Three Killed Near Cherokee in Air Evac Helicopter Crash Early Sunday Morning

Air Evac Lifeteam crew helping search for a lost hunter died early Sunday morning when their helicopter crashed and burned in a remote area in neighboring Colbert County.

The crash happened at 2:45 a.m. Sunday about a mile off Mount Mills Road in the Freedom Hills Wildlife Management area near Cherokee, Alabama.

Killed in the crash were the pilot and two medical technicians. The pilot was Michael Baker, and the technicians were Allan Bragwell,

All three members of an 40, and Tiffany Miles, 29, both of Florence, reports said.

They will be trying to identify what made the Bell helicopter abruptly crash, as it reportedly had located the lost hunter with its search lights and was circling the area, some reports have said. Television news outlets have stated that the helicopter hit power lines in the area.

Forestry officials were called in to clear a path to the scene, which has been described as very rocky and

Until the Corinth base for Air Evac opened recently, most all the Tishomingo County medical transport helicopter runs would have come out of this unit based in Muscle Shoals, said Gail Hudson, an Iuka nurse who has worked with Air Evac for 10 years. She was with the Muscle Shoals unit for years, and also worked with Bragwell at Helen Keller Hospital. He was interim director for

Keller ambulance service. "Air Evac is a family," Hudson said. "These were great people."

This is the first time Air Evac has ever had a crew fatality, Hudson said.

"They really stress safety issues," she said.

The helicopter was helping in a search for 25-year-old Matt McDowell, of Florence. McDowell's family had called 911 operators just after 1 a.m. and rescue authorities from Colbert County and the Air Evac unit responded.

Colbert County Emergency Management Agency Director, Mike Melton, said the hunter was spotted about 3 a.m., and the helicopter team was shining a light on the man in an effort to show ground rescuers where they could find him.

"They were hovering and all of a sudden it started down," said Melton, who was involved in the search. "At first. I thought they were landing but it kept going down. Then I heard the explosion. The first thing you feel is that lump in your throat."

Reportedly the hunter was hurt in the crash, and treated and released for non-

Therapist Suggests Ways To Prevent Your Child From Becoming A Tater Tot

Researchers say it is no mystery why one third of children in the United States are obese and some 60 percent of overweight children between 5 and 10 years of age have at least one risk factor for heart disease.

Cathy Henderson, a physical therapist at Methodist Rehabilitation Center in Jackson, says that eating fast food and sugar-filled snacks, along with an increase in sedentary activities, is putting children at risk of heart disease, diabetes and the propensity to become overweight adults.

"Physical education cal activity: classes have declined in schools over the last ten years and more children are watching television now than ever," Henderson . said.

Henderson says parents can help propel their children . into a healthier adulthood by encouraging physical activity at an early age. She says that implementing daily physical activity during early childhood will help establish good exercise habits and challenge motor coordination.

"Limiting television time, videos, computer games and Internet time will allow for more spontaneous physical activity," Henderson said. "Be creative and encourage indoor games like Twister, which gets them moving and promotes flexibil-

She also recommends that parents exercise with their children to set good examples and show them how much fun it can Henderson said the reward

will be more than just improvements in your children's physical well-being. "Many children see an improvement in self esteem, mental health and academic performance," she said. "Their attention span and energy level also can be increased when they stay physically ac-





The Purple Heart: A Tradition Of Courage

(NAPS)—Americans know to salute the brave military men and women who have earned the distinguished Purple Heart. But how much do you know about the medal

The Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration still in active use. Originally created as the Badge of Military Merit by General George Washington in 1782, it was revived and redesigned by General Douglas MacArthur in 1931 and reissued on February 22, 1932.

To be eligible for a Purple Heart, one must be wounded by an instrument of war inflicted by the enemy. That makes the medal the only decoration that attests, without question, to the bearer having been in combat.

Purple Heart Status To learn if next of kin has been awarded the Purple Heart, a written request, signed and dated, must be mailed to the Military Personnel Records facility of the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC). The address is 9700 Page Ave., St. Louis, MO 63132-5100.

After 10 days or so, you may send an e-mail requesting status of your request The e-mail address is mprsta tus@nara.gov. Or you may

call to ask about the status at (314) 801-0800. E-mailer original requests will not b honored.

Sudden Flashes And The Retina

If you've been dis-

turbed by sudden flashes in your eyes, this may be caused by an irritation of the retina. The retina is a layer of light-sensitive cells located in the back of the eye. When it is stimulated (or in this case irritated) it is capable of sending only one sensation to the brain: light. Just as the nerves in other organs have specific purposes - the ear for receiving sounds, the nose for smell and so forth - light is the only sensation the retina can transmit. Even if the retina was pricked with a sharp pin, the only sensation it would transmit to the brain would be a flash of light.

Even a tiny pull on the retina or a momentary stress on a tiny blood vessel caused by a slight rise in blood pressure may result in a flash of light to the brain. An occasional flash may be harmless. But it may also be an early warning of detachment of the retina, which can cause serious vision problems. Only an examination by your eye specialist can determine the cause and how it can best be
