


Segars NEMCC Loan Fund Generates \$71,600

Dixie: Dan Emmett of Ohio Wrote It as a Minstrel Song

Transcribed from The Commercial Appeal (Memphis, Tenn.), May 28, 1901, by RaNae Vaughn, on July 22,

It was in 1859 that Dan D. Emmett, then a member of Bryant's minstrels, 472 Broadway, New York, wrote the words and composed the music of "Dixie." portion of Emmett's duty in the troupe was to compose "walk rounds" as the management required. The closing feature of a minstrel performance in those days was a walk round song dance and chorus.

The song and dance of "Dixie" was written between the close of a week's business, and the rehearsal on the following Monday. Bryant called for the new walk round, and Emmett replied that he would do his best, though the time was short. At the Monday renearsal, Emmett appeared with the words and music in full, and it became a favorite from the start. It was soon

presented all over the country traveling companies.

The Buckley Serenaders first rendered it in the Southern States. It was first given at New Orleans in the Academy of Music in the winter season of 1859-60.

Many stories are extant as to how it first became popular, and was taken for the national air of the south, but the fact is that it was a catchy air, no matter where it was performed. It is as popular in Europe today as it is in this country, and it is liked in the Northern States of America as well as it is in the South. One of the stories of how it was accepted as the Southern national air is that when Brougham's musical travestie of Pocahontas was being rendered at John E.

Owen's Theater in New Orleans, while the manager was drilling a volunteer company mainly composed of actors termed the "Cocktail Rangers," it was thought to render the production more

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attractive by introducing a zouave drill and march of 40 females. The leader of the orchestra was Carlo Patti, a brother of Adelina. A number of airs were tried for the march, but not until Dixie was played did one suit. The drill and march with the Dixie chorus was given, and it took at once. Soon it caused a sensation and everybody whistled Dixie. Thus it became the popular war song of the South as that story

At Yazoo City, Miss., Dixie was first rendered by a part of the crew of the steamboat, Roebuck, then lying at the landing. A fire broke out in the town, and the boat people turned out to help extinguish it. After midnight, when the flames had been quenched, the boat folks paraded the streets and sang Dixie, and more people turned out to listen to the chorus than had been in attendance at the fire. Even ladies and children gathered to follow the serenaders and listen to Dixie.

At Jackson, Miss., in Spengler's Hall, a popular comedian named Harry McCarthy sung it to throngs, and Capt. Dinkins tells of the incident in his war book in a way that proves how it caught on with the people, making a hit there at the start. It was this way everywhere. In the South, in the North, and in Europe, it touches the popular heart now as it did then, and it will always

The author of "Dixie," D. D. Emmett, was born on October 19, 1815, at Mount Vernon, Ohio. He was the grandson of an Irish chaplain

and surgeon of a regiment that served in the War of the Revolution. His father, a native of Virginia, fought in the War of 1812 under Hull.

ear, and when barely 14 years old, he became second violin with Stickney's circus, the whole band including two violinists, a bugler, and a bass drum. Later he learned to play the piccolo, the fife, the snare drum, and some brass instruments by note. became a clever performer, singing songs of his own making of the plantation Negro type and making many hits in this line. He traveled with nearly all of the circus troupes of the first half of the century, including Seth Howe, Dan Rice, and many others. In 1850, he was the leader of the brass band with a circus company that traveled along the upper Mississippi when the tents of the Chippewa Indians were to be seen in many places about Lake Pepin, and when birch bark canoes were the chief means of navigating the St. Croix and other tributaries of the greatest river of this

continent. The first minstrel company ever formed in this country was composed of Dan Emmett, Brower, Kichard Pelham, and William Whitlock. It was in 1843 that this troupe performed in New York and Boston, afterward crossing to Great Britain and touring that country to disband in Scotland. Of late years, the old minstrel has lived retired among his kindred in Ohio. Some three or four years ago he made a tour of the South with one of his traveling companions, but he took little part in the performances, merely recounting the way he came to compose "Dixie."

NMMC's Hyperbaric Unit Provid **Pure Oxygen Therapy For Patien**

Nathan Cleveland of Golden, Miss., became the first patient to undergo treatment at the North Mississippi Medical Center Wound Center's Hyperbaric Unit beginning Oct. 11th, and his treatment is being deemed a success.

William Beazley, M.D., medical director of the Hyperbaric Unit, supervised Cleveland's treatment for osteoradionecrosis of the mandible, bone that has died as a complication of radiation therapy.

"The first case went great," Dr. Beazley said. "After about the fourth or fifth treatment the patient completely eliminated pain medications, which is remarkable."

Hyperbaric oxygen treatment is used to substantially increase oxygen flow within tissues to improve healing. The unit has two hyperbaric chambers, which provide 100 percent oxygen to patients receiving treatment. A typical treatment lasts approximately two hours. Diabetic foot ulcers, osteoradionecrosis, osteomyelitis (bone infection) and crush injuries are the most common

Glaucoma Tests

If you're past the age of 35 and have your eyes checked regularly by your eye doctor, one of the tests he or she will make is for glaucoma. The symptoms of this disease are often difficult to detect in its early stages, but glaucoma is a very serious disease that can cause blindness if not treated early enough.

In glaucoma, there is either too much fluid produced by the eye or the fluid does not drain normally, causing a buildup of pressure within the eyeball. As the disease progresses, this can cause many symptoms in addition to painful eye pressure. Among them are blurred vision that comes and goes, seeing colored rings around lights, a loss in side vision, and difficulty in focusing.

Tests made by your eye doctor will include checking the optic nerve for any signs of the disease. You will also be given the tonometry test, which measures the pressure in your eyes. This is a completely painless test - but an important one.

Teach Children To Take Responsibility **By Giving Them Age Appropriate** Jobs

Do you long for the day when your child will put away his own toys after playtime? For a while, you don't have much choice but to clean up after him. However, you can being teaching your child to take some responsibilities by the time he is able to walk.

Teaching your child to take responsibility is a life skill that will benefit you, the child and society. Children who never learn to take responsibility at home often grow into adults who don't take responsibility for their actions.

If you have not started a family clean-up routine in your home, now is a good time to begin. Consider the following

• Hang over-the-door organizers for items such as small toys, games, jewelry, and accessories.

 Keep brightly colored storage bins handy for quick pick-up of games and toys.

• Place a bulletin board at your child's eye level so he can see pictures that are displayed.

Use the kind that has ribbon dividers so there is no need for pushpins to hold pictures.

· Use colors for walls, floors, windows, and bedding that camouflage dirt and spills.

• Try oversized switch plates on light switches to keep sticky little hands off the

· Allow toddlers to bring a diaper or baby wipe to you when it's time for a diaper change. Children enjoy feeling that they can help take care of themselves. Be sure to say "thank you" for their help!

• Let children bring in the mail (with your help), feed the pet (with your help and/or supervision), or clear their dishes after meals.

• By the time a child is 3 to 5 years old, he can dress himself, make his bed, and several other activities. Keep in mind that your child may not do these tasks perfectly at first, but that is part of the learning process.

• Be patient! Learning to be a "big boy" or "big girl" is a process that requires lots of understanding from parents and caregivers.

• Enjoy the process!

Parenting, like life, is a journey, not a destination. Yes, you may say, "Parenting ends when they turn eighteen." That's not necessarily true. It is different-for different families and parents should always be open and available to listen, support, and be role models. Family support is important to everyone. Enjoy the previous time you have with your children - before you know it, they will be grown and gone! Happy Parenting!
