53rd Annual Tishomingo County Fair And Livestock Show Comes To Town Next Week

The Tishomingo County Fair will be holding the 53rd annual fair and livestock show during the week of September 20th-24th, and this year is filled with fun, food and entertainment planned for the entire family. The Tishomingo County Fair Association invites everyone to come out and be a part of all the excitement for this event.

THERE HAVE BEEN SOME MAJOR SCHEDULING CHANGES FOR THIS YEAR.

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING VERY CLOSELY.

Beginning Tuesday night the fairgrounds will set the stage for the Antique Car and Tractor Show beginning at 6:00. Campus Country will perform at 7:00. The Youth Pet Show will begin at 6:00. Bluff City Shows will be on an expanded Midway with more rides and thrills for all. Tuesday night will be "buck night." All rides will be \$1.00.

Wednesday will be Senior Citizen Day beginning at 9:00 a.m. Free refreshments will be served and local sponsors will offer free health screenings. Wednesday night will feature the Dexter Oaks bluegrass/gospel band at 6:30 in the inside arena followed by Smokin' Country gospel/bluegrass band. Friday night is packed full of excitement as the Tiny Tot Contest starts at 6:00 and the J-Bar-B Rodeo kicks off at 8:00.

THE KING AND QUEEN CONTEST WILL BE HELD ON SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 24TH AT 6:00 P.M. Tishomingo County Junior Auxiliary will sponsor the annual Cow Patty Contest at 6:00 also. The J-Bar-B Rodeo will put on another show at 8:00 p.m.

High Ratings For All County Schools

The Tishomingo County Board of Education, Superintendent and Central Office Staff are pleased to report that all schools in Tishomingo County have once again received high ratings for the 2004-2005 school year. In order to receive and maintain high ratings a number of performance indicators are measured including student achievement, adequate yearly progress, graduation rates and professional quality of teachers.

Schools are evaluated individually and each school must meet or exceed required standards in order for the school to achieve the assigned rating. Schools are rated on a scale from low (level 1) to superior (level 5). (The school ratings or school report cards are a result of the federal education law, "No Child Left Behind Act of 2001".) The CLB guidelines are being phased in on a school by school basis. These guidelines are requiring some restructuring of educational programs at individual schools.

Tishomingo County students, teachers and administrators have completed the 2004-2005 school year, met guidelines for initiating the

required changes and maintained high ratings. The school ratings for the 2004-2005 school year are as follows:

Belmont School - Level 5
Burnsville School - Level 4
Iuka Elementary - Level 4
Iuka Middle - Level 5
Tishomingo Elementary - Level 4
Tishomingo Co. High School - Level 5

The Board of Education, Superintendent and Central Office Staff congratulate our students, principals, teachers, assistant teachers, all auxiliary staff, parents, and community for supporting our challenge to maintain high educational standards. We cannot express to you our appreciation for the dedicated efforts of all involved in the educational process.

Tishomingo County Schools are committed to providing high academic standards and high expectations for every child so that truly "no child is left behind." Parents are encouraged to actively participate in parent/teacher meetings, parent workshops and Parent/Teacher organizations. Research overwhelmingly demonstrates

the positive effect that parental involvement has on their children's academic achievement.

This district is committed to maintaining good communication between the school and home. In an effort to provide additional academic assistance, after school tutoring is provided at each of the schools in the county. A certified teacher will work individually with students who need help with homework or preparing for a test. Students will also have access to a computer based instructional program that allows them to work on specific skills with which they may be having difficulty. Planners will be provided to all students who participate in the after school program. The planners will allow students to record their homework assignments, projects, tests and other important information to keep parents informed of their children's academic requirements. All parents will receive mid-six weeks student progress reports as another way to keep parents informed of the academic status between report cards.

Nixon Elected Burnsville Mayor In Run-Off Election

David Nixon defeated A.T. Marlar by a vote of 213 to 193 to fill the office of mayor for the city of Burnsville.

A total of 406 voters—a good turn out—went to the polls Tuesday, Sept. 13, to vote in the city's run-off election. The run-off was needed after neither candidate garnered a majority of votes in last week's special election, held Tuesday, Sept. 6. Nixon and Marlar were the top vote-getters in that election with Nixon receiving 151 votes and Marlar receiving 138 votes.

According to Burnsville City Clerk Alesha Dailey, Nixon will be sworn in as the city's top official sometime after the election results are certified by the municipal election commission.

MS Supreme Court Denies Candidate Jerry Boyd's Special Election Appeal for Sheriff

The Mississippi Supreme Court has agreed with the Nov. 4, 2003 election results for the office of Tishomingo County Sheriff, and has denied candidate Jerry (Ten Speed) Boyd's request for a special election.

The decision has been posted on the Mississippi Supreme Court website.

Boyd was initially defeated by candidate Glenn Whitlock by 40 votes in the second Democratic Primary election for sheriff held Aug. 26, 2003.

During appeal proceedings in Tishomingo County some votes were disallowed, making the final vote Whitlock—3,582 to Boyd—3,559, a difference of only 23 votes.

Boyd appealed to the Mississippi Supreme Court on Dec. 30, 2003, alleging irregularities in voting procedures in several areas including the ability to amend his pleadings, illegal absentee votes, disenfranchisement of voters by purging voter rolls between the first and second primaries, "spoiled ballots" as well as others.

Boyd's election contest was first heard in Tishomingo County Circuit Court on October 30, 31 and November 1, 2003 by Judge Albert Smith, III. During the hearing, Judge Smith ruled that Boyd did not provide enough evidence of illegal votes to affect the outcome of the election. Based on this, the judge upheld the results of the election which had declared Whitlock as sheriff.

Mississippi Supreme Court Judge William L. Waller Jr., who presided over the appeal gave the written opinion of the state's high court on Sept. 8, 2005. He was joined, in result only, by Judges James W. Smith Jr., Kay B. Cobb, Charles "Chuck" Easley,

Candidate Jerry Boyd To File Motion For Rehearing With Mississippi Supreme Court

Candidate Jerry Boyd has notified *The Tishomingo County News* that he will be filing a petition for rehearing with the Mississippi Supreme Court to challenge the court's recent decision to affirm the lower court's decision to accept the 2003 sheriff's election results. In the decision, candidate Glenn Whitlock was confirmed as winner in the Tishomingo County Sheriff's race over Boyd by a final tally of 23 votes.

Grounds for the rehearing stem mainly from three issues which the Mississippi Supreme Court stated were "procedurally barred" and therefore not considered in their decision.

In a draft of the petition to be filed, Madison, Miss. attorney Shirley Payne, who represents Boyd, states that the court barred the discussion of the lack of applications for absentee ballots because it was not addressed in Boyd's initial petition with the Tishomingo County Democratic Executive Committee. The motion points out that it was indeed in the initial petition, noting the page and paragraphs where it is located. This information was also presented during the special tribunal hearing and therefore should not be procedurally barred, according to the document.

Another challenge to the decision is to the disenfranchisement of voters. The motion says that there were voters in the county who were kept from voting because of letters sent out by the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office between the first and second primaries "which incorrectly advised voters they were ineligible to vote." This was also in the initial petition, but was procedurally barred.

Boyd's attorney also sets forth in the motion that Rule 15, which allows that amendments should be applicable to election contests, was not properly addressed.

The motion for rehearing is made pursuant to Rule 40 of the Mississippi Rules of Appellant Procedure.

George C. Carlson Jr., Jess H. Dickinson, Michael K. Randolph and James E. Graves Jr. Judge Oliver E. Diaz Jr. did not participate.

In the written opinion, Judge Waller stated that while there were technical irregularities in the casting of some ballots, it was not grounds for invalidation because there was no evidence of fraud or intentional wrongdoing. He said that "in determining whether failure to comply strictly with a statute will void an election, the key is whether the act constitutes such a total departure from the fundamental provisions of the statute as to destroy

the integrity of the election and make the will of the qualified electors impossible to ascertain."

Waller said the court felt that the will of the voters had been done and that no special election was warranted.

Justice Waller did note in the opinion that "Boyd discovered enough questionable votes during trial to possibly change the election's outcome had he been allowed to amend his original petition." Boyd attempted to amend his petition during the Tishomingo County hearing in October of 2003, but the motion was denied by the judge at that time.

Lomenick attended Northeast and earned both a Bachelor's and Master's of Science in education from Mississippi State University. He is an insurance agent with State Farm Insurance. He is a retired Brigadier General with the Mississippi Army National Guard. Lomenick is a past president and lifetime member of Northeast's Alumni Association. He is past president and chairman of the Paul Harris Fellow Committee of the Iuka Rotary Club; a past chairman of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation; past president and board member of the Iuka Special, Separate School District; past president, District 1 School Board Association; past chairman, City of Iuka Planning and Zoning Commissioners Association of the United States. He is currently chairman of the Iuka Battlefield Commission and a member of the Civil War Preservation Trust. Southern Corner Stones

Chronicles & Epitaphs from the old Tishomingo County Courthouse



In Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in 1857, the road from the east and the one from the west were joined at a point one mile west of town, merging many roads into what was known for 43 years as the Memphis and Charleston. A great celebration was made of the affair; governors of the different states through which the road passed were to make speeches. These were the days before the Volstead Amendment and wine flowed freely. The distinguished gentleman who was to have driven the silver spike was incapacitated, and Pat Maloney was given the honor of completing the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, one of the first built in the South. Many amusing tales are told of this celebration.

The railroad company offered free transportation but few were brave enough to risk their lives. Nevertheless, after the celebration of the railroad, a few valiant souls boarded the "Iron Horse," as it was called. Great was their glee as they passed pedestrians, but their exultation was changed to dismay when the train passed the Iuka station. Not until the Alabama line was reached did the passengers learn the use of the bell cord. Footsore and weary, they limped back to town only to be derided by the pedestrians.

A farmer's wife was very much disturbed over losing many cows on the railroad. She finally hit upon the idea of pouring soft soap on the rails each day just before train time.

While the engineer was trying to keep the wheels on the rails, the cows would have time to get off the track.

A most worthy farmer on the north side of the railroad sent his son to town with corn to be ground. The mill was on the south side of the railroad track so when the young man came to the railroad, the first thing he saw was a sign that stated "look out for the locomotive." He sat there all day looking for the locomotive which never did come, and he finally went home in disgust.

Col. Terry was the first depot agent. John M. Stone, who afterwards became Mississippi's best beloved governor, attended to the business. McPeters was the telegraph operator. The depot stood on the west side of what is now Main Street, in front of the Hiatt corner.

All lands in the new town were bought from the Hubbard

estate, and a town company, consisting of Col. Terry, Pres.; A. T. Matthews, Marcus Cook, Dr. Ben Hodges, and others, was formed. Terry surveyed all land bought from Lemuel Hubbard, and this is known as Terry's survey. All other land was surveyed by David Hubbard, and this is Hubbard's survey. These surveys came together lacking a few feet, just south of the railroad, and this was left unclaimed.

Among the first settlers we find the names of Corman, Collier, Stamps, Doan, McIntosh, Davis, Lathan, Cox, Blythe, Settle, Anderson, Eccles, Hubbard, McKnight, Hammerly, Hodges, Weaver,

Lyle, Moore, Thompson, Coleman, Ussery, Barnett, Chism, James, Matthews, and others.

It was the original intention of the town company to have business on both sides of the railroad, on the south side were Corman and Latham's store (this was also used as a Court House), Briand and Weiner, Fairless blacksmith, Colliers Shop and others. On the north side were Tom Barnett, Robinson and Ussery, Matthews, McKnight, Kozier and McMillian, Colman Bros., Settle Hammerly, Hodges and Terry, Dennis' Tin Shop, Guthrie's Saddlery. The first stone house built was what was known as McKinney's brick.

Don't Ignore Eyestrain

Louisiana Family Comes Home To Iuka For Safety

L. R. and Bertha Lewis, have made their home in St. Bernard Parish, Louisiana for the past 26 years where L. R. is pastor of River Bend Baptist Church in Violet.

Many times over the years they have headed north to visit family in Tishomingo County, but on Sunday, August 28, the Lewis' headed north in the southbound lane of Interstate 9. This contraflow system of evacuation had never been used by the people of south Louisiana and the Lewis' knew their hearts that hurricane "Katrina" which was headed their way was somehow different from the many other storms that had passed through the area.

This "frightful uneasiness" "Katrina" was "thick in the air." The weather was hot and very humid. People were excited, upset, mad, and scared. Men were yelling at each other and women were crying." On Saturday the Lewis' called their church members and asked if they wanted to have church. The church members said, "Pastor, get your family out of here!" By 9:00 Sunday morning they were headed north and arrived in Iuka around 10:00 Sunday evening. They brought only a few items, thinking they would be turning in a short time. They did get some money from their bank which now has 20 feet of water over it.

St. Bernard Parish is probably the hardest hit area in Louisiana. It was forgotten for some five days with only local Fish and Wildlife Officers and some rescuers from Canada helping the people. It is in St. Bernard Parish that a reported 10 elderly were found dead in Rita's Nursing Home after being left without food and water for so long. Bro. Lewis and his wife had just wondered about the nursing home before hearing of the tragedy on T.V. He had visited a member of his congregation who lives there only a week before the storm. Each day the death toll climbs in St. Bernard Parish and the Lewis' continue to be shocked at the terrible news coming from their community.

The Lewis' home is right below the church which is located on the Mississippi River Channel. Across the street from the church, ships from all over the world anchor and wait their turn to unload at the wharf. The view from the church is a wonderful sight - watching the ships and cruise boats docking day and night.

St. Bernard Parish is only five miles east of downtown New Orleans and is a hunting and fishing paradise.

Brother Lewis not only serves as pastor of River Bend Church, he and his wife are active members of the community. He is a member of the St. Bernard Sheriff's Department as a Special Commissioned Deputy and also serves a minister to the St. Bernard Parish Council Governing Body.

Bertha Lewis is a former employee of United Medical Center in New Orleans. She is "good at her job of



arranging surgical conferences with patients and doctors."

Leaving their home wasn't easy but the Lewis' knew they would find family and friends in Iuka and at Eastport Baptist Church where his nephew, Junior Jones is pastor. He knew his sister, Shirley Jones would be waiting for his family with open arms when they arrived.

Bro. L. R. is the son of the late Lawrence Roosevelt Lewis and Elizabeth Brown. He was born December 28, 1935 on the W. J. Brinkley estate. His family owned and operated for many years Lewis Fish Market on Eastport Road in Iuka and also in Corinth. He married Bertha Jean Johnson, the daughter of the late Elmo and Ruth Johnson of Iuka.

L. R. Lewis surrendered to preach at 5th Street Baptist Church in Iuka. Since that time he has traveled throughout the States preaching the Word of God. He began his journey as pastor at Mt. Joy Baptist Church on Pleasant Hill Road in Iuka, then pastored in Florida before going west to the Pacific area (Yakima, WA)

where he served as Missionary Pastor of the Emmanuel Baptist Church. He was instrumental in establishing a mission in White Swan, Washington which developed into the White Swan Baptist Church. He served as moderator of the North Western Association of Baptist Church in Washington and Idaho. He next went to Tucson, Arizona in the heart of the desert to be senior pastor of Bethany Baptist Church. He was instrumental in establishing a mission at Eloy, Arizona. This Mexican/American congregation developed into the Westside Baptist Church. He served as moderator of the Arizona State Baptist Association. With this honor he covered and traveled the whole state of Arizona.

After much traveling, the Lewis family was headed back south. They came to Bay St. Louis, Mississippi where L. R. served as State Missionary for the Baptist Missionary Association of MS - covering 100's of churches. He started his preaching at Bayview Baptist Church, which sold its land on Hwy. 90, bought other land and built the Central Baptist Church in the Bay St. Louis/Waveland area. While there he did a weekly radio program "Bible Thoughts"

which had a large listening audience. He began each program with "Good Morning this is Bro. Lewis from Bay St. Louis" and followed with "Good news for you today."

A Louisiana congregation soon called, and the Lewis family moved to Violet where they would spend the next 26 years at Riverbend Baptist Church. As senior pastor he taught and trained other preachers as they began their journey for Christ.

The Lewis' have been blessed with four children:

Debra, a former employee of Oshner Health Services who made the trip to Iuka with her parents;

L. R. Lewis, III (Sonny) a registered nurse at Tulane Medical Center and wife Cindy, also a registered nurse

at Tulane, they reside in Covington;

Mary Ann Miller is Head Nurse at Tulane Medical Center. She was the last nurse to leave the hospital after "Katrina" hit. She put patients in sheets and carried them to the roof for evacuation. Snipers saw the flashlights on the roofs and began firing. She was evacuated to Lafayette, LA where she was decontaminated, given necessary shots, and is now in Covington, LA with her family;

John David Lewis is Manager of Callen Oil Company - offshore production of platforms in Gulf. His wife, Michelle, is a registered nurse at Tulane Medical Center.

L. R. Lewis knows his family has been blessed and says we all take God's blessings for granted. He has spent his life trying to serve people in whatever way he can and feels his duty in life is to help others. Now it is time for people to help him and his family. The congregation of Eastport Baptist has been instrumental in finding the Lewis' a home at 1215 Hwy. 365 in Burnsville until they can return to Violet.

Bro. Lewis' only request is that the people of Tishomingo County pray for all the people of St. Bernard Parish and the surrounding communities on the Gulf Coast.

Linda Stafford, a Nurse Practitioner, who lives in Tishomingo made some really good friends while she was working in Beattyville, KY, a few years ago. This small town of approximately 900 to 1,000 people is located in Lee County in eastern Kentucky about 500 miles from Tishomingo County, MS.

Linda's friends work at the ambulance service in Beattyville, and they wanted to do something for her and for Mississippi in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. They put out some flyers on Tuesday and put a notice in their local paper that comes out on Wednesday about collecting items for the victims of Katrina. Friend Elizabeth Tester said they were

overrun with items by Friday. A local lady donated a truck and someone else donated gas money to make the 500 mile trip on mostly two-lane

highways. Linda praised her Kentucky friends for adopting her when she was there and for adopting Mississippi after Katrina.

Rachel Reese, another of the friends, said that every donation had a story. One little boy, Seth Hogan, emptied his piggy bank, bought items, and had the local paper make his picture, which he put in the bag, to be delivered to some little boy right here. Another young lady got a list of items needed and went down the aisles in a grocery store finding the items to be put in her box.


The ambulance service picked the box up at the grocery store. Both Reese and Tester said that it is amazing how a small town can respond to the needs of another small town. 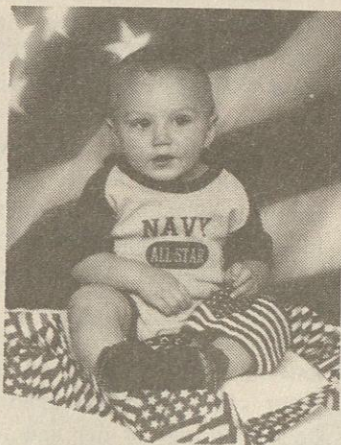

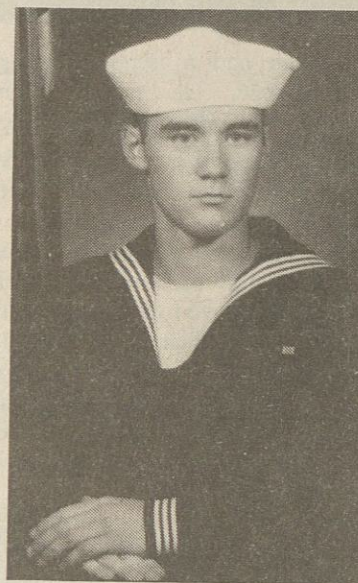

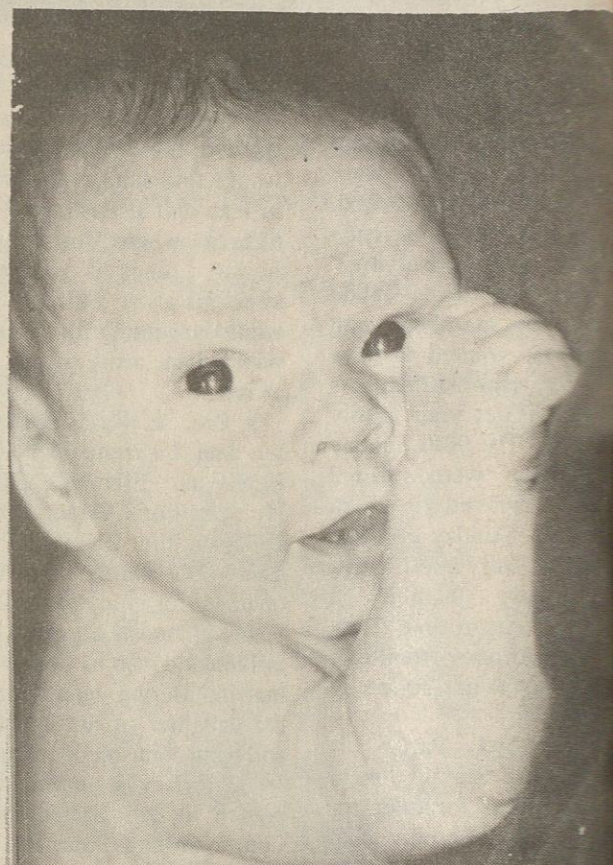
The Tishomingo County Fall Foliage Cruise 2005 will be held Friday, November 4th through Sunday, November 6th.

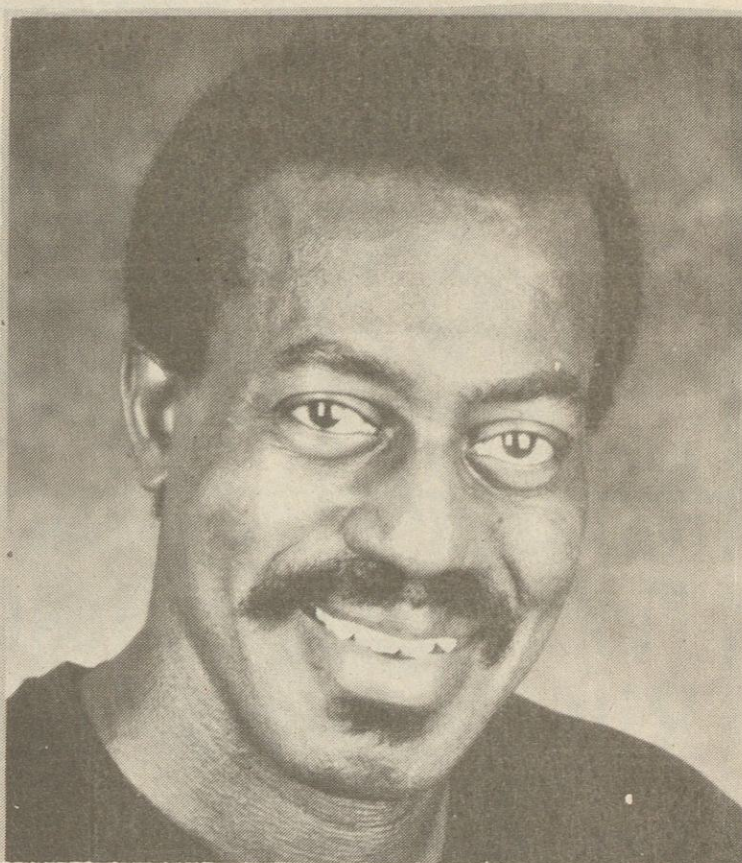

Battle of Iuka Fought September 19, 1862

The 143rd anniversary of the Battle of Iuka, fought September 19, 1862, will be celebrated on Friday, September 19th. It would be an excellent time for Civil War enthusiasts to visit Iuka's Goyer Cemetery, located behind the Sunset exit (exit located off of the 25 bypass between the Iuka and Hwy. 72 exits) to the burial sites of many. Of the approximately 500 soldiers, who were killed in the Battle of Iuka, approximately 250 of the dead were buried in a mass grave at Shady Grove Cemetery according to Union records. The two hundred others were buried in individual graves, maybe even in another mass grave at Goyer Cemetery, or the escape route. (The Battle of Iuka is known as one of the bloodiest, short battles of the Civil War.)

the 11th Ohio, returned to the area in 1869 to look over the battlefield acreage. Seven years later, he found the lasting evidence of where the 11th Ohio had lost some 80 animals. Many of the bones of these animals were still on the ground. Sears also found some 18 of his troopers' possessions (remains, etc.) marked on the road, waiting to be buried in Corinth at The National Cemetery.

During March and April of this year, Tyler Segars cleared Goyer Cemetery as a part of his Boy Scout Eagle project. A monument was erected and a new sign identifying the cemetery was put up. (Some vandalism has already occurred at this site, and everyone is asked to help preserve this historical area.)

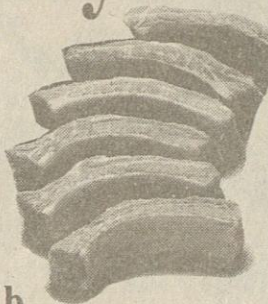

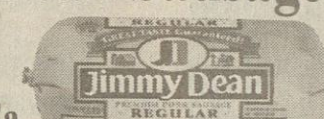

Byrom's conviction and death sentence has been upheld by the Mississippi Supreme Court in 2003 and her post-conviction petition issued last year was turned down by a Tishomingo County judge.

Byrom was convicted for the killing of her husband, Edward Byrom Sr., and enlisting the help of her son in the crime.

Byrom Sr. was shot to death in June of 1999 in his Tishomingo County home, just east of Iuka.

The prosecution in the original trial stated that Michelle Byrom's motive for the killing of her husband was money. The defense said that she had been abused in childhood and by her husband.

At the conclusion of her trial, Michelle Byrom asked Circuit Judge Thomas Gardner, instead of the jury who found her guilty, to choose her sentence. Faced with the decision, Judge Gardner sentenced her to death, rather than serving life in prison.

Her son, Edward Byrom Jr., plea bargained in the case and testified against his mother. He was sentenced to 50 years, with 20 years suspended.

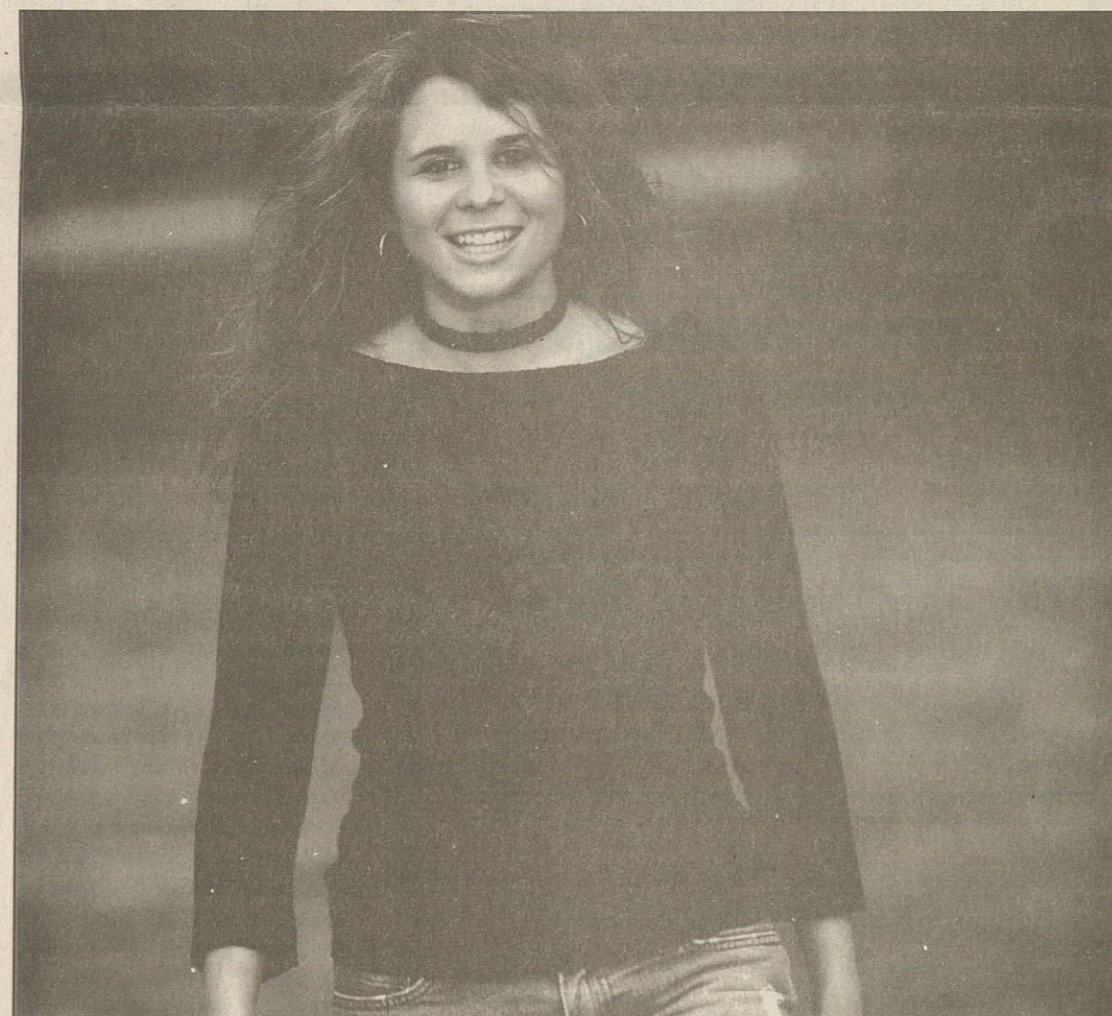
Byrom Asks Supreme Court For New Trial

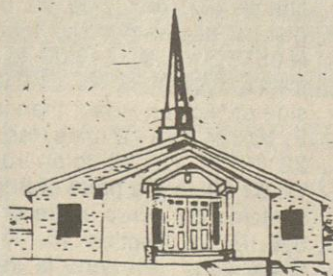

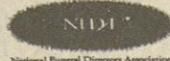

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE REGULATION OF THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO

WHEREAS, Mississippi Code Section 21-19-9 (1972), empowers the Town to regulate the running at large of all animals within the city limits and provides for the enforcement thereof; and, WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Alderman of the Town of Tishomingo deem it necessary for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the Town to enact an Ordinance regulating the running at large of dogs within the city limits; and

NOW, THEREFORE, It is hereby ordained by the Mayor and Board of Alderman of the Town of Tishomingo that:

- The owners of any dogs are required to do the following: restrict the dog(s) to the owners property in a humane way, whether it be by pen, chain, cable, leash or electronic invisible fencing; and,
- the dog(s) must have proof of rabies vaccination and all other vaccinations required by any state, federal or local law; and,
- the dog(s) must be tagged with the owner's name, address and telephone number.

Employees of the Town's Maintenance and Police departments are designated as animal control officers and will remove any and all dog(s) not confined to owners property and any stray, diseased, abused or vicious dog(s). The dog(s) will be transported to a licensed veterinarian selected by the Town. The veterinarian will notify the owner of the animal if the animal is tagged and collared. Also, a notice of the dog(s) confinement, whether tagged or not will be placed at the bulletin board inside city hall. The owner will be responsible for all expenses incurred at the veterinarian's office including bathing and vaccinations and any other treatment necessary in the sole discretion of the veterinarian for the health and well being of the animal.

If no one comes forth to claim and retrieve the dog(s) from the veterinarian within five days of capture, the veterinarian will be responsible for the euthanasia and disposal of the animal.

Any animal control officer or police officer with probable cause to believe that a person has violated this ordinance may issue the person a written citation charging violation of this ordinance and requiring the person to appear at a date and time certain before the municipal court of the Town of Tishomingo to answer the charges.

Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, any dog(s) that are diseased, vicious, a danger to public safety, or not reasonably subject to capture, may, at the discretion of the animal control officer, be destroyed on sight.

Penalties for violation of this ordinance are as follows:

- First offense \$35.00
- Second offense \$70.00
- Third offense \$70.00 and euthanasia and disposal of the animal.

The city clerk is hereby directed to publish this ordinance in the Tishomingo County News.

This Ordinance adopted September 13, 2005, by unanimous vote of the Board of Alderman, to take effect October 17, 2005.

**The JCPenny Afterschool Fund Sponsors Full-Day Training
For Power Hour, A Much Needed Homework And Tutoring Program**

"Back-to-School" has taken place for millions of children around the US, and Boys & Girls Clubs are wasting no time in preparing for their members who are scrambling through the door loaded down with homework and books. upon the child's attractiveness, poise, and personality.

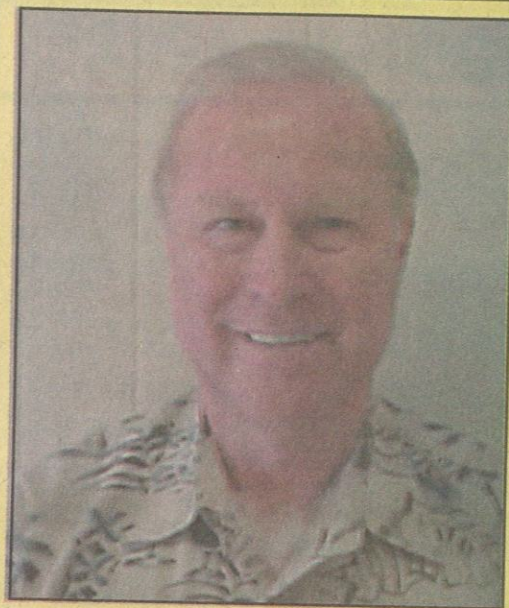
A winner and two alternates will be chosen from each category. Each winner and alternate will receive a trophy from the Tishomingo County Fair Association.
