

Residents of the state of Mississippi who do not have a Federal Firearms License may bid on these firearms by having evidence in their possession at the time they register on sale day that they have been cleared to register for a bid card from a background check done by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department. Regular federal firearm license holders from any state will qualify to register for a bid card provided they show proper photo ID and current license information. The Sheriff's Department has agreed to do background checks on individuals for this auction starting Tuesday, Jan. 6 and continuing through sale time on the 10th. 



Foreign high school students are scheduled to arrive soon for academic semester program homestays, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) Executive Director, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and are anxious to share their cultural experience with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend lies by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it be a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.


Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim at \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Germany, the Former Soviet Brazil, Macedonia, Hungary, Korea, Ghana, Mexico, Italy, Paraguay, Australia, Yugoslavia, China, Belgium, Vietnam and many other countries. P.I.E. has also been invited to participate in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union to the United States. 

Conservation Cost-Share Program Underway

The sign-up is presently underway for the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). This program will provide cost-share assistance to install conservation practices on private lands in Tishomingo County. Resource concerns that are eligible for assistance through EQIP are sedimentation, grazing lands, and forestry.

Applications are ranked and environmental points are assigned based on a number of different factors and whether the applications are for forestry, grassland or cropland. Some of the factors include points per ton of soil loss from sheet and reel erosion and gully erosion; points from various types of practices and systems in grazing lands; and site index and land cover conditions in forestlands are also assigned points.





As it is in the hospital business, a great team is hard to come by and manage at the same time, but Iuka is fortunate to have such a police force.



Wicker Highlights VA Impact In Mississippi

The Department of Veterans Affairs spent nearly \$750 million in 2002 on benefits for Mississippi veterans and dependents. The VA's wide-ranging programs reach into virtually every community in our state and reflect the nation's commitment to caring for the men and women who have served in our armed forces.

There are more than 245,600 veterans in Mississippi. They receive medical care, disability compensation, pension payments, home loan guarantees, and education assistance. Our state also maintains three national cemeteries where 849 veterans were buried last year.

Health Care Options

Health care programs are by far the largest and most visible component of the VA's activities nationwide and throughout Mississippi. The VA operates comprehensive medical centers in Jackson and Biloxi/Gulfport. Many veterans from north Mississippi also receive treatment at the VA Medical Center in Memphis.

Health care services are also provided at community-based outpatient clinics in Smithville, Houlka, Tremont, Kosclusko, Meridian, Hattiesburg, Byhalia, Natchez, Meadville, Greenville. An eleventh clinic has been approved for Columbus.

Geriatric care is a growing component of the VA's efforts to serve our veterans. Nearly 40 percent of all veterans are at least 65 years old, compared with 12 percent of the general population. More than 41,000 Mississippi veterans over age 65 received treatment last year from the VA. Programs include adult day care, home health aide services, and contract home health care. The State of Mississippi also operates four 150bed veterans homes that are supported with VA funds. All four facilities, located in Oxford, Collins, Jackson, and Kosciusko, offer skilled nursing care.

Research Efforts Continuing The VA conducts valuable



The VA's Regional Office ordinates disability compensi for individuals with medical pr lems related to their military vice. Last year, the Jackson office processed 8,877 disabil claims. Because of the complet of some cases, handling claims can take several months am encouraged that our recent forts in Congress to provide a tional funding will help stream this process and speed resolution of these cases. Family members veterans also may qualify monthly VA payments as survi of disabled veterans or pension cipients.

More than 4,600 Mississi veterans took advantage of Mo gomery GI education bill bene in 2002. This program prov direct tuition assistance for ve ans to attend community college senior college in our state. other 27,000 veterans in Mis sippi purchased homes through VA's home loan guarantee gram.

Veterans are eligible burial in a national cemetery, a their dependent children spouses. The VA manages national cemeteries in 39 sta The three cemeteries in Mississ are in Corinth, Biloxi, Natchez. In 2002, 47 veter were interred at Corinth. Bil were 723 burials in the cemetery and 79 in Natchez.

Poinsettias Provide Traditional Beauty

Known today as the most pular Christmas plant, poinsets long ago were called Flores de che Buena (Flowers of the Holy

The legend has it that a little in Mexico, named Pepita, and r cousin, Pedro, were on their ay to church in honor of the hrist Child. Pepita was poor and ad no money for gifts. On the ay to church she picked a bouuet of wild flowers and as she laid em lovingly on the altar, they med into beautiful poinsettias.

hence the name Flores de Noche Buena.

The colorful parts of a poinsettia are actually modified leaves known as bracts. The true flowers are the small, yellow buttons in the centers of the bracts. One popular variety is the Sonora Jingle Bells that have dark red bracts with white flecks, giving it a peppermint look

My personal favorite is Pepride with dark green leaves and deep red bracts that are shaped like oak leaves. Freedom is a dark red

variety with dark green leaves. It is awfully hard to find a prettier poinsettia than this one.

Silver Star is another poinsettia that has garnered my attention. This variety has dark red bracts but also variegated foliage of silver and green.

Monet is my favorite pink variety. Unless you prefer red, this may be the most beautiful poinsettia ever developed. The bracts are pink with drifts of a darker pink or burgundy, giving it a painted look. Marble Star is another great pink variety with a creamy white variegation that gives it a marble look.

One myth that has hung around for years is that poinsettias are poisonous. Research at Ohio State University has proven conclusively that the poinsettia plant and its juice are not poisonous.

Poinsettias can hold their color way past Christmas if you shop wisely. Look for plants with

fully mature, thoroughly colored and expanded bracts, and small green flower buds. Select plants with dark green foliage down to the soil line. This indicates a healthy root system.

Reject plants with damaged or discolored foliage and select symmetrical plants in proportion to their containers. As a rule of thumb, poinsettias should be 2 1/2 times bigger than their pots. In other words, a 15 to 18-inch-tall




"Christmas Under The Stars"

poinsettia for decorative effects. When possible, place the plant in the sunniest location in your home. A window that faces south, east or west is better than one facing north. Don't let the bracts touch the cold windowpanes, since freezing outdoor temperatures can cause damage.

Your poinsettia was greenhouse grown at day temperatures of 70 to 72 degrees and night temperatures of about 60 degrees. Your plant will last longer if you provide similar temperatures. Two problems most often encountered with poinsettias center around watering. With the busy holiday season, forgetting to water can be disastrous for a poinsettia.

Examine the soil daily. When the surface is dry to the touch, water until it runs freely out the drainage hole in the container. The second major problem results from decorative wraps that can trap water and suffocate the roots. Be sure to pour out any excess water.

Durable plants promise weeks of enjoyment. Look for strong, stiff stems, good leaf and bract retention, and no signs of wilting, breaking or drooping. Carefully inspect packaged poinsettias before purchasing them. Poinsettias left in sleeves for an extended period of time may become unhealthy.

Transport poinsettias carefully. Strong winds or short-term exposure to temperatures below 40 degrees can permanently damage the plants. Use plant sleeves or large shopping bags for added protection in cold weather.

Crop Disaster Program Sign-Up End January 30, 200

Phillip A. Horn, County Executive Director for Alcorn/ Tishomingo County Farm Service Agency alerts producers that signup ends Jan. 30, 2004, for the Crop Disaster Program (CDP), which provides payments for 2001 or 2002 crop-year losses due to a natural disaster.

"USDA has issued \$2.2 billion in benefits to about 325,000 farmers across the country," said "We encourage qualified Horn. farmers to take advantage of this assistance.

CDP, which is authorized by the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, has no overall funding limitation, but each "person" is limited to \$80,000. Producers are reimbursed for qualifying crop production and quality losses (other than sugar cane, sugar beets or tobacco) for either the 2001 or 2002 crop years. Payments are issued for losses exceeding 3 percent of expected production at:

50 percent of the established price for crops that were covered by crop insurance;

50 percent of the established price for crops for which crop insurance was unavaile and 45 percent of the establ

price to producers for that could have been in but were not. Producers are also reimber

for quality losses of at les percent for certain crops.



Wildlife Mississippi recently joined President George W. Bush at a signing ceremony for legislation that will improve forest management, minimize devastating wildfires and improve fish and wildlife habitat. This legislation will also improve air quality and habitat for threatened and endangered species.

The bill that was signed into law was the product of months of hard work by the conservation and forest communities. Wildlife Mississippi worked closely with its allies in the conservation community and with members of the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate to ensure that the final product would help to protect, restore and enhance fish and wildlife habitat through active forest management. Many species of wildlife depend on a mosaic of different forest stand age classes and densities, including early succession habitats.

This law provides federal land managers with the ability to address our most serious forest health threats without compromising important environmental protections. A lack of proper forest management has caused undue stress, resulting in an unnaturally high risk of catastrophic wildfires and large-scale insect and disease outbreaks. This has resulted in excessive fuel accumulation on over 190 million acres of Federal lands

This law creates the unique opportunity to recover threatened and endangered species and improve water quality through forestry practices. We can also take advantage of our nation's satellite technology to help detect pests and pathogens on forested lands, with an emphasis on hardwood forests.

President Bush said, "I appreciate the members of Congress...members who listen to the people, who know what they are talking about ... starting

with Senator Thad Cochran. Thad has done a fabulous job of getting the bill out of the U.S. Senate.

"Wildlife Mississippi placed a high priority on enacting forest management legislation and worked to craft a bipartisan solution," said W.A. Van Devender, one of Wildlife Mississippi's Trustees. "It was an awesome experience to be part of one of the greatest pieces of conservation legislation since the bi-partisan efforts of the 1970s and to work with senator Cochran and President Bush on it."

I can remember before our oldest, Will, was born, saying,

"Babies don't cost much. What planet was I living on and what was I thinking. Those words rank very high in the category of "Stupid things I have said in my life." The truth is, raising a child costs money and, in my experience, a LOT of money. There are medical costs, school (public school does not mean free school), clothes, activities, and a million other things. If you don't already have children, consider starting a savings account if possible; it will help a lot. A college fund is always a good idea. Adults are fooling themselves if they think babies don't cost much because their needs are so simple. Remember: diapers, formula, checkups, etc., etc.

The cost of raising a child rises each year. According to BabyCenter.com, a baby born in 2003 in a rural area (that's us: rural), with a two-parent family and four years of college (need I remind you that many kids go to college for more than four years) will cost an estimated \$544,234.00. I looked at the details and thought some of the numbers were a bit off but, all in all, it's probably true. (1 have found that with many of

these expenses I have been in denial). Take a look at costs per year

Housing - \$6,987.00 (Of course, this varies greatly from family to family.)

3,160.00 Food (Apparently this person didn't have boys, and they didn't cat much.)

Transportation - 3,217.00 (Apparently they weren't counting buying a vehicle and insurance until it was averaged out over the 18 years)

Health Care - 1,336.00 (I thought this was a bit high but may be true for some families.)

Child Care/Education -2,454.00 (Public education does not mean free education, does it?)

Miscellaneous - 2,718.00 41,023.00 College (WOWI)
