Tishomingo County Development Foundation Plans Annual Meeting - Public Invited

Tishomingo County Development Foundation is holding its annual meeting on Tuesday, November 8, 2005 at 6:30 p.m. at Schnadig Corporation in Belmont, Mississippi. The event should conclude by approximately 8:30 p.m.

Unidentified Male Body Found West of Belmont

The remains of a human body were found by hunters Friday afternoon, Oct. 25, west of Belmont, but at press time, authorities were unable to make a positive identity.

According to Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock and Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, the investigation into the identity of the individual, whose remains were found just off County

Road 6, west of Belmont, got underway Monday.

"We have sent the remains to the Mississippi Crime Lab for an autopsy and DNA testing, but it will be a few days before we have their initial report," Sheriff Whitlock stated.

The remains do appear to be those of a male, the official confirmed.

The Sheriff said he could

only speculate as to the identity of the individual at this time, but will release the information as soon as he receives word from the crime lab.

The Sheriff's Department is conducting an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the death and that information, too, will be released by Sheriff Whitlock as it becomes available to him.

Local Marina Project Seeks U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Permits

Plans for a marina project proposed by a local developer, as well as an unrelated community boat dock, both located in the same vicinity in Tishomingo County, are awaiting permits from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

A public notice issued recently by the Nashville office of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers stated that Pickwick Pines Marina, Inc. is seeking a permit to develop approximately 31 acres of waterfront TVA land in the northern corner of Tishomingo County.

The proposed marina project will be located in the area once occupied by the roadside park, just off Hwy. 25 N., near the Mississippi/Tennessee State Line. The roadside park, which had been operated by the Mississippi Department of Transportation, was closed to the public in the 2000.

According to the Corps document, the large-scale project plans will include not only a 185-slip marina, fuel dock, and boat ramp, but also residential villas with pool and 15 slip villa dock, a marina store, a restaurant with waterside deck, golf cart storage and dry dock and boat storage facility.

The document states that the 31-acres which will be used

for the marina project had been under a 40-year commercial recreational easement from TVA for the Tishomingo County Development Foundation. The TCDF had originally proposed to develop the site for a marina, restaurant, rental cabins, etc. Pickwick Pines recently leased the property from TCDF, the notice states.

According to the notice, the decision on whether to issue a permit to Pickwick Pines will be "based on an evaluation of the probable impacts including cumulative impacts on the activity on the public interest." It will take into consideration the utilization and protection of local natural resources.

Language in the public notice states that a permit will be granted to the project unless the District Engineer determines that it would be contrary to the public interest. This public notice is being issued to solicit comments from the public, as well as from federal, state and local agencies and officials, etc. in order to evaluate the impact of the project. The notice stated that any comments concerning the project can be submitted, in writing, to the Nashville District Corps of Engineers, Regulatory Branch, Attn: Kathleen Kuna, 3701 Bell Road, Nashville, TN 37214 on or before Nov. 14, 2005.

Community Dock Project

In a separate public notice, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has announced another unrelated project, located northwest of the Pickwick Pines project.

Local resident Mark Akers is asking for a permit to dredge an area in the Sandy Creek/Pickwick Lake/Doskie area, near the Mississippi/Tennessee State Line and construct a 30' x 156' floating, covered community dock, which will include nine boat slips.

According to the document, the purpose of the project is "to provide access to the lake during winterpool and to provide boat moorage for adjacent lot owners."

As with the Pickwick Pines project, the notice states that a permit will be granted for the project unless the District Engineer determines it to be contrary to public interest.

The notice states that any comments concerning the community dock may be sent, in writing, to the Nashville District Corps of Engineers, Regulatory Branch, Attn: Richard Graham, 3701 Bell Road, Nashville, TN 37214 on or before Nov. 14, 2005.

Survey of Students Reinforces Need For Quality After-School Programs

YOUNG PEOPLE SAY TEACHERS ASSIGN TOO MUCH HOMEWORK, TELEVISION IS #1 HOMEWORK DISTRACTION

A new survey supports the need for quality after-school programs that offer students homework assistance and academic goal-setting. While students accept the need for homework, they say they get too much each night. Television is the #1 homework distraction, and while most students get homework help from their parents, many get no help at all and need access and whole most students get homework assistance programs to compete and succeed.

The survey asked students their opinions on homework and on graduating high school. The results of the "Boy's & Girl's Clubs of America/JCPenny Afterschool Fund Survey" show:

Survey Results: Homework

1. 67 percent say teachers should assign homework, but 54 percent say their teachers assign too much homework.
2. 52 percent say television distracts them most from homework. Friends (22 percent), extracurricular activities (17 percent) and family obligations (9 percent) are other homework distracters.
3. Parents help kids most with their homework (56 percent). 19 percent say no one helps them and 17 percent get help from mentors and tutors.
4. 74 percent say they complete their homework every night.
5. 71 percent say they have 1-2 hours of homework each day, 20 percent have 3-4 hours a day and nine percent have more than four hours of homework daily.

Survey Results: Graduating High School

1. 89 percent say graduating high school is very important and almost all (98 percent) expect to graduate high school and attend college (94 percent).
2. 77 percent say their parents are the strongest influence in driving them to succeed in school.
3. 87 percent of young people surveyed say they strive to do their best at school every day.
4. 61 percent say going to college is their primary ambition after high school,

followed by getting a job (22 percent). 5. 42 percent say the negative

influence of peers is their greatest challenge to finishing high school.

"The results of this survey complement what other studies have found regarding after-school programming and the benefit it provides. Numerous studies have shown that children involved in quality after-school programs, including those that offer homework assistance, have better grades, higher grades, higher school attendance, better attitudes towards school, higher educational aspirations and less need for disciplinary action," says Julie Berkhouse, Afterschool Specialist, the JCPenny Afterschool Fund.

After-School Programs - By the Numbers

* Every day, more than 14 million children in this country are unsupervised between the hours of 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. That leaves them in great danger of becoming victims or perpetrators of crime or delinquent behavior.

* Another 43 million children could benefit from after-school activities with increased access and awareness of programs provided by Boy's & Girl's Clubs of America and other organizations like the YMCA, 4-H and Junior Achievement.

* Research shows after-school programs can have positive effects on students' performance in school, including improved math and reading performance, improved attendance, reduced dropout rates, decreased involvement in crime, improved behavior at school, and a heightened interest in learning.

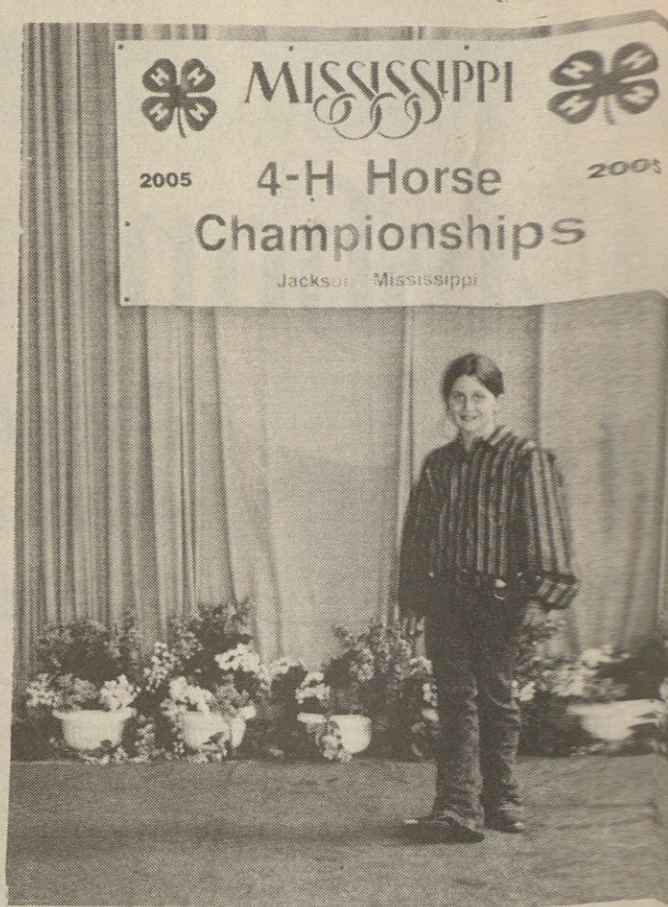

Near Or Far Vision?

With normal vision, you should be able to see objects clearly whether they are near or far away. During your eye exam, both close and distant vision will be checked. The distance measurement is usually done at 20 feet. A test for near vision is usually taken at the normal reading distance - about 14 inches.

Near vision is used for reading, sewing, eating, and any other activity in which the object you are looking at is within arms length. Distance vision is considered anything beyond that point. This would include looking at television or at people across a room, even though the distance is relatively short.

You need to see clearly wherever you happen to be looking. Straining your eyes to try to see objects clearly can often cause headaches and other discomfort. If you think you may need glasses or contact lenses or a new lens correction, see your eye doctor for an examination.

STRICTLY SPEAKING

Most tort cases require a plaintiff to prove the (in)action of another person or her injury or damage as the result of negligence or intentional misconduct. Strict liability tort, on the other hand, is a concept that, in certain situations, a defendant is responsible for the plaintiff's damages without any requirement that the plaintiff prove the defendant was negligent. In such an instance, a consumer who suffers an injury while using a product according to the directions. Under the doctrine of strict liability, he or she may receive compensation for damages without showing anything more than that the manufacturer marketed a product that was unreasonably dangerous. Strict liability applies regardless of any precautionary measures taken by the defendant.

Strict liability makes a manufacturer responsible for damages caused by its products or actions regardless of any fault on their part. When you are involved in a personal injury matter, or have questions about another legal dispute, don't hesitate and contact our office to schedule a consultation.

God The Father Is A Judge,
So Is His Son

I have often been amazed at various ideas floating around among human beings concerning the person and character of Jesus Christ. Among the most common ideas seems to be the notion that Jesus is mild and gentle and that he never ever could bring any kind of judgment to anyone. I have often heard this kind of statement: "Now Jesus is much different from the 'God of the Testament', for He is not mild and judgmental, like the God in the Old Testament." I

often wonder where people get the information that they put together to make up their belief systems, or their theologies, for they certainly do not all come from the Bible. Jesus Himself said plainly, "I and My Father are one." (John 10:30) He also said in John 14:9, "...he that hath seen Me hath seen the Father." Then we have the statement of Jesus in John 1:18: "No man hath seen God at any time; the only Begotten Son, which is in the bosom of the Father, He hath declared Him." Perhaps the above verses will be enough for the present to

substantiate the fact that Jesus is one with the Father in His divine attributes. The Father cannot be anything that the Son is not, so the "God of the Old

Testament is exactly the same God that we have in the New Testament in the person of Jesus Christ. If Jesus came to declare the Father to us, then He must be like the Father. If those who saw Jesus had seen the Father, then there could be no difference in divine attributes between the Father and the Son.

With these things in mind, I want us to look at the teaching of Joel 3:1-2: "For, behold, in those days, and in that time, when I shall bring again the captivity of Judah and Jerusalem, I will gather all nations, and will bring them down into the valley of Jehoshaphat, and will plead with them there

for My people and for My heritage Israel, whom they have scattered among the nations, and parted My land." (Notice that I capitalize all pronouns referring to deity.) Without taking time and space to develop all that may be inferred in these verses, may I say that the setting for these two verses is the end-time. Joel is speaking of a time when Israel will be restored to its own land and live in peace in it. At that time, Jesus Christ will gather the nations in the valley of Jehoshaphat for the battle of Armageddon.

Belmont for the past 16 years. Because of his love for hunting and wildlife, he has taken a 135 acre tract in to a wildlife area. After much planning and work, Mr. Yarber has turned a once

under-used tract into a haven for deer, turkey, and the return of quail to the area.

The 2005 Conservation Education Award went to Bobby Lowery of the Tishomingo County High School. Mr. Lowery teaches A&P, Zoology, and Environmental Science. 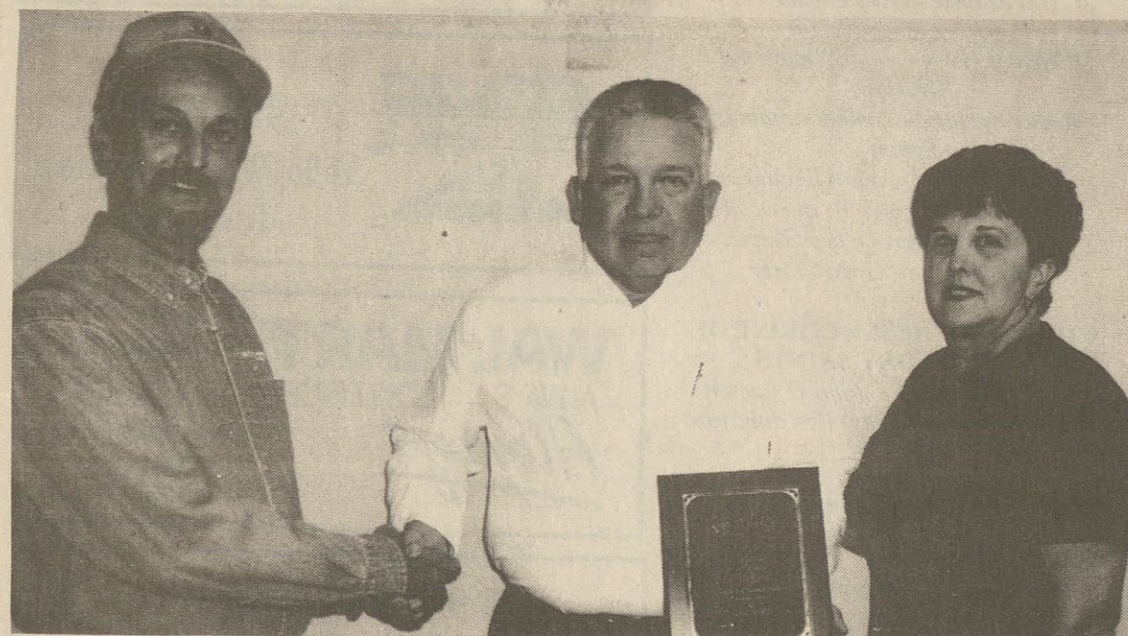

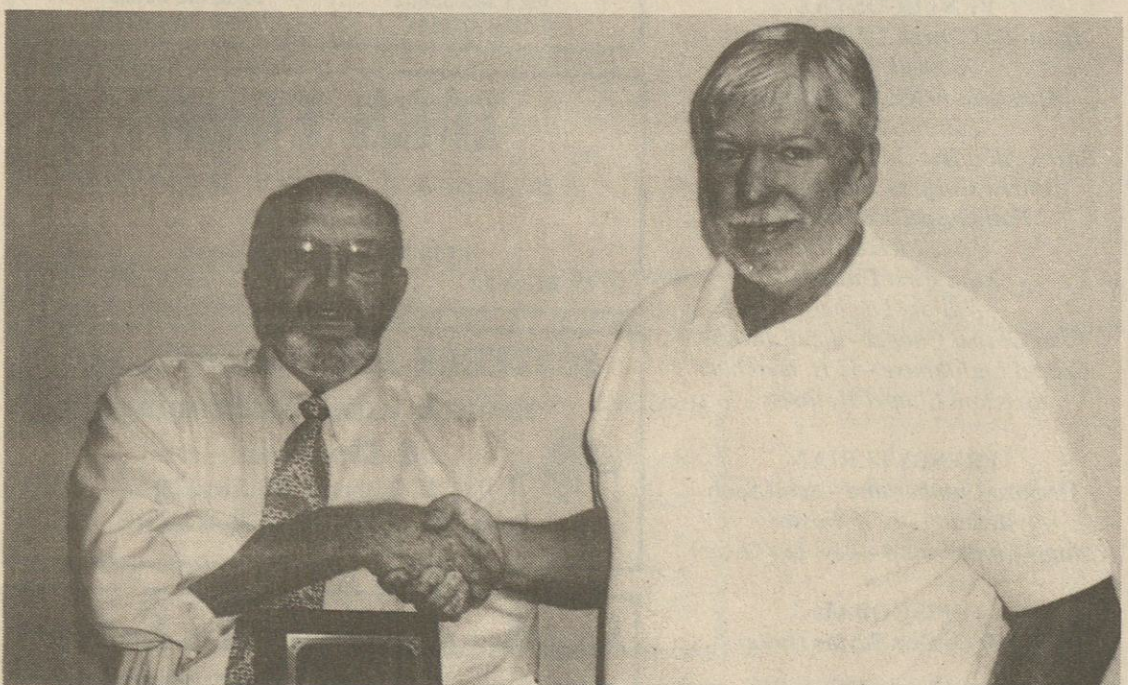

Tickets to the rodeo are \$8 for adults and \$4 for children. There will be a saddle given away the night of the rodeo.

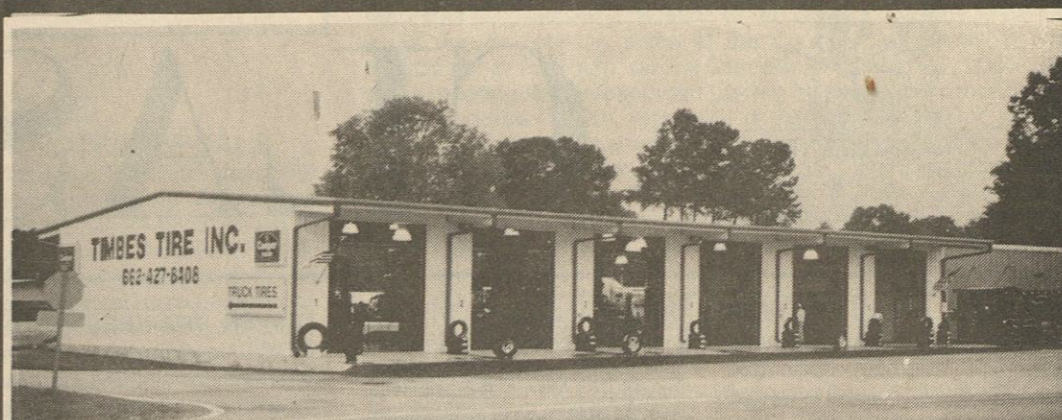

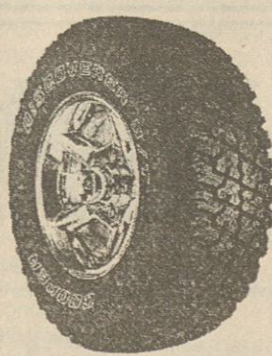

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

The Board of Supervisors, acting for and on behalf of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "County") and the Iuka Airport Authority (the "Authority") took up for consideration the matter of authorizing and approving a loan on behalf of the County from the Mississippi Development Authority (the "MDA") for the purpose of making improvements to the Iuka Airport Facility and thereby promoting commerce and economic growth.

Thereupon Supervisor Danny Ryan offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO AUTHORIZE AND APPROVE A LOAN ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY AND THE AIRPORT AUTHORITY FROM THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN A MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED NINETY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$295,000.00) FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING IMPROVEMENTS TO THE AIRPORT FACILITY TO PROMOTE COMMERCE AND ECONOMIC GROWTH.

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "County"), does hereby find, determine, adjudicate and declare as follows:

1. The Mississippi Business Investment Act, constituting Section 57-61-1 et. seq. Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Act"), was enacted for the purpose of promoting business and economic development in the state of Mississippi (the "State") through investment by private companies locating in the State.

2. Pursuant to Section 57-61-41 of the Act, the MDA is authorized to make interest-bearing loans to state, county or municipal airport authorities for the purpose of making improvements to airport facilities.

3. The County and the Authority will agree to improve the airport facilities and will request the MDA to finance a portion of the cost associated with the development of these improvements (the "Project").

4. Pursuant to the Act and guidelines adopted by the MDA, the County and Authority will file an application with the MDA for a loan to be used for the development of the Project in the amount of Two Hundred Ninety-five Thousand Dollars (\$295,000.00) (the "Loan").

5. The County and the Authority will enter into a Loan Agreement (the "Agreement") with the MDA wherein the County and Authority agree to borrow the proceeds of the Loan subject to and upon the terms and conditions of the Agreement.

6. In order to secure the Loan, the County and the Authority will execute and deliver to the MDA a Promissory Note (the "Note"). Failure of the County to meet its repayment obligations shall result in the forfeiture of sales tax allocation and/or homestead exemption reimbursement in an amount sufficient to repay obligations due pursuant to Section 57-61-15(7) of the Act. Upon forfeiture of the County of its sales tax allocations and/or homestead exemption reimbursement for twelve (12) months, the County may levy an ad valorem tax on the taxable property therein for the purpose of meeting its repayment obligation in accordance with Section 57-61-15(8) of the Act. The revenue produced from the tax levy shall not be included within the ten percent (10%) growth limitation on ad valorem tax receipts for its general budget.

7. The Loan shall not be deemed indebtedness within the meaning specified in Section 19-9-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE COUNTY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Governing Body of the County does hereby declare its intention to authorize and approve a Loan from the MDA in the principal amount not to exceed Two Hundred Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars (\$295,000.00) for the purpose of making improvements to the Iuka Airport Facility thereby promoting commerce and economic growth.

Section 2. The Loan will be secured by a Note executed and delivered by the County and the Authority to MDA. Pursuant to Section 57-61-15 (7) of the Act, failure of the County to meet its repayment obligations shall result in the forfeiture of sales tax allocation and/or homestead exemption reimbursement in an amount sufficient to repay obligations due until such time as the indebtedness has been discharged or arrangements to discharge such indebtedness satisfactory to the MDA have been made. Upon forfeiture of the County of its sales tax allocations and/or homestead exemption reimbursement for twelve (12) months, the County may levy an ad valorem tax on the taxable property therein for the purpose of meeting its repayment obligation in accordance with Section 57-61-15(8) of the Act. The revenue produced from

the tax levy shall not be included within the ten percent (10%) growth limitation on ad valorem tax receipts for its general budget.

Section 3. The Governing Body proposes to authorize and approve the Loan from the MDA in the amount and for the aforesaid purposes at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at its regular meeting place at the County Courthouse in Iuka, Mississippi at 9:00 a.m. on the 21st day of November, 2005, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto. If twenty percent (20%) or fifteen hundred (1,500), whichever is less, of the qualified electors in the County shall file a written protest with the Clerk of the County against the authorization and approval for the Loan on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then the Loan shall not be entered into unless authorized at an election on the question of authorizing and approving the Loan. Such election shall be called and held as

provided by law. If no protest is filed, then the Loan may be entered into without an election on the question of authorizing and approving the Loan at any time within a period of two (2) years after the date above specified.

Section 4. This Resolution shall be published once a week for at least four (4) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in the City of Iuka, Tishomingo County, Mississippi and having a general circulation in the County and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this Resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to November 21, 2005, and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to such date, said Resolution to be published on October 27, November 3, 10, and 17, 2005.

Section 5. The Clerk of the County shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of said publication of this Resolution and have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 3 hereof.

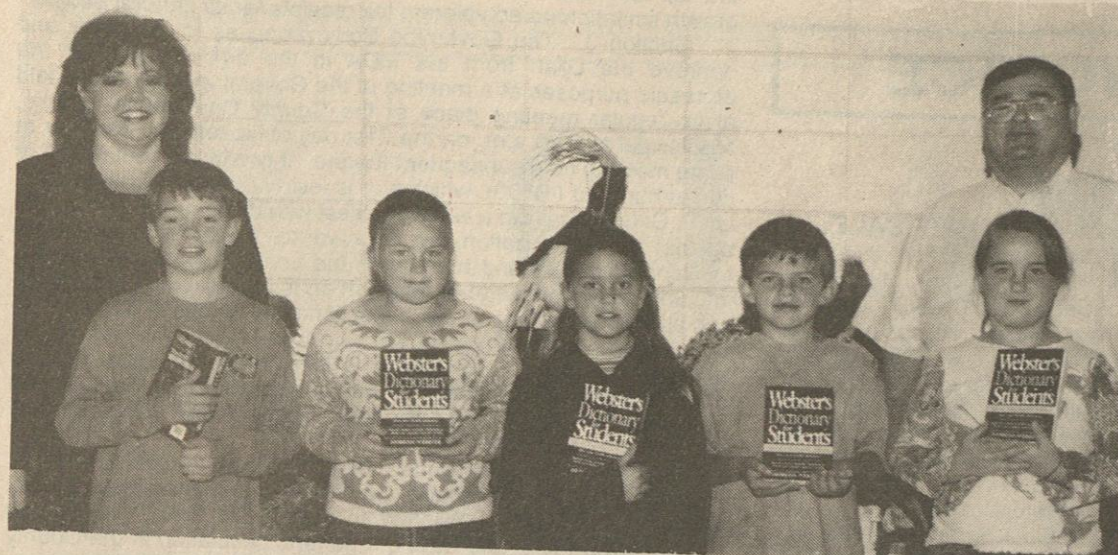

Medicare Rx Access Network Of MS Launches Effort To Educate About New Medicare Drug Coverage

The Medicare Rx Access Network of Mississippi was launched today at an Educational Seminar at Tishomingo Community Living Center. The network is one 50 state-based programs of the national Medicare Rx Education Network. The 14 member organizations in the Medicare chronic diseases, pharmacist, and health care providers and business. The Medicare Rx Access Network of Mississippi was created to share resources, coordinate activities and disseminate information to Medicare beneficiaries and their caregivers about the new Medicare Part D drug coverage.

It is important that we help our seniors and people with disabilities and chronic disease make informed decisions about their options regarding the new drug coverage," said Pam Lovelace, TLC NHA, "The Medicare Rx Access Network of Mississippi is working hard to make sure that people who receive Medicare get accurate information about the prescription coverage and know where to go in their local communities to get help signing up."

The Medicare Rx Access Network of Mississippi hopes

to eliminate duplication of efforts and maximize the effectiveness of outreach efforts. The network also hopes to inform beneficiaries about the new Medicare prescription

drug coverage by making sure information disseminated about the benefit is factual and accurately conveyed. The network will, whenever possible, direct beneficiaries to local resources in neighborhoods local counselor. The network does not engage in legislative activities or take positions on pending legislative or administrative policies related to Medicare Part D benefit and implementation.

"It is critical that we reach out to people in Medicare those who care for them so beneficiaries can make confident, informed, decisions about their prescription drug coverage," said Lovelace "This network and all of its efforts will be a big help towards the goal of reaching seniors where they live, work, play and pray."
