### Ashley Helton Crowned 2007 Miss NEMCC

Ashley Helton of Iuka was crowned Miss Northeast Mississippi Community College 2007 in the college's annual Miss Mississippi preliminary pageant held in the Seth Pounds Auditorium February 6th.

Competing with three other young women for the title, Helton, a sophomore pre-optometry major, earned the right to represent Northeast at the Miss Mississippi Pageant July 11-14 in Vicksburg. April Essay of Corinth, a sophomore accounting major was named first alternate.

Miss Northeast 2006, Summer Ray of Tupelo, was on hand to perform, conclude her reign with a final walk and speech, and crown the winner.

Contestants competed in the areas of private interview (25%), talent (35%), evening wear (20%), lifestyle and fitness in swimsuit (15%), and on stage question (5%). Helton chose diabetes awareness and prevention as her platform, an issue that she will publicize and support throughout her year of service. She performed a jazz arrangement on the piano for her talent.

Helton, the daughter of Douglas and Kathy Helton, is

a 2005 graduate of Tishomingo County High School, where she was salutatorian and STAR student. She was a member of the National Honor Society and the year-book editor.

At Northeast, Helton is a President's List scholar, a member of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society, where she serves as historian, and was selected to Who's Who. Among American Junior College Students.

Active in the community, Helton volunteers regularly at the Iuka Food Pantry and participated in the PTK Christmas Cards for the Troops project and the Better World Book Drive.

The Miss Mississippi Pageant is one of the most respected and prestigious pageants in the Miss American system. Mississippi has had four Miss Americas since the program began in 1921. According to Wayne Sutter, executive secretary of the Miss Mississippi Corporation, Mississippi's contestants have amassed more scholarship dollars than any other state.

Patrick Eaton of Booneville, executive director of the Northeast Development Foundation served as emcee. Ray along with other members of Campus Country provided entertainment.

### Burnsville Law Apprehends Man Wanted In Texas

A Jackson, TN man, wanted in Texas, was apprehended during a routine traffic stop by Burnsville Police Monday evening.

According to Burnsville Police Chief, Mike Shipman, Officer Joseph Marlar, while on patrol, stopped a vehicle traveling west on Hwy. 72 at a high rate of speed with no tag. During the interview with the driver, he noticed that the passenger was extremely nervous. A warrant check on the two indicated that the passenger, Olvenca F. Stewart, 22, of Jackson, TN had an outstanding warrant from the state of Texas for possession of a control substance - 10 lbs. of marijuana and 400 grams of cocaine.

Officer Marlar notified the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department for assistance and Deputies Eric Bowman and Christina Shipman responded to the scene. The two occupants of the car gave consent for a search of the vehicle which was clean.

Stewart was arrested on the outstanding warrant and transported to the Tishomingo County Jail. He signed a waiver to be returned to Texas. He is being held in the local jail until Texas officials come for him.

Also assisting at the traffic stop was the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department K-9 unit.

Iuka Couple Injured in Accident - Jerry and Eleanor Long of Iuka were injured in a wreck on the Natchez Trace Parkway Sunday evening while returning home from Florence. The two were air-lifted to Tupelo where Jerry remains in critical condition.

### Iuka Alderman and Wife Seriously Injured In Natchez Trace Wreck

Iuka Alderman, Jerry Long, and wife, Eleanor, were seriously injured in a one vehicle accident on the Natchez Trace Parkway in Alabama around 9:00 p.m. Sunday evening.

According to Cherokee Police Chief Steve Glover, who assisted at the wreck site, the Longs were traveling south on the Natchez Trace

about one mile from the Hwy. 72 cutoff when the crash happened. Mr. Long apparently attempted to miss an armadillo crossing the road, when he lost control and ran off the left side of the road. The car traveled some 40 or 50 feet off the road and hit a tree. The impact was on the driver's side. Mr. Long was air lifted to the North Missis-

sippi Medical Center in Tupelo from the scene and Mrs. Long was taken to the Iuka Hospital and then air lifted to Tupelo.

At press time Tuesday, family members reported that Jerry was in critical condition in ICU with head injuries. Eleanor was still in ICU but was improving and should be placed in a private room on Tuesday.



### Fisherman's One Stop Destroyed By Fire Thursday Evening

The former Fisherman's One Stop on Coleman Park Road was destroyed by fire Thursday evening, February 8th.

According to Coleman Park Volunteer Fire Department Chief, Danny Holland, the building located at the intersection of CR 321

and CR 989 was fully engulfed with flames at the east end of the building when the volunteers arrived around 8:30. It appeared the fire had begun in the east end and was spotted by a passerby.

The convenience store had been closed for some time but was under the new ownership

of Kathy Brown, who was planning on opening for business March 1st.

Volunteers from Coleman Park, Iuka, North Crossroads, and Harmony/Central Fire Departments worked to control the fire which quickly spread through the frame structure.

## Local EMTs Do Humanitarian Work In Central America

Two EMT's from this area recently traveled to Central America to provide life-saving care for a family in need. Randy Cole, of Booneville and Jerry Ervin of Iuka traveled to the Huehuetenango Province in the remote northwestern part of Guatemala, near the border with Mexico. There they helped a family in need get established in a business which will provide them a life-sustaining income.

Some months ago, Ervin was contacted by an organization in Baton Rouge, Louisiana which does humanitarian work among the poor. This group told him of a woman in Guatemala whose husband had been killed in an accident a few months earlier. The widow, Señora Francisca Castillo, has five children. Also living in her house are her two sisters and their children. Seeking to help her and her family, the organization was looking for someone who could travel to Guatemala to get Señora Castillo set up in the poultry business. The group contacted Ervin because he travels regularly to Guatemala and other Latin countries to do mission and humanitarian work and is familiar with the language, culture, and customs of Guatemala. Having been paramedic for many years,

Ervin uses his skills to provide medical care for people in remote areas of Central and South America.

Needing some help with the project, Ervin asked Cole, a fellow EMT, to accompany him. After weeks of preparation, the pair left to Guatemala City on Jan. 5th. These preparations involved purchasing tools and supplies for the project, as well as buying much needed supplies for the family, including medicine, school supplies, clothing, and other necessities.

Arriving in the capital of Guatemala City, Cole and Ervin rented a car and set out for their final destination. Traveling across country for 2 days, they arrived in the capital of Huehuetenango province, where they began seeking out the materials they would need and arranging transportation to the home of Señora Castillo. These tasks took several days. During that time, they were assisted by a Guatemalan whose name they had been given, Guillermo Weikert. This generous and hard-working friend quickly found fast and efficient ways to accomplish the preparations. Cole and Ervin left the capital and headed for Chuklis, the remote mountain village where the Señora lives, some three hours from the city.

Working during all daylight hour, construction of the poultry shelter took several days. It consisted of a tin-covered house which contained the nests, roosts, and feed/water equipment. A pen was erected outside in a manner which allowed the chickens to go outside for light and air. Señora Castillo was instructed in the care of the birds, as well as how to gather and market the eggs. Finally the birds were brought and put into the shelter. After a short time of getting acquainted, they began to feel at home and

climbed up to roost on the perches provided.

When the gallinero (chicken house) was completed, the Señora was called to inspect the structure. Her face lit up with joy as she looked it over. However, she soon began to look sad, then to cry. Asked what made her sad, she replied, in tear-choked Spanish, "I have never dreamed of owning anything so fine. I only wish my husband could be here to share it with me." After a Bible study and a time of prayer, Cole and Ervin left to return to Huehuetenango, then to Guatemala City.

Ervin found it ironic that the home of Señora Castillo where he was working was only two hours from the home of his daughter, Chantel, who is a missionary in southern Mexico. An employee in a Bible college, her schedule would not permit her to go to help with the construction project. However, she was able to meet for a few days with her Dad in Antigua, a city in the south of Guatemala, before they returned to the States.

Asked about his experiences in mission work in Guatemala, Cole replied, "We have a responsibility. To people here in our country, we just built a chicken house, but to this lady and her family, we provided a means for her to support herself and her children. God blessed us all greatly in this work."

When he was asked by a Guatemalan why they were willing to travel to another country at their own expense to help someone, Ervin replied, "We are Christians. We follow the example of Jesus Christ in helping those who are unfortunate, and the words of Solomon in Ecc. 2:3 to do good to all men. We believe that when someone has a need and we have the means of meeting that need,

we have the responsibility." In addition to the work they did for the Castillo family, Cole and Ervin distributed Spanish Bibles, held Bible studies, checked into the procedures for adopting Guatemalan children into the States, and visited a hospital operated by the Churches of Christ in the U.S.

Cole and Ervin are already planning their next trip together. Ervin, who is the Asst. Director of Panama Missions, a mission group that works in that country, will lead a larger team to a remote area of Eastern Panama in April.

### Which Tint Color?

If bright light bothers your eyes or if you like the appearance of tinted glasses, you have a wide range of tints to select from. The shade you select is a matter of personal preference. However, example, some experts recommend beige, brown, or gray lenses for someone with a ruddy complexion. For someone with a dark skin, a rich brown or burgundy might be more flattering than pastels. For blondes, some experts recommend a sunny yellow. Light complexioned people with gray hair, however, might want to consider a light blue lens. If eye comfort is a primary motive, pink, rose, or flesh-colored lenses are recommended for those who work under harsh or glaring indoor light. Tinted lenses are usually not recommended, however, for night driving or fine precision work.

Whatever tinted lens is your preference, you will need a carefully prescribed lens to give you the best vision correction.

## Bluegrass Music Show At VFW

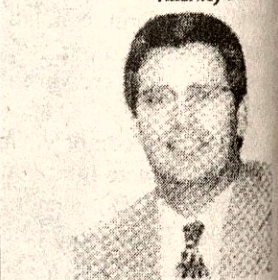

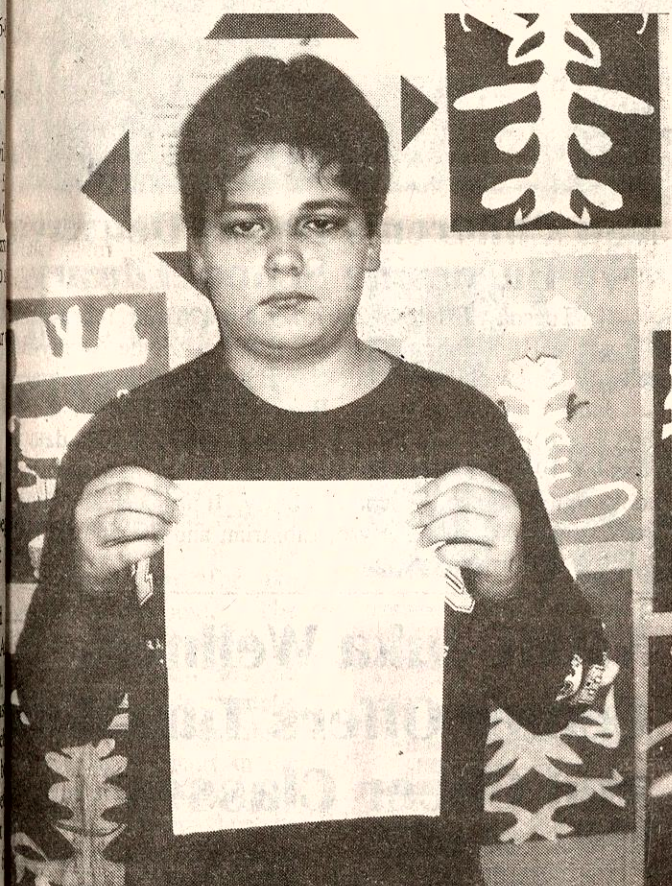

## Senior Citizens Target Of Medical Scams

The Better Business Bureau of Mississippi warns seniors to protect themselves against current medical insurance and Medicare scams.

Seniors are likely to become identity theft victims or experience illegal bank withdrawals after giving out personal information to solicitors, especially over the phone.

Automated messages from supposed insurance companies request the seniors to contact the company. Upon doing so they are told that their Medicare prescription plan's premium has not been received due to a glitch in the system and they are asked to provide personal information to

straighten out the problem. This is a ploy that can lead to identity theft.

"Seniors are often eager to make sure that their medical payments are up-to-date and are often unaware of this type of fraud" said Bill Moak,

President/CEO of the BBB Mississippi. "Seniors often let anxiety cloud their judgment in situations where they are victims of a fraud attempt. We encourage everyone to take time, think about the situation, talk to family and friends, and contact the BBB before revealing personal identity information."

## Indian Children's Choir To Perform In Area Churches

The famous India Children's Choir is on a ten-month tour of the United States, with stops in Belmont, MS and Red Bay, AL. Sunday, February 18th the 22-member choir will be performing at Calvary Baptist in Belmont at 11:00 a.m. and Red Bay First Baptist at 6:00 p.m.

The choir comes from the hills of Manipur on the India-Burma-China border and tell the story of their people's transformation from fierce headhunters, only two generations ago, to ambassadors for Christ. A Gospel of John was given to the tribal leaders in the early 1900's which set things into motion. Since that time Dr. Rochunga Pudaite

translated the Bible into the Hmar language for his people, and today 98% of the tribe claim Jesus Christ as their Lord. The children, ranging in age from eight to twelve years old, are direct descendants of these former headhunters.

Dr. Pudaite, along with his wife Mawii, founded Bibles for the World in 1972, a mission dedicated to sharing the Bible with people in their native languages on a global scale. 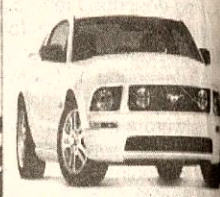

Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by this agency and will be provided to other agencies only in accord with the Family Rights and privacy Act and EHA-B. As a parent, you are guaranteed the right to inspect any such information about your child and to challenge its accuracy. Access to this information is forbidden to

any unauthorized person without informed consent.

Please contact Betty Barnes, Child Find, Contact Person for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, if you know any children who may have a disability by calling 423-3206 or writing her at the following address: Tishomingo County Schools, 1620 Paul Edmondson Drive, Iuka, MS 38852.

The Child Find Person implements child identification, location, and evaluation of children birth through twenty-one who have disabilities, regardless of the severity of their disability, and who are in need of special education and/or related services. The Child Find Person works with the local Head Starts, Human Services, Health Department, and Mental Health Agencies, as well as local education agencies, physicians, and other individuals to identify and locate children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services.

Once a referral is made, it

is the responsibility of the Child Find Contact Person to insure that the Referral-to-Placement Procedures are followed. She works with the Local Survey Committee at each school to implement these procedures. The following activities briefly describe the procedures.

As a part of Child Study, parents are invited to attend a Local Survey Committee Meeting to review a child's educational record and performance and determine a need for an evaluation. Prior to an evaluation, copies of the Parent Information Pamphlet and Procedural Safeguards are given to the parents. District personnel explain these copies to the parents and insure that they understand the Procedural Safeguards. This process will be reviewed at each parent meeting.

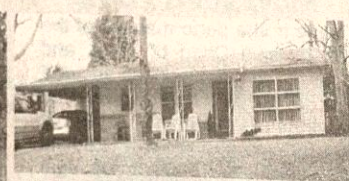

## State Unemployment Rate Up For December

Mississippi's unemployment rate inched up from November's rate of 6.9 percent to 7.0 percent in December, the Mississippi Department of Employment Security announced last week.

Tishomingo ranked as number 45 in the state with a 8.0 percent unemployment rate—a point over the state-wide ranking.

"Largely due to seasonal hiring in the retail trade industry, the number of unemployed Mississippians increased by roughly 7,900 over the month while the

number of jobless increased by 1,200 people as additional people sought temporary employment during the holiday season," said Wayne Gasson, "Chief of Labor Market Information."

December's rate a year ago was 8.3 percent and the U.S. rate as a whole held

steady at 4.3 percent, only three tenths of a percentage point lower than a year ago.

Non-farm employment showed an increase of 4,000 jobs. Industries losing jobs including Leisure and

Hospital and Government.

Thirty counties reported unemployment rates equal to or less than Mississippi's rate with DeSoto County recording the lowest rate at 4.0 percent followed by Lamar and Rankin Counties at 4.3 percent. Jefferson and Noxubee Counties posted the highest rates at 14.7 and 14.4 percent. Eighteen counties posted double-digit rates.

"We could see an increase in the unemployment rate in January due partly from post holiday layoffs in retail," said Wayne Gasson, Chief of Labor Market Information.

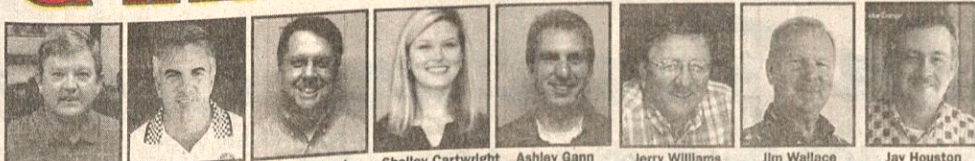

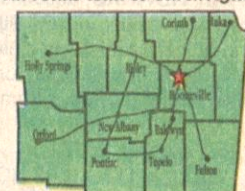

Here of late buzziness haz ben sorter slack an' I tole Unkle Gosh tu git out and see if he coodn't stur up somethin'. I tole him if he

wood stir up a fu little misbemeaness i'de devide the cost with him. I thaut the old fule had sents enuff to no whar tu go, an I didn't tell him erbout that, so he goze aver on Bair Crik and gits him a quart

of muneshine and cums back thru hackleyburg, and picks out a man that looks lack he wood do, so he takes him out behind the Post offis and draws his quart on him. They commense drinkin and Unkle Gosh got tu feelin good and open-harted, so after thay had drank about half uv what they had, Unkle Gosh sold haff uv what ws left to the uther feller, then this feller run an tole the polece thar was a ole codger out about the Post offis what had some whiskey. The Polece found Unkle Gosh out behind the garodge, seted on a nale kag, discussin with an arshman on the tin commanmint.

The offser rested him and found the balace uv his

whiskey. He was put in jale and find twenty ate dollars and cost.

He sent fur me tu cum and help him pay his fien. He sed he accordin to our agreement, I wus due to pay haff the expense. I tole him I

wazint goin to pay a nickel, az he went plum outside uv my Jewishdieshun an cudn't be helt responsibul.

Now, he thretens tu take the case tu court and make me pay.

Now, what I want to know iz, do yew think he can make me pay for his blundder?

The trubble with me iz, thay may hav a Jestis of the Peece an Baliff what has ben havin sorter "slack" bizness over thar.

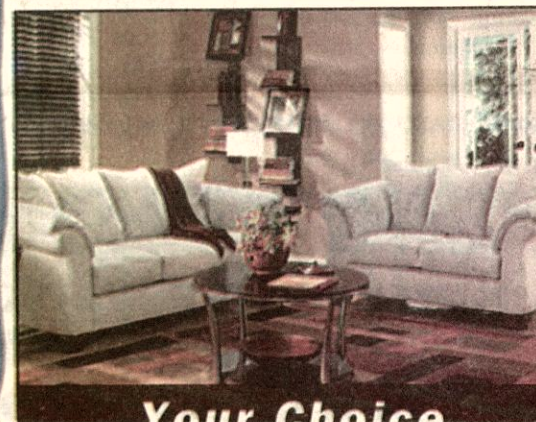

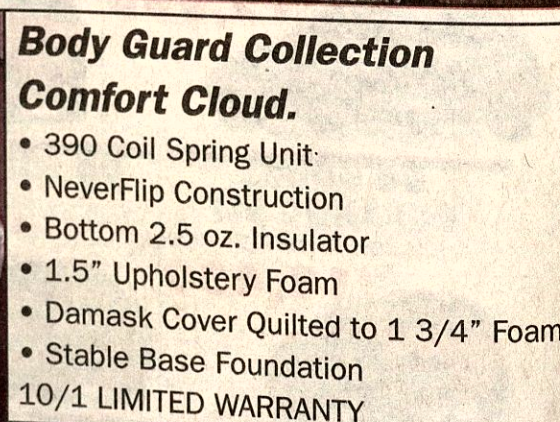
