ARC Grant Comes To Golden, MS For Sewer Work...

The Town of Golden will get a \$100,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) to expand its sewer system, federal lawmakers said Thursday.

U.S. Rep. Roger Wicker and Sens. Thad Cochran and Trent Lott said the funding is expected to add 15,848 linear feet of sewer line; 3,019 linear feet of mains; and two pumping stations.

The improvements will provide service to an additional 47 households and allow one company to expand its business operations.

In addition to ARC funds, state agencies will provide \$300,000 and local sources will add \$49,175, bringing the total cost to \$449,175.

Carolina Comfort LLC Expands To Tishomingo County

The new operation will manufacture upholstered furniture in a 74,000 square foot industrial building on Highway 72 in Burnsville. The company manufactures stationery upholstered furniture for Fraenkel Company. First year sales are expected to be approximately \$2.5 million. Manufacture of motion furniture will be added next year.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS NOW AVAILABLE FOR NOVEMBER 2ND, 2004 GENERAL ELECTION

Donna Henry Dill, Circuit Clerk, announces that absentee ballots are now available for the November 2, 2004, General Election.

All eligible absentee voters may cast their ballots in the Circuit Clerk's Office through Saturday, October 30, 2004, which is the last day to vote an absentee ballot. The office will be open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday, October 23rd and October 30th for those wishing to vote an absentee ballot. If you will need an absentee ballot mailed to you, you may call 423-7026 to request your application and ballot.

The following categories of registered voters are eligible

to cast absentee ballots in Mississippi elections:

1. Members of the Armed Forces or spouses or dependents of such members.

2. Members of the Merchant Marines or the American Red Cross, or spouses or dependents of such members.

3. Disabled war veterans who are patients in any hospital, or spouses or dependents of such veterans.

4. Civilians attached to any branch of the Armed Forces, the Merchant Marines, or the American Red Cross and serving outside the United States, or spouses or dependents of such civilians.

5. Persons temporarily residing outside the territorial limits of the United States and

the District of Columbia.

6. Students, teachers, or administrators whose employment or studies necessitate their absence from their county of voting residence, or the dependent or spouse who maintains a common domicile outside the county of voting residence with such student, teacher, or administrator.

7. Persons who will be outside their county of residence on election day.

8. Persons required to be at work on election day during the times at which the polls will be open.

9. Persons temporarily or permanently physically disabled.

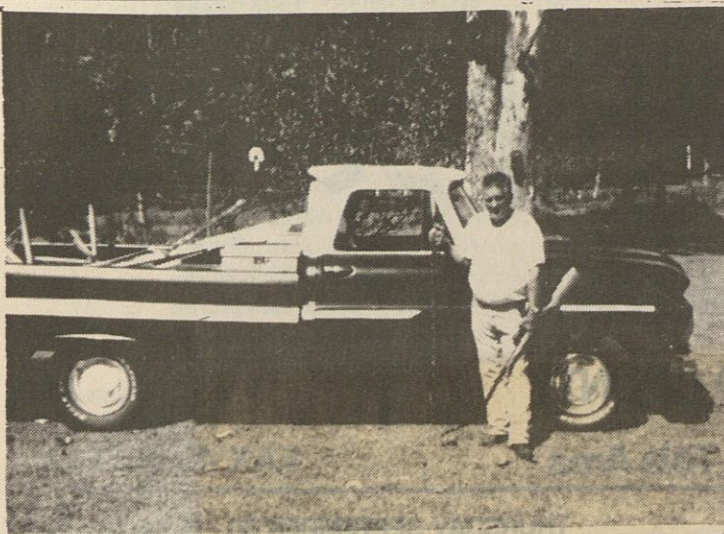

I have had snake hunting on my mind every since the season was in. I'm almost two years moved from my home place. The snakes are different here. Cotton Mouths and Copper Heads mostly in this area.

Now I'm ready to tell the story: I went to town one day not knowing of your letter to the editor in the Vidette newspaper. To my surprise folks just covered me and told of your letter to the paper.. It made me smile and it warmed my heart. I'd been wanting to get one all season. (That news made me really want one).

There was a good friend of mine named George Randolph I'd run upon. He asked me, "Odle why don't you get a rattler for Tommy - he is kinfolk to me." (George is as good of a friend as I've ever had).

Before I go any further I'd like to mention Mr. Billie Bonds, a really dear friend and homefolk, she's known me since I was born. I was raised there close to her and her family.

Well, she gave me a call and we talked about the write up. then we talked about all the other snakes (rattlers) I'd killed. She always gave me info if she read or came across any news of rattlers. Plus we love to stay in touch with each other. She had saved the paper for me also!

She's been sick lately. I thank God she's feeling a little better. I pray she continues a speedy recovery!

Also my sister, Lola kept me up with the Letter to the Editor.

that just made me smile and warmed my heart more.

I knew I was going rattler hunting then!

It was very early a Sunday morning, sun just starting to rise up. Dew was deep. It had been cool that night and still cool this morning. (I knew that was all to my advantage.) I hadn't even mentioned what I was going to do to my wife. She was safe asleep.

I loaded my four wheeler and headed out toward the River Hills, my old home place and stomping grounds. I was so excited and glad to be back at the old home place.

I pulled my .22 cal. pistol aimed and missed her. She was mad now! She was striking fast then back into a coil. My second shot blew four inches of her tail off. I realized I had to stand on top of the 4-wheeler seat to get her between the eyes. Well, I shot her between the eyes just as she was coming out of another coil. Mind you she was very mad and striking the length of her body which was 51 inches already off. Well, as you know I loaded her in my snake pouch and went back the way I came. got home told my wife to bring the camera outside that I had got a really bad rattler for my new friend in the paper!

How to deal with this and other oral side effects? For starters, take a list of all your meds to your dentist as well as your main doctor, suggests Dr. Blowers. That way, your symptoms can best be diagnosed, treated, and corrected. In some cases, you may be prescribed one of the new drugs with few, if any, oral side effects.

Or, if you can't change your medication, try these dry mouth remedies:

- Drink plenty of fluids.
- Suck on crushed ice.
- Use a synthetic saliva or oral moisturizer, such as Oralbalance, Salivart, or MouthKore.
- While you're at it, check out the rinses, toothpastes, and toothbrushes designed for dry mouth. One brand dentist recommend: Biotene.
- For instant relief try Breath Tech, a slippery spray with a dash of fluoride.
- Finally, there are several drugs designed to relieve dryness: Salagen and Evoxac, as well as Aricept and Reminyl, new Alzheimer's drugs that are also being prescribed for actors and public speakers. To be continued...

Correctable Contact Problems

There are some people not many, who have difficulty wear their contact lenses. Likely as not, they decide finally that their eyes were just not made for contacts. On the contrary, contacts properly adjusted and fitted are made for them. The problem may have more to do with external conditions - not the lenses.

A recent trip to Normandy proved quite interesting and very educational for Rex and Ruby Butler of Huntsville, Ala., formerly of Tishomingo County. They were accompanied by their daughter and her family, Liz and James Young, Sean and Briana of St. Petersburg, Beach, Florida.

The families flew from Miami to Milan, Italy where they stayed 4 days. From there, they flew to Paris and then drove to Brittany, where they stayed at a hotel at the bottom of Le Mont Sainte Michel. They were privileged in touring the Mont on

the following day and stopped at an American Cemetery enroute to Normandy.

During the 5-day stay in Normandy, they enjoyed a 12-hour tour of Khan visiting the World War II Museum there. They went to Omaha Beach where Rex, being a Veteran, was asked to take part in the closing ceremony of the cemetery. He folded the American flag and presented it to the color guards.

An Open Letter To The People of Tishomingo County From Donald Thomas

Thanks for being able to serve you as a certified Deputy and Investigator since 1999.

I have tried to be loyal and respectful to all and worked diligently to do my job in a professional manner. It has been my goal to treat everyone fairly and unbiased.

As of Monday, Sept. 20 my employment with the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department came to an abrupt end. I had two choices - submit a letter of resignation or be terminated by Sheriff Glenn Whitlock. I submitted a letter of resignation.

I would like to take this opportunity to explain how this decision came about before you hear "rumors".

On Thursday, Sept. 16th, I was asked by a loyal and dedicated Deputy, Scott Woodruff, for my assistance as an investigator. I met with Deputy Woodruff at the Tishomingo Co. Sheriff's Dept. He informed me that a male subject had been sexually abusing a 14 year old boy. The alleged pedophile was out on two felony indictment bonds. One charge of molesting a nine year old girl and possession of cocaine. The subject was originally from Tennessee but presently resides in Olive Branch, MS. Currently he owns and operates two liquor stores in Memphis, TN. He maintains a part time residence at Mill Creek in Tishomingo County.

There have been 8 instances of sexual abuse of the 14 year old boy, which was

under investigation by the Olive Branch Police Dept. The investigation at Olive Branch had been hindered by the young victim's father making threats against the alleged subject. The parents of the boy are divorced and the mother has full custody of the young man. The mother, who resides in Ripley, was reportedly dating the accused. They had spent the night at the suspects mobile home at least three times. The last time was at the end of August.

The mother had decided, after the investigation had been hampered in Olive Branch, to seek help from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Dept.

After Deputy Woodruff and I received statements from the mother and the son, I made a call to the Circuit Clerk's office and talked with Assistant D.A., Jim Pounds. He informed me not to arrest the subject, but to continue the investigation, since he was already out on two felony indictments. The mother and the son both were very emotional, causing them to take longer time to write out the statement. While they were writing, Deputy Woodruff and I were discussing whether to get a search warrant or not. Since the subject had not been at the mobile home since the later part of August, it was decided to get a search warrant and search for evidence of the last event reported.

Officer Woodruff and I had called Sheriff Whitlock to inform him of the intended

search. Also, the Assistant D.A., Jim Pounds, was informed. We asked the Assistant D.A. if we found drugs as well as sexual evidence, could we then make an arrest. He (Jim Pounds) said yes as long as it was included in the original search warrant. A word of thanks is in order to Judge Donnie Joe Sparks, who after receiving the phone call requesting the search warrant drove from his home in Belmont to the Sheriff's office in Iuka to sign the warrant.

Shortly after the warrant was signed, the mother received a call on a cell phone from the alleged subject. It was obvious to the subject that the

mother was very upset. He was desiring to buy an "eightball". The mother did not want him to know where she was. Arrangements were made for a C.I. to purchase some drugs for the alleged subject.

For the sake of the victim, the remaining information of this case will remain undisclosed. But I will be glad to tell the end result to anyone who would like to know.

After the Sheriff received a call from another deputy, who was not involved in the investigation, I received a call from the Sheriff who appeared to be lightly upset. Deputy Woodruff and I were instructed to meet with the Sheriff in his office, at which time we were reprimanded. Striving to be professional, I do not feel that what was done was any different than various other investigative efforts in times past.

At this point, Deputy Woodruff and I considered the matter closed. But on Monday, Sept. 20, I was called to the Sheriff's office and was informed by Sheriff Whitlock that I could either resign or he would terminate me. Deputy Woodruff received a two week suspension without pay as a result of this incident.

To all the citizens of Tishomingo County, I wish to thank you for your moral support, encouragement and the opportunity to serve in law enforcement in my home county. Although, I am presently not in law enforcement in the county, I would like for you to know that if I can help you in any way I will be glad to do so! Many of you are aware of the "heat stroke" I had at the Academy while pursuing certification. I only survived by the greatness of God, and the support I received from the medical profession and you, my friends and fellow citizens.

I had to make up my mind whether I would subject myself to the rigorous routine which could possibly have been the death of me or did I want to be

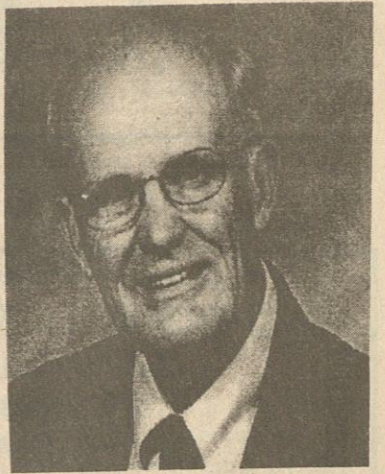
Revival Planned At Pleasant Hill United Methodist Church

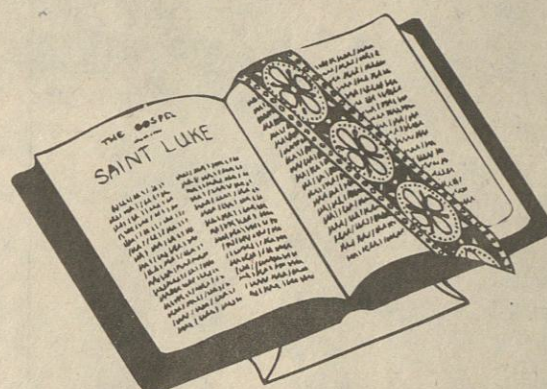

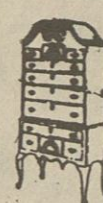

There are several doctors involved in his current treatment, and they are all Amazed at his strides daily. I overheard Dr. Kiwan talking with a colleague about the case he said, "Mr. Hudson was in a coma-stage 2 when he came to us and now with physical therapy and a walker is walking." "This is truly amazing." "It is not us it

is through a higher power." This past weekend Dr. Lee made rounds at the hospital and was also truly amazed. He told Brother Donald, "You are talking?" "That is good." "This is so amazing." "We have talked about you in our meetings and we are all amazed."

He still has a long row to hoe. Please continue to pray for him as he still is at a critical phase. We all need your prayers and thank you so much for all that you have done already. His blood counts are down and must come up, while the infection counts must come down in order for his recovery to be successful. Thank you all for being so concerned for him and for us. 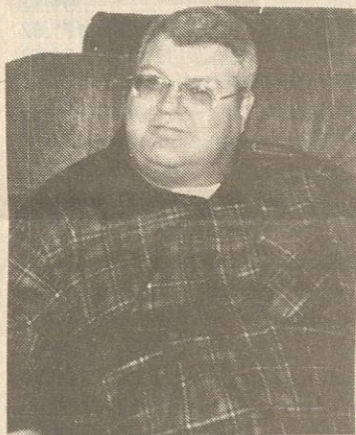

Rev. Donald Hudson And Family Ask For Your Continued Prayers During His Recovery



Iuka hospital to be close to the family in a swing bed to finish up a round of antibiotics, then to be sent home to ultimately die. The family refused to give up. His doctor in Arkansas was called and requested that he be released and brought there.

We left Iuka not knowing how near death he really was. We arrived at the ACRC (Arkansas Cancer Research Center) around 3:30 p.m. Mon-

day. The nurse there saw the state of urgency, got his vitals on the spot and rushed to get him direct admitted to the hospital. Although, the family was aware that he was in and out of consciousness and had severe mental confusion, we still did not know how bad it really was. He got admitted at UAMS (University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences). On Tuesday, September the 14th, the medical team was called to his room for "CODE BLUE". We did not think he was going to make it. In fact, after they revived him, he was still very critical. Dr. Elias Kiwan told us that our dad was not going to survive more than 24 hrs. He said to call the family and let them know. He told us that he had suffered Septic Shock from a gram negative infection other wise known as Meningitis, this was not responding to the biggest antibiotic drug on the market known as Vancomycin, and to add to the crisis his cancer cell count was out of control.

I don't know if you are familiar with the infection I just mentioned but, 40-80 percent of the people that acquire it die, and of those that live usually have brain damage. I mean not even taking into the account of his cancer being almost "too far gone". They started using a drug that is still in a clinical

For all those who have been calling and wondering how Brother Donald Hudson is doing let this serve as an individual answer. First of all, we the family of Donald Hudson want to thank all those who have been in constant prayer for him and his health, and for our strength to make it through, as well. Thank you so very much!

As many of you know, Brother Donald has been getting cancer treatments in North Little Rock Arkansas now for many years. Through experimental treatments, experimental drugs, and of course, the Grace of the All Mighty God above, his life has been spared and prolonged beyond any chance given by the doctors at the time of his diagnosis 12 years ago. Since then he has fought many courageous battles.

August 28, 2004 after returning from a check up in Little Rock, Brother Donald became very ill and was taken to Tupelo hospital, where he stayed for 12 days and the family was told by his cancer doctor there, that there was nothing left to do but keep him comfortable. He told us that he would help us get him set up on a hospice program for patients that were in their last days of life. He was then transferred to

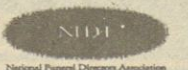

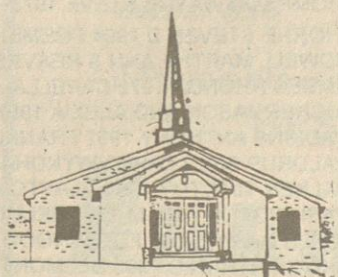

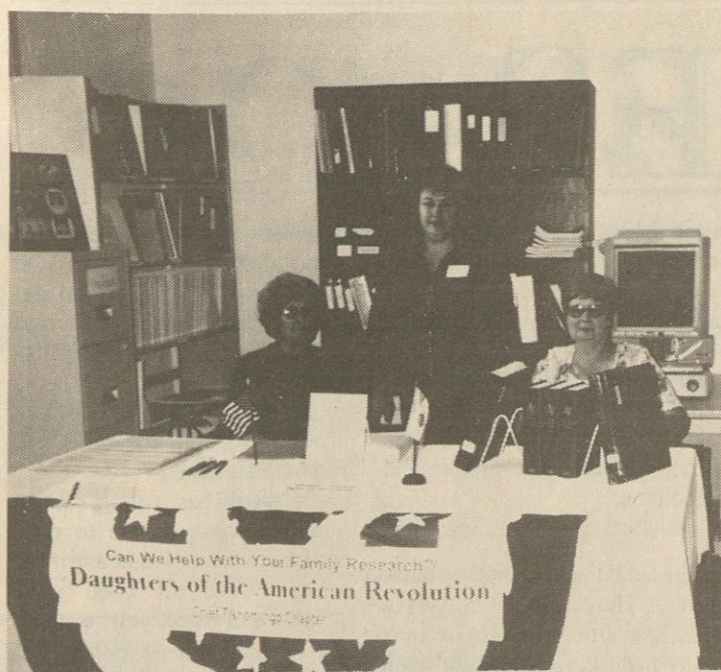

Perhaps I will give a verse from Daniel that shows this. This verse is one of the most clear verses in the Bible on

When He rules, the only other rulers will be the believers who rule under Him!

Our verse from Daniel says that God is going to set up a kingdom "in the days of these kings", meaning the four world empires that rule from Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon to the antichrist, who rules in a revived Roman empire. I love the fact that God Himself, in the person of Christ, is going to take over the kingdoms of this earth.

Notice the wording of Revelation 11:15b: "The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord, and His Christ; and

He shall reign for ever and ever." This is not a "spiritual kingdom"; this is an earthly kingdom with spiritual leadership, that of Jesus Christ! Whatever your theological persuasion may be, you will have to admit that the verses before us show that the Lord Jesus Christ is going to rule over the kingdoms of men by putting them down! Chronicles & Epitaphs from the old Tishomingo County Courthouse



We have all heard the statement: "The hardest thing about change is change itself". Indeed, it is "hard to teach an old dog new tricks". However, statistics show that more than ever, "people are taking an interest in historical preservation within their hometowns". Such is the case in Tishomingo County shown in the rehabilitation of the 127 year old Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka. While I typically donate 100-150 or more hours per month, because I am also employed full time out of state, the majority of my work is done at the beginning and the end of my business day and on weekends. A couple of weeks ago, I had the opportunity to be the "relief person" for the courthouse staff. At first I was a little alarmed because I had no written instructions about what to say about the different exhibits, what would I do if more people came through the door than I could handle, how could I be on both floors at one time; after all, it was a nice warm sunny Saturday and our nice new "historic court house signs" had just been placed on Highway 25. As I so often do, I just rolled my sleeves up and asked God to "lay His hands on my shoulder and give me a big shove in the direction He would have me go".

Just as I pulled up, the "open" sign. I was greeted by an old school mate whom I didn't recognize at first. As he was signing the guest book, the phone rang and before I knew it he and his two youngsters asked if they could look around upstairs. Before I could go to meet them, more visitors were on their way in; thus was the case throughout the remainder of the day. Just as I was counting the number of visitors who had signed in that day, I realized it was now closing time and if I was to take care of my personal weekend responsibilities for the museum, I would have to change the sign to "closed." So, I picked up my inbox and carried my paperwork home and logged in an additional 6 hours of paperwork.

Over the next few days, I dwindle on all the history that I learned that one short day

through my personal conversations with people who found an interest in this or that exhibit. In just a few hours, I relived the lives of many senior adults who worked on the Sears battery powered radio, used the old farming equipment, purchased some of the same merchandise on display in the general store, used the same military equipment and supplies on display in the Military room, used the same equipment or supplies that some of the courthouse staff used during its time of government, or we just looked out the windows from the courtroom talking about the old Depo, and pointing to where the old hotels were, and where some of the old businesses were

once located. The spark of excitement in the youngsters eyes when viewing the arrowhead exhibits, the furniture, and the old pictures made my day even more worth while. I said all of that to say this, if you haven't done so already, get involved with your local community in reserving history for our future generations. Whatever you have to offer, whether it is time, money or words of encouragement, all will go a long way in assisting other volunteers in making projects such as the courthouse museum a reality.

Since our open house on March 7, 2004, the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum has been blessed with over 4,500 free service hours from 26 different volunteers. Whether they volunteers one hour or 100, each and everyone contributed to the operation of the courthouse. We have been honored with over 1,400 visitors from various states and one foreign country.

Now, some six months later, the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society, has held our "Grand Opening". We wanted to show you what we have done to preserve and protect the courthouse which served as the "county courthouse" from 1938 to 1971. Included in the courthouse inventory is a wide range of exhibits depicting the lives and times of the public who lived and worked here in Tishomingo County.

Will The Real Jesus Please Stand Up! (part IV)

If you are following my articles, you will remember that we were looking at Psalm 110 in the last article. I will return to that psalm, but I will not give the entire psalm again. In verse one, we learned that God the Father has told God the Son to sit at His right hand, until He makes His enemies His footstool. Verse two says, "The LORD shall send the rod of Thy strength out of Zion: rule Thou in the midst of Thine enemies." We will see from verses

I think that most of the world has some wrong ideas about Jesus Christ; they seem unable to see that He is a God of judgment. Perhaps our permissive society has conditioned us to think that no one will ever be judged for anything! This is detrimental to all of our present world, for it does not prepare people to meet God! I get amazed at the people who are willing to accept some things the Bible says, but they are not willing to accept its teaching about judgment.

ing, when they say that God will never judge sin, for that would turn the whole universe into chaos! If sinners shall forever get away with their sins, then there is absolutely no hope of anything better beyond here and now. 10. Persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older.

11. Parents, spouses, or dependents of persons having a temporary or permanent physical disability who are hospitalized outside their county of residence or more than fifty (50) miles away from their residence if the parents, spouses, or dependents will be with such persons on election day.

12. Members of the Mississippi Congressional delegation, or spouses or dependents of such members.

Procedure For Absentee Balloting

1. Miss. Code Ann. 23-15-625 et. seq. (1972) contains several requirements for absentee voting. These requirements include:

*Absentee ballot applications shall be furnished by the Circuit Clerk to a person upon the oral or written request of the elector who seeks to vote by absentee ballot;

*The parent, child, spouse, sibling, legal guardian, those empowered with a power of attorney for the elector's affairs, or agent of the elector may orally request an application on behalf of the elector;

*An absentee ballot application must have the seal of the registrar affixed to it and be initialed by the registrar or deputy registrar in order to be utilized to obtain an absentee ballot;

*A reproduction of an absentee ballot application shall not be valid unless it is a reproduction provided by the office of the registrar of the jurisdiction in which the election is being held and which contains the original seal and initials of the registrar or deputy registrar;

*Third parties procuring applications for others must complete and sign a new section of the applications designated "Certificate of Delivery" on each application the third parties are procuring, identifying themselves and the voters for whom they are acquiring the applications;

*If the third person acquiring an application for a voter cannot read or write, the Circuit Clerk or deputy clerk must complete the form "Request for Absentee Ballot Application by Third Person";

*Any voter who is blind, temporarily or permanently physically disabled, or cannot read or write, is entitled to request and receive assistance in the marking of his/her ballot. The voter may have the assistance of anyone except his/her employer, an agent of the voter's employer, or an officer or agent of the voter's union.

*Any person who provides assistance is required to sign and complete the "Certificate of Person providing Voter Assistance" on the absentee ballot envelope disclosing the date

and time assistance was provided and family relationship to the voter (if any).

*A candidate whose name appears on the ballot cannot be an attesting witness for an absentee ballot.

2. **Voting in the Circuit Clerk's Office:** All eligible absentee voters may cast their ballots in the Circuit Clerk's Office by completing the appropriate application form in the Circuit Clerk's Office.

3. **Voting by Mail:** Eligible absentee voters may request an absentee ballot by calling the Circuit's Clerk's Office at 423-7026, if they will not be able to come to the Circuit Clerk's Of-

fice to vote because they are:

A. Temporarily residing outside the county;

B. Temporarily or permanently physically disabled;

C. Sixty-five (65) years of age or older; or,

D. The parents, spouses, or dependents of temporarily or permanently physically disabled persons who are hospitalized outside of their counties of

residence or more than fifty (50) miles away from their residences if the parents, spouses, or dependents will be with such persons on election day.

Once you request the absentee ballot, an application will be mailed to you. You must complete this application and mail it back to us. When we receive your completed application, an absentee ballot will be mailed to you.

Applications and absentee ballot envelopes must be notarized or sworn and subscribed to by another official authorized to witness absentee ballot-

ing. However, applications and ballot envelopes of the temporarily or permanently disabled are not required to be notarized but must be witnessed and signed by a person eighteen (18) years of age or older. This person does NOT have to be a registered voter.

HAND DELIVERY OF ABSENTEE BALLOTS PROHIBITED

It is illegal to hand deliver absentee ballots in Mississippi. Unless an absentee ballot is being properly voted in the Circuit Clerk's Office, it must be mailed by the Circuit Clerk to the voter and the voter must

return the voted absentee ballot by mail to the Circuit Clerk. (Miss. Code Ann. 23-15-735 (1972)).

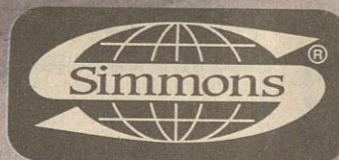
