Recovery of Stolen U-Haul Leads To Recovery of Log Truck Stolen In Tishomingo County On Christmas Day Clinton, MS Man To Be Charged With Grand Larceny

A 26-foot U-Haul truck, stolen from Magee, MS, on Friday, December 24th, was recovered in Tishomingo County on Monday, Dec. 27, 2004, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department Detective, Jay Moyers.

The recovery of the 26-foot U-Haul led investigators to a subject, who had been arrested in Lincoln County, MS, for Petty Larceny. At the time of his arrest the subject was found in possession of a two-ton log truck that had been stolen from Tishomingo County on December 25.

According to Tishomingo County Investigators, the 26-ft. U-Haul was found parked on the side of Highway 365 on Dec. 27th. As the Tishomingo County deputies were out

looking over the U-Haul, a resident drove up and told them he had just discovered his log truck missing. He added he had received a phone call from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department who had found the truck. When he investigated, the owner had found it missing from his property.

The U-Haul found by the deputies was parked about half a mile from where the log truck had been stolen.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Detective Jamie Reynolds contacted Lincoln County authorities, and they advised him that a white male had been arrested on December 26 after pumping some \$80 worth of gas into a truck and then driving away without paying.

The subject was identified as Charles Ray of 499 Magnolia Ave., Clinton, MS. Ray had told the Lincoln County deputies that the truck belonged to his boss who had let him borrow it to get home for the holidays.

Detective Reynolds stated that Charles Ray will be returned to Tishomingo County to face charges of Grand Larceny for the theft of the truck as soon as his charges in Lincoln County have been cleared.

Detective Reynolds credits the work of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and actions taken by the Tishomingo County deputies for the quick resolution of these crimes and the return of the stolen property to the owners.

Crow's Neck Receives Grant For An Environmentally Friendly Walking Path At The Center

Nestled on a peninsula surrounded by Bay Springs Lake lies Crow's Neck Environmental Education and Conference Center in Tishomingo, MS. Full of life from the multitude of wildflowers, trees, and insects, Crow's Neck provides the perfect retreat to learn about nature and our environment. From viewing invertebrates under a microscope from one's own lake sample to enjoying a Midnight Safari along the trails by flashlight, children and adults alike benefit from the hands-on experiments, teambuilding programs and educational activities offered by the center.

Leading the way in Mississippi by promoting responsible stewardship of our natural and cultural resources, Crow's Neck wanted to create an environmentally friendly walking path that would also provide wheelchair accessibility from their educational buildings to the overnight cabins. Cynthia Harrell, Executive Director of the Center, decided that a relatively new type of pavement called pervious concrete would meet their needs.

To help make this dream a reality, Mississippi Concrete Industries Association was able

to provide a grant for the center by raising funds through the Count on Concrete Bike Ride "Building Access for all Americans" held during the summer of 2004.

The Count on Concrete Bike ride began as an effort to spread the word about the environmental benefits of concrete. To build awareness a group of bike riders peddled their way across America from the Santa Monica Pier in California to Ponte Vedra, Florida stopping in various states along the way. This nationwide program was supported by the National Ready Mixed Concrete Association and The Conservation Fund along with various state and corporate sponsors. Together they helped raise over \$47,000 in funds for local projects in participating states. Since the Mississippi Concrete Industries Association (MCIA) was a state sponsor of the event, a grant of \$5,159 was awarded to help build a concrete path in Mississippi.

The Count on Concrete Bike Ride funds enabled Crow's Neck to apply for and receive a much larger Recreational Trails Program grant that required 20% matching funds. The funds will be used to add pervious concrete to the Lodge Trail and provide a major overhaul to the non-paved Greenbrier Trail.

Once complete the Lodge Trail will have a texture similar to a rice cake. Since pervious concrete uses a mixture of gravel or stone, cement, water and little-to-no sand, an opencell structure is created. The voids allow air and water to pass through the pavement simulating natural ground cover. Pervious concrete has also become an important solution to reduce storm water runoff from parking lots in cities. When impermeable parking lots are constructed, almost all of the rainwater runs off the pavement into storm-water collection systems. The rainwater carries with it contaminants that are left from vehicles and debris. These pollutants eventually make their way to our rivers and streams killing fish and wildlife. Since pervious concrete models natural ground cover, it provides a natural filter. The open-cell structure also provides a media for aerobic bacteria that break down pollutants such as oil and other hydra-carbon liquids that seep from parked cars helping to clean up our water and environment.

Can you help identify the house in this photo?

Written on the back of this photograph are the words: "Iuka, Mississippi, Holly House-where Grandparents Holly lived during the Civil War and where two Civil War soldiers are buried-one Northern and one Southern soldier who crawled wounded from the nearby battlefield at Corinth, Miss." No other information is known about this house. Can you help identify where it was located?

This house was purportedly the home of Benjamin Ferrington HOLLY and his wife, Mary Ann HOLMES, during the Civil War. Benjamin was born in Tennessee in 1818 and died in Iuka in 1863. Mary Ann was born in 1821 and died in 1875, probably in Louisiana. The circumstances of Benjamin's death are not known; his burial site is also not known.

Conservation Corner by James L. Cummins

Whether you are a photographer, hunter or like viewing wildlife, anyone who has spent time overlooking a food plot will have a deep appreciation for wildlife plantings.

Food plots are very attractive to wildlife because they can supplement their daily nutritional needs at a low cost. These plots can be designed to serve as a source of food and cover. Well-managed food plots have the potential to increase wildlife, quality of health and observability.

To aid landowners who would like to plant wildlife plots, Wildlife food Mississippi is continuing its Wildlife Habitat Seed Through this Program. program, Wildlife Mississippi will make seed available at a minimal cost.

The Wildlife Habitat Seed Program is designed to provide an incentive for landowners to establish and maintain food plots that will yield a variety of benefits to the landowner as well as the species of wildlife he or she is managing.

Winter wheat, corn. soybean, grain sorghum and sunflower seed will be available through the 2005 Habitat Seed Wildlife Program. All seed has been treated and has excellent germination rates. The seed is provided by Pioneer Hi-bred International and is distributed through resource Management to the Foundation.

If planted properly, the various types of seed will be utilized by a variety of species of wildlife. White-tailed deer, turkeys, bobwhite quail, mourning doves, waterfowl and

sorghum, \$10.00 per 50 lb. bag for soybeans, \$8.00 per 20 lb. bag for sunflower and \$5.00 per 50 lb. bag for wheat. Persons ordering seed will be required to pick it up in Amory, Greenville or Hattiesburg.

he first grant, a \$55,000 eational Trails Program) requires a 20% match. grant is administered by S Department of Wildlife, Ties and Parks. This grant y will be used to rehabilind restore two key trails. fter more than ten years of y use, Greenbrier Trail,

Crow's Neck's most popular non-paved foot path, needs a major overhaul. In addition, Lodge Trail, the paved path connecting the Center's overnight lodges to the main educational building, needs to be modified to meet accessibility standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Beginning in June 2005, the grant money will be spent for non-technical trail work and trailhead restoration to be accomplished by a Student Conservation Association (SCA) "Charlie Crew"; materials such as #7 washed slag, treated timbers, treated pilings, rebar, wood chips, pervious concrete, flagstones, top soil, pine straw, and sand; the contractual services of a landscape architect who will provide expertise in the planning and design of trail modifications to ensure ADA requirements are met; the contractual services of a local concrete firm skilled at installing the new pervious concrete surface; and the contractual services of a stone mason competent in laying the flagstone "apron" at the trailhead.







Old Tishomingo County

The following information was obtained, in part, from both the J.S. Bureau of the Census and the book entitled, Valley of Springs: The Story of Iuka, written by William L. Coker.

The "old" Tishomingo County, as it was organized by the State of Mississippi in February 1836, covered what is now Alcorn, Prentiss, and Tishomingo counties. This huge county was the largest created in Mississippi and had a total land area of 923,040 acres, or 1,286 square miles. With an estimated population of 5,000 inhabitants, there would have been over 700 acres to every man, woman, and child in the county.

Several men, all settlers in Tishomingo County, were appointed to organize the new "State of Tishomingo." They were: Peter G. Rives, James Davis, James McMatthews, and A. M. Cowan. The act to organize the county also provided for the location of a "seat of justice" which was supposed to be located within five miles from the geographic center of the county. An area was located and named Cincinnati, but because there

was already a large city in Ohio named Cincinnati, the citizens decided to rename the small village Jacinto, in memory of the Battle of San Jacinto, which involved several units from Tishomingo County during the Mexican War. A log structure was erected by Caleb Lindsey for the sum of \$199 to use as a county courthouse. Many settlers and merchants moved into the area during the 1850s, and population expanded in Tishomingo County due to north Mississippi's rich land and favorable climate. Jacinto experienced tremendous growth also, and in keeping with the expansion, it was decided that a new courthouse was needed. In 1853, a contract for the sum of \$3,399 was awarded to J. J. Blythe for the erection of a new Before work courthouse. however, began, both contracting parties agreed to changes which called for the construction of a two-story brick structure to be topped with an octagonal-shaped belfry. The new sum of \$6,798 was contracted, and the financially prosperous Tishomingo County paid the final note of indebtedness for the structure upon completion of the building in 1854.

In 1870, the population of Tishomingo County decreased drastically because an act of the state legislature divided old Tishomingo County into three smaller counties-Alcorn County and Prentiss County were formed out of the "old" Tishomingo County. With this division of land, each new county separated into three county administrative units. This left Jacinto without any particular attraction, and most of the merchants moved their businesses to the new county seats.
