Sheriff Whitlock and all the questions that were directed to them by the group.

They fully explained all the questioned situations. Some of the questions included necessities provided to prisoners free of charge, the state operated commissary that sets their own prices for pre-packaged items that keep illegal items from being smuggled into the prisoners, optional commissary items, (the jail has a program that helps provide for those people who are not able to buy from the commissary.), neglect of sick prisoners, strip searches and cavity searches, and dis-

jail is checked several times a year by the State of MS, and that all the problems noted by this department had been fixed soon after their visits. After the last visit from the state agency, several electrical and plumbing items were repaired. (The State of MS agency was at the jail making one of their inspections as this meeting was taking place.) Sheriff Whitlock also added that he expected all the personnel at the Sheriff's Department to treat all inmates fairly. He also added that he wanted adequate facilities for the inmates and that the Sheriff's Department officers were doing the best that can be done with what is available to them.

Sheriff Whitlock also said rectly to the sheriff. Sheriff he felt that as long as people are involved in situations that personalities will clash at times and there will be two sides to every story.

After more than an hour of Deputy Moyers responded to discussing the concerns, the meeting was concluded with Mrs. Parsons saying she would bring a civil suit against the sheriff and the supervisors if something was not done about the conditions at the jail.



The eye bank in Memphis has certified "harvesters" who take cornea's and other eye tissue for cornea replacements." The donor must have an organ donor card and/or family consent for this. These are performed free of charge to the patient or family. Lions' can now literally help the needy to see again by this method or glasses. Locally, we try to help all we can. Our guidelines for choosing recipients is based on financial need and probability of success after being evaluated by the doctors, Memphis Eye Bank and the Iuka Lions' Club.

We go along the lines of evaluating and excepting candidates similarly to the qualifications of other programs such as Medicare, Medicaid and similar government programs.

We have over 100 requests in our area of Tishomingo County each year. Due to limited funds, we do our best to see

who is in the worst need of our service. We operate strictly on the funds given at roadblocks
