A 1962 graduate of Tishoningo High School, "Coach Black," as he was widely nown, attended Mississippi tate University and earned his Masters and Specialist degrees n Education. At the request of hen-principal R.C. Strickland, e returned home to teach at is alma mater, specifically to elp the school successfully in-ORegrate in the 1966-67 school ear. He taught high school nd then junior high science to ountless Tishomingo students or 39 years and coached basketall and football teams early in is career. He drove the bus for he Carter's Branch community. nd had a special relationship with the people of that area. He ras a behind-the-scenes leader nd administrator, supporting he work of many of Tishomino's principals. He was principal f Tishomingo Middle School hen he retired a few years ago. Charles served the county or many years as a member of he Tishomingo County Electric ower Association Board of Diectors, including through the 994 ice storm.

There was seemingly no person or family in Tishomingo with whom Charles Black was not familiar, and he had nearly perfect recall if you asked him about someone.

Charles was born December 14th, 1944, the only son of the late Woodrow and Clara Kennedy Black of Tishomingo.

He is survived by his wife, Marcia McRae Black, and their son, Alan, who was his pride and joy.

# **Mississippi Silicon Bringing 200 Jobs to Tishomingo County**

Monday morning, hundreds gathered for a "groundbreaking ceremony" to welcome Mississippi Silicon as Tishomingo County's newest industry.

The silicon metal production facility is scheduled to locate in the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park, which is located in Burnsville, just south of Highway 72 on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. When completed, the silicon metal manufacturing plant will provide 200 jobs paying around \$50,000 a year, officials have stated.

The "ground-breaking" was held in a building that previously was used by New River Homes, since weather was not conducive to meeting at the actual proposed location of the plant a mile or so away. Governor Phil Bryant, and executives from Mississippi Silicon and its parent company Rima Holdings, USA, were on hand to speak to the gathered crowd.

"I congratulate the team from Mississippi Silicon as they prepare to move forward with the construction of their silicon

said Bryant in his prepared statement. "Upon completion of this facility, Mississippi Silicon will join a long list of companies that demonstrate daily to the country and to the world that Mississippi is an ideal location for advanced

manufacturing."

"We are very excited to be in Tishomingo County," said Mississippi Silicon President and CEO David Tuten. "The hospitality we have received so far has been overwhelming, and we are John Correnti, of Mississippi looking forward to at the ground-breaking. building and operating a successful

project." Mississippi Silicon is investing \$200 million in the construction of the plant, and Mississippi Development Authority providing assistance through the Mississippi Industry Incentive Financing Fund for construction and workforce training needs, as well as New Market Tax Credits. Tishomingo County and Tennessee Valley Authorproject, as well.

The new facility will produce silicon metal for a broad range of industries in the United States including the aluminum, automotive and chemical industries. The Mississippi Silicon's

is expected to be one of the most efficient and costcompetitive silicon metal production facilities in the world. It will be the first silicon plant built in the western hemisphere in forty years, said Silicon, addresses attendees Ricardo Vicintin, president and CEO of Rima Holdings.

# Mississippi Silicon a Long Time **Coming to Waterway Industrial Park**

Executives from Mississippi Silicon had endless praise Monday for the work of local development officials for helping them successfully locate in Tishomingo County.

After many years of developing infrastructure like that at the Waterway Industrial Park, and advertising what Tishomingo County has to offer, the efforts are beginning to see results, and contributing to Mississippi's role in the "fastest-growing economic development" region in the country, from South Carolina to Texas.

For the first time last year, the gross domestic product (GDP) of Mississippi was more than \$100 billion, which makes it easy for companies like Mississippi Silicon to see that Mississippi is on the move, stated Governor Phil Bryant in his remarks at Monday's groundbreaking ceremony.

In remarks Monday, John Correnti, of Rima Holdings, said that when Lowndes County lost patience two years ago and made unrealistic demands of the company, they "picked up their bat and ball and looked elsewhere."

Correnti said they looked in Quebec, but Mississippi officials continued to woo them to a site in-state, and eventually to Tishomingo County, a place with which they are well familiar, thanks to endless marketing materials sent weekly to them by Gary Matthews, executive director of Tishomingo County Development Authority.

"I dream of Tishomingo County in my sleep," joked Correnti, of all the Tishomingo County information the intrepid Mathews provides. "He's your best asset for industrial growth in this county."

Correnti said to be prepared, because when Rima officials go home to Brazil, and other Brazilian associates come to the county, they will be relying on our hospitality, and talking about their experiences in Tishomingo County back home.

Apparently, Mr. Vicintin has been enjoying some good ole' Southern hospitality that had him wondering aloud to the crowd, "Why Mississippi Mud pie is not your national pie?"

Correnti also praised the late congressman Jamie Whitten, and late Senator John Stennis for "that big ditch out there" referring to the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, which has opened up north Mississippi for the influx of development it has seen in the last 15 years, including a steel manufacturing cluster at Yellow Creek Inland Port that employs more than 400 people at half a dozen steel processing facilities. Structures and products like those built at the Port are dependent on dependable, efficient ways of transporting items to the client, and water transportation allows for that.

Correnti said that if the Tenn-Tom was in Europe, it would be lined along all of its banks from Tennessee to Mobile, Alabama.

The Port continues to develop the Northeast Mississippi Waterway Industrial Park, which it has invested more than \$10 million in infrastructure improvements in recent years, to make it marketable to companies like Mississippi Silicon. The Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority engineered and built a \$2.6 million barge notch (place to dock large barges) to do exactly what Mississippi Silicon is needing it to do, explained Eugene Bishop, executive director at the Port.

To recruit a prospect like Mississippi Silicon is a long process that has been in work for many years, says Bishop. For the actual 100-acre property for Mississippi Silicon, the Port sold the land to Tishomingo County, to allow for grants and funding for which the Port, as a stateowned entity, was not eligible.

"The steel industry at the Port was a long time coming, but then we got an anchor tenant, and it has exploded from there," said Bishop of the Port's phenomenal growth in the past decade. "Mississippi Silicon opens up a whole new horizon for this industrial park and the county, as related industries come on board."

In related news, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors voted 4-1, immediately after the ground-breaking, for Cook-Coggins Engineering, of Tupelo, to do engineering work for the \$3.5 million in infrastructure the county is doing to support the location of Mississippi Silicon in Burnsville.

**Jackson Nurse Runs to Save Lives**

Ledger "I know that might sound far out to some people," said Hammack, 46, a nurse for the past nine years at Jackson Oncology Associates, "but a lot of my patients that I've grown to know and love who eventually died from cancer ... it's like they're right alongside me every step I take."

Hammack felt them carrying her Sunday as she completed the inaugural Dopey Challenge at Walt Disney World in Orlando - a four-day event that included a 5K run (3.1 miles) Thursday, a 10K (6.2) Friday, a half marathon (13.1) Saturday and a full marathon (26.2) as a grand finale. That's 48.6 miles total, or roughly from Jackson to Forest. Approximately 7,000 people participated.

She ran to raise money for the Mississippi/Louisiana Chapter of the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. Prior to the Orlando challenge, Hammack had raised more than \$22,000 for the organization dedicated to funding blood cancer research, education and patient services.

And as she crossed the finish line of her 11th marathon, Hammack said, "I got really emotional. That's the first time I've ever just fell apart after a run. I started crying, just thinking of why I did this, what all I did to get here, those I did it for. ... I'm drained physically and emotionally. But it's worth every bit of it.

"I gain so much determination from seeing patients come into the clinic, continuing to fight when there seems to be little

ence so maybe others won't have to go through that."

She covered the distance Sunday in 5 hours, 23 minutes, slightly longer than average for a female runner.

"But I did a lot of 'dopeying' around," joked Hammack, who ran her best time - 4 hours, 44 minutes — in October at the Marine Corps Marathon in Washington. "My times aren't important. I don't compete against other people. I just want to finish."

Hammack, who is the daughter of Sandra and Milton Guice of Iuka, has been running for local cancer charities since 2007. She focuses much of her fundraising on blood cancers. "And the reason is, they don't pick a certain age, race or gender. Blood affect people cancers across the board," she said.

Those who know Hammack said the 48.6 miles at Disney were in the bag once she decided to enter.

"Angela is one of the most unique people you'll ever meet," said Susan James, nurse manager at Jackson Oncology. "She does things at one speed ---hope left. I push myself to 100 miles per hour. I have

energy. She talks faster than I can listen.

"But the thing is, that people sometimes take for granted is, she really has a good heart. I don't know of anyone who has more drive and ambition. She's served as president of the Oncology Nurses Society. She became certified to teach other nurses how to give chemotherapy. There is a lot more to her than just the marathons."

Said Teresa Davis, clinical trials coordinator at Jackson Oncology: "Angela not only raises money and awareness about cancer, but she helps improve patients' perspective about cancer and the research that's being done. She likes to talk, likes to teach and likes to educate. That's what you look for in an oncology nurse."

Hammack admits to marching - swiftly - to a different beat than most.

She runs marathons, yet suffers from asthma.

Her iPod includes Christian, classical, grunge, Broadway, heavy metal and hip-hop.

She often trains at 4 a.m. but declares, "I'm not a morning person."

sweatshirt, jeans, boots, and a ball cap. That night, I was dressed to the nines and attending a Christmas party. I was thinking, 'If these people could've seen me just a few hours ago, they wouldn't believe I was the same person.' "

Hammack, who was born in Starkville, graduated from Iuka High School in 1985 and Mississippi State University in 1989 with a degree in communications. Bored with desk jobs, she attended paramedic school at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson and graduated in 1995.

"The day I graduated, I found out I'd been accepted into nursing school at Mississippi College (in Clinton)," she said.

She earned her nursing degree in 1997 and began working at the Elvis Presley Memorial Trauma Center in Memphis.

"When I started dating Jimmy, I would come down for visits but felt like I needed to be doing something all the time," she said. "A friend said they might hire me part time at Jackson Oncology. I talked to them, and they did. It was a different experience than what I had been used to in trauma. This was a lot of nurturing and talking with patients. ... I really enjoyed that."

Hammack joined Jackson Oncology full time in 2004, but the trauma bug didn't leave. So a couple of weekends a month, she travels by train to Memphis and back and pulls two shifts at her old job.

"The adrenaline of seeing somebody dying, but then watching them come back to life through the Lord's will and with a little bit of your help is an amazing thing," she says.

Running to fight cancer gives her a different type rush. "I saw a sticker Thursday that fits me," she
