Mr. Anonymous Exceeds 100,000 Pounds

For the fourth time, an anonymous Tishomingo County resident has donated over \$8,000 worth of groceries to The Food Depot. The first time was early in 2003 when The Depot was barely a year old. The same donor gave groceries last spring and Thanksgiving.

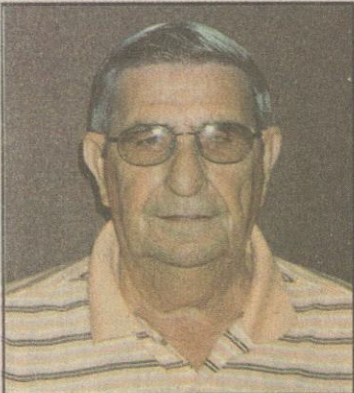

Investigation Into Donna Cupido's Disappearance Continues

According to Iuka Police Chief Randy Stringer, the investigation into the disappearance of Donna Teresa Cupido, a 5'9," 135 lb., white female with sandy blonde hair, on October 21, 2004, is still continuing on a daily basis.

Chief Stringer said, "Just last week on Friday, May 13, Mrs. Cupido's husband and son, Brian and Jason Cupido, respectively, voluntarily took polygraph tests. These tests were administered at the Iuka Police Department by an independent polygraphist. By voluntarily taking the tests, both the father and the son hoped to remove any doubt and/or suspicion that they might be involved in anyway with Donna's disappearance. According to the polygraph tests,

both passed.

Chief Stringer said that after a followup story on Donna Teresa Cupido's disappearance on Eyewitness News out of Memphis, TN, earlier last week a couple of leads did surface. One of the leads concerned a sighting of the missing woman in the Knoxville, TN, area. Another lead was that she was thought to have been seen in another state. Chief Stringer said both of these leads were investigated, and no new facts were found. He also added that any and all leads will be thoroughly investigated.

Anybody who might have information on the missing woman, no matter how small or seemingly insignificant,

Don't Live In Ignorance Or Fear

There have been several science fiction movies made over the years about computers being created and put in charge of all our national defenses. In most of those movies, something goes wrong with the computer and it turns on the people it was empowered to protect, the remainder of the movie is devoted to a super spy or agency regaining control of our national defenses to save our country or the world from destruction. Many of you reading this article have probably seen one of these movies.

Within Tishomingo County, we do not depend on a super computer to protect us from harm. One of the systems we do have in place is something called a Sheriff's Department, you may have had dealings with this agency (hopefully with better results than my own). The sheriff's department is mandated to keep order and protect citizens from those who break the laws of the land. What happens when a sheriff's department malfunctions and turns on those it is empowered to protect? Unfortunately there is no super spy or agency to come to the rescue. Unfortunately also is that this story concerning the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department turning on those it is empowered to protect is not science fiction.

I have been in contact with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors and the Mississippi Attorney General's Office as well as other agencies and have been told the sheriff's department is an autonomous body. This basically means the sheriff has the authority to run the sheriff's department any way he chooses, regardless of whether it benefits the citizens of the county or not. The sheriff, once elected, can, for the next 4 years do as he pleases with the sheriff department's personnel and budget, as long as he remains within federal and state law. Okay. Wait a minute, I am confused. The sheriff can (in Tishomingo County at least) deprive people of their civil rights guaranteed under federal and state law. Do you know how the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department can, has, and I believe will continue to ignore our civil rights? Simply because there is, to my knowledge after much investigation, no federal or state agency that will pursue civil rights violations under numerous circumstances. This basically means the

sheriff's department can, under many circumstances, arrest without probable cause, falsely arrest and imprison, and harass and intimi-

date the people within the county without fear of any consequences. I urge anyone that believes the sheriff's department should be accountable for any illegal activity to contact their state legislators and let them know the citizens in Tishomingo County will not tuck their tails between their legs and allow an elected official such as the sheriff to bully the citizens that pay his salary. Our state legislators can create or empower a state agency to investigate all cases of police misconduct. If the internal revenue service heard of one person who supposedly cheated on their taxes for only a small amount of money, you can bet that person would be investigated and every last dollar collected, yet many civil rights violations are reported within the state and go uninvestigated. Our government is concerned about hounding the average citizen that is just trying to get by about any taxes they may have inadvertently failed to report to the IRS. It appears to me that our federal and state government is more concerned with a few tax dollars than the tremendous harm that can occur from having citizen's civil rights trampled on by some law enforcement officers. I am not saying that people should not pay their taxes. I simply believe that at least as much efforts as is spent on collecting taxes should be spent on protecting the civil rights of all citizens. If the amount of man power an money was expended by our government to fight civil rights violations as is used by the IRS to pursue hardworking tax payers, then I believe civil rights violations would be a thing of the past. We pay taxes to be protected by elected law enforcement officials not to be abused by them.

I have had some people tell me that they are afraid to speak out against the authorities within Tishomingo County, and that fear is the only way that prejudice and intimidation can exist. When people stand together in a common

RECEIVING COMPENSATION

Workers' compensation pays medical bills and lost wages of individuals injured or killed while working. It is not necessary to prove that the employer was at fault because the workers' compensation is administered under a no-fault system. The tradeoff for receiving payments without having to prove negligence is that workers cannot sue their employers for compensation for their pain and suffering. However, if the employer does not carry workers' compensation insurance, injured workers can sue their employers for pain and suffering. If the work-related injury was caused by someone other than the employer or a co-worker, the injured worker can collect workers' compensation benefits and still have a lawsuit for pain and suffering against the one who caused the accident.

In all work injuries, the employee has certain rights and duties. The injured worker should seek legal consultation to understand her or his rights including those for medical treatment and disability payments. It is not wise to rely upon the employer or the insurance company to help you or to explain your rights. For further information, call our office for a consultation.

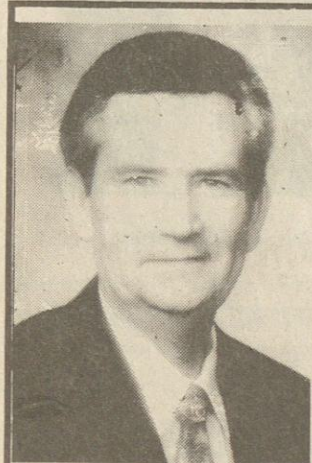

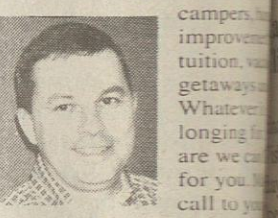

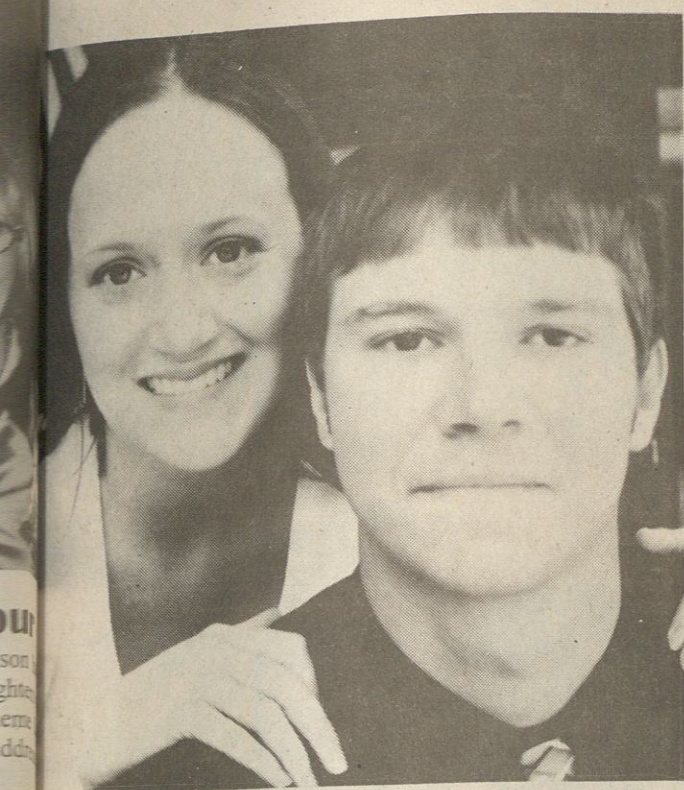


Changes In Your Vision

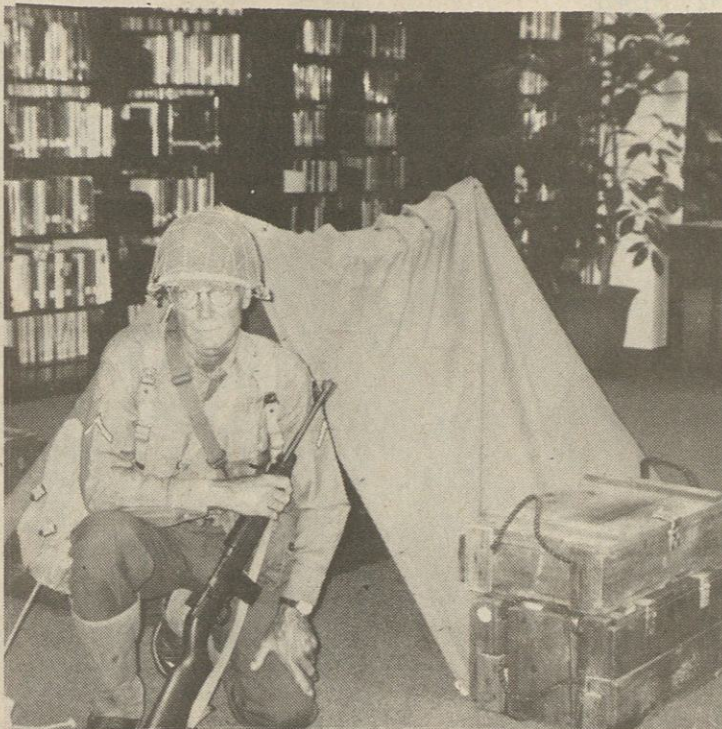

"The Living History Event is dedicated to all those, in every branch of the services, past and present who have laid their lives on the line for our country," Fredda Sanderson, Librarian and Regent of Tishomingo Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution stated.

The Living History Event at the library will feature World War II military equipment and supplies. Msgr. Lancaster will represent the World War II soldier in period uniform and equipment and will be available to answer questions. Everyone is encouraged to visit the hands-on exhibit and experience the learning environment at the library during the three day event.

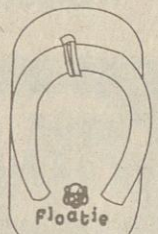

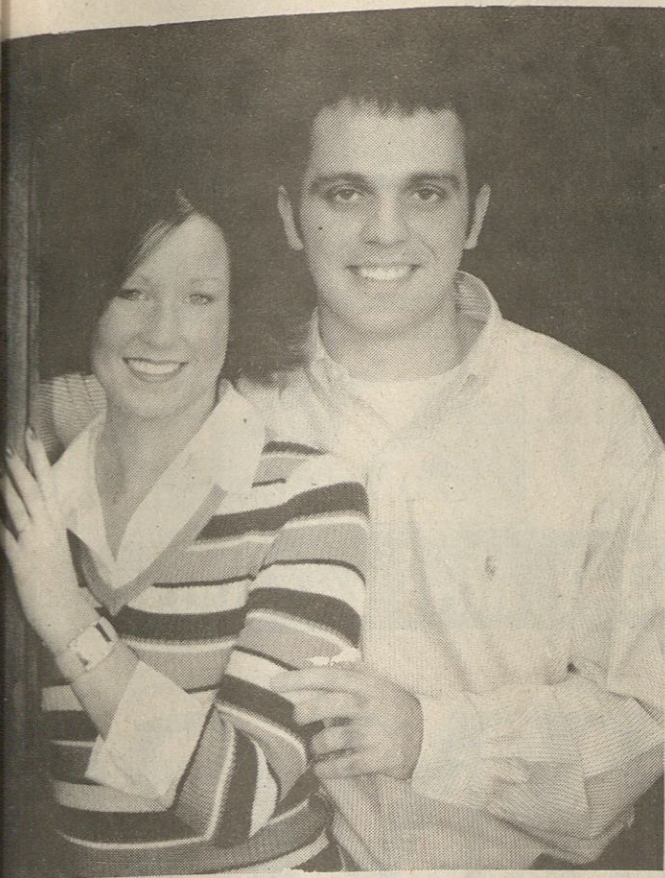

New Tishomingo County Book Released...

The transcription of the 1856-1859 School Funds Account Book for Old Tishomingo County, Mississippi, has been completed and is now ready for purchase. The original handwritten document is dated 1856-1858 on the spine; however, monies for 1859 are also included. The 234-page, softbound book lists the names of the schools and instructors. It also contains the names of the Tishomingo County children taught as beneficiaries, the number of days each pupil attended school, the rate of pay charged per day, and the total amount paid for each pupil. These rates varied from 5 cents to 13 cents per day. It is interesting to note that not all pupils in the same school were allowed the same rate.

Students need to bring \$.50 cents to their first period teacher to buy an envelope which will be used to mail their report cards.

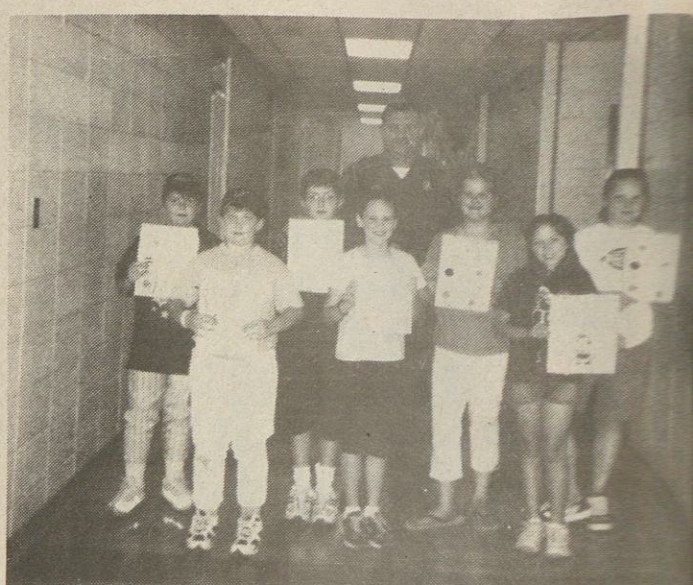

Mississippi/Tishomingo County Sex Offenders

The Tishomingo County News recently had an inquiry requesting the publication of information on registered sex offenders in this county (area). After an Internet Search, the following information was found: The Mississippi Department of Public Safety, mandated by federal legislation, put into effect a Sex Offenders Registration Law. This law was enacted requiring the Mississippi Department of Public Safety to maintain a registry of persons residing in this state who have been convicted of certain sexual offenses or attempted offenses.

According to the Internet site, MDPS updates the information regularly, to try to assure that it is complete and

accurate. However, this information can change quickly. People are cautioned about how quickly the information can change. People visiting the site are also cautioned that information provided on this site may not reflect the current residence, status, or other information regarding an offender. The information in this registry is provided to MDPS by criminal justice agencies and representatives. MDPS compiles and provides this information but does not independently confirm the accuracy of all information. Positive identification of a person believed to be a sex offender cannot be established unless a fingerprint comparison is made.

This information is made

available for the purpose of protecting the Public. Anyone who uses this information to commit a criminal act against another person is subject to criminal prosecution. The sale or exchange of sex offender information for profit is prohibited. Misuse of this information is a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or imprisonment in the county jail not more than six (6) months, or both.

To correct erroneous information in the Mississippi Sex Offender Registry or to report a change in sex offender information, including a change of address, contact the MDPS via e-mail, mail, or telephone at the below listed number and addresses.

registry, please refer to the Frequently Asked Questions section or contact MDPS via email at msor@mdps.state.ms.us, telephone 601-368-1740 or regular mail to: Department of Public Safety, Sex Offender Registry, PO Box 958, Jackson, MS 39205.

Interested parties may go to the Internet site for a specific listing of registered sex offenders in Tishomingo and surrounding counties.

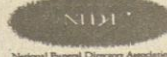

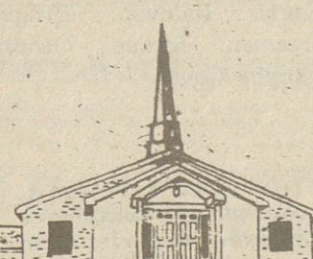

COUNTY AGENTS NOTES By Danny Owen Fire Blight Is Back

Lately, I've noticed many Bradford pears throughout the county have symptoms of fire blight. Apples, pears, flowering crabapple, and other common landscape plants such as flowering quince, hawthorn, and pyracantha are susceptible to fire blight. Crowns of diseased trees have a "scorched" appearance.

Tree mortality as a result of fire blight isn't common. For badly diseased plants, the following practices could help reduce the impact of this troublesome disease. (1) While it's not a good idea to prune fire blight diseased branches or twigs after active growth has started, it can be done, provided EXTREME sanitation is practiced. (2) Pruning tools MUST BE DISINFECTED between EACH cut. Tools should be dipped in or swabbed with a denatured 75% methyl alcohol solution. A 75% solution can be prepared by mixing three volumes of denatured alcohol with one volume of water. A 10% bleach solution (nine volumes of liquid bleach to one volume of water) can also be used. This

preparation is the most effective but is corrosive to most pruning tools. If it is used, the tools should be thoroughly rinsed, dried, and oiled following completion of pruning. (3) All pruning should be made several inches below the point of visible infection. (4) DO NOT prune during periods of rainy weather. (5) To prevent cankers on large limbs and trunks, "rub off" water-sprouts during the spring and summer. (6) Avoid excessive nitrogen fertilization at any point in the season, since this promotes succulent growth highly susceptible to fire blight infection. (7) Ideally, fire blight pruning should be carried out as a summer activity during drier periods when bacterial spread is less likely to occur as a result of pruning. (8) Spray application of bactericides such as streptomycin to fire blight infected trees may help some, but this practice is most effective during the dormant season and at blossom time.

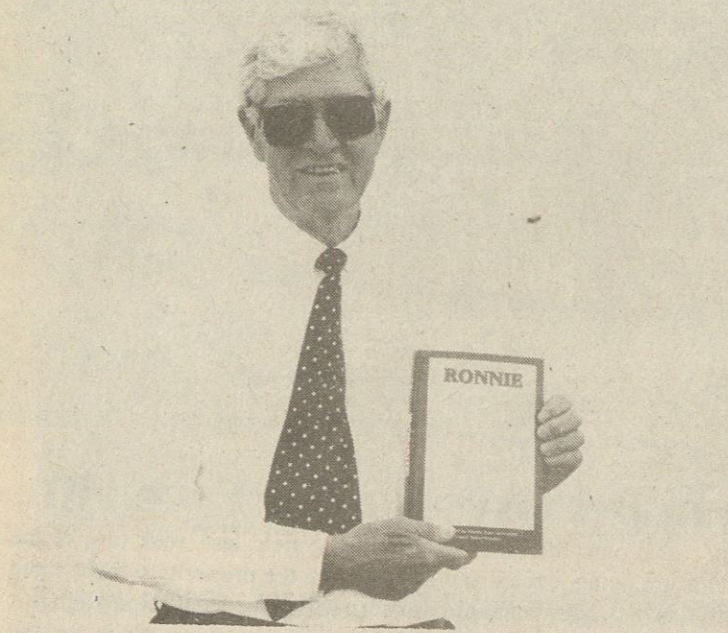

Bill Williams Addresses Iuka Rotary Members

Bill Williams has a story to tell about his younger brother who was an exceptional athlete whose life was devastated and ended by alcohol and its influence. The older Williams now travels the country trying to save the "daughters and sons" of others. His book, RONNIE, was written for one reason and that is: to combat underage drinking alcohol abuse among our young people—SIMPLY BECAUSE THAT DEMON SHOWS NO FAVORITISM—THERE ARE NO EXEMPTIONS OR EXCEPTIONS.

Williams' book is the true experience of his brother, an athlete who quickly evolved into a devastating life style, a real story of a real person: not unlike your son or daughter or the kid next door. Williams' book and prevention program have been adopted by Rotary, and he is now canvassing the country speaking to the Rotary groups to try to get them to introduce the program into local areas. He was in Iuka last Wednesday to speak to the Rotarians here. Williams himself is a very

interesting person. He is a true Florida native, served in the US Army, owned and operated

four businesses in the Pensacola area, served on the staff of three Florida Governors and as the Director of Legislative Affairs for the Florida Insurance Commissioner, chaired a multitude of political campaigns and lobbied in Tallahassee and Washington, owns two US patents and has three others pending.

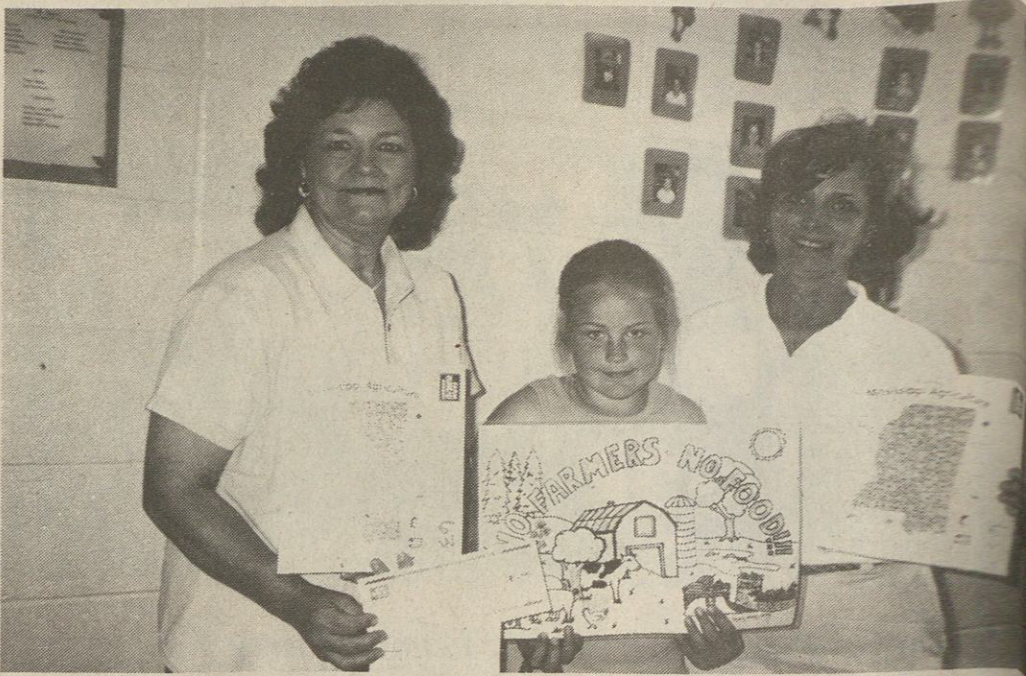
Williams has written three other books, interviewed Ted Bundy, and founded a company called People's Coalition for Justice. The goal and intent of this company is to shorten the longevity of death row inmates. He has been invited to the White House for dinner twice, and he has three personal friends who became Governor of Florida and two more who almost did. As a teen, he had a date with Brenda Lee, who had a top-ten record at that time.

Williams has visited in 38 states in the past 18 months promoting his books. Of particular interest to those of us in this area is the fact that: He owns the most valuable musical instrument in the world—Elvis Presley's very first guitar. You need to read the book, RONNIE, to see how he obtained this guitar.

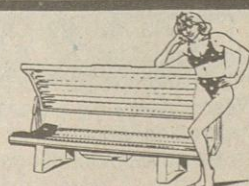

Trial Reenactment At The Historic Tishomingo Co. Courthouse

On Saturday night, April 16, at 7 p.m., the old courthouse hall rang calling court to order. Students from Tishomingo County High School and Belmont High School reenacted the 1930 trial, "Mrs. Mary Nell Prichard vs. the Southern Railway Company". Upon entering the courthouse, guests were interviewed by the local reporter Michael Rees. Bailiff Scottie Linton guarded the stairs; to make sure everyone left their weapons downstairs. The jury was seated and sworn in a few minutes before 7 p.m. by Bailiff Brad Williams. The jury consisted of Miranda Barnes, Perry Primes, Brandon Grissom, Mike Melton, Joy Melton, Brianny Pruitt, Jessica Penny, Jay Myers, Ken Roaten, Randy Springer, Dylan Wallace, and Mike Wallace. Cindy Nelson, Executive Director of the Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum, welcomed everyone and the trial began. Bailiff Williams asked everyone to rise as Judge C.T. Long, played by Ronnie McNutt, entered the courtroom. The sound of typing could be heard coming from the court stenographer, Aislynn Hamm.

Opening statements were given by both sides and the prosecuting attorney, Jesse Long, started to call witnesses. The prosecution called Mrs. Sarah

Ann Hill, played by Kirby Lambert; Dr. L.F. Sparks, played by Jared Frazier; Mr. Henry Prichard, played by Scottie Linton; and Mrs. Mary Nell Prichard, played by Jessica Davis. The prosecution and the defense both questioned these witnesses. The railway had hired two lawyers to defend them; they were played by Shawn Clark and Sammie Linton. The defense started its case by calling the railway flagman, Mark Williams to the stand. It was apparent to everyone that a member of the crowd, played by Corey Belue, was not happy with his testimony as she leaped to her feet and started yelling that he was lying. Judge McNutt ordered her removed from the court with the threat that anyone else disrupting his court would be taken to jail by Sheriff Pace. Watson Long, the baggage master was called next, during his testimony a train came through and Judge McNutt had to stop court until it passed.

Two doctors from Memphis, TN followed Mr. Long's testimony, Dr. Blässengame and Dr. Chainey, played by Casey Phillips and Alicia McCameron. It was then time for the jury to make their decision. They were escorted to their chambers, while the audience enjoyed a short intermission. The courthouse bell sounded once more, and Judge McNutt

asked the jury if they had made their decision. Miranda Barnes gave Mrs. Pritchard the sad news that the jury had found for the defense. Mr. Linton and Mr. Clark rejoiced with their client, played by Jose Alcarez.

This was a night not to soon be forgotten; with 110 people in attendance the courtroom still had ample room. When asked if the courthouse would be putting on another production of this type Mrs. Marlar stated that after seeing the reaction in the community to this event they would be planning another trial for this fall. The case heard this fall will be a criminal case and members of the community and students will be asked to help.

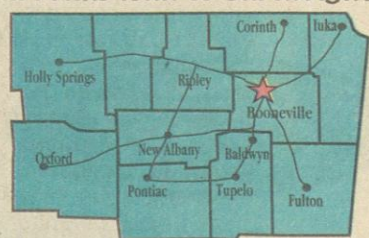
