### **Letter To The Editor...**

#### Don't Live In Ignorance Or Fear There have been several sci-

ence fiction movies made over the years about computers being created and put in charge of all our national defenses. In most of those movies, something goes wrong with the computer and it turns on the people it was empowered to protect, the remainder of the movie is devoted to a super spy or agency regaining control of our national defenses to save our country or the world from destruction. Many of you reading this article have probably seen one of these movies.

Within Tishomingo County, we do not depend on a super computer to protect us from harm. One of the systems we do have in place is something called a Sheriff's Department, you may have had dealings with this agency (hopefully with better results than my own). The sheriff's department is mandated to keep order and protect citizens from those who break the laws of the land. What happens when a sheriff's department malfunctions and turns on those it is empowered to protect? Unfortunately there is no super spy or agency to come to the rescue. Unfortunate also is that this story concerning the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department turning on those it is empowered to protect is not science fiction.

I have been in contact with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors and the Mississippi Attorney General's Office as well as other agencies and have been told the sheriff's department is an autonomous body. This basically means the sheriff has the authority to run the sheriff's department any way he chooses, regardless of whether it benefits the citizens of the county or not. The sheriff, once elected, can, for the next 4 years do as he pleases with the sheriff department's personnel and budget, as long as he remains within federal and state law. Okay. Wait a minute, I am confused. The sheriff can (in Tishomingo County at least) deprive people of their civil rights guaranteed under federal and state law. Do you know how the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department can, has, and I believe will continue to ignore our civil rights? Simply because there is, to my knowledge after much investigation, no federal or state agency that will pursue civil rights violations under numerous circumstances. This basically means the

without fear of any consequences. I urge anyone that believes the sheriff's department should be accountable for any illegal activity to contact their state legislators and let them know the citizens in Tishomingo County will not tuck their tails between their legs and allow an elected official such as the sheriff to bully the citizens that pay his salary. Our state legislators can create or empower a state agency to investigate all cases of police misconduct. If the internal revenue service heard of one person who supposedly cheated on their taxes for only a small amount of money, you can bet that person would be investigated and every last dollar collected, yet many civil rights violations are reported within the state and go uninvestigated. Our government is concerned about hounding the average citizen that is just trying to get by about any taxes they may have inadvertently failed to report to the IRS. It appears to me that our federal and state government is more concerned with a few tax dollars than the tremendous harm that can occur from having citizen's civil rights trampled on by some law enforcement officers. 1 am not saying that people should not pay their taxes, I simply believe that at least as much efforts as is spent on collecting taxes should be spent on protecting the civil

## RECEIVING

Workers' compensation pays medical bills and lost wages of individuals injured or killed while working. It is not necessary to prove that the employer was at fault because the workers' compensation is administered under a no-fault system. The tradeoff for receiving payments without having to prove negligence is that workers cannot sue their employers for compensation for their pain and suffering. However, if the employer does not carry workers compensation insurance. injured workers can sue their employers for pain and suffering. If the work-related injury was caused by someone other than the employer or a co-worker, the injured worker can collect workers compensation benefits and still have a lawsuit for pain and suffering against the one who caused the accident.

In all work injuries, the employee has certain rights and duties. The injured worker should seek legal consultation to understand her or his rights including those for medical treatment and disability payments. It is not wise to rely upon the employer or the insurance company to help you or to explain your rights. For further information, call our office for a consultation.

## **New Tishomingo County Book Released...**

The transcription of the. 1856-1859 School Funds Ac-Book for Old count Tishomingo County, Mississippi, has been completed and is now ready for purchase. The original handwritten document is dated 1856-1858 on the spine; however, monies for 1859 are also included. The 234-page, softbound book lists the names of the schools and instructors. It also contains the names of the Tishomingo County children taught as beneficiaries, the number of days each pupil attended school, the rate of pay charged per day, and the total amount paid for each pupil. These rates varied from 5 cents to 13 cents per day. It is interesting to note that not all pupils in the same school were allowed the same rate. A copy of this book may be purchased at the Tishomingo County Archives & History Museum at 203 East Quitman Street, P.O. Box 273, Iuka,

## **Tishomingo Legion Auxiliary** Selling Poppies For Memorial Day

The ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary Post 144, Tishomingo, will be selling the traditional red poppy that all of us associate with Memorial Day. This national holiday, which is the day we honor those Americans who gave their lives for our country, is celebrated on the last Monday in May.

Since the end of World War I Memorial Day has also been known as Poppy Day. Inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields," which was written by Colonel John McCrae, a WWI surgeon with Canada's First Brigade Artillery, Moina Michael, a YMCA volunteer who worked with soldiers in New York City, decided to keep the message of the poem live by wearing a red silk poppy to honor the American soldiers who fought in WWI and to make the poppy a memorial to all veterans. Her idea was to produce and distribute the flowers throughout the country. The newly established American Legion officially adopted the poppy as a national symbol of remembrance in 1920.

In 1924, the American Legion Auxiliary as given total responsibility for poppy production and distribution. The Poppy Program is now one of the oldest and most beneficial Auxiliary programs for veterans. Veterans in VA hospitals around the nation make the poppies. This work benefits the . veterans both financially and psychologically.

All of us are familiar with the first few liens of Colonel McCrae's poem:

#### In Flanders Fields The poppies Blow Between the Crosses Row on Row

As WWI veterans returned home for the devastated battlefields of France and Flanders they remembered the wild poppies they saw and looked upon the red petals of the flower as a living symbol of their fallen comrades ultimate sacrifice.

Mississippi/Tishomingo County Sex Offenders

The Tishomingo County News recently had an inquiry requesting the publication of information on registered sex offenders in this county (area). After an Internet Search, the following information was found: The Mississippi Department of Public Safety, mandated by federal legislation. put into effect a Sex Offenders Registration Law. This law was enacted requiring the Mississippi Department of Public Safety to maintain a registry of persons residing in this state who have been convicted of certain sexual offenses or attempted offenses.

According to the Internet site, MDPS updates the information regularly, to try to assure that it is complete and

accurate. However, this information can change quickly. People are cautioned about how quickly the information can change. People visiting the site are also cautioned that information provided on this site may not reflect the current residence, status, or other information regarding an offender. The information in this registry is provided to MDPS by criminal justice agencies and representatives. MDPS compiles and provides this information but does not independently confirm the accuracy of all information. Positive identification of a person believed to be a sex offender cannot be established unless a fingerprint comparison is made.

This information is made

available for the purpose of protecting the Public. Anyone who uses this information to commit a criminal act against another person is subject to criminal prosecution. The sale or exchange of sex offender information for profit is prohibited. Misuse of this information is a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) or imprisonment in the county jail not more than six (6) months, or both.

To correct erroneous information in the Mississippi Sex Offender Registry or to report a change in sex offender information, including a change of address, contact the MDPS via e-mail, mail, or telephone at the below listed number and addresses.

registry, please refer to the Frequently Asked Questions section or contact MDPS via email msor@mdps.state.ms.us, at telephone 601-368-1740 or regular mail to: Department of Public Safety, Sex Offender . helping the Mississippi Fire-Registry, PO Box 958, Jackson, MS 39205.

Interested parties may go to the Internet site for a specific listing of registered sex offenders in Tishomingo and surrounding counties.

## **Two New Signs Marking Historic Sites** Put Up By luka Battlefield Commission, Inc.

Members of the Iuka Battlefield Commission, Inc. are happy to announce that two new signs marking historic sites in Iuka have been put into place. One of these signs marks the Goyer Cemetery and the other shows the location of Twin Magnolias.

In Goyer Cemetery, Civil War soldiers from both the North and the South are buried. TCHS Senior Tyler Segars, as a part of his Eagle Scout project, has been working to clear and clean up and restore this cemetery. Goyer Cemetery is located adjacent to the Sunset Lodge Motel just off of the Hwy. 25 bypass in Iuka."

The other sign marks the site

of the house that served as the headquarters of Confederate Brigadier General Henry Little during the Battle of Iuka. This historic house, Twin Magnolias, now the home of Neil and Beth Davis, is located across

the street from the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse. At the time of Little's death, he was buried in the yard of the house. His body was later moved to Baltimore, Maryland. This historic house was also the home of Mississippi Governor John M. Stone's family. Stone, a Colonel during the Civil War, is recognized as Mississippi's longest-serving governor and the second president of Missis-

sippi A&M College (now Mississippi State University) in Starkville.

The Iuka Battlefield Commission, Inc. is currently seeking funds and grants to continue the establishment of a Civil War Interpretative Center near the Goyer Cemetery. The Commission is working with the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, and state and national departments of Archives & History on additional funding op-

### A HISTORY OF IUKA MISSISSIPPI Truth From Fiction On The Life Of Chief **By Christian Evans**

No real first hand records or accounts of town namesakers, Chief Iuka readily exist for research. I'm working on compiling area history, many sources have been used for generations that were "assumed" accurate at the time of publication or from records or stories passed down through folk stories by both native Americans and white settlers.

Only scattered bits and pieces of Chief Iuka's life is documented on paper. No date or exact year is recorded for his birth around 1750. We know as a young brave, he fought in the French and Indian Wars. He also aided the British in other ways through fighting and scouting. When the American Revolution erupted in the mid-1770's, Iuka joined many other Chickasaw braves and chiefs as a warrior and scout for George Washington's Continental Veteran's pension for his military service in the war.

Iuka's full name and Chickasaw pronunciation was a title he earned as a young brave. The name or titles was ISHTU (pronounced "ISH" as in "dish", "TU" as in the number "two"). Iuka, (pronounced "I" as in "eye" "u" as the "ue" in "blue" or "clue") and "ka" pronounced like a "key", like the "key" that unlocks a door.) Finally, the last part of his name or title was "Tubby" as in "Chubby" with a "T" in front.

Ishtu - Iuka - Tubby (Ish-Two-I-ue-key-tubby). The phase is a name or title meaning, and this comes directly from the Chickasaw to English dictionary and the librarian of the Chickasaw National Library in Ada, Oklahoma, ready? It means "Big-Sneaky-Killer".

Chief Iuka again came to the aid of the republic by joining General Andrew Jackson as he crossed the Tennessee River into Chickasaw Territory. He made a recruiting and training base for both Chickasaw Braves and others in the area recruited to fight the British known as "Jackson Camp".

He used the time to make valuable alliances with the Chickasaw leaders and warriors before continuing down the Natchez Trace toward New Orleans. There, General Jackson would face a British force sent in to capture the area's of Louisiana and Mississippi territories by taking New Orleans. In the battle, General Jackson lost no men to death and only a few were wounded. One of these was Chief Iuka. A small powder keg ignited and blew up in the Chief's face. He was totally blinded in one eye and partially blinded in the other. The blast caused extensive burns to the elder Chief and severely damaged his hearing.

A Captain McVay was assigned to accompany and care for the injured chief as a gesture of good will from Gen. Jackson

#### **COUNTY AGENTS NOTES By Danny Owen Fire Blight Is Back**

Lately, I've noticed many Bradford pears throughout the county have symptoms of fire blight. Apples, pears, flowering crabapple, and other common landscape plants such as flowering quince, hawthorn, and pyracantha are susceptible to fire blight. Crowns of diseased trees have a "scorched" appearance.

Tree mortality as a result of fire blight isn't common. For badly diseased plants, the following practices could help reduce the impact of this troublesome disease. (1) While it's not a good idea to prune fire blight diseased branches or twigs after active growth has started, it can be done, provided EXTREME sanitation is practiced. (2) Pruning tools MUST BE DIS-INFECTED between EACH cut. Tools should be dipped in or swabbed with a denatured 75% methyl alcohol solution. A 75% solution can be prepared by mixing three volumes of denatured alcohol with one volume of water. A 10% bleach solution (nine volumes of liquid bleach to one volume of water) can also be used. This

preparation is the most effective but is corrosive to most


pruning tools. If it is used, the tools should be thoroughly rinsed, dried, and oiled following completion of pruning. (3) All pruning should be made several inches below the point of visible infection. (4) DO NOT prune during periods of rainy weather. (5) To prevent cankers on large limbs and trunks, "rub off" water-sprouts during the spring and summer. (6) Avoid excessive nitrogen fertilization at any point in the season, since this promotes succulent growth highly susceptible to fire blight infection. (7) Ideally, fire blight pruning should be carried out as a summer activity during drier periods when bacterial spread is less likely to occur as a result of pruning. (8) Spray application of bactericides such as streptomycin to fire blight infected trees may help some, but this practice is most effective during the dormant season and at blossom time.

Upon entering courthouse, guests were inviewed by the local reporter vering the story, played by chael Rees. Bailiff Scottie ton guarded the stairs; to ke sure everyone left their apons downstairs. The jury s seated and sworn in a few nutes before 7 p.m. by Bailiff e mad Williams. The jury conted of Miranda Barnes, Perry mes, Brandon Grissom, eke Melton, Joy Melton, Briy Pruitt, Jessica Penny, Jay overs, Ken Roaten, Randy inger, Dylan Wallace, and ke Wallace. Cindy Nelson, recutive Director of the homingo County Archives d History Museum, welmed everyone and the trial gan. Bailiff Williams asked eryone to rise as Judge C.T. ing, played by Ronnie Mc-, entered the courtroom. e sound of typing could be and coming from the court mynpher, Aislynn Hamm.

Opening statements were given by both sides and the prosecuting attorney, Jesse Long, started to call witnesses. The prosecution called Mrs. Sarah

Ann Hill, played by Kirby Lambert; Dr. L.F. Sparks, played by Jared Frazier; Mr. Henry Prichard, played by Scottie Linton; and Mrs. Mary Nell Prichard, played by Jessica Davis. The prosecution and the defense both questioned these witnesses. The railway had hired two lawyers to defend them; they were played by Shawn Clark and Sammie Linton. The defense started its case by calling the railway flagman, Mark Williams to the stand. It was apparent to everyone that a member of the crowd, played by Corey Belue, was not happy with his testimony as she leaped to her feet and started yelling that he was lying. Judge McNutt ordered her removed from the court with the threat that anyone else disrupting his court would be taken to jail by Sheriff Pace. Watson Long, the baggage master was called next, during his testimony a train came through and Judge McNutt had to stop court until it passed.

Two doctors form Memphis, TN followed Mr. Long's testimony, Dr. Blassengame and Dr. Chainey, played by Casey Phillips and Alicia Mc-Cameron. It was then time for the jury to make their decision.
