Iuka Fire Dept. Investigating Cause of Weekend Fire in Former Genesco Building

Officials are investigating a possible arson fire that caused more than \$300,000 in damage to a local warehouse building Thanksgiving week-end.

According to Iuka Fire Chief Brian Grissom, participating police officers Chuck Dean and Mark Bonds located and called in the fire in the GM Wholesale facility, about 12:28 a.m. Friday, November 23rd. Firefighters from Iuka and the surrounding departments fought the fire until 2:30 that afternoon, said Grissom.

Some suspects have been retained, but the investigation is ongoing, said Grissom and Iuka Police Chief Randy Stringer. Chief Stringer verified that it is being investigated as an arson case. The state fire marshal was on the scene Monday examining the site.

The case is also being investigated as a burglary, since the officers could tell the business had been burglarized and some items had been taken, which led to the possible suspect(s).

GM Wholesale, owned by Mike Higginbottom, was located in the east end of the former Genesco shoe factory building on Bettydale Drive in Iuka. He leased the 80,000-square-foot building from Tishomingo County, through the Board of Supervisors.

Higginbottom estimated there is \$300,000 in damage.

GM Wholesale carried miscellaneous outlet store and overstock merchandise, and was listed as one of the sites to visit on the recent Tishomingo County Development Foundation outlet tour campaign.

"We had a larger inventory than usual, since this is our busiest season," said Higginbottom. "We will try to salvage some, but much of the higher-end inventory was in the area that was fire damaged."

He said there was not insurance on the contents, but county officials confirmed that the county had insurance on the building itself.

Higginbottom provided space in the west end of the building for the Food Depot, a charitable organization that distributes food to needy and elderly persons in the county. Art Gaines is the treasurer of the Food Depot, and said that they suffered extensive damage, mostly from smoke and soot.

Additionally, the Junior Auxiliary had some coats for their "Coats for Kids" project in the Food Depot section, which may not be usable. At the November monthly distribution day on the 17th, they placed 275 coats with new owners, Gaines said.

According to Gaines, the county has tentatively pro-

vided an alternate, temporary location for the Food Depot operation in what is known as the incubator building off Paul Edmondson Drive.

Iuka Hospital also was using part of the building for storage, according to Chief Grissom.

Volunteers Needed Dec. 1st to Move Food Depot

This Saturday, Food Depot officials are asking for volunteers to come out to help move salvageable supplies and equipment about 9 a.m. Saturday morning.

Volunteers are asked to bring old towels, a bucket and other cleaning equipment. Also recommended are rubber gloves and a painter's face mask, as all the items in the current facility will need washing or wiping before moving it to the new location.

"We really appreciate all the calls and volunteering even before we had a cleanup or moving plan," said Gaines. "We've had offers of help already from as far as the Ripley food pantry."

"Resort Community Will Bear Cost of Utility District" Says Pickwick Pines Developer

County officials have been fielding numerous inquiries concerning the recent announcement by the Board of Supervisors of a public hearing to establish a new utility district in the northern part of the county.

On Tuesday, developer David McMeans addressed some of the misunderstandings that interested parties have voiced.

On November 8th, the Board started advertising a public hearing scheduled for December 3rd at 10 a.m. at the Tishomingo County Courthouse. The notice stated that the Board planned to create and incorporate a utility district to provide water, sewer, garbage and waste collection to the Pickwick Pines resort community area.

In a prepared release provided to explain Pickwick Pines expansion plans for the next year, McMeans clarified, "Plans are in place to add a conference center, hotel, marina, restaurant, and RV park to the resort's present amenities. Also a separate utility district has been established for Pickwick Pines to provide water, sewer, fire protection

and garbage services to the residents of the resort. All costs associated with the resort's expansion and the new utility district will be paid by Pickwick Pines exclusively. No county funds will be used or new taxes levied to provide any financing for these projects."

This is standard procedure for establishment of a utility district said McMeans in an extended interview. Eighty percent of the area in the proposed utility district is not covered by the Short-Coleman Water District, explained McMeans. And Short-Coleman has released certification of the 20 percent it does cover to Pickwick Pines if it gets a district of its own. It only actually covers an area 500 feet on either side of the highway, which is very few of our homes, explained McMeans.

"The main reason for the new district is to have control of our own destiny, set our own rates and services, and get better fire protection," stated McMeans. "We can go from a Class 9 to a Class 6 rating, and apply for funds as a utility district to set up a fire department." This would be

paid for through the utility bills of the customers served by the system.

In response to questions about the county possibly providing the funds for construction of a conference center, McMeans explained that Pickwick Pines Resort is merely asking for a deal similar to many others the county has facilitated with other industries, including Monotech, Toltech, New River Homes, and Mid-South Drapery and several other businesses, and that the costs would be paid by Pickwick Pines.

"The revenue bonds the county has requested be prepared will not count against the debt cap of Tishomingo County, and will actually provide income to the county since they receive all lease payments and a portion of the bond interest payments," according to the prepared statement provided by McMeans.

"Pickwick Pines and myself, personally, will be guaranteeing the bonds," assured McMeans. "The county simply provides the financial vehicle for industries to borrow money and repay it on a lease

School Maintenance Projects In Work to Improve Facilities

Several school maintenance and construction projects are starting after being approved during the November 15th business session of the Tishomingo County School Board.

The board voted to move all meetings to the third Monday night of each month at 6 p.m., except if there is a school holiday. For example, in January, the meeting will be Tuesday, the 22nd, to work around the Martin Luther King Day holiday.

Location of the meetings are usually at the administrative offices in Iuka, but some may be held in other locations in the county, said district spokesman Joel Robertson. Look for alternate locations to be advertised at Iuka City Hall and the Tishomingo County Courthouse before the meetings.

The board approved that the administration could advertise for bids to construct a

weight room at Tishomingo County High School which could be used by all boys' and girls' sports teams, according to Superintendent Malcolm Kuykendall.

"Right now the weight room is combined with the football locker room, and all the team can't even get dressed out at the same time," explained Kuykendall. "This will free up locker room space, and allow for male and female athletes to use the weight facility."

Also approved was a proposal to build a stage for Belmont School on the north side of the existing gymnasium, which will be used for physical education classes when the new basketball gym is completed. The auditorium at Belmont school has been condemned by two different engineers as unsafe, explained Kuykendall.

"This way, they can offer drama courses, like most other high schools," he said. It

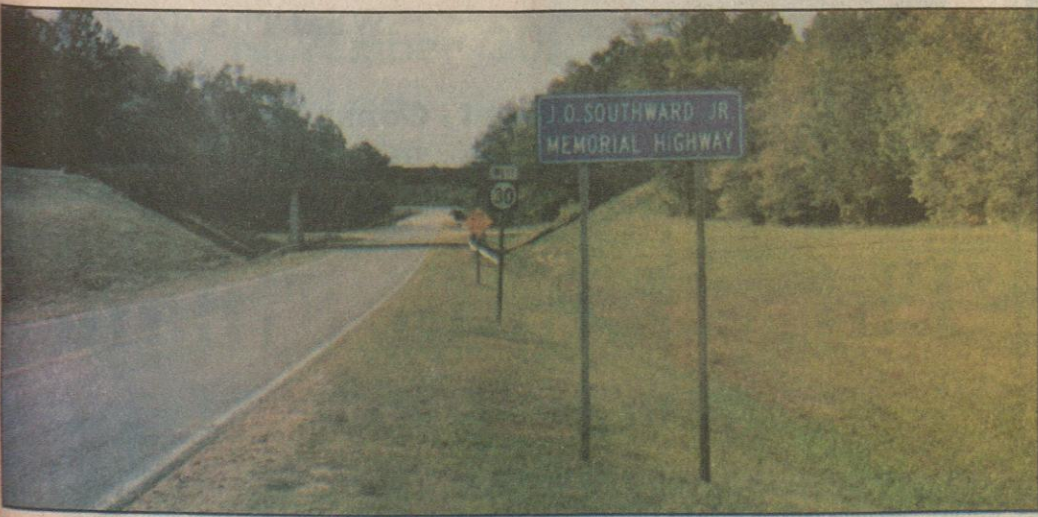
will also be expandable for future growth, Robertson added.

At the Tishomingo School campus, old, leaky windows in the elementary gymnasium have been approved for replacement by Siemens Building Technology, along with windows on the K-2 building and cafeteria. The same company will replace windows on the south side of the main Burnsville School building.

"With buildings at nearly every campus built in the 1930s through the 1960s there is so much maintenance work to be done just to bring our facilities up to acceptable standards," explained Kuykendall.

"We have spent an estimated \$1,100,000 on roof repair and replacement just to try to get all our students in the dry," he said. "We hope to have all the roof work completed by the end of the school year."

State Highway 30 Named J. O. Southward, Jr., Memorial Highway

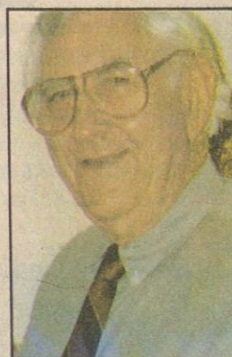


Signs were recently placed along a portion of State Highway 30 in Tishomingo County designating that section of roadway as the J. O. Southward, Jr., Memorial Highway.

The designation was the result of a bill introduced by State Senator J. P. Wilemon, Jr., to honor Southward, who died in March 2006. Southward, of Tishomingo, was a graduate of Tishomingo High School and Mississippi State University. He served in the State House of Representatives from 1952-56 and was active in public affairs throughout his life.

"He was a member of the House of Representatives when Highway 30 was paved from Tishomingo to Booneville," said Wilemon. "He had been a hard worker representing Tishomingo County."

Under the Senate bill, approximately 10 miles of highway from the Prentiss-Tishomingo County line to the entrance road of the Natchez Trace Parkway is now named in Southward's honor. The legislative act establishing the memorial has been in effect since July 1 of this year.

Former Inmate 46857 (Eddie Spencer) To Speak At TCHS

Eddie Spencer will speak at Tishomingo County High School on Thursday night, November 29th at 6:30 p.m. Don't miss the opportunity to hear this former inmate relate the compelling events of his young life which led to him being sentenced to Parchman Penitentiary.

Hear him tell about the night he sat on his prison cot at Parchman Penitentiary fingering his homemade knife and contemplating murdering two fellow inmates just to strengthen his tough reputation. As the nineteen-year old convict visualized himself stabbing his intended victims, God intervened. The encounter took only a moment, but getting there had taken a lifetime. Instantly, all the years of anger and rejection flashed before his eyes. As memories flooded back, Inmate 46857 felt the pain and poverty of his childhood. He remembered the morning his only pair of shoes had fallen apart and his mother sent him to school wearing his sister's shoes. As Eddie stepped into his first

grade classroom, his classmates taunted him for wearing "little-girl" shoes. Humiliation and revenge gripped his young mind, launching him into a journey of crime and violence in the streets of the Mississippi Delta.

Eddie Spencer will tell how his life was changed the night he sat on his prison cot with his homemade knife. After being released from prison in 1988, Eddie Spencer left prison a free man. For several years he worked with young people in and around the Jackson area and was recognized by USA Today as one of fifty national drug-fighting heroes. Currently, Eddie has a ministry speaking at schools, churches and conferences. He is also the author of two books.

The Food Depot is an inter-denominational charitable food distribution ministry that serves about 1,200 persons per month.

Art serves now as the treasurer of the all-volunteer organization, but Mrs. Edna is still very active in the everyday affairs. Both were a part of a group from Harmony Church who 10 years ago spearheaded the formation of what is now an organization with about 85 to 100 active volunteers who provide boxes of basic foods to qualified participants on the third Saturday of each month.

"Churches from all denominations worked together to make this endeavor work," said Edna. "It's one of the few examples we have of people at both ends of the county working together on anything."

"The Food Depot serves alongside the Helpful Samaritan Food Pantry, which handles more immediate and emergency needs" explained

Art. The Food Depot screens applicants and provides food to them as long as they qualify, based on their income, and applicants are re-examined every 90 days for qualification in the program.

Last month they distributed 712 40-pound boxes of food, and usually pass out 25,000 to 30,000 pounds of food a month. The last two months of the year are some of their busiest, Art said.

Recently Art and Edna accepted, on behalf of the Food Depot, the first-ever Feed the Need Award for Agency of the Year from The Food Bank in Memphis, which is a supplier of the food

the Depot distributes.

Last weekend the Depot suffered a major blow when the building in which it is located caught fire. Plans are being made to clean up and salvage most of the equipment and inventory on Saturday morning.

Art and Edna have four children and 8 grandchildren and they love to travel, but since they got involved in the Food Pantry, they don't get to much, they said.

Be sure to look for Art and Edna in the parade this Friday night and thank them for their contribution to the community by volunteering at the Food Depot.

Through the church, the Crandalls have a clothing give-away program that provides donated clothing free to anyone who needs it.

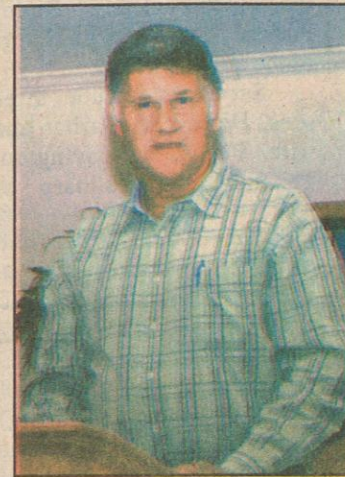

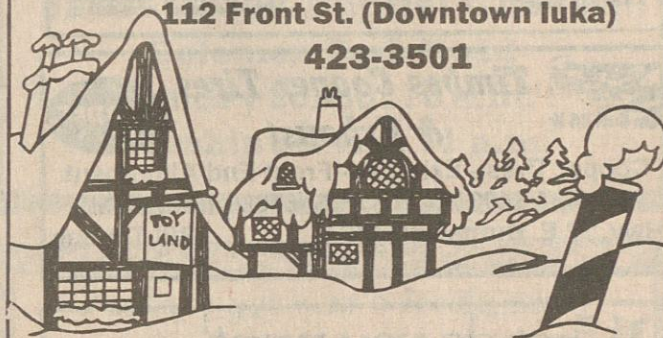

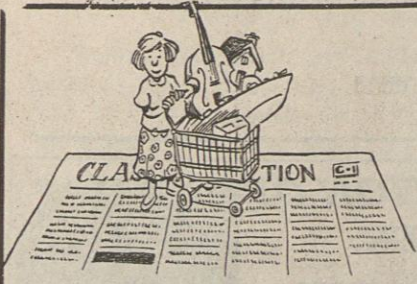

agreement," he explained. "Plus the county gets increased industry or business, which is good for everyone."

This method has been used successfully with other industries, and expansions, like New River Homes in the Waterway Industrial Park in Burnsville.

The following information was included in the release:

McMeans opened Pickwick Pines in 2001 and has sold close to 300 homes.

"Because resort property is appraised similar to lake-front property, this has established Pickwick Pines as one of the largest taxpayers in Tishomingo County.

About 100-150 persons have been employed in the last 6 years, said McMeans in the release. The majority of this revenue remains in the area and is much more valuable than the typical manufacturer that sells their products out of state. All of this has been accomplished with zero dollars of investment from the taxpayers of Tishomingo County.

The Tishomingo County Economic Development Board and the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors have recognized the potential for economic growth from tourism. These boards believe that the County's proximity to Pickwick Lake affords Tishomingo County opportunities that are not available to other surrounding counties.

The Mississippi Development Authority has stated that the return on investment from tourism is much greater than that from manufacturing and is most likely the future of Tishomingo County.

Crossed Eyes

There are many misconceptions about crossed eyes (strabismus). Many people think of crossed eyes as looking at each other. Actually, they can assume many forms. Once the condition is diagnosed, the treatment can be embarked on to straighten the eyes. Provided the condition is discovered early, results are very favorable.
