Crystal Meth Lab Found And Dismantled In Burnsville City Limits

An anonymous tip led county and city law enforcement to a lab set up to manufacture crystal methamphetamine in a wooded area in Burnsville City Limits on Tuesday, Jan. 9.

According to Tishomingo County Narcotics Investigator Jason Williamson, he received a call around 6 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 9, from someone who happened up on a variety of equipment and chemicals in a heavily wooded area in Burnsville.

Upon investigation of the scene, which was only accessible by walking into it, Williamson

said he recognized the containers, equipment and chemicals which would be used to manufacture crystal methamphetamine.

After finding the lab, Williamson called in Burnsville Police Chief Mike Shipman to assist in the investigation. Also contacted were the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and a Haz-Mat Team from Jackson to remove the toxic chemicals from the scene.

The lab contained equipment designed to manufacture the substance and some chemicals which had been separated into the components known as

precursors or chemical elements known to be used to make the substance.

Williamson said, while no arrest was made at the scene, an investigation has come up with suspects and he said he is hopeful that an arrest can be made soon.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock encourages anyone with any information on this or any other drug related activity in the county to call his office so that it can be investigated. The number of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office is 662-423-6185 or 423-7000. The office is open 24-hours a day.

Former Burnsville Mayor Bobby Harold Johnson Loses Life In One-Vehicle Accident

Area residents were shocked and saddened recently as prominent Burnsville businessman and former, long-time Burnsville City Mayor Bobby Harold Johnson, 56, died during a one-vehicle accident Saturday, Jan. 13 in southwestern Kentucky, not far from the Tennessee State Line.

According to reports from Hickman County Kentucky Coroner Paula Boaz, Johnson was returning home from Kentucky where he had purchased a Mack truck. A witness, travelling behind Johnson told authorities that the truck, being driven eastbound on Hwy. 58 headed toward U.S. Hwy 45 by Johnson, began to go off the side of the roadway for no apparent reason. The truck ran down through a ditch and hit an embankment with an impact which they believe caused the driver's door to open. Johnson was thrown from the truck while the truck was still moving and was hit by the vehicle's back tires, the Coroner explained.

There is speculation that Johnson may have had a heart attack and that was why he drove off the side of the road, but the coroner said an autopsy was done, but the results are not back yet.

"I can't be certain until the autopsy results are back in a few weeks, but it is possible that Johnson may have suffered a heart attack or some other medical complication which caused him to leave the road," Boaz said. "We just won't know for sure until these results are back."

According to Boaz, it will be between three and four weeks before the autopsy results are back. She did confirm that Johnson was pronounced dead at the scene.

Johnson was a popular and well loved member of the Burnsville Community and was close to the members of his large family and to the many employees who served him and also to the customers in his businesses. He was also close to those who worked with him at the city during his over 20 years in office.

Johnson did much to better the town of Burnsville. He helped to get the town better water and sewer service, among the many other improvements and updates accomplished during his tenure in office.

He also was very active in charity work and helped many through donations to organizations and persons he was

acquainted with throughout the years. He also helped many families who did not have money to provide funeral services for their loved ones by donating money for services, or the donation of equipment to assist in their burial.

Most recently, Johnson was a very successful businessman who owned several companies including 72 Express Trucking, Mustang Transport, and 72 Express Citgo Mini-Mart, all in Burnsville. He had been honored on the national level for his business endeavors by being recognized as one of the state's top businessmen by the National Republican Congressional Committee and was listed in the 2003 NRCC Chairman's Honor Roll. He served as co-chairman of the committee's Business Advisory Council. He was presented the Republican Gold Medal at a special awards ceremony in Washington which was also attended by the President. He was also selected for the Mississippi Municipal League's Hall of Fame. He was a lifetime member of the league.

Additionally, Johnson was a member of Harmony Hill Baptist Church and was a lifelong member of the Burnsville Masonic Lodge #233 F&AM. He was also a member of the Mississippi Trucking Association and was a former member of the Tishomingo County Electric

Power Association's Board.

Funeral services for the longtime public figure were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 17, at Harmony Hill Baptist Church in Burnsville. Burial, with full Masonic Rites, followed in the church's cemetery with Bro. Louie Williams and his nephew, Bro. Edward Johnson, officiating. Cutshall Funeral Home of Glen had charge of the arrangements.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Deanyer and Annie Johnson; a brother, Will Mose Johnson; and four sisters, Alma Cooper, Nettie Johnson, Lou Dodson and Ethel Thacker.

He was survived by his loving wife, Debbie Johnson of Burnsville; two sons, Brian Johnson and his wife Robin and Heath Johnson and his wife, Carrie, all of Burnsville; One daughter, Lori Lawson and her husband Ronnie, of Burnsville; two brothers, Donnie B. Johnson and Dunk Johnson, both of Burnsville; two sisters, Myrtle Hamm and Bonnie Horn, both of Burnsville; seven grandchildren, Bethany Johnson, Alie Grace Johnson, Mackensley Johnson, Lucy Lawson, Clint Johnson, Noah Lawson and Billy Johnson.

Pallbearers were nephews of Johnson.

Chaz Akers and Molly Savoy Honored As Mr. and Miss TCHS

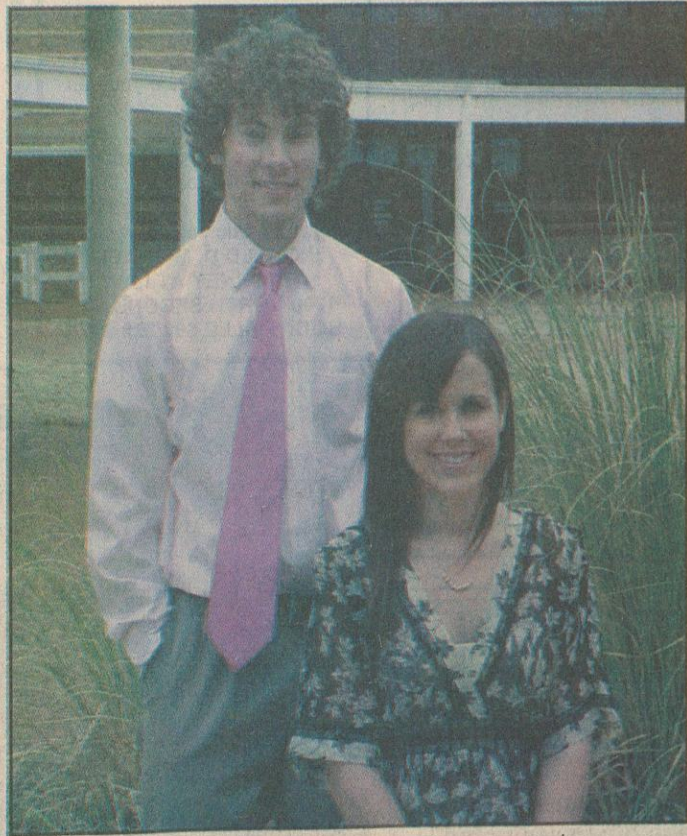

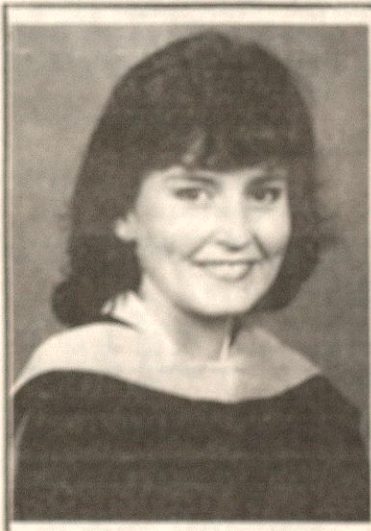

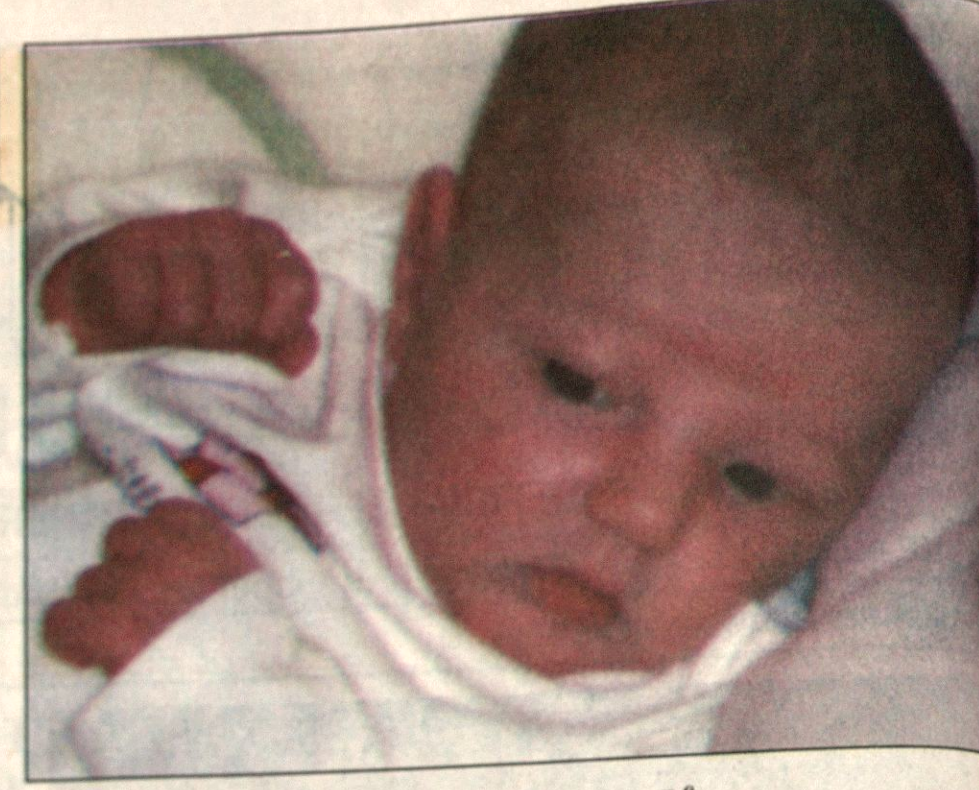

Harmony Homemaker Volunteers Meeting

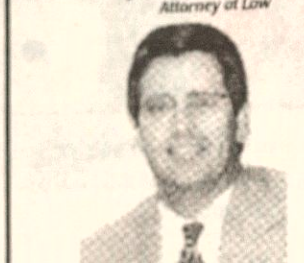

JUDGMENT BASED ON ACKNOWLEDGED FACTS

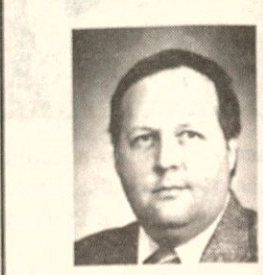
Civil trials usually involve disputes over the facts associated with a particular situation. However, when both parties are in agreement about the facts of the case, and are simply seeking a judgment as a matter of the law, one or both parties may move for "summary judgment." When utilized during civil litigation, the primary benefit of this legal device is that it can expeditiously move both parties to a legal resolution of their conflict without going to trial. The judge can take into account the agreed-upon facts of the case and determine how the law should be applied to the situation. He then issues a ruling. Usually, a court will hear oral arguments on a summary judgment motion.

Motioning for a summary judgment is also a way to avoid a trial when a plaintiff's claim is patently baseless. The courts do not like wasting time to settle a suit that is frivolous or of a vindictive nature. If you are sued, speak with an attorney about the course of action to take in your defense. Learning And Vision Problem

If you have a child in a remedial reading class, is it because he omits words and confuses similar words when reading? Even though the child may have scored 20/20 in the school eye test, his vision may be the source of the reading problem. Such problems CANNOT be detected during a school vision screening.

It would be appropriate to have his vision examined by an optometrist experienced in treating learning-related vision problems (as is this office). Bring along a list of symptoms that you and the teachers may have noticed. This will help with the diagnosis.

If a learning-related vision problem exists, treatment may involve glasses alone or vision therapy or a combination of the two. Vision therapy programs use specially prescribed vision tasks to help the eyes learn or relearn vision skills.

Overcoming learning-related vision problem will not automatically end the child's reading problem but it will help him or her to respond more effectively to the remedial program.

Tishomingo County Adolescent Offenders Program

Nikkie Tapp, Clinical Director of Children's Services from Region IV MH/MR Commission (Timber Hills) and Joey Cobb, Youth Court Judge from Tishomingo County have worked diligently to obtain additional services for adolescent offenders in Tishomingo County. On January 16, 2007 those efforts will be rewarded with the opening of an Adolescent Offenders Program. This program will serve court ordered youth twelve to seventeen years of age, who are at high risk of becoming further involved in the Criminal Justice System.

The overall program principles are to provide a treatment program in response to the ever growing crime rate among adolescents. It will also provide an alternative to the ever growing Youth Court System caseload, as well as to supplement the supervision and attention already given by community and state agencies. Counseling service to be provided will be delivered in

a balanced, coordinated, and comprehensive manner within a therapeutic setting. The therapeutic modality will include group, individual, recreational, and family therapy. Youth enrolled must successfully transition through three phases before discharge from the program. Each level of transition will be based on the youth's overall performance and progress toward meeting personal treatment objectives.

The program will operate at the local Region IV (Timber Hills) office four days of the week from 3:30 to 5:30. Mr. James Dye will serve as the program therapist, Ms. Amanda Lambert will serve as the program case manager, and Ms. Jessica Barnett will work with Mr. Dye as the program assistant. Coordinated efforts with Ms. Lesa Judd, Youth Court Counselor, will identify the youth being court ordered into the program.

January 15th, 1929 appeared to be a normal day. There were no breaking news headlines, no urgent happenings, but it was a day that changed history forever: on this winter day, one of the most famous leaders of the American civil rights movement was born.

He was born Michael Luther King, Jr. but later changed his name to Martin. Throughout the years, he developed into a political activist, a Baptist minister, but also a world figure. In 1964, King became the youngest man to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his work as a peacemaker, promoting non-violence and equal treatment for different races. Martin Luther King, Jr. was a beacon of light for those persecuted on the basis of their race. However many did not appreciate his good works, and on April 4, 1968, Dr. King was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee, while sitting on his balcony preparing for protest march.

Remembered every January as a holiday, but the uprising precedents and examples set are what truly live on each and every day.

David Bailey Freeman. He enlisted with his mother and brother's permission to assist his older brother who was already a soldier. David's brother was a ranking officer in the Fulton Blues but was unable to carry out his duties alone due to a medical condi-

tion. David wanted to enlist to help his brother. "Little Dave" as he was called by his fellow Confederates was one month shy of his eleventh birthday.

He fought in several battles, among them was the battles of Resaca, Cassville, Kennesaw Mountain and Atlanta. David was only fourteen when the war ended.

Following the war, David became involved in the newspaper business and carried out his political ambitions. He

married in 1895 and became the father of three sons.

He became the mayor of Calhoun, GA at the age of 25, mayor of Cedartown, GA at the age of 35 and mayor of Cartersville, GA at the age of 54. He did some writings about his war experiences and became active in the United Confederate Veterans.

At the age of 77, "Little Dave" passed away of a heart attack after returning home from a Confederate reunion in North Carolina. David Bailey Freeman was carried back to Cartersville, GA and lay to rest beside his wife who had preceded him 7 years earlier.

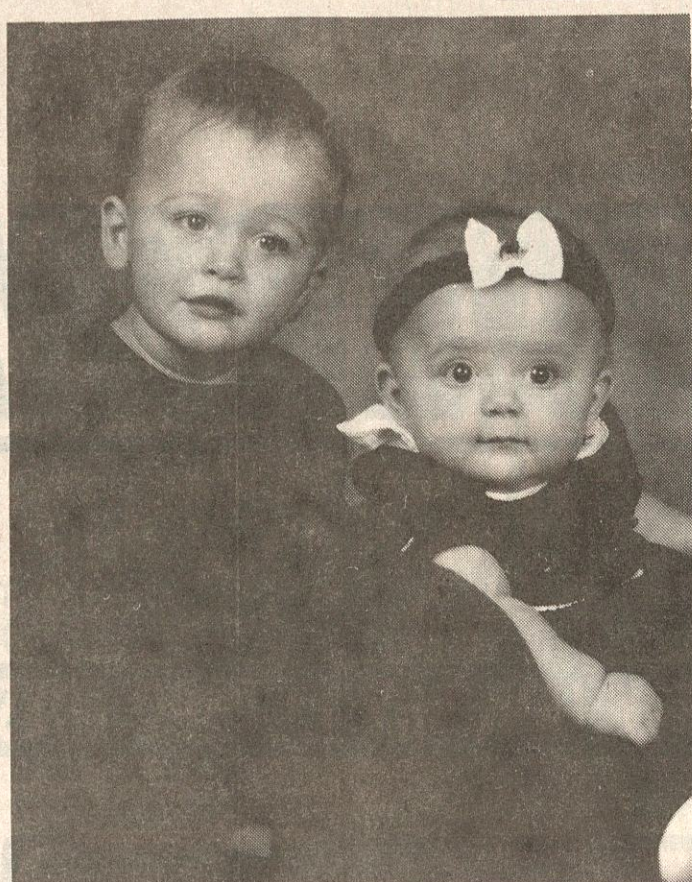
"I can be the eyes and ears," Judy said. "But Vickie has to be the arms and legs."

Workers At Schnadig Corporation May Qualify For Trade Act Benefits

Former employees of Schnadig Corporation, who lost their jobs, may be eligible to receive payments and to qualify for a variety of reemployment services, the Mississippi Department of Employment Security (MDES) announced Friday.

Former employees of Schnadig, in Belmont, Mississippi, who were totally or partially separated from employment on or after November 30, 2005, may be eligible to receive Trade Adjustment Assistance Act (TAA) services. Under TAA, eligible workers can receive additional unemployment benefits, have their training costs paid so they qualify for new employment, and receive a health coverage tax credit and other services.

Workers who lose their jobs or whose hours of work and wages are reduced as a result of increased imports or a shift in production to certain foreign countries are eligible for TAA services.

Schnadig Corporation, employees, in Belmont, Mississippi were engaged in the upholstered residential furniture. An investigation by the Division of Trade adjustment Assistance (TAA) of the U.S.

Department of Labor showed that declines in employment and sales at the subject firm are related to an increase reliance on imports of upholstered residential furniture.

Under TAA, additional, unemployment benefits are paid after regular unemployment benefits are exhausted and training qualifications are met.

To be eligible for additional unemployment benefits and the health coverage tax credit, workers must report to a local WIN Job Center for an initial assessment for services within 16 weeks of their separation from employment or eight weeks after the TAA petition is certified. The petition for Schnadig Corporation, in Belmont, Mississippi

was certified on January 5, 2007.

Workers should visit any WIN Job Center across the state to determine their eligibility for TAA services. A directory of WIN Job Centers can be found on the MDES Web site at www.mdes.ms.gov or by calling 888-844-3577. Further information about Health Coverage Tax Credit can also be found by calling 866-628-4282.
