow, cedar elm and cedar). He referred to at least 10 specific wildlife

species (golden cheek warbler, fox, deer, dove, quail, turkey, armadillo, buzzards, cottonmouth and bass) and at least 3 different plant species (poison ivy, Johnson grass and buffalo grass). He made at least 12 direct references to actively improving the natural resources of his land. He even talked about how certain species were important "because they become nesting materials for things like the golden cheek warbler..."

Bush also said, "I'm interested in these trees. This place

I remember my buddies and I, as well as Jim, meeting in the fields on Saturday afternoons anticipating shooting a mess of quail for Sunday dinner. We would get so tickled at Carl when he'd miss a bird. He'd swear he was never going hunting again, though he never missed a hunt. Some of my favorite times were going into town with Momma and Papa to buy groceries on the weekend. They would normally give me



arlier this year, due to the cance of the CNNR dis-, the New England Jourmst Medicine and the Centers isease Control and Prevention expedited the release of articles reporting their clinical findings. The Journal of the American Medical Association also published the CNNR article that appeared in the CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report.

Now, with the release of the Lancet article, researchers are again urging public health officials to be aware of their findings.

"It is important that physicians and public health officials in areas with active West Nile virus transmission realize that muscle weakness and acute flaccid paralysis could be a manifestation of West Nile poliomyelitis," said Dr. Art Leis, CNNR senior scientist and project lead investigator. "If doctors see patients with symptoms that suggest involvement of the gray matter of the spinal cord particularly in combination with fever, chills and headaches - with or without meningitis or encephalitis, then these patients should be tested for West Nile virus by sending serum to the Department of Health. Such awareness will help avoid the morbidity associated with unnecessary diagnostic procedures and inappropriate treatment.

West Nile poliomyelitis should also be considered in recent organ transplantation or blood transfusion recipients who develop muscle weakness or acute flaccid paralysis said

"What we've discovered issignificant and will enable physicians and public health workers nationwide to better characterize this illness," said Dr. Stokic. "Our findings have greatly advanced the understanding of the spectrum of clinical presentations of West Nile virus infection."

The first outbreak of West Nile virus in the United States occurred in 1999 when 62 people were hospitalized and seven died in New York. While reading the first autopsy reports, Dr. Leis noted that the brains were mostly unaffected and that all four patients were profoundly weak, suggesting that muscle weakness may be a significant risk factor in predicting morbidity and mortality.

"More than half of the confirmed West Nile cases have displayed severe muscle weakness," Dr. Leis added. "Yet, this important symptom had previously received little scien-

CNNR researchers suggest that physicians be aware of four symptoms of possible West Nile poliomyelitis:

- Asymmetrical muscle weakness - where one arm or leg is weaker than the
- An absence or decrease in deep tendon reflexes.
 - Acute change in bowel or bladder function.
 - Respiratory muscle weakness especially where endotrachial intubation and mechanical ventilation is necessary.


CNNR researchers hope that an increased awareness that the virus may target the spinal cord will result in better diagnoses and more appropriate

"A more accurate diagnosis and treatment will also lead to more accurate assessment of the effectiveness of prevention activities and mosquito control in humans," added Dr. Leis.

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

An old Chinese proverb says "One generation plants the trees; another gets the shade." The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District is celebrating Mississippi Arbor Day a tree sale. It is a perfect time for you to plant a tree that will serve as a gift to your children and future generations. It's a time to think about the many gifts we get from trees-like paper, lumber, medicine, and food. It's also a time to commit to do something for trees. Planting the right tree in the right place around your house could save you a bunch on heating and cooling costs. And, it would make your backyard more pleasant for you and your wildlife friends.

Mississippi's Tree Planting Week will be held February 14-20, 2003. Mississippi's week long "Celebration of Trees" is held each year beginning on the State's legally designated Arbor Day (second Friday in February).

The District will present school programs and distribute

pine seedlings to the Tishomingo County Kindergarten Classes in cooperation with the Mississippi Forestry Commission on February 14, 2003. The annual event recognizes the importance of trees in the environment as well as the economic importance of the forestry industry in Mississippi.

Tree Planting Week features special planting events at schools, on public parks and streets, and on private residential sites. Communities, clubs, and other associations are also encouraged to plant trees.

The District will continue its practice of selling "bare root" seedlings in recognition of Arbor Day and Tree Planting Week. Flowering Dogwood, Silver Maple, Pin Oak, Common Lilac, and Hardy Pecan will be sold at a cost of \$2.00 per seedling. Trees go on sale February 10, 2003 at the District Office located at 240 Kaki Street in Iuka, MS.

The Flowering Dogwood is a beautiful, small tree with a spectacular display of white "flowers" in spring and red fruit. In fall the leaves turn a dark red color. It grows 8-20'

The Silver Maple leaves are deeply separated into 5 doubly-toothed lobes; opposite, simple, silvery below. Seeds are used by songbirds and small mammals. It prefers moist or moderately drained soil and grows 1-3' per year until it reaches full growth of 60-80'.

The Pin Oak leaves are 3-5" long, 2-4" wide with 5-7 deep lobes nearly to midvein. Turkey, wood duck, grouse, and blue jay eat its acorns. It tolerates poorly drained, wet sites and grows 50-90' tall.

The Common Lilac has good density and provides cover for many birds and mammals. This extremely fragrant shrub grows best on moist to dry soils and needs full sunlight. It grows 20' tall and 15'

wide. The Pecan leaves are compound; 20-22" long; 11-17 leaflets, each 2-7" long; finely saw-toothed margin; alternate. The nut is 1-2" long. It prefers moist, well drained, bottomland soils and grows to 100' tall.
