The Tishomingo County Development Foundation Board of Directors held its January monthly meeting at Environmental in Tishomingo. Board members toured the Heil facility.

General Manager Michael Johnson gave an overview of the company and its products. The Tishomingo plant produces dump truck bodies ranging in size from small lawn and garden to huge construction bodies. Heil ships its products all over the Heil employs 183. world. The company is investing in improving the Tishomingo operation, recently installing a new wastewater treatment facility and purchasing new equipment. Projected improvements and new equipment exceed \$2 million. The Tishomingo plant has been named "Best in Company". Heil is a division of Dover Corporation. Heil needs welders and is willing to train quality workers

MSU EXTENSION SERVICE ...Some Things You Can't Control

It's a tough fact of life: there are just some things in life you can't control. You can't control the weather, you can't control your genetic makeup; and you can't control the reactions of others. You can control only your own reactions (some would argue with this statement). Looking back over 2005, we have seen a smorgasbord of sadness: the tsunami, the war, and the tragedy that hit our own homeland, Katrina. It is difficult at best to help children understand these great catastrophes. It is difficult to say why people hurt children, why they cheat or lie, and why "bad" things happen.

In any tragedy, children have to first learn to understand their own feelings. Often, just putting a word to a feeling helps young children understand more. If a child loses someone they love, it is good to sit down with that child and tell them you are sad too, that people die, and that it cannot be controlled.

Telling the child it is OK to be sad and that it is even OK to feel angry may help them validate their own feelings. Children who are uncertain will often become clingy. Help your child by allowing them lots of "together" time. During this time, observe closely and look for cues to the feelings they are experiencing and be ready to respond. Children do not have the social or mental sophistication to understand the stages of grief and actually, they don't have to. You can help by listening, reassuring them, and showing them options. By giving homage to your child's feelings ("I understand that you are 'mad'..."), you tell him he is worthwhile and his feelings are

while the things that should and do matter most (like my family for me) have a new and heightened importance. Really, when it comes down to it, we need food, air, and water to live. We, who are so amply provided with these, move on to other needs such as shelter and transportation. Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs states that our needs are set in layers, the most basic (food, air, water) at the bottom of a pyramid-like structure. When those needs are taken care of, you "humanness" allows us to move on to the next set of needs.

So what does Maslow's theory have to do with teaching children about their feelings? It's simple, really. Teach children that their feelings and the feelings of others do matter and everyone responds differently to different things. Hopefully, by doing so, you will raise a child who will grow into a mature, unselfish, and giving adult. I'm not so sure America has hit the mark on this one. I'll never forget the words of a newspaper columnist who once said "The world is going to the dogs." She went on to explain that every generation since the caveman has said the same, support for the fact that everything is relative. It is all about perspective and attitude. Teaching a child that they cannot always control a given situation, but they can control their attitude and reaction comes to fruition in the form of early lessons about self-control, perseverance, and drive.

In this "quick fix" world in which we live, we cannot teach these lessons in a single sitdown discussion. The lessons we as adults teach children come in small, easy-to-ingest doses that become heard, then practiced, then mastered. Parenting is not a one-night-stand; it is a long-term commitment actualized by words and, more importantly, by deeds. It is not a one-size-fits-all undertaking, and parents have to be ready to grab onto those "teachable moments" whenever the opportunity presents itself.

Children grow into skills, both physical and emotional, and parents need to remember to nourish those first efforts into extended lessons about determination. Children need and want guidance, unbeknownst to them, and it is our job to be on hand to offer that guidance in the form of a hug, an encouraging word, an understanding of mutual support, and a million other ways. These are the foundations, the beginnings of helping raise a caring, contributing member of society which is ultimately the goal of parenting. It all begins with love, and the possibilities are without limit. Commit yourself to it. Happy Parenting!

THE NEW BANKRUPTCY

As of October 2005, a new bankruptcy law took effect that allows bankruptcy petitioners who earn less than the median income in their states to be eligible to file under Chapter 7. Those who earn more and can repay at least \$6,000 over five years must file under a Chapter 13 debt reorganization plan, which requires some repayment. The law requires filers to submit more paperwork (such as tax returns and paycheck stubs) and to get credit counseling at their own expense within six months of applying. To a lesser extent, the law also makes it tougher to file for commercial bankruptcy by giving companies that seek debt protection less time to decide whether to assume or reject

Filing for bankruptcy is a debtor's most extreme remedy. It is available only once every six years, so once you use it, you are bared from using it again for a while. Speaking with an attorney will help you understand how you can benefit from it and what alternatives you could use instead. For additional information about today's column or another legal issue, call our office to schedule a consultation.

HINT: Studies have found that the new bankruptcy law will force about 10 percent of debtors to seek Chapter 13 debt relief instead of Chapter 7 protection.

luka Stands To Lose \$1.1M Under Tax Plan

The city of Iuka stands to lose more than \$1.1 M over the next decade if a tax bill passed by the Legislature becomes law. An analysis of Senate Bill 2310 shows that this city would lose revenue it now uses for such services as paying city employees and operating city govern-

The legislation was presented as an increase in Mississippi's cigarette tax and elimination of the sales tax on groceries. Overall, however, with grocery sales growing at the historical statewide average of 5 percent, municipalities would lose an estimated \$166 million in future revenue and state revenue will be reduced by more than \$1.5 billion over the next nine years as the legislation is implemented.

Supporters of the bill, however, may not have calculated its full impact on sales tax revenues that fund many aspects of local government. When voting for this proposal, Legislators did not have all of the information about its potential effects on Mississippi's State budget an

According to the Mississippi State Tax Commission, the original estimate of the amount of grocery tax collected in municipalities was incorrect, likely by 20 percent. Therefore, even the proposed fund set up to reimburse the municipalities is not funded at a high enough level in

the legislation. Yet, Legislators were told that cities and towns were protected from a loss of revenue. Even if that estimate were corrected, this demonstrates the lack of information on which this proposal was

Furthermore, the Tax Commission's estimate on potential new revenue from an increased tax on cigarettes failed to take into account the reduction in smoking which is occurring both in Mississippi and across the nation. This will reduce revenue from this higher

Also, increasing the cigarette tax by 455 percent would give Mississippi the highest cigarette tax of all our surrounding states. Such a drastic increase would inevitably lead to bootlegging of cigarettes across state lines and entice more people to purchase cigarettes from the Choctaws, which are not taxable.

The Tax Commission's estimate on potential new revenue from an increased tax on cigarettes did not take either of these likely effects into account, and both would reduce the new revenue from the higher tax. Clearly, any increased revenue from a higher tax on tobacco will not come close to offsetting the decreased revenue from reducing the grocery tax.
