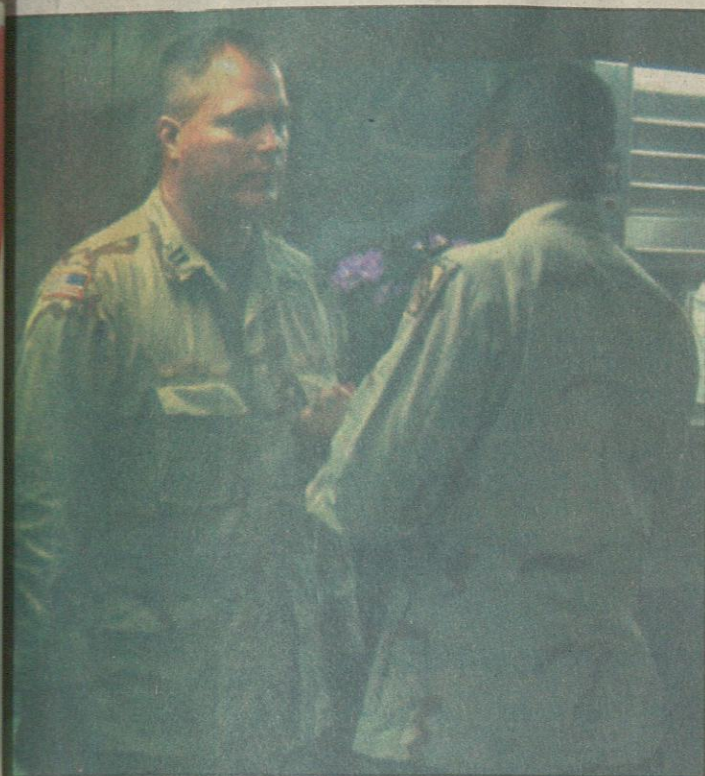

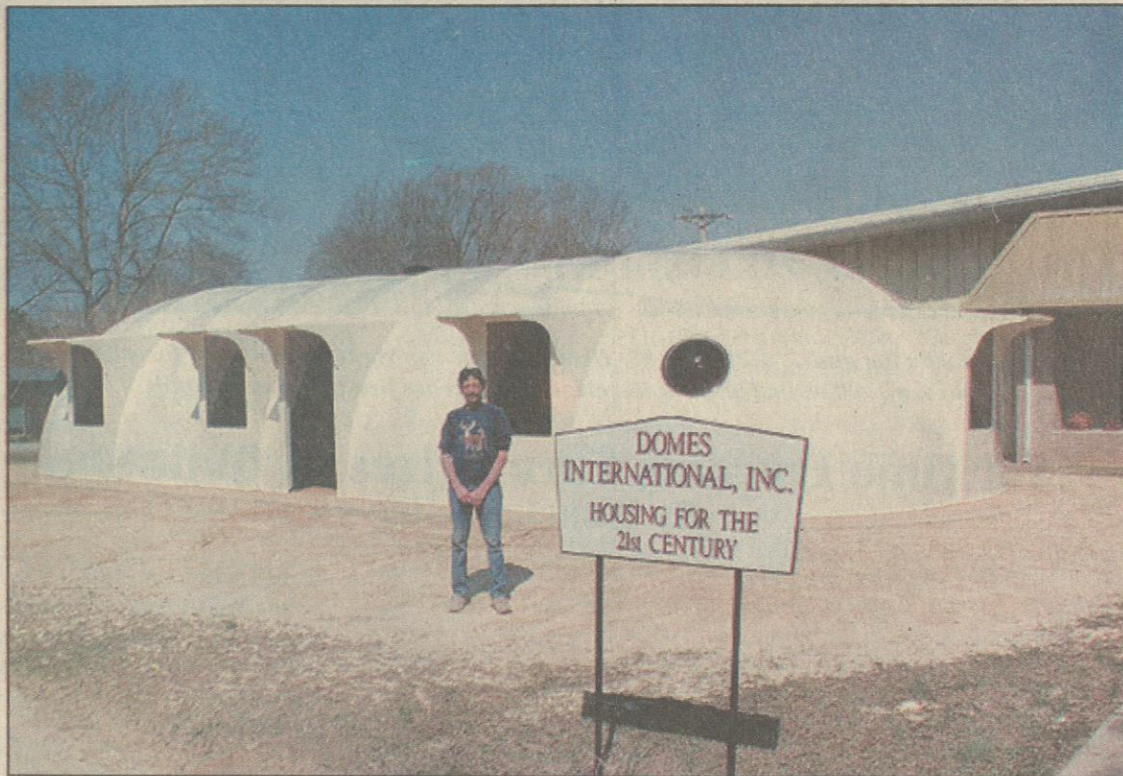

Domes International Inks Multi-Million Dollar Contracts

Domes International, Inc., of Paden, Tishomingo County, Mississippi, has signed contracts worth several million dollars for fiberglass dome structures to be used as jails. The jails will be located in Alabama, New York, Georgia, Mississippi, Florida, and West Virginia.

Domes International, Inc., has built molds, components, and finished buildings for clients all across the United States and in Japan, the Marshall Islands, India, and Africa. The company manufactures to order and has built residential and commercial structures ranging from 454 square foot utility buildings to commercial buildings that are thousands of square feet.

Design Engineer Joel Nichols reports that "fiberglass dome structures are very economical, costing about one-half of conventional construction. Dome structures are energy efficient. The only

maintenance that is needed is a washdown once or twice per year." Plant Manager Lance Nichols stated that "marine grade fiberglass is used for Domes International structures. Some of our structures are 26 years old and still look as good as the day they were set on site. Our structures come in any color and the color is permanent. Fiberglass dome structures have one-third less exterior area than a box type structure. This makes domes extremely wind resistant. One of our structures survived a 144 MPH wind and an 18 foot storm surge from a hurricane in Florida."

Plant Engineer Joel Nichols also emphasized that "fiberglass dome structures can be installed on a site in less than a day. Domes can be easily moved and added to as needed. You can add onto a dome house in any direction with ease."

Chief Operating Officer David Deaton reports that he

has "high hopes for the company and expects to see continued growth as energy and conventional building materials increase in price. We offer the only cost efficient alternative."

Mayor Pam Oswalt stated that "Paden is delighted with the new contracts. We are committed to helping the company to continue its strong growth record."

District 4 supervisor David Sanders reported that "Tishomingo County is proud of Domes International. This is a home-grown company that is likely to continue to grow and create jobs in Tishomingo County."

1st Time Entrants Earn Prizes At Quilt Show By Pamela McRae

Several awards at this year's Needle Chasers Quilt Show went to those for whom this was their first entry in a quilt show, showing that you do not have to be an expert to inspire others with your quilts!

Sandy Rich, of Corinth, has been a member of the guild for a couple years, and has produced a couple quilts a year in the past several years she has been quilting, but she just never had a quilt to enter before this year.

"I give them all away," was Sandy's usual response to the show committee's request for entries. She also never thought her quilts were "good enough" to show. Both judges and the visitors to the show proved her wrong by awarding her a few prizes, including a cash award for 1st place from the judges for her small quilt entry, and another cash award for being the Viewer's Choice for Favorite small quilt. She also won a third place on one of her large quilts.

Another first time entrant, Ilene Lauderdale, of Booneville, was the Viewer's Choice for Large Quilt with her Sunbonnet Sue Quilt that charmed the most visitors. She is a part of a new quilting group that formed a couple years ago

and meets at Northeast Community College in Booneville.

Chris Mallette, of Belmont, just joined the Needle Chasers this past year and was planning on entering only a t-shirt quilt that she had made until she had quilting friends over to her home one day. They persuaded her to enter a couple more quilts, each of which earned her another ribbon from the judges!

"We have accomplished at least one of our goals this year," said Norma Grissom, show co-chairman. "We have new folks entering and sharing their quilts with the public, and that is sure to inspire someone who has been wanting to learn to quilt."

Overall, winners came from not only Corinth and Tishomingo county, but also from Florence, and Cherokee in Alabama and Tupelo and Booneville, too. Each quilt that was judged received a critique sheet that included constructive and encouraging comments from the judges on how to improve their skills on future quilts.

More than 350 visitors from all over Mississippi and the Tennessee Valley enjoyed the 8th annual quilt show presented at Iuka Baptist Church by the Needle Chasers Quilt

Guild. They were treated to a wonderful display of quilts, both in the display area and theme rooms, and two great trunk shows at noon Friday and Saturday.

Students can get registration materials from their high school counselors or they may register online on ACT's student website (www.actstudent.org). Students may also find the testing locations closest to them on this website.

The basic registration fee for the ACT is \$29. An additional \$14 fee is required for students who choose to take the ACT Writing Test. Free sample tests are available from school counselors and on ACT's website.

A DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR HEALTH

A living will is a legal document that allows people to state their preferences for end-of-life treatment. Because technology advances so quickly, however, a living will may not be able to predict which treatments you would or would not want years in advance. In addition, many people change their minds about which end-of-life treatments they want, and their wishes may no longer be reflected in their living wills. With all this in mind, a better option may be a durable power of attorney for health care. This legal document, drafted with the help of a lawyer, gives the person of your choice the right to make medical decisions for you in the event that you cannot make them for yourself.

It is advisable to have legal assistance when creating a living will. Should you decide to write your own living will, have it reviewed by a lawyer to ensure it is understood exactly as you intended. Something Uncontact

For contact wear are a couple of tips on do when you get so (that doesn't belong to your eye).

With the hard lens possible for a piece of dirt to fall into the eye, become trapped between the lens and cornea.

A good way to go to hold the upper lid against the bone of the eyebrow and blink. If the foreign particle remains, you will have the lens out and rinse.

With the soft lens they're in place, it is impossible for anything between the cornea and lens. However, it can while putting them on ignore any unusual sensation hoping it will go away. The lens out and rinse often as necessary. It feels right. A tiny fragment of thread or several rinsings finally comes off.

You and your family are invited to join us on Sunday, October 16th for our 11th reunion. Tableware, cutlery, and napkins will be furnished.

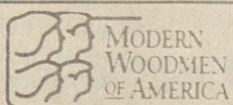
Senator J.P. Wilemon, Guest Of Retirees

Reassure Children In The Aftermath Of Hurricane

The aftermath of Hurricane Katrina and the threat of more severe weather have traumatized many families. People have been uprooted and displaced; many children are now attending new schools with unfamiliar teachers and surroundings. Even if you were not directly affected by Hurricane Katrina, you have been exposed to its tragedy. Here are some tips on coping with the stress of recent days. If you know someone affected directly by the hurricane, share this article. There may also be something you can learn to apply in a variety of situations with your child:

1. As a parent, take care of your own personal needs. Research shows that children cope better with disasters if their par-

ents cope well. Find someone you trust to talk with about your feelings of grief and frustration. A friend, relative or volunteer may be able to help.

2. Re-establish some routines that were in place before the storm. For example, tell the same bedtime stories, give your child the same bedtime blanket, or anything that will reclaim some normalcy within the family unit.

3. Set and enforce limits on the child's behavior. Even though he has been traumatized, expectations for the child are still important. These rules can be reassuring to a child who is feeling out of control. Allow children to express their feelings and give them extra support, but it is still important to

enforce regular bedtime, simple chores, etc.

4. Listen to your child and try to answer his questions. Some questions may be difficult to answer, such as "Why did the hurricane come?" or "When will we be able to go home?" Some of the child's concerns may be related to misunderstandings. Provide correct information to your child. In some cases you may need to say that you don't know the answer.

5. Reassure your child in appropriate ways. For example, if you know that your home is gone and that you cannot return to it, explain very tenderly that your family will find a new home and that you as a family will make the new home just as special as the old one.

6. Help your child mourn. Even young children feel losses, but in a different way from adults. Talk with your child about what he misses

form his home, school, or neighborhood. He may want to draw pictures of the things he misses. It is important for young children to say good-bye to toys and other items that were important to them. Don't underestimate a child's emotions. If a child is upset, anytime, you need to allow them to work through their emotions. If a child is upset, anytime, you need to allow them to work through their emotions in their own unique way. Talking, unconditional acceptance, and lots of love and support can make all the difference. Remember how you felt as a child when you were worried or hurt about something - or even how you feel as an adult. With this in mind, it is easy to see why children need to work through concerns in their own way and in their own time.

7. Watch for trauma reactions. Children may develop

fears of storms, rain, loud noises, and separation from parents. They may even have nightmares and other difficulties in dealing with their losses. In most cases, these reactions will get better over time (especially with your careful nurturing). If fears and worries continue, do not hesitate to get outside help from a qualified mental health counselor.

8. Remember that children will respond to events on a different timetable than adults. Even if your child showed no adverse reactions during the first days after the hurricane, he may show some difficulties later. Do not create a "cycle of silence." This happens when parents assume that children are not reacting, so they don't talk about the issues. When children see that their parents are not talking, they believe they should not talk about it. The crisis becomes a taboo subject,

and nobody's needs. Make sure your child can talk with you about his thoughts, fears, and

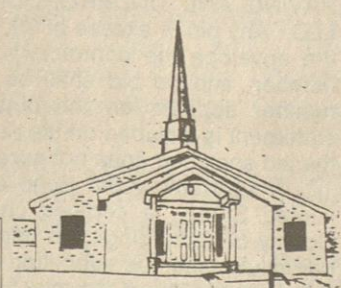

DO YOU WANT TO BE SAVED?

Only one time, in the entire Bible, is the question asked. "What must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:30). In the next verse (Acts 16:31) the question is answered, **"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house."**

Remember:

Hell's Hot
Life's Short
Death's Sure
Eternity's Long
and, "There Ain't No Exits In Hell."

NO MAN KNOWS, HOW SOON IT IS TOO LATE

"Thou shalt not take the Name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh His Name in vain." Exodus 20:7

Any way that you use God's Name, the Lord's Name, Jesus' Name, other than in a Holy manner, is taking His Name in vain.

"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16

Acts 2:21 and Romans 10:13 indicate that, "whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." In the next verse, Romans 10:14 it says, "How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed?" Believing precedes calling upon The name of the Lord. Jesus Himself said in John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth, and the life: **no man cometh unto the Father, but by me.**" God reaffirms this truth in 1 Timothy 2:5 saying "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." When someone says "repeat this prayer after me to be saved" it is making people feel like they have to "do" something to be saved, other than **believing**. If someone is asked to say a prayer to be saved, the person who says the prayer is still on his way to hell, after repeating the prayer, if he hasn't believed in his heart. Nowhere in the Bible is it found that a person has to pray a prayer to be saved. God does not hear a prayer unless you go to God in the name of Jesus Christ, **The Only Mediator between God and man**. Jesus Christ is not your Mediator unless he is your Lord and Savior. So according to God, the steps are, first, you **believe in Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior**. By believing as Acts 16:31 indicates, you are **saved!** Acts 16:30,31 is the only time in the Bible where the question is asked, "what must I **do** to be saved?" God answering through Paul said, **"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved."** By being saved, Jesus Christ is your Lord, Savior, and Mediator between God and yourself. Now you can pray to God, because you have the Mediator, Jesus Christ.

I believe that when a person "prays" to God, without being saved, his prayer goes no higher than the ceiling, and God probably says, "Who do you think you are, to think that you can come to Me, without coming to Me in the only possible way that I have set out in My Word? For you come to Me, through My Only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ, the One and Only Mediator between you and Me." You don't just pull Jesus Christ out of the air, and say today I want You to get me to God, be my go-between for God! It doesn't work that way. Jesus Christ is either your Lord and Savior, making Him your Mediator, or, if Jesus Christ is not your Lord and Savior, He is not your Mediator. I believe it is very important to stress that you are saved by **believing only**. John 3:16, probably the most quoted verse in the Bible, says that, "whosoever **believeth** in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Again, this passage clearly prescribes believing, not repeating a prayer. In John 3:4, Nicodemus asks Jesus, "How can a man be born when he is old? Can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born?" He was asking this in regard to Jesus' statement in John 3:3, that a man needs to be born again. Jesus' answer in John 3:5 and following is "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Nowhere does Jesus say, pray to be saved, it is **always believe**.

Years ago, I heard Dr. Donald Grey Barnhouse say "I'm deeply offended when I hear a prayer that does not end with the idea that God must be approached only through the Name and the Being of the Lord Jesus Christ." Ephesians 1:13 says "In whom (Christ) ye also trusted, after that ye heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation: in whom also after that ye **believed**, ye were sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise." Romans 10:9 tells us "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt **believe** in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." "For with the heart man **believeth** (first) unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession (next) is made unto salvation." How many people have gone to hell or are going to hell by putting their trust in the ungodly "pray the sinners prayer" or "repeat this prayer after me", instead of **believing**. John 3:36: "He that **believeth** on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him."

Luke 23:39-43 tells us "And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on him, saying, If thou be Christ, save thyself and us. "40 But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? "41 And we indeed justly; for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but this man hath done nothing amiss."42 And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. "43 And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, Today shalt thou be with me in paradise." In these verses in Luke, we see that a man was saved by believing only. The malefactor did not, and was not instructed by Jesus, to pray, to receive salvation. He said unto Jesus, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom."43 And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise. **You don't fool Jesus**. Jesus **knew** that this man **believed** in Him; that this man **believed** that this Jesus that he was talking with was the Lord, The Messiah, the Only Begotten Son of God, the Savior, and in believing, the man was saved. Now if you think that you have to pray first, repeat first, or **anything** first, before believing, why did Jesus tell him "today thou shalt be with Me in paradise?" OR if there is a need to do for anything to go along with **believing**, why didn't Jesus tell him what that was? Jesus doesn't make mistakes! God's Word is true. You don't (really you can't), add to or take away from God's Word, and it be true. Just leave His Word alone, and do what God said, **believe**. Psalm 119:89 "For ever, O LORD, thy word is settled in heaven." Revelations 22:18,19 "For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book: "49 And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book." Take your Bible and check the references that we contained herein— nothing added to and nothing taken away; and when you hear "the plan of salvation" from anyone, get your Bible out and see if it is God speaking or "someone's" idea. I can't see "ten steps" to salvation, I can see only one step: **believe**. The malefactor on the cross had but one step, and he took it. You, I, we all have "one step," **believe**. Please take it, and believe in the Lord Jesus Christ for your salvation.

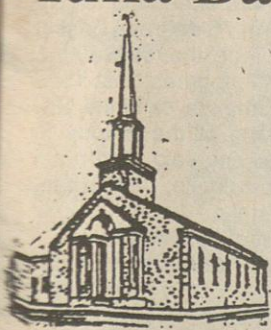

Embezzlement Charges Brought Against Funeral Home Owners

Former Prentiss County funeral home owners, Michael and Alice Salts, were found guilty on three felony embezzlement charges and one misdemeanor embezzlement charge by a jury last week in Lee County.

According to a press release issued Tuesday, Oct. 11, by Mississippi Attorney General Jim Hood, the Salts, who issued Gulf National Insurance Company burial policies through their funeral home, had been accepting premiums for the policies from individuals; however, they had not been sending in the money to the insurance company.

According to records from Gulf National Insurance Company, the last time the Salts had submitted any premium money to them was in 1994, but they continued to take in premium money from policy holders until 2002.

The Salts were originally indicted on six counts of embezzlement in May of 2003 by a Prentiss County Grand Jury; however, the state moved to drop one count due to the health condition of one witness who would have had to testify in the case.

Of the five remaining counts, the state Attorney General's office was successful in getting four convictions against the Salts. The trial was moved from Prentiss County to Lee County because of pre-trial publicity, according to the attorney general's office.

Sentencing of the couple will probably take place later this month. Each of the Salts could receive up to 10 years per felony conviction and six months per misdemeanor.

The Attorney General stated that Mr. Salts has been convicted before in 1999 for five counts of providing the Prentiss County Board of Supervisors with false affidavits for paupers' burials. This makes him a habitual offender and requires that he be sentenced to the maximum of 10 years on each of the felony charges.

"I hope these successful prosecutions send a message to others in our state that we will not tolerate crimes being committed against Mississippians, especially our vulnerable and elderly citizens who are trying to take care of their funeral expenses in advance," Hood said.
