

The snake measured about 3 inches around and was about 50 inches long before having his head chopped off. worried about the one back at the house that wouldn't come, "Well, he is twenty-one".

When you get there, the one with the flashlight goes in first to locate the snake, they like to hide on that shelf or under a slab. "Now there is one over there in that corner that I couldn't reach with a hoe, but he is just as scared of us as we are of him". I never believed that.

It makes a lasting impression sitting there listening to adults grumble, thunder, rain on that tin roof and the smell of mold mingled with fresh snake blood. Once somebody got wise during the snake killing part and the hoe handle busted a half gallon jar of pickles that had been there for eight or nine years—that is a smell that will stay with you.

Travis Childers told me that his memories of the storm house were pretty much the same as mine. He remembers one night, "it is always night, I don't think bad storms come in the daytime". His whole community was in the same storm house, the Timbes' and the Beardens, and the Stokes' and several others, he was sitting on his Grandmother Stokes' lap, holding on tight. The thunder was bad, the lightning, they were getting the whole works. His Grandmother Stokes was of that generation of women that wore their hair long and rolled up into a neat little bun on top of her head. So they are sitting there in the half of light of the coal-oil lamp and she notices that Travis is pulling on her hair, "Travis, don't pull on Granny's hair", he denied it. After the third warning, Grandpa Stokes turned from the door with the flashlight. Like us, they always had a man standing in the door to tell everybody what was happening. He shined the light in her direction, mostly to get Travis' attention. That is when he saw it, it wasn't a BIG snake, but there it was wrapped in Granny's hair. It had crawled off that shelf. Travis said he didn't remember exactly what happened next, but there was a lot of activity. He did remember that they didn't kill the snake, I guess it wasn't that important. WATCH FOR SNAKES! Parliamentary Speaking, Procedures, and Protocol.






telling me that during Annual Training at Camp Shelby (in 1996), he didn't take his boots off one time!!! "That's how
