Municipalities To Elect New Leaders in 2005

Municipalities in Tishomingo County are scheduled to elect new Mayors and Aldermen in 2005. Belmont, Burnsville, Golden, Iuka, Paden, and Tishomingo will all be holding elections. The official deadline to file qualifying fees and statements of intent for the offices of Mayor, Alderman, and Chief of Police (where elected) will be Friday, March 4th, 2005, at 4:00 p.m. If needed Party primaries will be held on May 3, 2005. The Run-Off election, if needed, will be held on May 10, 2005. The General Election will

be held on June 7, 2005. Newly elected officials are scheduled to take office on July 4, 2005, according to information from the Mississippi Secretary of State. In the City of Iuka, all candidates will have to qualify as Independents because no one qualified four years ago for the Party Executive Committees. Since no party affiliations are in place, all candidates will run on the General Ballot as Independent Candidates. Those wishing to qualify in Belmont, Burnsville, Golden, Paden, and Tishomingo should check with the City Clerks concerning qualifications.

Tishomingo County Section of Natchez Trace Parkway Re-Opened

A washed-out section of the Natchez Trace Parkway in Tishomingo County has been re-opened. This section of the Parkway collapsed in late August due to rains and heavy flooding. The washout was located between milepost 293.5 and 297.4. Travelers have been using a detour along a portion of state Highway 4 while the construction was being done. While this section of the Parkway has been re-opened, some construction continues as the final paving and roadway striping is completed. Travelers are encouraged to continue to use increased caution while the paving and striping details are being completed.

Recovery of Stolen U-Haul Leads To Recovery of Log Truck Stolen In Tishomingo County On Christmas Day Clinton, MS Man To Be Charged With Grand Larceny

A 26-foot U-Haul truck, stolen from Magee, MS, on Friday, December 24th, was recovered in Tishomingo County on Monday, Dec. 27, 2004, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Detective, Jay Moyers. The recovery of the 26-foot U-Haul led investigators to a subject, who had been arrested in Lincoln County, MS, for Petty Larceny. At the time of his arrest the subject was found in possession of a two-ton log truck that had been stolen from Tishomingo County on December 25. According to Tishomingo County Investigators, the 26-ft. U-Haul was found parked on the side of Highway 365 on Dec. 27th. As the Tishomingo County deputies were out

looking over the U-Haul, a resident drove up and told them he had just discovered his log truck missing. He added he had received a phone call from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department who had found the truck. When he investigated, the owner had found it missing from his property. The U-Haul found by the deputies was parked about half a mile from where the log truck had been stolen. Tishomingo County Sheriff's Detective Jamie Reynolds contacted Lincoln County authorities, and they advised him that a white male had been arrested on December 26 after pumping some \$80 worth of gas into a truck and then driving away without paying.

The subject was identified as Charles Ray of 499 Magnolia Ave., Clinton, MS. Ray had told the Lincoln County deputies that the truck belonged to his boss who had let him borrow it to get home for the holidays. Detective Reynolds stated that Charles Ray will be returned to Tishomingo County to face charges of Grand Larceny for the theft of the truck as soon as his charges in Lincoln County have been cleared. Detective Reynolds credits the work of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and actions taken by the Tishomingo County deputies for the quick resolution of these crimes and the return of the stolen property to the owners.

Crow's Neck Receives Grant For An Environmentally Friendly Walking Path At The Center

Nestled on a peninsula surrounded by Bay Springs Lake lies Crow's Neck Environmental Education and Conference Center in Tishomingo, MS. Full of life from the multitude of wildflowers, trees, and insects, Crow's Neck provides the perfect retreat to learn about nature and our environment. From viewing invertebrates under a microscope from one's own lake sample to enjoying a Midnight Safari along the trails by flashlight, children and adults alike benefit from the hands-on experiments, team-building programs and educational activities offered by the center. Leading the way in Mississippi by promoting responsible stewardship of our natural and cultural resources, Crow's Neck wanted to create an environmentally friendly walking path that would also provide wheelchair accessibility from their educational buildings to the overnight cabins. Cynthia Harrell, Executive Director of the Center, decided that a relatively new type of pavement called pervious concrete would meet their needs. To help make this dream a reality, Mississippi Concrete Industries Association was able

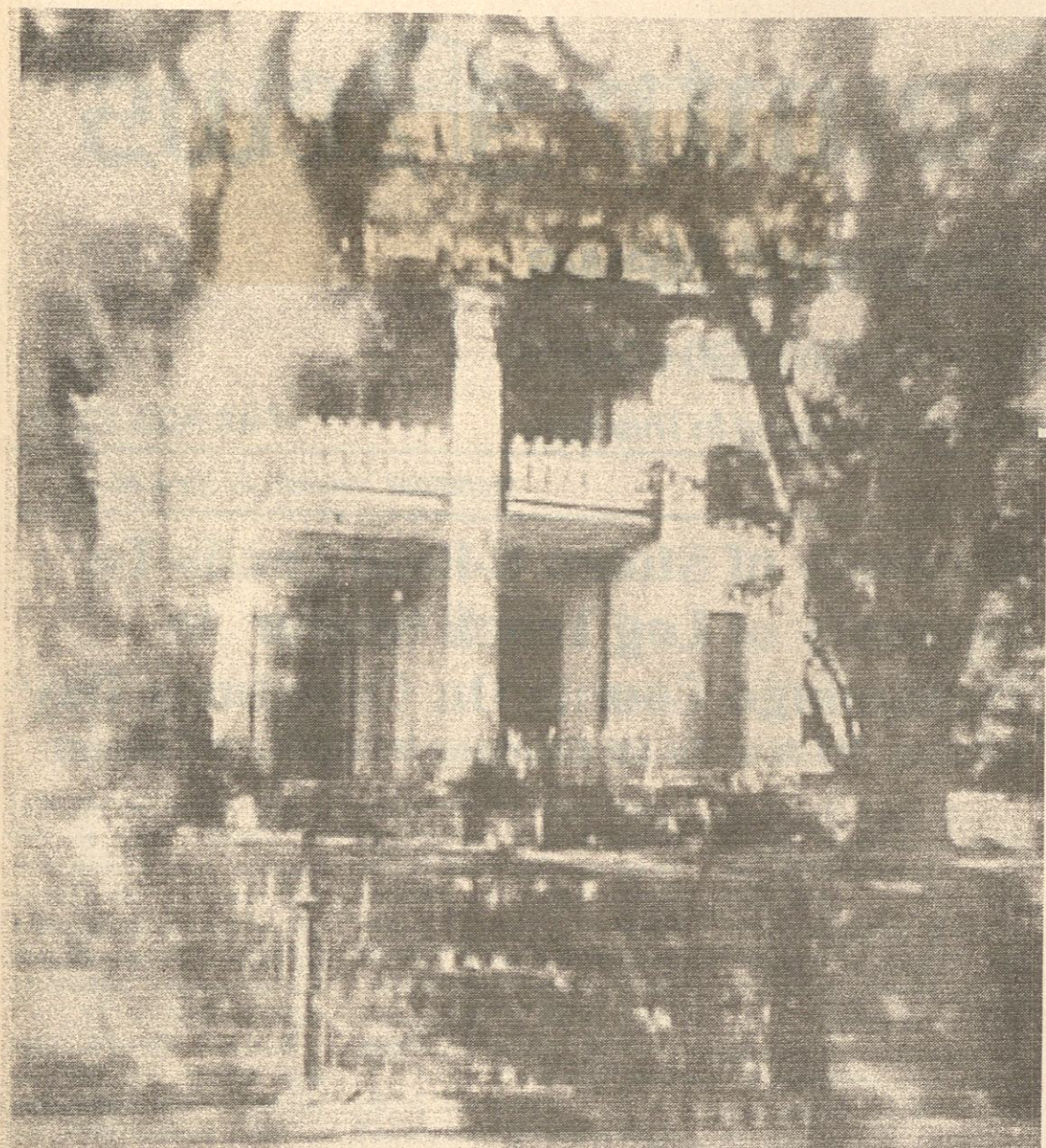
to provide a grant for the center by raising funds through the Count on Concrete Bike Ride "Building Access for all Americans" held during the summer of 2004. The Count on Concrete Bike ride began as an effort to spread the word about the environmental benefits of concrete. To build awareness a group of bike riders peddled their way across America from the Santa Monica Pier in California to Ponte Vedra, Florida stopping in various states along the way. This nationwide program was supported by the National Ready Mixed Concrete Association and The Conservation Fund along with various state and corporate sponsors. Together they helped raise over \$47,000 in funds for local projects in participating states. Since the Mississippi Concrete Industries Association (MCIA) was a state sponsor of the event, a grant of \$5,159 was awarded to help build a concrete path in Mississippi. The Count on Concrete Bike Ride funds enabled Crow's Neck to apply for and receive a much larger Recreational Trails Program grant that required 20% matching funds. The funds will be used to add pervious

concrete to the Lodge Trail and provide a major overhaul to the non-paved Greenbrier Trail. Once complete the Lodge Trail will have a texture similar to a rice cake. Since pervious concrete uses a mixture of gravel or stone, cement, water and little-to-no sand, an open-cell structure is created. The voids allow air and water to pass through the pavement simulating natural ground cover. Pervious concrete has also become an important solution to reduce storm water runoff from parking lots in cities. When impermeable parking lots are constructed, almost all of the rainwater runs off the pavement into storm-water collection systems. The rainwater carries with it contaminants that are left from vehicles and debris. These pollutants eventually make their way to our rivers and streams killing fish and wildlife. Since pervious concrete models natural ground cover, it provides a natural filter. The open-cell structure also provides a media for aerobic bacteria that break down pollutants such as oil and other hydro-carbon liquids that seep from parked cars helping to clean up our water and environment.

On his last day before returning to school on Tuesday, Canaan Harris and his Dad enjoyed spending a "day out" together on Monday. After enjoying a lunch treat of pizza, Canaan, 6, and his Dad, Kane Harris, of Belmont, enjoyed visiting the Old Tishomingo County Museum of Hives and History. One of the new books that they enjoyed looking at was the 1887 Assessment of Personal Property and Polls. Canaan said he was going to tell his Mom, Christy, and brother, Christian, 3, about all the "neat" stuff at the museum. He added that Grands, Sport and Barbara Harris, Golden, would also be told about the interesting stuff at the museum. Kane Harris said they had moved to Tishomingo County back in the early 70's, and he has an extreme interest—that he wants to pass on to his sons—in learning about the history of this area. The 1887 Assessment of Personal Property and Polls book is now available for purchase. It has been transcribed and compiled into a page booklet. This 1887 tax roll lists the names of citizens taxed in Tishomingo County by district. Assets, including the value of each asset, are listed for each citizen. Assets enumerated include number of cattle, horses, mules, sheep, swine, carriages or other wheeled vehicles, pianos, melodeons, and guns, watches, jewelry, pistols, bowie knives, dirks, and sword scabbards. The amount of tax assessed is also shown. If your ancestor was an inhabitant of Tishomingo County during this period, this booklet is a must for your personal library collection. Can you help identify the house in this photo?

Written on the back of this photograph are the words: "Iuka, Mississippi, Holly House—where Grandparents Holly lived during the Civil War and where two Civil War soldiers are buried—one Northern and one Southern soldier who crawled wounded from the nearby battlefield at Corinth, Miss." No other information is known about this house. Can you help identify where it was located?

This house was purportedly the home of Benjamin Ferrington HOLLY and his wife, Mary Ann HOLMES, during the Civil War. Benjamin was born in Tennessee in 1818 and died in Iuka in 1863. Mary Ann was born in 1821 and died in 1875, probably in Louisiana. The circumstances of Benjamin's death are not known; his burial site is also not known.

What Kind Of Bifocals?

Bifocals are generally the choice of people who require two separate vision corrections - one for near and one for distance. It is the sensible alternative to carrying two pairs of glasses and changing them constantly.

What degree of magnification is desirable? The power of the bifocal segment can be selected for any distance desired. Most often it is set for reading distance, but it need not be. It can be made for seeing as close as eight to ten inches for very precise work. Or it could be set for twenty to thirty inches to see the dashboard of an auto or an airplane. But it probably cannot provide optimum focus at both distances.

There are also choices as to the position and size of the bifocal segment. It is usually located in the lower third of the lens, but it doesn't have to be. It could be at the top of the lens or in the corner. It can be as small as a dime or encompass most of the lens.

John Jefferson Blythe Family Descendants Visit Tishomingo County

Descendants of John Jefferson Blythe enjoyed Christmas in Tishomingo County. The current Iuka Fire Department (the Old Co-Op Building) is located where the Blythe Hotel was located until it burned in the Civil War.

The group traveled west on to Ye Ole Apple Barn near Corinth for lunch and then on to Jacinto Courthouse where some got a little emotional seeing the brick floors and archi-

Tyler Segars Knows Meaning of Wearing Blisters and Getting Dirty

While their friends were sleeping late during Christmas vacation, Tyler Segars, some of his friends, and some of his family members were wearing blisters on their hands and getting really dirty cutting trees, limbs, and weeds. They used their weed eaters, saws, rakes and hand, arm, and back power to clear and collect debris to pile on top of a burning pile to clear the land at the Goyer Cemetery.

Goyer Cemetery is located to the west of and adjacent to the Sunset Lodge on Hwy. 72. This old cemetery, which has been declared as an abandoned cemetery, dates back to the Civil War, and it is believed

that as many as 300 to 400 Yankee and Confederate soldiers are buried there. These soldiers died in the Battle of Iuka that was fought on September 19-20, 1862. The restoration of this historic battlefield is one of the projects of the Iuka Battlefield Commission, and through his project, Tyler is helping to make this project a reality. As a part of his Eagle project, Tyler, with the help of his friends is clearing and cleaning the cemetery spot. After the cleaning is completed, a team from the Battlefield Preservation will come in and actually probe the cemetery to find out where the graves actu-

ally are. There is a possibility that a second mass grave could be located at this spot.

In choosing his Eagle project, Tyler wanted to do something that would be beneficial to members of his community. He also wanted to do something that would continue to educate others about the significant history of his hometown area. Completion of Tyler's project will bring members of this community as well as Civil War enthusiasts across the nation to this area to research happenings that occurred at the Battle of Iuka. Goyer Cemetery will be a spot of special interest to these enthusiasts.

2005 MS Legislative Session Began Wednesday, January 4

The Mississippi 2005 Legislative Session officially began at 12:00 noon on Wednesday, January 4 with "money, or the lack of" on the minds of both Senate and House of Representative members. They will be facing tough financial-funding problems during this session. Medicaid, the Funding for Education, and Budget Deficits will weigh heavily on the minds of the Legislators.

According to the Associated Press, nearly \$350 million is needed to patch holes in the current year's budget. State agencies are also requesting nearly \$1 billion more than the \$3.8 billion available for the fiscal year that starts July 1. Some considerations for additional tax funds on items such as cigarettes will also probably be considered.

Republican Governor Haley Barbour begins his second year as Governor of Mississippi saying that he opposes any new taxes. He wants most agencies to cut 5% from their budgets,

and he is asking legislators to give the executive branch more control over the state agencies.

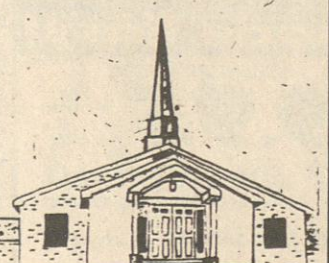

NMMC-Iuka Sleep Disorders Lab Offers Services For Area Residents

My husband snores heavily and often complains about being sleepy during the day. He is about 30 pounds overweight and is 52 years old. His physician recommended that he be evaluated for a sleep disorder. Is this a good idea?

For area residents who experience these symptoms, an evaluation at the North Mississippi Medical Center - Iuka Sleep Disorders Lab can determine if you suffer from a sleep disorder.

"If your sleep is characterized by periods of silence followed by loud, raspy snoring and gasping sounds, and if this happens more than 30 times during a typical night's sleep, you may have sleep apnea," said Felix Morris, M.D., medical director of the NMMC-Iuka Sleep Disorders Lab.

In addition to excessive snoring, nighttime symptoms of sleep apnea can include abnormal movements while sleeping, as well as choking sensations, headaches and confusion. People with sleep apnea may also

be tired during the day because of the lack of sleep at night. The lack of oxygen caused by sleep apnea can "short circuit" the brain, causing a person to become forgetful, inattentive and irritable.

"Patients who stop breathing at intervals during the night or experience daytime sleepiness could potentially benefit from sleep apnea treatment," said Dr. Morris. "Obese persons with excessive morning fatigue or early morning

headaches may also be candidates for a sleep evaluation."

According to Dr. Morris, people who respond to treatment report dramatic improvement in energy levels and quality of life. Treatment can reduce the need for medication and has been shown to decrease the incidence of sudden death.

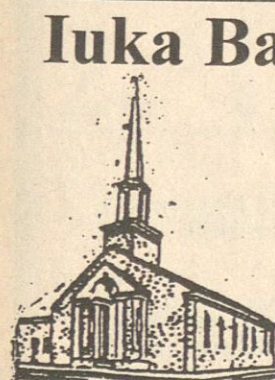

Conservation Corner

by James L. Cummins

Whether you are a photographer, hunter or like viewing wildlife, anyone who has spent time overlooking a food plot will have a deep appreciation for wildlife plantings.

Food plots are very attractive to wildlife because they can supplement their daily nutritional needs at a low cost. These plots can be designed to serve as a source of food and cover. Well-managed food plots have the potential to increase wildlife, quality of health and observability.

To aid landowners who would like to plant wildlife food plots, Wildlife Mississippi is continuing its Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. Through this program, Wildlife Mississippi will make seed available at a minimal cost.

The Wildlife Habitat Seed Program is designed to provide an incentive for landowners to establish and maintain food plots that will yield a variety of benefits to the landowner as well as the species of wildlife he or she is managing.

Winter wheat, corn, soybean, grain sorghum and sunflower seed will be available through the 2005 Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. All seed has been treated and has excellent germination rates. The seed is provided by Pioneer Hi-bred International and is distributed through resource Management to the Foundation.

If planted properly, the various types of seed will be utilized by a variety of species of wildlife. White-tailed deer, turkeys, bobwhite quail, mourning doves, waterfowl and many species of songbirds will benefit from these plantings.

The guidelines regarding this program are simple and easy to follow. Anyone interested in obtaining seed should send a self-addressed, stamped envelope to Wildlife Mississippi with a request for an order form and planting recommendations for the seed. Wildlife Mississippi will be taking orders up until February 18, 2005. This will allow the staff to place the orders in a timely manner to ensure that they will be filled.

Shipping and handling charges incurred by Wildlife Mississippi are included in the price of the seed. The costs will be \$12.00 per 50 lb. bag for corn, \$8.00 per 50 lb. bag for

sorghum, \$10.00 per 50 lb. bag for soybeans, \$8.00 per 20 lb. bag for sunflower and \$5.00 per 50 lb. bag for wheat. Persons ordering seed will be required to pick it up in Amory, Greenville or Hattiesburg.

For an order form and planting recommendations for this unique program, send a self-addressed stamped envelope to Wildlife Mississippi, P. O. Box 10, Stoneville, MS 38776.

James L. Cummins is Executive Director of the Mississippi Fish and Wildlife Foundation in Stoneville, Mississippi. 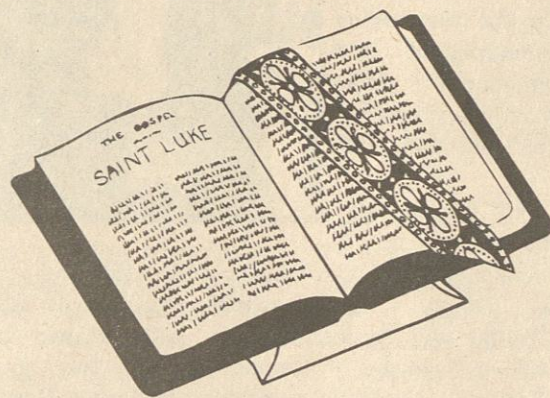

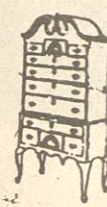

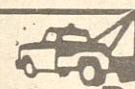

Three grants of \$55,000, \$9, and \$12,650 will be used to rehabilitate trails, improve trails and paths, and provide additional educational opportunities at Crow's Neck Environmental Recreational Center.

The first grant, a \$55,000 National Trails Program grant requires a 20% match. The grant is administered by the U.S. Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks. This grant will be used to rehabilitate and restore two key trails. After more than ten years of use, Greenbrier Trail,

Crow's Neck's most popular non-paved foot path, needs a major overhaul. In addition, Lodge Trail, the paved path connecting the Center's overnight lodges to the main educational building, needs to be modified to meet accessibility standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Beginning in June 2005, the grant money will be spent for non-technical trail work and trailhead restoration to be accomplished by a Student Conservation Association (SCA) "Charlie Crew"; materials such as #7 washed slag, treated tim-

bers, treated pilings, rebar, wood chips, pervious concrete, flagstones, top soil, pine straw, and sand; the contractual services of a landscape architect who will provide expertise in the planning and design of trail modifications to ensure ADA requirements are met; the contractual services of a local concrete firm skilled at installing the new pervious concrete surface; and the contractual services of a stone mason competent in laying the flagstone "apron" at the trailhead.

A second grant of \$5,159 will be used in the "Building

Access for all Americans" Program. This grant, administered by The Conservation Fund and the National Ready Mixed Concrete Association, will be used to improve trails and paths, especially for the disabled.

As part of their "Count on Concrete" Bike Ride the Mississippi Concrete Industries Association (MCIA) has awarded the Center an outright gift to improve handicapped accessibility to Crow's Neck visitors staying in the residential lodges. This work will be incorporated in the larger RTP grant.

The third grant of \$12,650 will benefit the Master Naturalist Program. It is administered by North Central Mississippi

Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council and the Natural Resources Initiative (NRI) of North Mississippi. This grant money will be used to conduct a "Master Naturalist" certification course at Crow's Neck.

From money originating from the United States Forest Service, the North Central MS RC&D Council and the NRI of North Mississippi will develop two training sessions for the Master Naturalist Program. One program will be held at Crow's Neck beginning in February 2005 with 15 participants taking part. (The second will run concurrently at Strawberry Plains Audubon Center, Holly Springs, MS.) The Master Naturalist Program will train adult volunteers in a wide range of topics to include plant identification, basic ecology, soils, and wildlife management. A goal of this program is to develop, at no cost to the center, a cadre of available instructors for future Crow's Neck classes and activities.

NMMC, WCBI to launch "Nutrition Detectives on the Go"

North Mississippi Medical Center and WCBI-TV are teaming together for "Nutrition Detectives on the Go" a nutrition and physical fitness program aimed at students in grades K-6. Every child who completes the nine-week program receives a "Nutrition Detectives on the Go" T-shirt, and one lucky winner will receive a round-trip for four to Disney World in Orlando, Fla.

To register, call 1-800 THE DESK (1-800-843-3375) before Friday, Jan 15. The program is limited to 250 participants. Participants can pick up their "Classified Files" information packets at any NMMC Wellness Center between Jan. 24-29. NMMC Wellness Centers are located in Baldwin, Eupora, Iuka, Pontotoc, Tupelo and West Point, Miss., and Hamilton Ala.

The "Classified Files" con-

tain nine weekly nutrition and physical fitness lessons, each with an important question at the end. Each Tuesday, Feb. 1 - March 29, WCBI will air a "Nutrition Detectives on the Go" segment during the Sunrise edition and the evening News at 5. The segment will focus on that week's lesson and will contain the "clue" needed to answer that week's question. The "clue" will also air throughout the week and be posted on www.wcbi.com and www.nmhs.net.

In addition to lesson requirement participants will be required to exercise at least 15 minutes a day most days of the week.

"Classified Files" contain an exercise log for children to track their progress.

All participants who complete the requirements and return their packet by April 15 to their local Wellness Center will receive a "Nutrition Detectives on the Go" T-shirt and be entered to win the trip to Disney World. 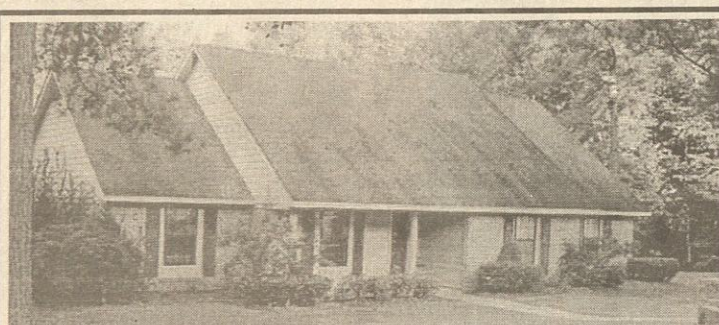

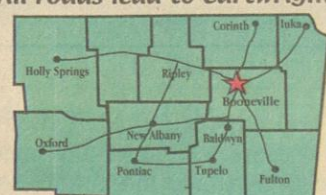

Chronicles & Epitaphs from the old Tishomingo County Courthouse



Old Tishomingo County

The following information was obtained, in part, from both the U.S. Bureau of the Census and the book entitled, *Valley of Springs: The Story of Iuka*, written by William L. Coker.

The "old" Tishomingo County, as it was organized by the State of Mississippi in February 1836, covered what is now Alcorn, Prentiss, and Tishomingo counties. This huge county was the largest created in Mississippi and had a total land area of 923,040 acres, or 1,286 square miles. With an estimated population of 5,000 inhabitants, there would have been over 700 acres to every man, woman, and child in the county.

Several men, all settlers in Tishomingo County, were appointed to organize the new "State of Tishomingo." They were: Peter G. Rives, James Davis, James McMatthews, and A. M. Cowan. The act to organize the county also provided for the location of a "seat of justice" which was supposed to be located within five miles from the geographic center of the county. An area was located and named Cincinnati, but because there

was already a large city in Ohio named Cincinnati, the citizens decided to rename the small village Jacinto, in memory of the Battle of San Jacinto, which involved several units from Tishomingo County during the Mexican War. A log structure was erected by Caleb Lindsey for the sum of \$199 to use as a county courthouse. Many settlers and merchants moved into the area during the 1850s, and population expanded in Tishomingo County due to north Mississippi's rich land and favorable climate. Jacinto experienced tremendous growth also, and in keeping with the expansion, it was decided that a new courthouse was needed. In 1853, a contract for the sum of \$3,399 was awarded to J. J. Blythe for the erection of a new courthouse. Before work began, however, both contracting parties agreed to changes which called for the construction of a two-story brick structure to be topped with an octagonal-shaped belfry. The new sum of \$6,798 was contracted, and the financially prosperous Tishomingo County paid the final note of indebtedness for the structure upon completion of the building in 1854.

In 1870, the population of Tishomingo County decreased drastically because an act of the state legislature divided old Tishomingo County into three smaller counties—Alcorn County and Prentiss County were formed out of the "old" Tishomingo County. With this division of land, each new county separated into three county administrative units. This left Jacinto without any particular attraction, and most of the merchants moved their businesses to the new county seats.
