Homestead Notice

Homestead signing is underway and will continue until March 31, 2007. Anyone needing to file a homestead for the first time or file on a newly constructed house will need to do so during this time. The applicant will need a copy of the deed to the property, social security numbers for the applicant and the spouse, and vehicle tag numbers. Anyone that wishes to file an over 65 homestead exemption will need proof of their age such as a driver's license. Anyone that wishes to file a disability homestead exemption will need to bring their disability award letter.

Anyone needing to make a change to their homestead such as becoming over 65 before January 1, 2007, becoming disabled before January 1, 2007, loss of a spouse in 2006 either by death or divorce, or changing their place of residence also need to come in between January 1, 2007 and March 31, 2007. Iuka Medical Clinic To Hold Groundbreaking Ceremony Friday, January 12th

North Mississippi Medical Clinics will hold a groundbreaking ceremony at 11 a.m. Friday, Jan. 12, to mark the beginning of construction on the new Iuka Medical Clinic. The ceremony will be held near the front entrance of North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka, located at 1777 Curtis Drive.

Representatives from Iuka Medical Clinic and the NMMC health care organization will participate in the ceremony.

"The recruitment of two additional physicians to this community is one of the driving forces behind relocating Iuka Medical Clinic from its current location to a new facility near NMMC-Iuka," said David Barber, North Mississippi Medical Clinics administrator. "We're pleased to introduce this community to Drs. Brian Bagwell and Tripp Gillespie who have chosen Iuka to establish their clinic and hospital practices. They will be joining Dr. Kenneth Draper at the new clinic later this year."

Brian Bagwell, D.O., received a bachelor's degree in pharmacy from the University of Mississippi in Oxford and a bachelor's degree in biology from Evangel University in Springfield, Mo. He completed his medical training at the University of Health Sciences College of Osteopathic Medicine in Kansas City, Mo., and his residency training with the NMMC Family Medicine Residency Program in Tupelo. Dr. Bagwell and his wife, Vicki, have two daughters.

George Edward "Tripp" Gillespie III, D.O., received a bachelor's degree in biology from Millsaps College in Jackson. He completed his medical training at the University of Health Sciences College of Osteopathic Medicine in Kansas City, Mo., and his residency training with the NMMC Family Medicine Residency Program in Tupelo.

CONSERVATION CORNER Seed Available For Wildlife

Whether you are a photographer, hunter or like viewing wildlife, anyone who has spent time overlooking a food plot will have a deep appreciation for wildlife plantings.

Food plots are very attractive to wildlife because they can supplement their daily nutritional needs at a low cost. These plots can be designed to serve as a source of food and cover. Well-managed food plots have the potential to increase wildlife, quality of health and observability.

To aid landowners who would like to plant wildlife food plots, Wildlife Mississippi is continuing its Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. Through this program, Wildlife Mississippi will make seed available at a minimal cost.

The Wildlife Habitat Seed Program is designed to provide an incentive for landowners to establish and maintain food plots that will yield a variety of benefits to

the landowner as well as the species of wildlife he or she is managing.

Winter wheat, corn, soybean, grain sorghum and sunflower seed will be available through Wildlife Mississippi's 2007 Wildlife Habitat Seed Program. All seed has been treated and has excellent germination rates. The seed is provided by Pioneer Hi-bred International and is distributed through Resource Management to the Foundation.

If planted properly, the various types of seed will be utilized by a variety of wildlife species. White-tailed deer, turkeys, bobwhite quail, mourning doves, waterfowl and many species of songbirds will benefit from these plantings.

The guidelines regarding this program are simple and easy to follow. Anyone interested in obtaining seed should send a self-addressed, stamped envelope to Wildlife Mississippi with a request for

an order form and planting recommendations for the seed. Wildlife Mississippi will be taking orders up until February 28, 2007. This will allow the staff to place the orders in a timely manner to ensure that they will be filled in time for planting season.

Shipping and handling charges incurred by Wildlife Mississippi are included in the price of the seed. The costs will be \$18.00 per 50 lb. bag for regular corn, \$12.00 per 50 lb. bag for sorghum, \$12.00 per 50 lb. bag for soybean, \$8.00 per 20 lb bag for sunflower and \$7.00 per 50 lb. bag for wheat. Persons ordering seed will be required to pick it up in Amory, Greenville or Hattiesburg.

business or corporation, and will be taken through January 31, 2007.

"This program has grown into a Mississippi tradition which highlights positive business practices," said Bill Moak, BBB Mississippi President and CEO. "If you know of a business which deserves recognition, we encourage you to nominate them."

There is no cost to enter the competition, and nominations may be submitted by businesses or consumers. The four winners will be entered into the Better Business Bureau's international Torch Awards for Marketplace Ethics.

The award is open to all for-profit businesses that serve retail and wholesale markets. Businesses with governmental entities (local, state or federal) as primary markets are not eligible, nor are government agencies and

not-for-profit organizations. Businesses based in other states, but with Mississippi operations, are eligible. Businesses do not have to be members of the Better Business Bureau to be eligible, but they must have a satisfactory record with the BBB to be considered.

CONTRACTORS UNDER CONTRACT

If you are one of the millions of Americans who have used a home equity loan to make improvements to your house, you know how challenging a home improvement project can be. While cost overruns and delays are to be generally expected as part of the process, some homeowners have been known to run into unscrupulous contractors who simply do not deliver all that was promised. In such cases, if there was a contract signed by both sides, homeowners can take legal action to enforce it. As a preventive measure, homeowners are encouraged to have their attorneys review any contract before it is signed to make sure that it is comprehensive in its protection of the homeowner's interests.

Eudora Welty: *Other Places* On Display At Iuka Public Library

"Eudora Welty: *Other Places*" an exhibit featuring black and white photographs taken by Eudora Welty, during visits to New York City and New Orleans in the mid to late 1930's are on exhibit at the Iuka Public Library during December and January.

Welty spent several weeks in Manhattan during the winter of 1938-39, job hunting. It was the middle of the Depression and Miss Welty remembers it as a desperate time with people standing around trash fires to keep warm, selling apples for a nickel to keep themselves employed. Welty was intrigued by the shadows and patterns of light created by the low, raking sun on Union Square and Third Street, the streets over which the subway loomed. These elements became the heart of the photographs taken in New York City.

Her photographs in New Orleans in the winter of 1936 offer a contrast in mood and

subject. The Mardi Gras celebrations went on in spite of the times. Welty did not photograph the parades or the festive balls that ended parade days. Instead, as she wandered the streets of the French Quarter, her eye caught jesters, ironic juxtapositions, and, as always human interactions and relationships.

The exhibit of twenty photographs produced by the Museum of Mississippi History has been included in the traveling exhibits currently on display at the Iuka Library. The public is encouraged to visit the Iuka Library and view these delightful photographs.

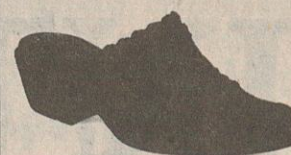

Maybe these music download were motivational songs to improve his performance as Justice Court Judge for Tishomingo County. Anyway...Justice Court Judge Donny Joe Sparks has claimed the downloads were for official County business. Were they? You be the judge. These are privately owned businesses so I will not list the names, but I will list the phone numbers and anyone interested can call them for themselves:

*A kennel club located in Blaine, TN 865-932-9680

*A truck rental and leasing company in Tupelo, MS 662-844-1931

*A dog food manufacturing company in Red Bay, AL 256-356-9541

This is just a few of the many questionable phone calls made at our (the taxpayer's) expense listed on Justice Court Judge Donny Joe Sparks' personal cell phone bill. Justice Court Judge Donny Joe Sparks claims these calls were official County business. Were they? You be the judge.

County funds can legally be used to purchase cell phone plans in the County's name for public officials to use for County business. County funds cannot be legally used to pay for public official's personal cell phones or personal calls. The total amount you and I paid for the two Tishomingo County Justice Court Judges' personal cell phone bills is approximately \$5,000. I would like to have a free cell phone plan, how about you?

Tishomingo County Justice Court Judge Billy Glover and Tishomingo County Justice Court Judge Donny Joe Sparks have judged and condemned many individuals for a single act of theft, yet Justice Court Judge Glover and Justice Court Judge Sparks have unlawfully taken money from approximately 19,000 people comprising Tishomingo County for almost three years. Chronicles & Epitaphs from the
old Tishomingo County
Courthouse



The following information
was transcribed from *The
Vidette* (Iuka, Miss.,) April 7,
1910

Mr. R. Marlar (more generally known as "Shug" Marlar) who lives in the north end of the 2nd District, was in town Monday and told the following story to the editor. Last February, a 5/8 Indian woman, 68 years of age, named Sibbie Durant, drove up to his residence in a buggy and called him by name. She alighted and came in, called his wife by name, and told the astonished couple who she was, where she was from, and that she had a dream directing her to come to that place to make her home. She further told him she owned, in her own right a valuable piece of land in the town of Durant, Oklahoma. From that day, she took up her abode with the

family of Marlar, which consists of himself, wife, and adopted child; they have no children of their own. Since being there, this woman has deeded Mr. Marlar a half interest in the farm she owns with the stipulation that he and his wife are to care for her during her lifetime. She is paralyzed on one side but is sprightly and industrious and is considerable help about the place. Mr. Marlar says he has investigated the matter and finds she owns the land all right, and he has arranged for it to be rented one year for \$600. As soon as his crop is made, he expects to go to Durant and look after the place and perhaps move there or near there. Several persons, he says, has tried to induce the old woman to leave him. She tells him, every case and steadfastly refuses to leave.
