Late Night Traffic Stop Results in Big Marijuana Bust in Tishomingo

Tishomingo Police Officers Lesly Adams and James Newcomb stopped a truck with no tag Monday night around midnight, June 7, and found approximately a half pound of marijuana.

Two men from Culman, AL, Joseph Wayne Thomas and Jeff Harper, were arrested and charged with possession of the illegal substance. These men were accompanied by one adult female, who was held for questioning and later released, and one juvenile female, who was not held.

The two men were traveling in two different trucks when the truck with no tag was stopped. The second truck, pulling a third truck on a tow bar, stopped to wait on the friend.

The marijuana was found after the officers noticed that the driver of the first truck was acting suspiciously. They asked for and were granted permission to search the

vehicle.

When the officers looked behind the pull-down console, they found several bags of marijuana ready to distribute. The driver then took off and ran into a nearby wooded area.

The K-9 unit was called out to help search; however, the suspect escaped. Harper turned himself in to the Tishomingo Police Department two days later. It is believed that the men were on their way to the Paden area when they

were stopped. Besides the arrest of the second man and the finding of the marijuana, the three vehicles were also seized and are currently being held by the Tishomingo Police. The men have posted bond and have been released until their hearing date. Tishomingo Police Chief Mike Kemp said he is very pleased that the Tishomingo Police Department officers were able to get this drug, valued at \$1500 to \$2000, off the streets and roads of the county.

Tishomingo Police Department Extremely Busy Drugs and Other Illegal Substances Confiscated

Tishomingo Police Chief Mike Kemp and his officers have been extremely busy during the last 90 days. Thousands of dollars worth of marijuana, crack, crystal meth, alcohol, guns, drug pipes, needles, and other drug paraphernalia, along with several cases of beer have been confiscated during traffic stops in Tishomingo. Chief Kemp said tickets for eleven DUI's and nine possession's of controlled substances have been issued. Although Chief Kemp knows that it's not always the popular thing for a police officer to do, he and his officers will keep checking vehicles to keep drugs, etc. off the streets. He appreciates his officers, Lesly Adams and James Newcomb for their hard work. Kemp said he also appreciates the positive comments from the citizens who support the work of the Tishomingo Police Department.

The informational brochures are now available free at the Tishomingo County Visitor Center (Tishomingo County Development Foundation) at 1001 Battleground Drive in Iuka from 8-12 and 1-5 weekdays. (The kiosk in front of the visitor center offers brochures and maps to visitors after normal business hours and on weekends.) Brochures are also available at City Halls in Belmont, Burnsville, Iuka, Golden, and Tishomingo, and in the outlet shops.

The approximately two dozen outlet, liquidation, and import shops clustered in

Tishomingo County and featured in the brochure range from 1,500 to 150,000 square feet in size and specialize in everything from go-carts to electric tools to iron work to home decor to clothing to grocery items, etc.

Gregg Pharr, chairman of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation is joined by all other Tishomingo County leaders when he says, "We hope to draw more customers to the area to shop and, while they are here, to learn about the many recreational, scenic and historical resources that our county is blessed with."

WARNING SIGNS OF HEART ATTACK
Coronary heart disease is America's No. 1 killer. That's why it's so important to reduce your risk factors, know the warning signs, and know how to respond quickly and properly if warning signs occur.

Some heart attacks are sudden and intense - the "movie heart attack," where no one doubts what's happening. But most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Often people affected aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help. Here are signs that can mean a heart attack is happening.

Chest discomfort: Discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or it goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

Discomfort in other areas of the upper body: Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

Shortness of breath: This feeling often comes along with chest discomfort. Also a feeling of anxiousness or a feeling of doom may occur.

Other signs: These may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

If you or someone you're with has chest discomfort, especially with one or more of the other signs, don't wait longer than a few minutes (NO more than 5) before calling for help. Call 911.

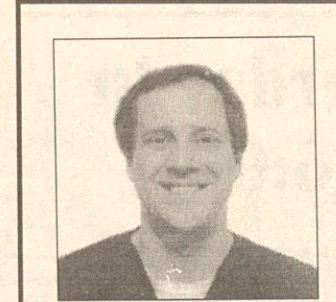

Why Does A Tooth Ache?
Toothache. Ah, yes, "the pain that drives you to extraction," says general practitioner Laurence Rifkin, DDS, of Beverly Hills, in jest, referring to the too-many patients who notoriously delay treatment until the pain gets really bad. But not all toothaches are created equal. Some can be fixed easily. Others call for detailed treatment - which, these days, only rarely involves a tooth getting pulled. Here, we decode 10 kinds of toothaches, and what they may mean. (Only a dental exam can tell you for sure.)

1. Gum recession, from aging, general wear and tear, grinding, or over-brushing, can result in root sensitivity, which in turn can cause a sharp pain that quickly goes away - think of the kind of pain you get when you're drinking a cold beverage.

2. Advanced tooth decay, excessive teeth grinding, teeth hitting each other too hard, and outside trauma (like a punch in the mouth) can all produce nerve damage, which feels like a lingering, unrelenting dull ache, says Anne Murray, DDS, a general dentist practicing in Cupertino, California. It may take months or years for such nerve damage to show up.

Legal Update

THE FIRST STEP
Many slip-and-fall accidents occur on stairs, often due to stair construction and design deficiencies. To initiate the investigation of a claim, analysis of the premises is a cost-effective first step. According to the Basic Building Code set by Building Officials & Code Administrators International, a minimum tread of nine inches and maximum riser of 8.25 inches is required for single-family dwellings. Many claims allege that the stairway was deficient and did not conform to code. In such cases, dimensional measurement of the stairs is necessary to compare with building code requirements. Handrails are also often required by code for stairways and should also be investigated for availability and proper height. Lighting is another factor.

Cosmetics And Contact Lenses

If you wear contact lenses, you should avoid contaminating them with cosmetics. They can cause discomfort and irritation as well as impair your vision. Here are some tips:

If you use a cosmetic soap before applying makeup, refresh your hands with a mild soap that has no additives. Soaps often contain lotions and deodorants that may coat or smudge your lenses. By the same token, if you shampoo while wearing your lenses, be sure to keep your eyes tightly closed. If you go to sleep with your eyes open, soap or shampoo in your eyes, rinse them thoroughly with saline.

A water-proof makeup system is the best for lens wearers since it is less likely to run into your eyes. It is also important to place your lenses on before applying any eye or face makeup.

On the other hand, false eyelashes should be applied before placing your lenses in your eyes. Be sure the adhesive is completely dry before placing the lenses on.

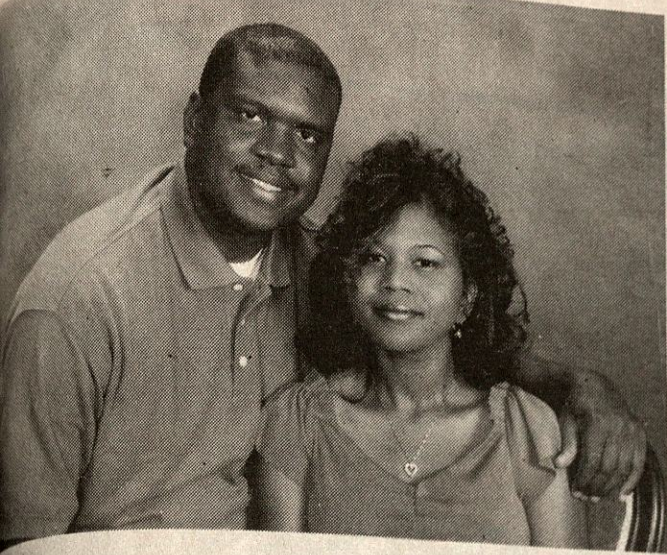

Tri State Educational Foundation Scholarships and Grants

How Important Is The "Bible Code"? (part III)

In this third article on my subject, I would like to continue writing about the matter of how we are to understand the Bible. Is it to be by deciphering some code, so that we can understand? I do not think so! I gave Deuteronomy 30:11-14 in the last article. I want to point out that this passage is given in Romans 10:5-9, with some variation. In Romans, we see Christ put into the text by the Apostle Paul, who is the writer of Romans. Here are the verses under consideration for Romans: "For Moses describeth the righteousness which is of the law that the man that doeth them shall live by them but the righteousness which is of faith speaketh on this wise, Say not in thine heart, Who shall ascend into heaven? (that is, to bring Christ down from above:) Or, who shall descend into the deep? (that is, to bring Christ again from the dead.) But what saith it? The word is nigh thee, even in thy mouth, and in thy heart: that is, the word of faith, which we preach; that if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved."

Again, we see that the word of God is near those who want to believe it. There is no need for a code to understand it; there is only a need for faith to receive the Savior Whom it proclaims. I personally think the problem with most people

in the fact that they are not willing to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as the One Who can forgive their sins. The devil loves to get people all tied up trying to understand some code, while they overlook the basic need they have for a Savior. Perhaps the person seeking to understand the "code" has already been saved. Very well then, he may waste a great deal of time playing around with a "code", when he needs to be studying the Word of God in the plain sense in which God gave it.

Of course, we are to understand that there is value in studying the languages in which the Bible was written, but that does not mean that we have to have some other "code" to understand Scripture. Of course, someone may want to say that the "code" is for understanding prophecy. I would say concerning that idea that Revelation 19:10 says that the "testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy". The testimony that the Scriptures give concerning Jesus is the spirit of prophecy, for that is what the angel was making known to John in the Book of Revelation. Although there is symbolic language in Scripture, there are keys given in the Bible itself that will help us understand the symbolism. There is no such thing concerning any "Bible Code"! (Perhaps one more article will be forthcoming on this subject.)

Tishomingo Co. Development Foundation Meets At Schnadig Corporation In Belmont

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation Board of Directors held its June monthly meeting at Schnadig Corporation in Belmont. Board Vice Chairman John R. White moderated the meeting.

The board reviewed the completed Tishomingo County outlet tour brochure and a media release concerning the outlet tour campaign. The brochures will be placed at welcome centers, motels, restaurants, and other locations within a two or three hour drive of Tishomingo County. 30,000 copies were printed. The production cost was a little less than \$5,000.00 of which \$3,000.00 came from a federal grant and the remainder came from TCDF funds. The board discussed the status of the barge channel project at Tri-State Commerce Park. The barge channel needs to be deepened and widened to accommodate larger ships. The Corps of Engineers has committed \$70,000.00 to do the engineering study, but another \$70,000.00 is needed. The Appalachian Regional Commission may contribute part of the cost.

A TCDF budget committee meeting was scheduled for June 17, 2004.

After discussion of proposed ribbon cuttings at Miltec Corporation and Tiffin Motor Homes, Vice Chairman John R. White adjourned the meeting. Board members toured the Schnadig Corporation plant and were impressed with the efficiency of the operation and the high quality of the furniture produced by Schnadig.


