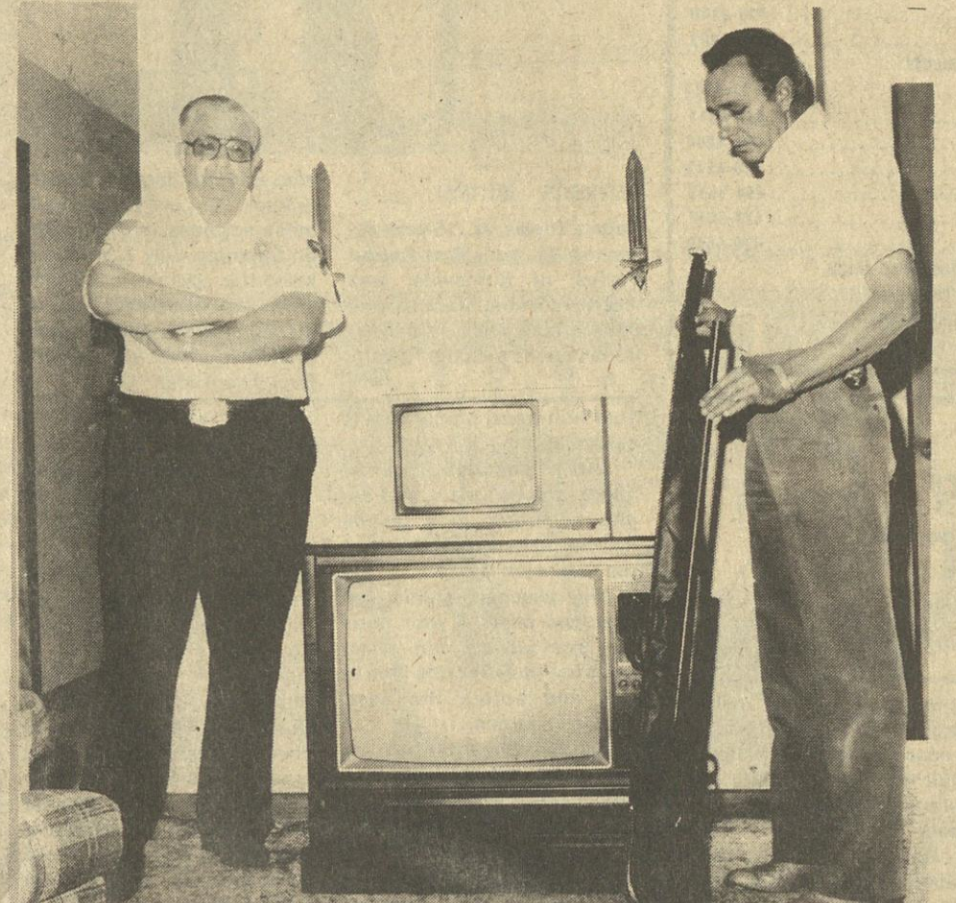
IUKA 10 YEAR OLD ALL-STARS TO VIE FOR STATE TITLE

STOLEN GOODS RETURNED HOME

Two men have been arrested in connection with the July 2 burglary of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Grisham of Iuka, according to information released from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's office.



Local law officials, acting on tips, made the arrests following the discovery of several items which were identified as taken from the Grisham residence. Sheriff Bob Payne said James Luster, 29, of Corinth, has been charged with breaking and entering, grand larceny, and receiving stolen property and Milton Christian, 29, of Booneville, is charged with breaking and entering and grand larceny. Christian was released from the Tishomingo County Jail under a \$15,000 bond. Luster's bond was set at \$10,000. He also has been released according to the sheriff. Both men are awaiting action of the Grand Jury.

Recovered and returned to the Grishams was a 25 inch color TV, a 13 inch color TV, and a 12 gauge shot gun. The small TV set along with the shot gun were discovered at the apartment of Luster's sister in Corinth on Wednesday, July 4. Authorities found the larger TV set in the home of Christian's mother-in-law in Booneville on Saturday, July 7.

Mr. Grisham told the News that still missing from the July 2 robbery were various other personal items; however, the Grisham home has been broken into and burglarized on three other separate occasions. Sheriff Payne noted that the Tishomingo County law officials and Iuka Police Chief, Joel Holliman, were greatly aided by Alcorn and Prentiss County law officers in making the arrests and recovering the stolen merchandise.

Soybean Pests

As soybean crops develop, insects may become a major factor in production. Tishomingo County farmers should look for green clover worm infestations now and soybean looper and velvetbean caterpillars as the season progresses.

Despite the different times these three insects attack plants, many farmers confuse them because they are similar in appearance.

Early in the season, it is usually good to have a few of these worms in your fields to attract beneficial insects.

The green clover worm usually will be the first foliage-feeding worm to attack soybeans. It is uniformly pale green with white stripes running along the sides.

Although this pest makes the same looping movement as the soybean looper, it has three pair of prolegs, as opposed to the soybean looper's two pair.

The green color worm is also similar to the velvetbean caterpillar because it makes similar vigorous movements when knocked to the ground. However, the velvetbean caterpillar has four pair of prolegs.

The velvetbean caterpillar

generally attacks soybean crops in mid-season and late season. It varies from light to dull green with white lines running the length of the body.

However, the lines of the sides of this larva are usually much broader than those on the green clover worm or looper. It also has a yellowish or orange head and four pair of prolegs.

A later season pest is the soybean looper. The looper may occur in large numbers. Infestations are generally heavier in late planted beans.

The soybean looper moves with a looping movement when it crawls. It is light green with thin white lines running the length of the body on the sides and top. The body tapers toward the head and has two pair of prolegs.

If bean plants are not blooming or filling pods, apply insecticides when eight or more worms at least one-half inch long are present per foot of row or when 35 percent foliage loss has occurred.

your fruit trees, proper care is essential.

Spray peaches, plums, bunch grapes, pears, and apples according to a recommended schedule available at the Extension Office.

Thin peaches, plums, apples, and pears if your trees are overloaded. Thin when fruits are three-fourths inch in size and before the seed begins to harden.

Thin peaches four to six inches apart and apples or pears six to eight inches apart. Prune and train young fruit trees by removing suckers from trunks and by thinning branches throughout the growing season.

**Popular Food Provides
Good Nutrition,
Few Calories**

Some of the most popular American meals -- hamburgers, tacos, pizza, quiche and chef's salad -- are flavorful, easy to prepare and many contain foods from each of the four basic food groups.

With a few variations, these favorite meals can be high in nutrients and lower in calories. For example, make

that hamburger a cheeseburger, add fresh green lettuce or other salad greens and a ripe tomato slice.

To reduce calories, start with lean ground beef and low-fat process cheese. Use high calorie condiments sparingly.

Tacos are more nutritious and flavorful when meat sauce is topped with grated cheese, fresh tomatoes and shredded lettuce. To lower calories, use lean ground beef and drain the fat before adding it to the tomato sauce mixture. Top with low-fat process cheese.

Pizza can be high in nutrition and flavor. To increase the nutrients and lower the calories per serving, choose mozzarella cheese made from skim milk, add a generous amount of green pepper strips and brown and drain the fat from lean ground beef and sausage before adding to the pizza.

Quiche is another high nutrient favorite with its basic ingredients of milk, cheese and eggs. Make it lower in calories by using low-fat cheese, skim milk, your choice of lean ham, shrimp or crabmeat, and spinach or broccoli. A bit of pimiento pepper makes it even more appealing.

A chef's salad begins with salad greens and a variety of other fresh vegetables, and becomes a main dish with hard-cooked eggs, strips of cheese, lean ham, chicken or turkey and croutons. Reduce the calories by again choosing low-fat cheese and limit or eliminate rich salad dressings.

Many commercially prepared reduced-calorie dressings add a lot of flavor for the calories they provide. Experiment with your own low calorie dressings. Try one made with cottage cheese, buttermilk and herbs -- a

Nutrition can be increased by drinking a glass of milk with these meals. Lower calorie versions are buttermilk and skim milk.

Calories and nutrients vary in these dishes according to serving size and specific ingredients. But these long-time favorites can be easily varied to be good nutrition choices for the calories they provide.

Spaghetti

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 2 large cans tomatoes
- 1 can tomato paste
- 1 can water
- 3 large onions (red or white)
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms (canned or fresh sauteed in butter)
- 1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese
- 1 tsp. salt & pepper (each)
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese

Brown meat in iron skillet. Add chopped onion and one garlic clove. Put tomatoes through colander and add to meat mixture, then add seasonings. Simmer for 2 hours, then add the mushrooms and the other garlic clove. Simmer 2 more hours. Cook 2 packages vermicelli. Just before serving add cheese to sauce. Pour

over vermicelli and top with Parmesan cheese. The sauce is better if made the day before. Serves 10-12.

**Protect Children From
Farm Hazards**

During summer months, children have more time to play outdoors but also more time to hurt themselves by being careless. Farms are particularly dangerous for children and teenagers.

About one in three persons killed accidentally in the United States are under age 25 -- over 30,000 annually. Accidents respect no age so youth in the 4-H Safety Project offer these tips for farm kids for a safe summer.

Farm children are often exposed to workplace hazards and many become victims of accidents involving farm machinery, animals, and chemicals. Though not helping with the work, small children are often in the work area watching or playing.

Children are often asked, or volunteer, to help with some farm jobs or take on routine chores. Unless the assignment is within the child's ability and he is properly trained and supervised, serious injury could result.

Show young workers how to do a job properly and safely. Then watch them until they can handle the work satisfactorily.

Do not allow horseplay, show-off behavior or sloppiness. Farm work is serious business and, if not done properly, the result could be wasted time, lower production, damaged equipment, and, worst of all, personal injury.

Youth should be warned to stay out of silos, bins, feedlots, pens, chemical or fuel storage areas, the farm shop and other places where they could get hurt. Installing locks and barricades will help. Machinery operators should always remove keys from motorized equipment to prevent children from starting it.

No child should be allowed to operate farm machinery until he is physically and mentally capable of handling it. Only licensed drivers should be permitted to operate tractors or self-propelled farm machines on public roads.

Outdoor play areas should be fenced to keep children from wandering out to the

road, barn, pond, or machine shed. Pesticides, medications, firearms, sharp tools and household cleaning products should be kept out of reach or locked up.

The 4-H Safety Project teaches youth safety practices on the farm, at home, and at work. For more information on the 4-H Safety Program, contact the Tishomingo County Extension Office.

TV AND YOUR EYES

Your favorite TV show is on the screen, but why is the picture out of focus? Maybe it's not the picture. Maybe it's your eyes. Watching TV for long periods of time can cause eye fatigue. But TV watching is not harmful to the eyes.

To give your eyes a break when watching TV, you should be sitting at least six feet away from the screen. One guide is to sit at a distance that is five times the width of the picture. And don't sit in the dark. It's not good for your eyes. There should be light in the room, but not bright enough to wash out the TV picture. Move the light or the TV so that it doesn't cause a reflection or glare in the TV

screen. The set should be in perfect focus. If you've done all you can to get a clear picture but still have trouble seeing well, maybe it's time for an eye examination. Corrective glasses, contact lenses or a prescription will provide eyes where you need them to be: back to picture-clear and

PILLING YOUR DOG

Many people are frustrated when it comes to giving medication, capsules or pills to their dogs. They try mixing it in with Rover's food and then find nothing but a pill left in the bowl. They grind it up and find that Rover will not eat his food at all. They shove it in his mouth, only to find it on the floor a minute later.

It's really not hard if you tackle the job directly. Any dog can be made to swallow pills, capsules and tablets, if only the right technique is applied. And don't think you're being cruel by "forcing it down his throat". It doesn't hurt, and it would be more cruel to deprive your dog of his prescribed medication.

Grasp his muzzle from the top. Then push firmly in and up on his top lip, just behind his canine teeth. This should get

him to open his mouth. Push the other side down on the jaw and slide the deep down into dog's throat with index and middle fingers. Then remove your hand and clamp his jaws. Rubbing his throat thumping it should then get him to swallow his medication.

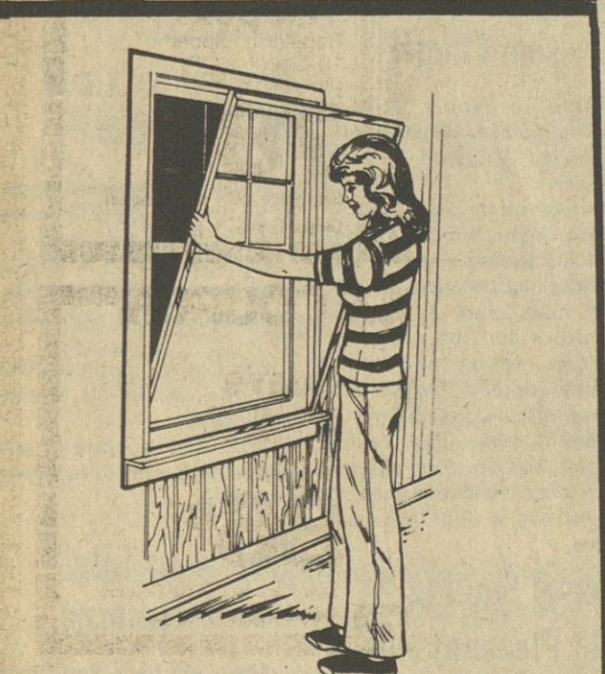

They are grown in greenhouses or southern states for fresh use the year around. The calendar adds their special bright color, tempting and vitamin value. They are used for pies and are endless. In a cupboard without catfish, fresh tomatoes are an ideal vegetable, served wedges, or accordion, either alone or in combination with salad, cucumbers, celery, asparagus or power. Tomatoes are among the important source of Vitamin C. One medium-sized (three to a pound) will give you nearly half your quota of vitamin C, as a generous amount of Vitamin A. To get the most good from tomatoes, eat them raw or But remember they have a large share of their nutrients even when cooked. More ripe tomatoes available from home gardeners will be mostly dependent on purchased ones for fresh use. To get the most from tomatoes from retail centers, choose ones that are plump, firm, free from hard places, spots, and unhealed

flavor or color that unchilled tomatoes do. Tomatoes that have been chilled soften instead of ripening when returned to room temperature. This is why cold storage tomatoes, kept for mid-winter demand, have three common characteristics: mushiness, lack of color, and lack of flavor.

Underripe tomatoes, even mature green ones about to turn color, will ripen indoors. Spread them out at cool room temperatures (at 60 to 70 degrees F.), in the basement, or on the porch if not too cold.

Light isn't needed to produce good red color after tomatoes are picked. Ripening on a sunny window sill in summer is a poor practice; too much sunlight prevents development of normal or even color, and high temperatures promote rapid spoilage.

Immature green tomatoes won't ripen and are likely to rot if kept too long. It's best to cook them soon after picking.

In Mississippi, where tomatoes are available from local sources throughout the summer, fresh homegrown tomatoes are daily fare on many tables. Now that canned tomatoes have increased so much more in price than fresh ones, fresh tomatoes can often be used in casseroles and soups as economically as canned ones.

Sun Tans

Will Getting A Tan Really Damage My Skin?

Summer's here and the great American race to get a tan is on. Even the problem of those "tanning lines" has been solved this season with the marvel of new "light transparent" tanning suits.

While a tan can represent a healthy, outdoors appearance, solar radiation has profound and progressive effects on human skin. So before the sun reaches its zenith, perhaps a few words of caution are in order.

The skin is the largest organ of our bodies and accounts for a full 15 percent of our body's weight. It's unique exposure to the environment makes the skin the most frequently damaged organ by environmental stresses.

The social significance of skin is considerable. Its coloring defects and blemishes are likely to be the basis of our first impression of someone's age. The advertising industry reminds us that what we most admire is youthful-appearing skin, not a youthful stride.

As we age, the skin changes in predictable ways, including thinning and the loss of elastic fibers, leading to sagging, dryness, and the inevitable wrinkling. The first signs of aging that most of us will see will be in exposed areas of our skin.

Many factors are responsible for these changes and they seem to be unique for each individual. Genetic variation, chromosomal aberrations, auto-immunity, disease, and exposure to environmental stress all program our skin for the changes of natural aging. The most important factor, however, is the one brought about by the effect of the sun. It's solar exposure rather than time that wreaks the greatest havoc on skin, as the contrast between exposed and covered skin clearly shows.

When the rays of sunlight reach the skin, a number of chemical reactions begin. Radiant energy is absorbed

by keratin, melanin, and amino acids and leads to irreversible complex changes. Melanin is an efficient absorber of solar energy and acts as a protectant. The more melanin, the greater the protection, which explains why the risk of damage to the skin is greatest in blonds or redheads and blue eyes or fair complexions.

This increase in melanin and darkening of the skin is what tanning is all about - the response of the body to protect against solar radiation. Continued exposure to solar radiation will result in a direct thermal burn to the skin, or sunburn - a condition which once experienced is unlikely to be forgotten.

The energy of solar rays leads to damage to the tiny elastic fibers in the skin, producing "solar elastosis" and wrinkling. Damage to the collagen fibers leads to thinning of the skin so that small vessels become visible or rupture, causing brownish purple spots. As the body responds by producing more of the protective melanin, the skin darkens or freckles.

The effects of sun-damage or cumulative and may begin at an early age. Sun-damage to the skin may be severe as early as age 20. Age and sun-related changes can promote the development of premalignant and malignant skin disease. Lesions, named "actinic" to show that they are "sun-ray" caused, can develop squamous cell carcinoma, a cancer of the skin. Other skin cancers - basal cell carcinoma, lentigo maligna, and melanoma - can occur in sun-damaged skin.

Limiting your exposure to the sun is the best preventative for premature aging. Sunscreens should be used even at an early age. Exposure between the hours of 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. is particularly risky. Reflection of the rays from sand, water, or snow considerably increases the effect of the radiation. Protective clothing is almost mandatory for the fair-complexioned.

Choosing a sunscreen is easier since industry-wide standardization. Look for the labeled number on the bottle. The number 15 - maximum protection - indicates that the time required to produce a burn is increased by a factor of 15 over nonprotected skin. Smaller numbers mean less time before burning occurs. Sunscreens and tanning lotions differ because tanning preparations are designed to let the ultraviolet rays reach the skin and produce tanning.

Everyone will experience a natural process of skin aging, but it's clear that the process is accelerated by continued exposure to the effects of solar radiation.

WHO NEEDS VITAMINS?

A USDA diet study of 37,785 Americans showed the majority ate more fat and protein than needed and not enough vitamin-mineral-rich fresh fruits and vegetables. More than half got too little vitamin B6. Two-thirds had low vitamin A intakes and one-fourth had low intakes of vitamin C.

Thirty-two percent did not get enough iron. Thirty-nine percent ate too little magnesium and 42 percent too little calcium. More than half of all females over age 11 did not consume enough calcium.

Around one-third of those studied were on very low calorie diets. Forty percent of all females 19-50 were in this group, reflecting the common practice of weight-loss diets among women. It is often difficult to get all the nutrients needed on such diets.

Eat a balanced diet and you'll get enough vitamins and minerals. But if food habits are irregular, if you snack on the run or avoid certain categories of food, you probably need a vitamin-mineral supplement. It is also good insurance for infants, growing children, pregnant and nursing mothers, people on reducing diets, and the elderly.



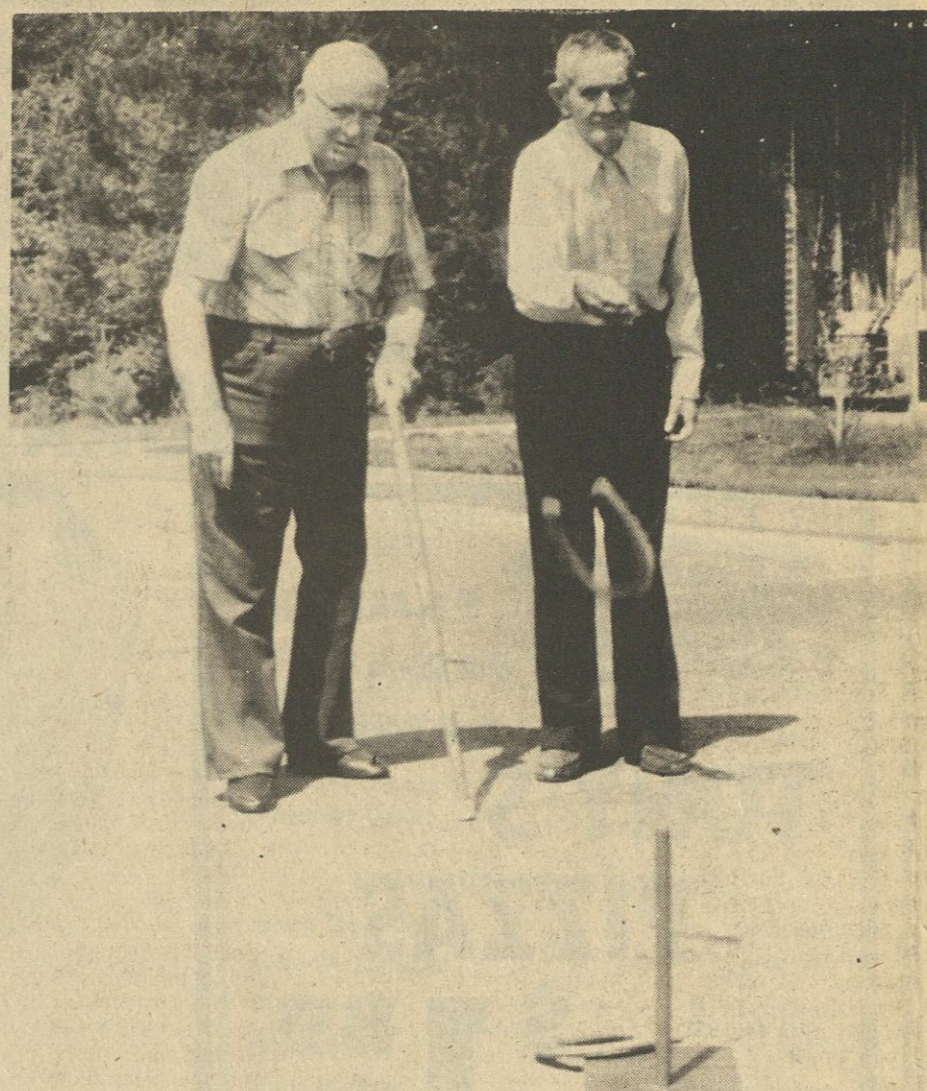

Norma Dennison To Speak At W.M.U. Prayer Retreat

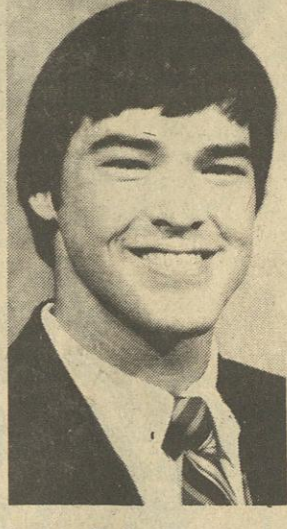

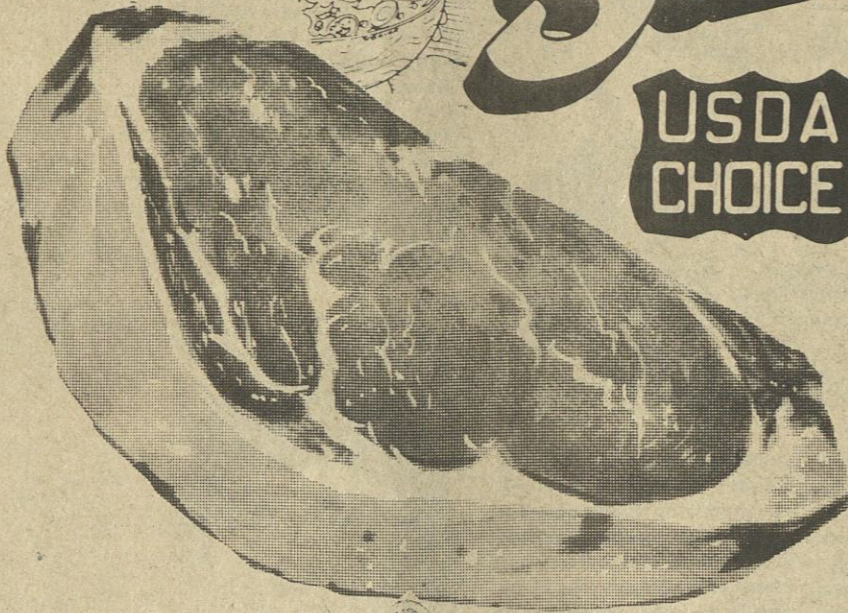

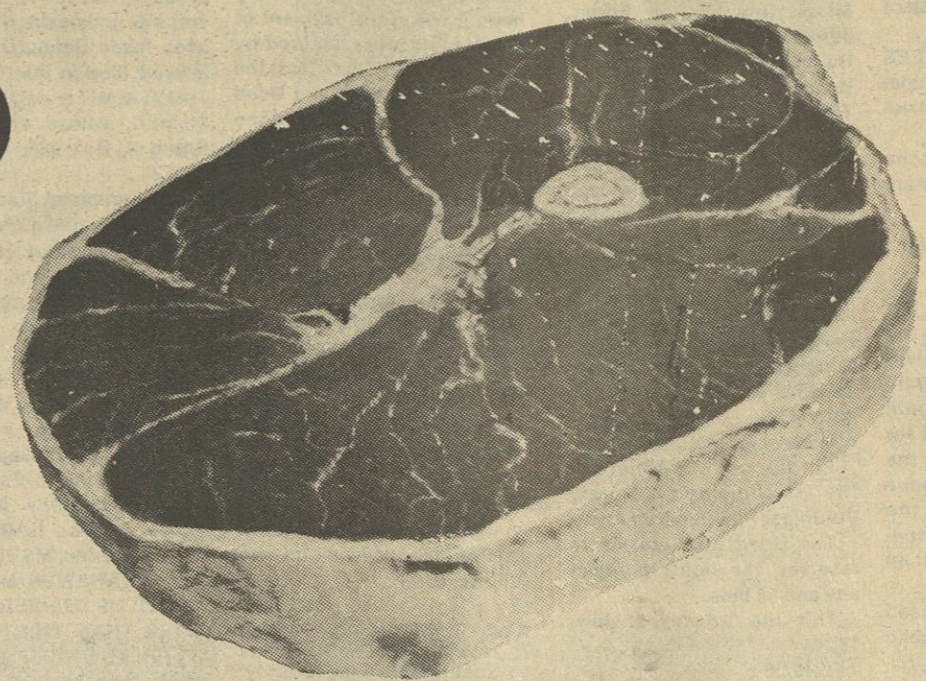

UNPREDICTABLE ULCER

Allan R. Magie, Ph.D., M.P.H.

Almost everyone has had or knows someone who has suffered from the distress and discomfort of ulcers. This shouldn't come as a surprise, since about one in every ten Americans has had an ulcer at some time during his life. Ulcers come in two forms--gastric (the stomach) and duodenal (the first section of the small intestine). Apparently both have similar origins.

Yet ulcers remain an enigma to medical science. We have only a partial understanding of why ulcers form. In general, stomach ulcers develop because the delicate mucous membrane of the stomach cannot protect it from its own digestive juices, and ulcers of the duodenum often occur when stomach acid spills over into the intestines. It's also difficult to predict who'll develop them. The so-called "ulcer type" or "ulcer personality" is probably just a myth. Although certain life-styles and emotional makeups seem to be associated with ulcers, they cannot be classified with any certainty. For example, many tense persons never get ulcers while calm and seemingly relaxed individuals do.

There are, however, several factors associated with ulcer development. Men are more often affected than women. Ulcers seem to be much more common in individuals who have a family history of the problem. Increasing numbers of adolescents are afflicted. Smoking cigarettes and drinking alcoholic beverages are associated with ulcer formation and



definitely delay the normally used drugs, aspirin, the common and arthritis remedies, increase one's risk.

Ulcers are dangerous. Just who's had one? The destruction of the protective lining of the stomach allows acid to eat into the stomach walls. Pain is accompanied by intestinal which causes bloated or stools to

What can a person do to prevent ulcers? Avoids ulcers? A lot. Ulcers require rest. Avoids and irritating diet. So is a life-style by observing rest and sleep emotionally stressed. And yes, you may need to avoid all caffeine and alcohol.

Ulcers demand attention. And they should be taken seriously. They can ruin your life if you ignore warning signals.

ASCS Farm News

MONDAY, JULY 16TH LAST DAY TO CERTIFY

Monday, July 16th, is the last day to certify your planned acres. Every farm with a lease or with a crop planted could be certified. All crops to be reported. This includes corn, grain sorghum, cotton, soybeans, peanuts, marketable truck crops, hay and ACR (Acreage Conservation Reserve). Failure to report can cause you to lose program benefits. It can result in the crop being ineligible to qualify for FCIC insurance in future years, and will cause the yield for the farm to be zero for upland cotton and the program crop acreage to be zero for each program crop. Don't miss out on future program benefits. Certify your crops before July 16th.

FARM PROGRAMS REVIEWED BY ASC COMMITTEEMEN

Farmers from each of Mississippi's 82 counties to serve as members of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees had an opportunity to participate in a series of four meetings which were held throughout the state. The last such meeting was held at Greenwood this week for farmer elected committee members from the Delta area. Similar meetings were held at Hattiesburg, Jackson and Hattiesburg.

Barron, State Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Mississippi, and other state ASCS officials who work with the various farm programs were on hand to discuss the current farm programs and to answer questions. O.M. Tilley, of Jackson County, and Jack Tomson, of Benton County,

who are members of the State ASC Committee, also participated in the meetings. State Director T.M. Barron emphasized the importance of the role which is played by ASC county committee members in overseeing and administering farm programs in their respective counties. He emphasized that farmers are entitled to efficient and courteous service and county committees need to see that this type of service is offered by ASCS in every county.

At each of the meetings committee members reviewed the current farm programs which are administered by ASCS and raised questions in areas of concern. There was a general feeling of optimism concerning the present farm situation in that the 1983 Payment-in-Kind (PIK) Program was successful in reducing surpluses of cotton, rice, wheat, feed grain and soybeans have all improved substantially in recent months.

State Committee member, O.M. Tilley, noted that the Milk Reduction Program, which was implemented this year, has been well received in Mississippi. In southern Mississippi, especially, which is a heavy milk producing area, participation in the program has been heavy. He expressed optimism that this program is a giant step in getting milk production in line with consumption in order to eliminate the burdensome surpluses of dairy products.

Committee members heard an in-depth discussion of the Agricultural Conservation Program and the Forestry Incentive Program both which are administered by ASCS. It was emphasized that the funds for sharing of conservation cost are being directed toward the steeper and more highly erodible soil. Committee members were encouraged to utilize these funds with the utmost care in getting the most conservation possible for the tax-

payer's dollar. State Director, T.M. Barron, at each of the four meetings, emphasized the need for continued participation in the Acreage Reduction Program which is available to producers of cotton, feed grain, and other basic commodities. He pointed out that the PIK Program was a one-time program; and although it was successful in eliminating surpluses, the problem of surpluses can arise quickly if farmers produce in surplus of the demand.

People Have Responsibility To Report

People who receive Social Security benefits have the important responsibility to report events to the Social Security Administration that could affect payment of those benefits.

Failure to report could mean that a needed check

might not arrive on time, or it could result in an overpayment a person can ill afford to repay.

Things everyone needs to report are:

- * Change of mailing address, even if the person's checks are deposited directly into a checking or savings account.
- * Earnings of more than the 1984 annual limit - \$6,960.00 for people 65 to 70 and \$5,160.00 for people under 65.
- * If the person goes outside the U.S. for 30 days or more.
- * If the person works outside the U.S.

Things disabled people must report:

- * Any improvement in condition.
- * Any work.
- * Receipt of, or change in the amount of Worker's Compensation.
- Things dependents or survivors must report:
 - * Divorce or annulment.
 - * Marriage.
 - * Adoption of a child.
 - * Child leaves care of wife, husband, widow, or widower.

Someone should report for a beneficiary if:

- * A person is unable to manage funds.
- * A person getting benefits dies. The check for the month of death must be returned. The check should be returned to the Social Security Administration. The post office will not deliver and will return checks of a beneficiary who is known to be deceased.

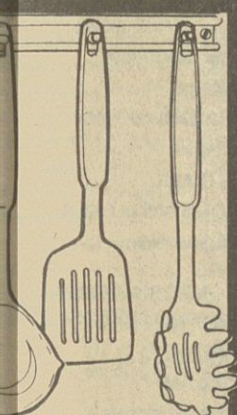

PECAN 'N' HONEY COOKIES

ASCS Farm News

July 15, Last Day To Report Corn Acres

Tishomingo County farmers who have planted corn and other spring seeded crops still have a few days to report the acreage to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and become eligible for 1984 farm program benefits.

"The final certification date is July 15, 1984," Howard R. Bridges said. Farmers who meet this deadline will avoid paying a late certification fee of \$17.40. He said that all farmers who accurately

report crop acreages will be eligible for price support loans and target price protection.

To date 102 farms are certified and in compliance with provisions of the 1984 acreage reduction program. Bridges said the entire farm must be certified correctly before farm program participants can receive benefits. Those farmers who are not participating in the 1984 programs should also certify their acreages because their participation in future programs can be adversely affected if they fail to certify their acreages of crops.

To avoid eligibility

problems and be sure of their planted acres, farmers can request measurement service. "For a reasonable fee farmers can have their planted crops measured before reporting their acreages." Bridges said the fee covers the cost of a farm visit and the work necessary to accurately measure the acreage.

The ASCS official said farms will be randomly checked to verify that acreage reports are correct and aerial photographs will be available for farmers to identify their fields.

Crops may be certified with the county ASCS office weekdays between 8:00 a.m.

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TREATING PMS

PMS is an abbreviation which stands for *premenstrual syndrome* - a group of symptoms that occur in an estimated 40% of the female population. The specific cause of PMS is unknown, and the symptoms vary. Women may suffer with one or more of the following problems for up to three weeks of each month: *tension, depression, cystitis, headache, backache, diarrhea, dizziness, constipation, irritability, panic attacks, tender breasts, swollen ankles, and painful joints.*

No one medicine has been found to relieve all of these problems, or even the same symptom in all women. Common aspirin and acetaminophen provide a great measure of relief for many women. Prescription arthritis medicines, which fight inflammation, are sometimes helpful in reducing pelvic pain. Diuretics (fluid pills) relieve swollen ankles and premenstrual weight gain.

Many physicians and their patients have found that the hormone progesterone - in birth control pills or via injection or suppository - relieves several PMS symptoms in a large number of women. Progesterone therapy is popular in Great Britain and is increasing in popularity in North America.

According to Drown, the program has been quite successful for students in the past. "We find that the retention rate of those students who attend the orientation programs is quite high."

Students majoring in one of the following curriculums should attend the first session of orientation and pre-registration: agriculture, agriculture education, air conditioning and refrigeration technology, auto body repair, auto mechanics, biology, carpentry and cabinet making, chemistry, child care development technology, civil technology, combined science, computer science, cosmetology, country-western music, dental hygiene technology, dentistry, diesel mechanics, distribution and marketing technology, drafting and design technology, electrical technology, electronics technology, engineering, entomology, fashion merchandising (4 year), fashion merchandising technology (2 year), forestry technology.

Also included are forestry (4 year), heavy equipment, home economics, home economics education, hotel-motel-restaurant technology, machine shop, mathematics, medical assisting technology, medical laboratory technology (2

Caladiums Are Near Perfect In The Garden

If a perfect garden plant is one that combines extraordinary beauty with versatility and ease of care, then caladiums approach perfection.

These spectacular relatives of common philodendron tolerate almost any garden soil and thrive either in sun or shade. Caladiums can brighten spots in the landscape where many flowers fail with flamboyant foliage that lasts all summer long.

What are called "Fancy Leaf" types are the most valuable caladiums for home gardeners. "Fabulous Leaf" might be more accurate. Kaleidoscopic splashes of pink, red, white and green adorn the large heart-shaped leaves of most varieties. Others are washed a solid creamy white with veins and outer edges tinted rich green. There are dozens of variations to choose from.

Caladiums dazzle in flower beds and shrub borders, make attractive foundation plants and are absolutely breathtaking when boldly clustered within lawns and beneath trees.

The best news of all is how easy caladiums are to grow. The "Fancy Leaf" Caladiums planting and care guide informs gardeners that caladium foliage sprouts from bulb-like tubers, which are available during spring and summer, as are caladium seedlings and full-size plants. Economy-minded gardeners prefer the tubers, especially when planting caladiums the way they look best—in masses of a dozen or more.

Plant the tubers in the garden after all danger of frost



has passed, and when soil becomes warm to the touch. If earth is sandy or loaded with heavy clay, dig in some peat moss or compost before planting. Place tubers upright in furrows or individual holes spaced nine to fifteen inches apart. Cover with two to three inches of soil. Eliminate air pockets by firming the earth around each tuber. A mulch layer on top of soil helps retain moisture while inhibiting weed growth.

When planting window boxes or other containers, be sure the potting soil provides fast drainage. A mix of three parts peat moss and one part sand plus bark chips works well.

Immediately after planting, dampen the soil. Throughout the growing season, water only when soil dries. Resilient as caladiums are, continuous overwatering takes a toll.

The first leaves unfurl three to six weeks after planting, depending on soil conditions. A dose of fertilizer applied just as foliage emerges promotes

vigorous growth and vibrant coloration. A good rule of thumb is to use two pounds of 6-6-6 plant food per 100 square feet of planting area. Reapply monthly. If more convenient, use a liquid fertilizer drench when plants get larger. In warm southern climates, where caladiums can grow year-round, feed bi-monthly from November through February.

Caladiums originate from tropical Brazil. In cold regions, they cannot overwinter outdoors and should be dug and stored. The "Fancy Leaf" Caladium planting and care guide provides the simple instructions. Unlike other bulbs, never refrigerate caladium tubers and do not be alarmed if, in six to eight weeks after digging, new growth sprouts. It is a sign that tubers are already prepared for next summer's display.
