Iuka Police Officers Recover Guns/Stolen Merchandise

According to Iuka Police Chief Andy Stringer, a recent burglary in Iuka has been solved due to the hard work of Iuka Police Officers Anita Mitchell and Glenn Whitlock.

Albert Lamar Powell, 125 Eastport Road, Iuka, has been charged with Burglary and Larceny in the case. He is currently being held in the Tishomingo County jail.

On January 27, Willie (Lucky)

Mitchell returned to his home, after being sick and away for several days, to find that his house at 1310 Seay Lane, Iuka, had been burglarized.

Missing items included: a Springfield 22-caliber rifle; a Remington 22-caliber automatic rifle; a Springfield 410 shotgun; a bench grinder, a John Deere weedeater, a Stihl weedeater; and a DIRECTV

Satellite receiver.

Officers Mitchell and Whitlock were able to solve the burglary and recover most of the missing items because several of the items were offered for sale and sold to area residents.

Colbert County authorities found one of the missing guns at the residence of a Cherokee, AL, man recently charged with drug trafficking. Guns recovered in that raid were turned over to the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms to trace for ownership. Mitchell's gun is expected to be returned to him from Colbert County.

Chief Stringer was quick to recognize his officers for their prompt resolution of the case due to the alertness of the officers and their involvement with residents of Iuka.



Car/Train Accident Fatal To Iuka Man

A mid-day Sunday car-train accident claimed the life of Gary Briggs, 59, of Pickwick Circle Apartments in Iuka.

The accident occurred at the railroad crossing on CR 247 just north of Highway 172 at approximately 12:30 p.m. This crossing, located approximately two miles east of Iuka, is better known as Gravel Pit Crossing. There are no barriers, no lights, or guard rails at this crossing.

According to Mack Wile-

mon, Tishomingo County Coroner, Mr. Briggs, who was traveling alone at the time, was pronounced dead at the scene about 1:30 p.m. It appeared he was going south on Gravel Pit Road in a late model automobile when the car was struck by an eastbound Norfolk Southern train on the passenger side of the automobile. The car landed in a ditch of low water just east of the crossing.

Personnel from the Iuka Fire Department were the first

to arrive on the scene. They were soon assisted by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, and volunteer firemen and EMT's from the Snowdown Volunteer Fire Department. According to Iuka Fire Chief, Brian Grissom, the jaws of life were used to remove Briggs from his vehicle.

Arrangements for Mr. Briggs have not been completed and will be announced later by Grayson Funeral Home.

Country Gospel Song With Local Roots Tops Chart

The country gospel song, "Today, Reality Came Home To Me," which has climbed to number one on an international country gospel music chart this month, was created with the combined talents of three local residents - Charley Kyles, Augusta Jones and Jimmy Pyle.

The song, also referred to as the "Reality Song," is currently number one on Rev. Graham's World-Wide Day List, and is steadily climbing on other charts including the Country Gospel Connection Radio Chart, where it is currently number 3, and the Country Gospel Music Guild Chart, where it is currently number 48.

The singer is Charley Kyles, a longtime singer/performer from Goose Pond, Miss., located just west of Brimth. Kyles can be seen weekly on his cable show, "Country Gospel Jubilee," on which he performs and hosts, along with co-hosts Ruth Allicutt and Richel Brown. Locally, the show can be viewed on Friday nights, from 8 to 9 p.m. on Galaxy cable channel 41, North Crossroads Communications cable channel 20, or if you live in the Booneville area, channel 53. Charley has had three other songs to reach the charts in the past two years which include "Lord, It's Me Again," "Between the Altar and the Cross," and "I'll

Praise Him In Everything." He is also the proprietor of a music park and music theater located in Goose Pond.

The songwriter is Augusta Ellis Jones, who was born and reared in Tishomingo County, beginning life in an area of the county known as Pumpkin Center and later moving to the Holt Spur/Rowland Mills community. Augusta said she has been writing songs since childhood. She only recently teamed up with singer Kyles after seeing him on his cable show. She began sending him songs and finally he took notice, according to Jones.

The vocal tracks for the song were recorded and the entire song was mixed and mastered in the local recording studio of Jimmy Pyle, located near Burnsville. Pyle is a lifelong resident of the Burnsville area, whose hobby surrounding all aspects of the music business - from performing to recording - has been going on most all his life. Pyle is the son of former Grand Ole Opry singer/songwriter Pete Pyle. Jimmy began singing and performing with his dad at a very young age, and later with his own band. In addition to operating his recording studio, he is a partner in Pyle-Roser Music Group - a music publishing company - with Savannah, Tenn. resident Larry Roser. Pyle also performs with friends Larry

Brown and Dale Edmondson in their band "Still Country."

The idea for the song, "Today, Reality Came Home To Me," came from an experience Kyles had which literally brought his thoughts to the reality of what happens to us when we grow old. Kyles said that one day on his way to Corinth, he saw a woman on the side of the road whose Jeep had broken down. He stopped to see if he could help. Then after her failed attempts to contact someone on his cell phone, he volunteered to go to the nursing home where she worked and deliver her message in person. He stated that when he walked into the local nursing home, he was hit with the reality of the lives of the residents there and that someday, he could be there. We all could be there.

Kyles conveyed his experience to songwriter Augusta Jones, now of Booneville, and asked if maybe she could write a song about it. Jones said that after that, she had the opportunity to go see a friend in a nursing home. Following this, she was able to write the song. After some revisions of her original work, she and Kyles agreed on the current song. They met with Pyle who suggested they have some music tracks laid down by Steve Wilkerson, currently

of Branson, MO, formerly of Humbolt, Tenn. They did so and returned to Pyle's studio, where Kyles added the vocals. Pyle then did the mixing of the single, as well as the final mastering.

Originally, the single was placed on a compilation CD put out by Glory Train - a compilation company. When the demand for the single became great, Kyles returned to the studio, along with Jones, where they worked with Pyle to produce Kyles' latest country gospel album which includes this popular single. His

CD, just finished this week, is now available to the public.

Kyles said that a video of the song is in the works and the song will begin airing on Gospel Music Television (GMT) in March. He has been notified of a possible nomination of the song for an award by the U.S. Gospel Singing News. He will be giving special performances of the song at the IMAX Entertainment Complex - "Little Opry Theater" in Branson, MO in April and at the Christian Country Music Association Awards to be held in Pigeon Forge, Tenn. on June

12, 13 and 14.

Conservation Corner

The fourth annual Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Expo will be held on March 7-9 at the Washington County Convention Center in Greenville, Mississippi.

For three days anglers, hunters and outdoor enthusiasts can get the latest information and equipment on their favorite outdoor activity. Emphasis will be on fishing, hunting, camping and other spring and summer outdoor activities. The Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Expo, hosted by Wildlife Mississippi, is one of the largest of its kind in the state.

Leila C. Wynn, President of Wildlife Mississippi, stated "We are expecting a crowd of more than 10,000 people to attend for the wide array of outdoor equipment, supplies and services, all at the right prices. Kids can have a great time and the whole family can learn about conservation through the many exhibits. It's a real bargain. Proceeds from the Expo will go to conservation projects throughout Mississippi."

The Expo will feature approximately 100 exhibitors selling hunting gear, tree stands, game calls, boats, fishing supplies, wildlife art and books, outdoor apparel, ladies gifts, game calls, guided trips, kids exhibits and much more. Government conservation agencies will be on hand to answer your most difficult questions about conservation.

According to Wynn, the Expo will definitely be bigger and better than the 2002 Expo. "It will have a totally new look. Anyone who loves fishing, hunting, camping, wildlife viewing or just being outdoors will find something of interest at the Expo," continues Wynn.

Along with the exhibitors and the many hands-on events, the Expo will feature the "The Bass Tub," one of the top attractions on the show circuit.

"The Bass Tub" is a 42-foot long portable fish tank which holds 5,000 gallons of water. It will be stocked with native fish species. During the seminars, spectators will get a "fish's eye view" of how fish react to lures. It will demonstrate various techniques and what baits to use while fishing. There will be five seminars at The Bass Tub over the 3-day Expo.

The Climbing Wall will also be at the Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Expo. It has proved to be a great form of entertainment for the young at heart.

Due to popular demand, Terry Vandeventer, a professional herpetologist, will be back at the Expo each day with his live snakes. Vandeventer has hunted and studies reptiles throughout the world. His snake demonstrations are seen by over 70,000 people annually. He will discuss their life histories, habits and their effects on people, good and bad.

This year there will be several new exhibitors that will interest the many ladies and kids. Fine gifts and decorative accessories will be available. Blowguns will again be available and kids can even purchase boomerangs and get a free boomerang demonstration.

Cure For Detached Retina

You may have heard in the past that someone with a detached retina was almost certain to become blind. That may have been true 50 years ago, but it is no longer true today. Development in eye research and the use of modern technology now make it possible to cure more than 95% of the cases of detached retina. It can also be prevented, if discovered early enough in an eye examination.

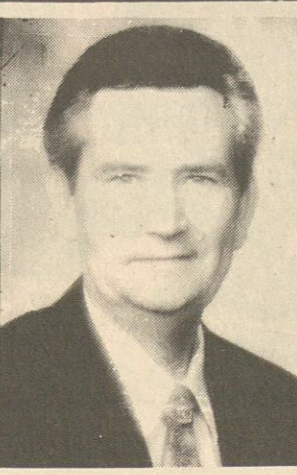
The retina is the innermost lining of the eyeball, a very delicate membrane that receives the focused image as it enters the pupil. It is attached to the inside of the eye at two points, at the optic nerve located in back of the eye and along the front edge in an area called the ciliary body. The rest of it is held in place by gentle pressure exerted by eye fluids. Any part of it may become detached, allowing fluid to seep out and causing the retina to collapse. One of the symptoms of a detached retina in its early stages is blurred side vision and light flashes.

Legal Update

STRICT INTERPRETATION

Under the "strict liability" rules, a person who is injured by a defective or unexpectedly dangerous product can recover compensation from the manufacturer or seller of the product without showing that the manufacturer was actually negligent. Consumers can make strict liability claims, without showing any carelessness on the part of the manufacturer or seller, if three conditions exist. The first is that the product had an "unreasonably dangerous" defect that injured the consumer of the product. The defect must also have caused an injury while the product was being used in its prescribed manner. And, the product must not have been substantially changed from the condition in which it was originally sold, in the sense that its performance was altered.

If you have been injured and would like to know your rights within the law, speak to a legal professional. Neutering

Why should I have my dog neutered?

Neutering should be considered if you are a responsible pet owner. Remember that Guide for the Blind, Hearing for Deaf People, and Deaf the Disabled are neutered.

What are the advantages of neutering my male dog?

- Reduces the risk of prostate cancer
- Reduces the risk of prostatitis
- Reduces the risk of hormone-related diseases such as perianal adenomas
- Eliminates the risk of testicular cancer
- Removal of sexual drive which results in roaming behavior
- Reduction of types of aggression

Is neutering performed for any other reason?

The operation is performed to treat tumors and some gland conditions. It is used to control the (testosterone) diseases such as adenomas.

Neutering may also be in an attempt to treat forms of aggression.

What are the disadvantages?

Most of the perceived disadvantages are false. The most quoted of these is that the dog will become characterless, and useless guard. Obesity is probably the most commonly cited disadvantage of neutering. Obesity is the result of overfeeding. By regulating your dog's diet and exercise intake, you can prevent obesity in neutered males.

Neutering doesn't alter the change in personality. It guards intelligence, playful affection.

When should the operation be performed?

Research reveals that neutering a pet at an early age does not cause any increase in risk. Most veterinarians recommend neutering at four and six months of age.

Is there any alternative surgery?

Not at the present time.

although there are some exciting advances being made in this area.

Are there any alternatives associated with the operation?

Neutering is considered a major operation and a general anesthesia. Today's modern anesthesia and monitoring equipment reduce the risk of a complication. It has been said that a pet has a greater chance of being injured in a car accident than having an anesthetic surgical complication.

What happens when my dog for this procedure?

Your pet will be anesthetized and pre-anesthetic blood are usually performed. Everything is acceptable. The pet will then be anesthetized. Most pets will have an intravenous catheter placed to administer the anesthesia to provide fluid therapy during the surgery. After your pet is anesthetized, a breathing tube will be placed in his windpipe. This will allow to deliver oxygen and anesthetic. The procedure consists of making an incision in front of the testis and removing the testis. Many veterinarians use absorbable sutures so that do not have to return to remove them.

Are there any operative precautions I should take?

Rest and restriction of activity are the primary post-operative care you should follow. Most dogs can resume activity five to ten days after surgery. Until then, walks, no running or jumping, stairs and lots of rest are recommended.

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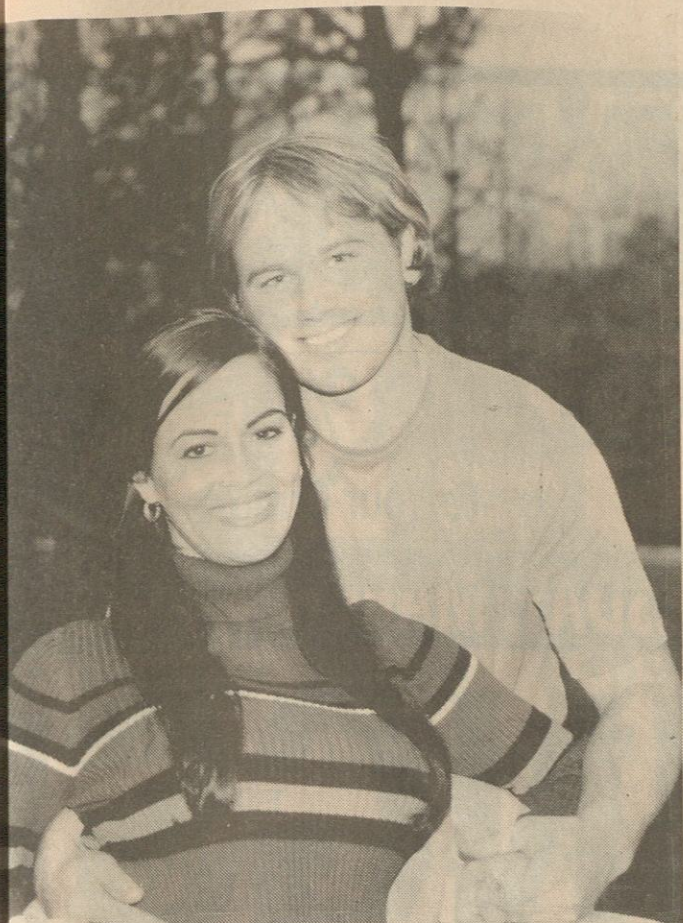

The meeting was called to order by President Jo Russell. She welcomed our new associate member, Ruth Lovelace, and gave each member an opportunity to introduce themselves to her.

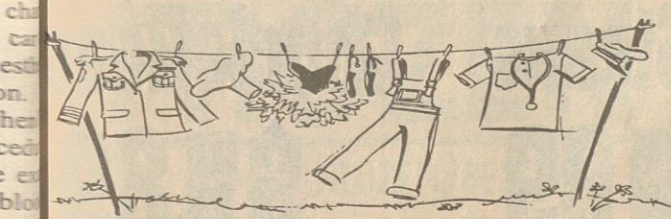
Hostess Joy Kitchens led the Pledge of Allegiance and read "Prepare to Dare" as the devotional.

Local Volunteers Traveled To Jackson For American Cancer Society Lobby Day

Hundreds of American Cancer Society volunteers from across Mississippi convened in Jackson on Thursday, Jan. 23 to lobby their elected officials about cancer-related issues.

The American Cancer Society's 2003 legislative agenda for Mississippi focuses on increasing the state's excise tax on cigarettes by 50 cents. The increase in the state's excise tax could bring Mississippi more in line with the rest of the United States. Mississippi's cigarette excise tax which currently stands at 18 cents has not been changed since 1985 and ranks as the ninth lowest in the nation.

"In this legislative session, we have the opportunity to help achieve some of the state's budget concerns while saving lives at the same time," said Toni Barry, an American Cancer Society grassroots volunteer. "The decisions of our elected officials can affect how many people will die of cancer in Mississippi. That's why it is important for us to let our voices be heard."

The American Cancer Society is joined in this effort by the Communities for a Clean Bill of Health, a broad-based coalition of community and state-based organizations who believe that by increasing the excise tax on cigarettes, Mississippi will achieve a reduction in the number of teen and adult smokers, fewer teens will start to smoke, deaths caused by tobacco-related illnesses will decrease, health care costs will decrease, and revenue will be increased for Mississippi.

"Each household in Mississippi pays \$495 per year in federal and state taxes to aid in tobacco-related health expenses, and yet less than 25 percent of Mississippi's income," said Kimberly Hughes, American Cancer Society Government Relations Director for Mississippi. "Raising the excise tax just makes good sense. It only affects less than 25 percent of the population that smokes, but could generate more than \$122 million in tax revenue for the state and most importantly save lives."

According to the Communities for a Clean Bill of Health, raising the cigarette tax by 50

cents would achieve the following in Mississippi.

- 5,900 children will no longer prematurely lose their lives to smoking-related illnesses
- 18,500 fewer youth under the age of 18 would begin to smoke
- 14,700 adult smokers would quit the habit
- More than \$122 million in tax revenue would be raised for critical health care needs
- More than \$5 million in sales tax revenue would be raised
- The state would save more than \$343 million in long-term health care costs

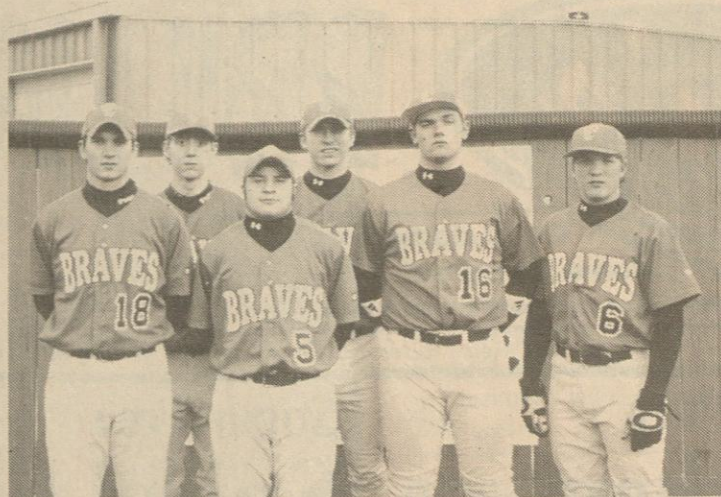

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army; American Red Cross; United Jewish Communities; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; and, United Way of America. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A Local Board will determine how the funds awarded to Tishomingo County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase

of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government; 2) have an accounting system; 3) practice nondiscrimination; 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs; and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Tishomingo County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Northeast Community Services and Helpful Samaritan Food Pantry.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Beverly Hall at 1-877-728-2118 for an application. The deadline for applications is Thursday, March 6, 2003, at which time a EFS meeting will

be held at the office of Community Services at the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

Red Cross Reaches From Iuka To Afghanistan & Back to Iuka

Last summer requests from the Tishomingo County Chapter of the American Red Cross appeared in the Tishomingo County News asking people in the county to donate articles to be sent to American soldiers in Afghanistan. And as always, Tishomingo County responded.

Several truckloads of articles were donated by Tishomingo County residents, according to Jim Seago of the Tishomingo County Chapter.

Some of these residents who gathered items to be sent to Afghanistan were members of Hubbard Salem Baptist Church.

Members, Benny Carter and his wife, Jessica, helped collect items and box them. They included a letter with their donations. In the top corner of their letter's envelope, Mrs. Carter wrote the return address with the word "Iuka" in it. Little did she know just how important this little word would be.

Meanwhile, a guy stationed a world away in Afghanistan, was almost daily being kidded about his hometown. Nobody believed he could be from a little Mississippi town called "Iuka." That name was just too unusual.

Shipping time for the supplies took about two weeks, and the soldiers were very appreciative when they received them. When the supplies did arrive, one of those who was helping distribute them noticed the "Iuka" on the envelope, and immediately sought out LeRon Hargrove, the guy who had received the daily kidding about the name of his hometown. Can't you just see LeRon's heart swelling as true believers were made out of all those other guys who had kidded him about his "Iuka."

Several letters had return addresses, and many of the soldiers wrote to express their thanks for the supplies.

LeRon was moved by his letter from Iuka. He took the time to write the Carters back, telling them about his life and family. He also sent an Afghanistan money bill with all the names and hometowns of the other platoon members.

LeRon thought the Carter's children would like that.

LeRon also read his letter to his fellow soldiers, and they were touched with the words of love and kindness, the prayers, and donations. They just could not believe these words of hope and love and thanks from people they did not even know. Sgt. LeRon said, "It was a good feeling, and my fellow soldiers felt grateful and blessed by the supplies and words from Iuka and Tishomingo County."

The Carters were delighted when they received their letter, and they showed it to everyone they saw, and they read it to the church members. Mrs. Carter said, "You see, God put the letter in the hands of someone who needed it. We all say that!" Jessica Carter also said, "I believe God was in this venture from the beginning. He led me to helping my church collect the items and then to get Mr. Seago to come to the church and pick them up." She has continued to lead Hubbard Salem members to keep in touch with LeRon's Afghanistan airbase and send them meaningful donations hoping to get in touch with another hometown soldier.

And the story does not end here. About a month after the Carters received their letter, Sgt. Hargrove returned to Ft Campbell, KY, and Christmas was just around the corner. LeRon Hargrove and his family were able to come home to Iuka to visit with his family for Christmas.

While at home, LeRon and his wife Lena, and his Mother went to Iuka Ford looking for Benny Carter. LeRon wanted to shake hands in person with Benny and thank him in person for reaching out to Afghanistan.

It just happened that Jessica was in town that morning and she, too, stopped by Iuka Ford where her husband works. In the parking lot, she found Benny and the Hargroves.

Ben and Jessica invited the Hargroves to join them for church the next day at Hubbard Salem. The Carters also invited the Seago family.

The members at Hubbard Salem and their pastor, Bro. Allen Osborn, were all overjoyed that Sunday morning when LeRon spoke thanking them for what they had meant to him and the other soldiers who were so far away from home in dangerous times.

LeRon's letters to the Carters follows:

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Carter
It sure was nice to read your letter. It sure means a lot to know that there are people who are praying for us back in the States.

My name is Sgt. LeRon Hargrove. My home station is Fort Campbell, KY. My platoon has been over here for almost six months. We are at a small airbase called Bagram. The temperature here gets up to at least one hundred degrees each day.

I have been in the Army for over eleven years. I am married and have two children. My wife's name is Lena. She is a model. We have a three-year-old daughter named Kiara. We also have a son who is less than a year old named Koba. They are truly a blessing. I love and miss them a lot. I thank the Lord for them everyday.

I am praying that by the time you receive this letter, I will be on my way home. Thank you for calling us American Heroes. I am truly honored to be fighting for all of you back there. Keep up the support, and keep the FLAG flying.

Like I stated earlier, I have been in the Army for over eleven years. I graduated from Iuka High School in 1991. (LeRon's friends and teachers will remember him as an award-winning basketball player and a good student.) My parents and brothers still live there. My parents are Dell and Annie Hargrove. My mom works at the Corner Store on Eastport Road. If you get a chance, please stop in and say, "Hello." (LeRon's sister, MeShell, is also in the military. She is stationed in North Carolina and has one son, Devan.)

Please continue to pray for us over here. My family and I will be praying for your family as well.

Jim Seago brought this information by the News office. He said he is so appreciative of all the contributions that Tishomingo County made last summer for our soldiers in Afghanistan, and he was especially happy that some of these supplies went directly to an Iuka/Tishomingo County soldier.

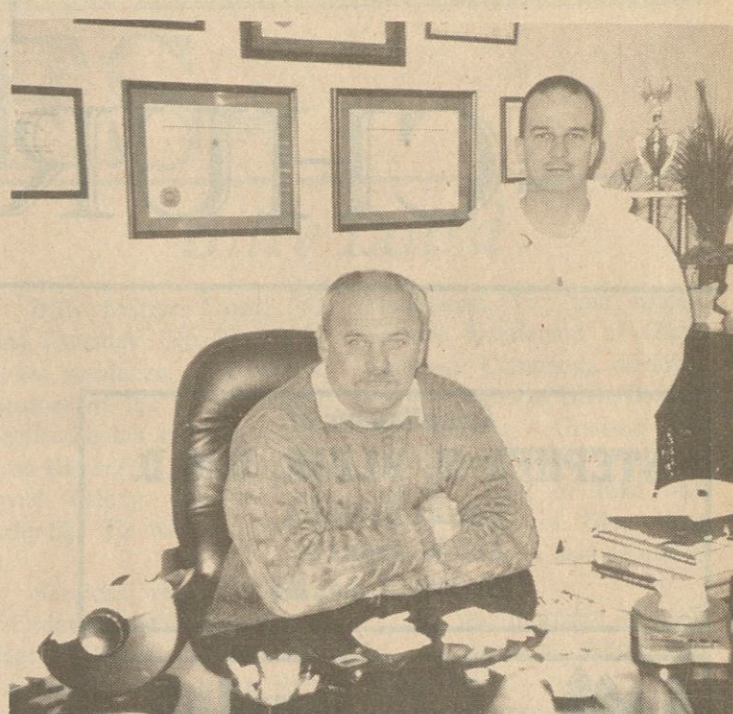

Drugs Seized at Burnsville Residence Sunday Night

Drugs were seized Sunday night, Feb. 23, from a residence in Burnsville and a warrant has been issued for the arrest of a Burnsville man in connection with the raid.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff David Smith, David Armadiez of One Elm Street, Burnsville, is being sought for questioning concerning the recovery of the illegal drugs.

Iuka Hospital Expands Ambulance Reach

With a new addition to its fleet and a new location in Belmont, Iuka Hospital's Ambulance Service now provides Tishomingo County residents the highest level of emergency care possible. The hospital recently purchased a top-of-the-line 2002 ambulance to be stationed at Iuka Hospital. The largest ambulance on the fleet, the new unit replaces a 2001 model that has been moved to a new dispatch station in Belmont. "This is our fourth new ambulance in five years," said Jerry Cummings, Iuka Hospital's Ambulance Service Supervisor. "We run two paramedic crews and five ambulances, 24 hours a day, seven days a week."

The Belmont ambulance is stationed at the former Belmont Fire Department. Every call is answered by a paramedic and a driver who is certified as a basic or intermediate level Emergency Medical Technician. "The new ambulance and the new Belmont station allow us to provide the same level of service to everyone in our area," Cummings said.

All five of Iuka Hospital's ambulances are equipped with a LIFEPAK 12 defibrillator/monitor. The device allows emergency responders to initiate a 12-lead electrocardiogram (ECG) and fax the results to the hospital's emergency department physicians by cell phone while patients are en route. The ECG has 12 sensors that are attached to specific areas of the patient's body to monitor different anatomical areas of the heart.

"This technology enables our physicians to make treatment decisions much earlier," Cummings said. "The single piece of equipment monitors the ECG continuously, measures the level of oxygen in the bloodstream and, if necessary, provides defibrillation and pacing to help maintain the heart's rhythm."

The monitor, which weighs 17 pounds, is compact and portable. It attaches to the bed rails and is transportable with the patient from the ambulance to the emergency department. The detailed test looks at the heart from several different angles to provide information about the condition of the entire organ.

With this information in hand, the emergency department physician can administer treatment more quickly after the patient arrives. Shortening treatment times can significantly speed recovery and improve a patient's chances of returning to a fully productive life. The Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District is participating in an ongoing statewide effort to identify, locate and evaluate children, birth through the age of twenty-one, who have a physical, mental, communicative and/or emotional disability. Early identification of children in need of special education experiences is most important to each child. Furthermore, this information gathered from contacts with parents and other agencies will be used to help determine present and future program needs as progress is made toward the goal of providing a free appropriate public education to all children with a disability.

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to any unauthorized person without informed consent.

Please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find Contact Person for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, if you know any children who may have a disability by calling 423-3206 or writing her at the following address: Tishomingo County Schools, 1620 Paul

Edmondson Drive, Iuka, MS 38852.

The Child Find Person implements child identification, location, and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find person works with the local Head Starts, Human Services, Health Department, and Mental Health Agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians, and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Contact person to insure that the Referral-to-Placement Procedures are followed. She works with the Local Survey Committee at each school to implement these procedures. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

As a part of Child Study, parents are invited to attend a Local Survey Committee Meeting to review a child's educational record and performance and determine a need for an evaluation. Prior to an evaluation, copies of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to the parents. District personnel explain these copies to the parents and insure that

they understand the Procedural Safeguards. This process be reviewed at each meeting.

After parental consent testing is obtained, a discriminatory evaluation is conducted. Student is evaluated in all areas related to the suspected disability qualified personnel.

Parents are invited to attend the Eligibility Determination Conference, the Multidisciplinary Evaluation/Eligibility determination if a disability. If the child meets eligibility criteria for special education services and/or related services, an Individualized Education Program is developed. Parents are invited to attend meeting. Parents must give permission for placement before a child can receive services. Parents, teachers, and students participate in the process. All students are reassessed at least once and reevaluated at least every three years.

We now have seven special education services in our district which are available to students who have physical, developmental, communicative, emotional disability. The Tishomingo School District to provide free appropriate education to all children with disabilities through age one.
