Former County Employee Indicted for Embezzlement

A former Tishomingo County employee has been indicted on five counts of embezzlement announced State Auditor Stacy Pickering in a press release late Tuesday.

Norma Lomenick, who worked as Deputy Chancery Clerk from 1988 to 2003, was indicted by the sheriff's department last Friday after being indicted on five counts of embezzlement by the grand jury. She was released on bond, and is scheduled to be arraigned this Thursday morning in Tishomingo County Circuit Court.

According to the auditor's office spokesperson Lisa Shoemaker, the investigation looked at funds embezzled from January 2001 through September 2003, and involved the land reclamation process.

Total funds embezzled were \$15,032.12 and interest was \$8,352.49. In addition, the amount demanded included \$8,244.56 for investigative costs incurred the

State Auditor's Office, bringing the total of the demand to \$31,629.17.

Lomenick paid the full amount of \$31,632.17 to the State Auditor's Clearing Account in June 2008. County officials have verified that the money has been dispersed to the appropriate individual(s).

After issuing the demand, investigators presented the case to the District Attorney, stated the release from Pickering on Tuesday afternoon. Assistant District Attorney Arch Bullard said he was unable to comment on the case until after the Thursday arraignment.

Lomenick is currently employed as District 2 Area Coordinator for the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency. She is responsible for eight counties in Northeast Mississippi. Shoemaker verified that the auditor's investigation concerned only the Tishomingo County Chancery Clerk's office.

Supervisors Delay Decision on Landfill Renovations

At the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors regular third Monday meeting, the board opted to examine their plans for the county landfill.

Board President Brandon Grissom opened quotes for projects: renovation of loading area at the transfer station, and another to build a barn in which to store equipment. The bids four bids received ran from \$14,250 to \$746 and included roll up doors, options for insulation, and other features that caused Second District Supervisor Nicky McRae to state, "I thought this was going to be a barn."

The board had asked landfill supervisor Mike Grissom to come up with a design for fixing a sinking concrete pad at the transfer station, and they anticipated the cost coming in much lower than the \$24,785-\$27,500 received from four bids.

Board members discussed issues like rising construction costs, and the weather working against

construction in upcoming months as factors in rejecting all the bids and reexamining the possibility of moving the transfer station operation to the rubbish landfill area.

Currently the two facilities split landfill personnel, equipment and resources, and the board said that perhaps this was the time to combine the two operations at one site, as such a move would cost just a little more, and was an action they anticipate doing in the future anyway.

Red Bud Rd. Temporarily Closed

Due to ongoing construction, the south end of County Road 864, or Red Bud Road, will be closed until probably next Monday, November 24th, announced Fifth District Supervisor James McDowell.

McDowell recommended motorists take a detour on Highway 4 or Moore's Mill Road to avoid the closed area.

Dynasteel Announces Expansion

Dynasteel Corporation announced an expansion of its Yellow Creek Port facility.

According to President Russell, the Memphis-based corporation's expansion involves a 42,000 square foot building with 45-foot hook height and cranes ranging from 10 to 50 tons. The new building will also contain a unique loading and blueprint reading classroom for on site

training.

Dynasteel is a specialty fabricator of pollution control equipment for electric power plants, process equipment for cement mills, and other specialty fabrication with production facilities at Iuka and Natchez.

With 150 team members, the facility is seeking additional welders and workers in other metal trades. Ideally, they would like 50 more welders, but are willing to

train 50 to do the work they require.

Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors President Brandon Grissom said, "Dynasteel has seen steady growth over the last five years, and this is the company's second expansion within the last two years. Dynasteel's commitment to quality and timely delivery means the company will continue to compete well in the global marketplace."

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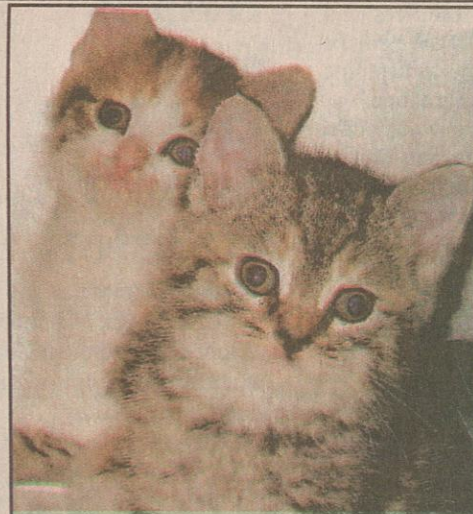


The Myopia Myth?

It is estimated that a full 25% of our population is myopic (nearsighted). Some say this is an inherited condition. Statistics disprove this. Before age 10, approximately 4 to 6% of the population is nearsighted. When these same children finish college, the number varies from 60 to 80%, with a higher percentage among the honor and graduate students. Evidently, there is a connection between the amount of reading we do and nearsightedness.

In a survey of Eskimo families, only 2% of the children, who could not read or write showed myopia. Yet among their children who were attending school, approximately 65% were nearsighted. This happened in a single generation in a population known to be somewhat farsighted.

Yet, some still believe that nearsightedness is inherited, that it tends to run in families, although this example shows massive reversal in a single generation. Genetics cannot account for it.

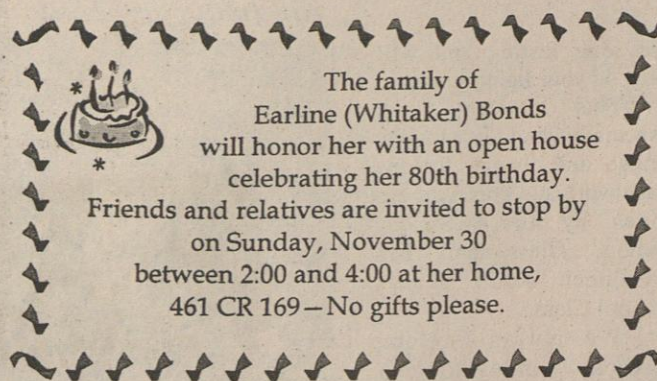
When God Confirms Blindness
Have you ever wondered why some people do not seem to understand much of anything about the Bible? I realize that none of us understands everything in the Word of God, nor do all of us together understand it all.

The fact remains that some people understand much more than others. Why is this true? Would it surprise any of you if I were to say that the problem rests with those who hear the Word of God. Mark 4:23-25 says, "If any man have ears to hear, let him hear. And he said unto them, Take heed what ye hear: with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you: and unto you that hear shall more be given. For he that hath, to him it shall be given: and he that hath not, from him shall be taken even that which he hath."

The above words of Jesus are very interesting. He gives us the indication that our ears are for the purpose of hearing! The point, however, is that we must use our ears for hearing what God has to

say. We must hear with rapt attention to what God is telling us in His Word. This is why Jesus said that we should take heed what we hear, or, as one gospel puts it, we should take heed how we hear (see Luke 8:18). There is a difference between hearing the sound of words and actually paying close attention to the message of those words! It is the latter that Jesus has in mind. Those who measure their attention span with a small measure will have a small measure of understanding; this is exactly what Jesus is saying by the word "mete", which means "to measure".

Those who measure their time in the Word of God with a "small measure" will have a "small measure" of understanding of the Word! Those who hear will receive more understanding, but those who have not much understanding, because of their laziness and lack of attention, will lose even the amount of understanding that they do have! How much understanding do we want? How much time do we measure out for the Word of God and the work of God?

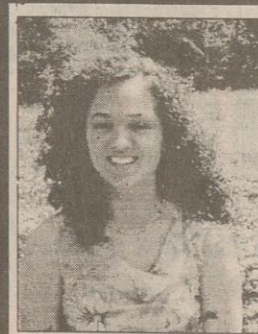

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Tishomingo County Development Foundation Holds Annual Meeting

Chairman Bob Carter welcomed the crowd and reported that the annual meeting was partly funded by BancorpSouth, First American National Bank, Renasant Bank, and Spirit Bank. Dr. Ronnie Hatfield, pastor of Iuka Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

Chairman Carter recognized special guests Sam Shepherd, John Bolan, Ms. Tommie Merimon, Dave Wieties, Peanut Hollinger, A. B. Isbell, Norman Isbell, Doug Martel, and Christine Martel who are working on potential economic development projects in Tishomingo County.

Chairman Carter reported that 2008 was a tough year because of the global recession, but there may be potential economic

breakthroughs on the horizon for Tishomingo County. We are working on a significant number of new and expanded projects. Our progress is due to partnerships, teamwork, persistence, and patience. The worsening economy means that we must be more innovative and creative than ever. We cannot do things the same way and expect different results. Let us continue to create new jobs from all sources and diversify our economy.

The greatest unrealized potential for new jobs in Tishomingo County is tourism. The Mississippi Development Authority released the Fiscal Year 2007 Tourism Impact Report in 2008. The report found that tourism is the sixth largest employer in the state. The re-

port documented that \$1 invested in tourism advertising yielded a \$10 return on investment.

According to the MDA report, visitors in Tishomingo County spent \$10,096,800 in 2007, an increase of \$660,976 in one year, one of the largest percentage increases of any county in Mississippi. Direct tourism employment in Tishomingo County in 2007 is 166. Tourism-related sales taxes rebated to municipalities in Tishomingo County were \$102,631 in 2007.

One way to get the word out about the "Best Kept Secret of the South" is special events like Trash to Treasures.

The 2008 Trash & Treasures along the Tennessee was a resounding success. Residents and sellers reported buyers from all the surrounding counties as well as several states as far away as Texas and Oklahoma. Local restaurants were pleased, with most reporting increases in sales of 50% or more. One convenience store owner reported that she "did more business during the two day event than in the previous three months."

Another way to increase jobs from tourism is to continue to work with potential investors such as the Martel Group. Doug and Christine Martel, we appreciate your consideration of Tishomingo County for a major investment.

All of us here tonight are partners in improving the economy of Tishomingo County and the State of Mississippi. We thank all of our partners and we would like to offer special thanks to a few.

We especially want to express our appreciation to the board of supervisors, Brandon Grissom, James McDowell, Nicky McRae, Danny Ryan, & Steve Thorne.

The Tourism Council paid for advertisements in national travel, sporting, retirement, and tourism related magazines such as Budget Travel, Compass Family Insert, Memphis Magazine, Mississippi Magazine, Trailer Life Magazine, Life on the Water Magazine, Mid-South Magazine, Retirement Lifestyles Magazine, Young at Heart, several local and regional newspapers, and

the Mississippi Tour Guide. The tourism council and the development foundation partnered on a new format full-color visitor's guide. 30,000 copies were printed and most were distributed. TCTC and TCDF are joint members of the Natchez Trace Compact which helps to promote communities along the Natchez Trace Parkway via a web site, printed and electronic materials, and advertising in media sources. TCTC and TCDF are also joint members of the Mississippi Hills Heritage Area Alliance that markets the region's historic and cultural heritage. The tourism council members attend special events and conferences to promote Tishomingo County. Tourism Council members are already busy with plans for the October 2 & 3, 2009, Trash and Treasures event.

Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority Chairman Jimmy Ramsey offered the nominations from the TCDF executive committee: Peyton Cummings, 2009 Chairman, Wayne Stanfield, Vice Chairman, Dan Young, First Vice Chairman, and Dale Curtis, Secretary-Treasurer.

Mississippi Development Authority Regional Director Bill Mobley gave a short assessment of the economic development advantages and disadvantages of Tishomingo County. This is addressed to the person who mails unsigned letters to people in the Shutdown Community and Iuka...

I would like to clear up some mistakes or deceptions in your letter.

(1.) You need to tell the people you are writing to that this young man's parents lived with him in his house. You attempted to deceive people in this.

(2.) When it comes to caring for elderly parents, a lot of people find situations "they just can't tolerate". Yet some people go the second or even the third mile to care for their parents. He is one of those people. I personally cannot see how you justify not speaking to a parent for seven years.

(3.) "What these two men do together is an abomination before God" According to the laws of Moses, you committed "an abomination before God" every time you eat catfish. Christ came to fulfill the law and put us under the law of His grace. I think your letters have revealed more about you than about him. He has lived among us all his life. We know him to be a kind and helpful person. He does a good job, charges reasonable rates, and is thus appreciated by the people of this area.

Here are a few things your letter made me believe

Letter From Concerned Citizen of Burnsville

This is a follow up of a letter that I sent to you earlier this year about the Burnsville Police Department. I had hoped that there would be improvements by this time but there has not! In fact, even though Mr. Lambert has been appointed Chief of Police in Burnsville things have only gotten worse. He has just as much of a police officer, yet maybe not as bad as Officer Lindsey Timbes. The David Nixon has failed miserably as well by allowing the police to treat the citizens the way they want by not being able to keep the peace in Burnsville and making sure that the laws are followed without showing favor.

Burnsville PD pulled a car over that pulled into the drive of Brandon Eaton when it stopped. Eaton came out to see what was going on and was arrested in his own yard by Burnsville Police Officer Eric Harris with Officer Brandon Lambert and Officer Glover as back up from county and assisted by Officer Timbes. Mr. Eaton was arrested for Failure to Comply (97-35-7) because when Officer Harris to go back on his porch, he moved back and sat on the back of his car, 30 feet or more away from where he was, some thirty plus feet away. I went to court to see what would be said and none of the three officers said they felt threatened by Mr. Eaton when asked but he was still found guilty by Sparks, who is the Burnsville Judge as well as a County Judge. To me, this is just a nit-picking by these police officers to pad their stats.

This law (97-35-7) was meant to be used as a way for officers to be able to protect themselves and others around them if needed; not as a way to just order innocent citizens around like puppets at the limits which citizens and what citizens have to comply with. The police can ask and most people will comply, but if they don't, they have not broken any law. The police have no right to order bystanders to do anything but to move back if too close for their safety and yours, but only if needed. A police officer that can't handle someone watching them or even looking over their shoulder from behind them should not be allowed to be a police officer. Any and all officers that abuse this law do not only to the citizens they are sworn to protect, but to all other officers who use this law the way it was meant to be used. The Supreme Court has ruled time and time again that citizens have the right to be in the police from a safe distance and at a place of their choosing, not the police, so long as this is a country. If you don't believe it you can look it up for yourself. Having a choice is what freedom is and not having to do what the police tell us to do is part of what makes this a free country.

Now there have been more problems with what the police have done or not done when they should have. Shanna Butler went to City Hall and reported to the City Clerk, Jill, that she and her daughter had been getting vulgar and threatening text messages from a woman. Ms. Butler showed the messages to the City Clerk, Jill, who said that Ms. Butler could take out papers on her for the text messages. Ms. Butler did and the City Clerk, Jill, filed it as Profane and Indecent Language Over Telephone (97-29-45) which is a misdemeanor. Even though it should have been filed as Cyber Stalking (97-45-15) which is a felony because it was clearly meant to harass and threaten Ms. Butler and her daughter. Text messages sent to a cell phone by all accounts is electronic communication and should not be confused with a regular phone that you can only use for voice communications which is what MS law (97-29-45) clearly states.

When Officer Brandon Lambert and another officer were told about the text messages that were sent to Ms. Butler and her daughter, his reply was that he could not prove who sent it, only whose cell phone was sent from and did nothing else but tell her she would have to take out papers on her which she had already done by this time. Because Cyber Stalking (97-45-15) is a felony the police did not need to prove that the owner of the phone sent the text, but just have reasonable suspicion that she did. The fact that the text messages were sent from the suspect's cell phone makes her responsible and is reasonable suspicion. Also the fact that a voice call made from the same number as the text messages were sent to Ms. Butler from the phone left no doubt it was the suspect who sent the text messages. To prove it, the police had to do is call the number that the texts were sent from and if the suspect answered, that was all the reasonable suspicion they needed, to show that she had control over the cell phone that the messages were sent from. The police did not do this or anything else that I know of. It is as if the police are going out of their way to protect the suspect.

When Ms. Butler went to City Hall and filed charges against the woman just after leaving City Hall, a fight broke out between Ms. Butler who had a bat and the woman who had some kind of sharp object. According to witnesses I spoke to, the fight was in the middle of Eastport S. just north of the Burnsville PD Officer Lindsey Timbes was the first on the scene. Officer Timbes only arrested Ms. Butler for aggravated assault (97-3-7).

At a later date, I asked officer Timbes why Ms. Butler was the only one arrested. Officer Timbes said "Ms. Butler was the only one with a weapon." I asked why she did not search the other woman or the woman for the weapon that Ms. Butler tried to tell Officer Timbes that she used, but was called vulgar names by Officer Timbes and cursed Ms. Butler and told to shut up by Officer Timbes according to Ms. Butler. I spoke to as well as others who had gathered by this time. Officer Timbes replied "I didn't see a probable cause". Even though she had to know or should have known about the text messages sent to the woman. As well as the fight that had just happened in the middle of the street, if that isn't probable cause, I don't know what is. I have been searched and had my car searched for much less than that.

I can't prove what Officer Timbes did or did not see. I'm sure she saw what she wanted to see. Two witnesses told me that both women had weapons. Both witnesses were farther away than Officer Timbes says she was but seemed to only see the bat Ms. Butler had. A trained police officer should be able to spot a weapon like a short 12 to 18 inch stick in someone's hand as close as Officer Timbes was. Officer Timbes also said "I was right behind Ms. Butler when the fight broke out". That doesn't sound too well with what the witnesses told me or with what Officer Timbes told me either because the women passed each other on the street and then stopped, meaning that if Officer Timbes was right behind Ms. Butler that Ms. Butler and the woman had to see the police but still got out of their cars and started fighting with the police right there. If the woman didn't have a weapon, as Officer Timbes said, why would she try and fight someone who clearly had a bat as a weapon with the police who have guns? There to protect her. Why didn't they just stay in their cars and keep on going if Officer Timbes was there? In any case, if I was a police officer, I would not want Officer Timbes watching my back. Even though Officer Timbes only works for Burnsville part-time (and not much at that), he works for the county on a full time basis. As a citizen of this town, county and state, I would prefer to have a police officer anywhere in this country and believe that she should be fired for her part in this case.

One of the witnesses I spoke to say the police never asked or any of the witnesses around them were the closest to the fight, what they saw or what happened. Another witness that was the farthest away from the fight said that they didn't want to get involved. I don't believe anyone should be involved in a crime they saw, how ever minor it might seem, but with the way the police do bystanders in Eaton, in this town you can't blame anyone for not wanting to get involved by talking to the police. Fear of being arrested because they didn't do or say exactly what the police wanted them to do or say.

If the City Clerk, Jill, would have filed charges under Cyber Stalking (97-45-15) which is a felony, she could have and should have been filed under and as far as I know, hasn't been even though I tried to point out to Jill after I spoke to one of the lawyers that worked for the DA's office who agreed that it was Cyber Stalking (97-45-15). Who told me where to tell the City Clerk, Jill, she could find the statutes in the law books they have at City Hall. I also gave Jill the name of the lawyer at the DA's office that I spoke to so that she could have talked to them herself. Also, if Jill would have filed the charge as Cyber Stalking (97-45-15) the fight that followed may not have ever happened.

The suspect in the case has since gotten others involved in harassing Ms. Butler, her family and other people who have nothing to do with any of this and are just friends with the family are being harassed and threatened by her and others. She has apparently tried to pay some teenagers \$500 to beat up Butler's teenage son and daughter. She did get a 17 year old boy to fight with Ms. Butler's son. The boy was arrested on unrelated charges after the fight was over and she paid the 17 year old boy \$750. This is the same as paying him directly. It is confirmed that yet, but it goes along with her trying to pay others to do the same thing, which is confirmed but nothing has been done about it by the police or the fight would not have happened.

Even though Ms. Butler was not billed by the Grand Jury of the aggravated assault (97-3-7) charge by Officer Timbes, she has now been indicted by the Grand Jury for the same charge that she has been indicted for by Officer Timbes. Ms. Butler had tried to get her charged with aggravated assault (97-3-7) but Officer Timbes told her and her aunt that she couldn't charge her with that because she didn't have proof that she had a weapon. Ms. Butler has since brought the charge of aggravated assault (97-3-7) but her but has not heard if she was indicted by the Grand Jury. If the police and the City Clerk and the Mayor would have done their jobs, they could have put a stop to all this with the first text messages, but they not and now it has gotten way out of hand, but don't have anyone to blame but themselves.

No one has done anything to help Ms. Butler or her family, nor have they been able to stop the harassment of Ms. Butler and her family by the woman. Neither the Chief of Police, Brandon Lambert, the Mayor, David Nixon who are the ones that are responsible for keeping the peace and upholding the law, and both have failed miserably. They both should resign and save the town the trouble of having to wait until the next election to be replaced by others more competent to do the jobs.

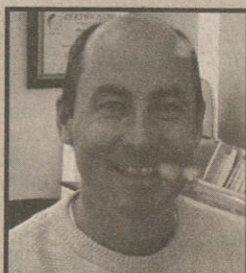

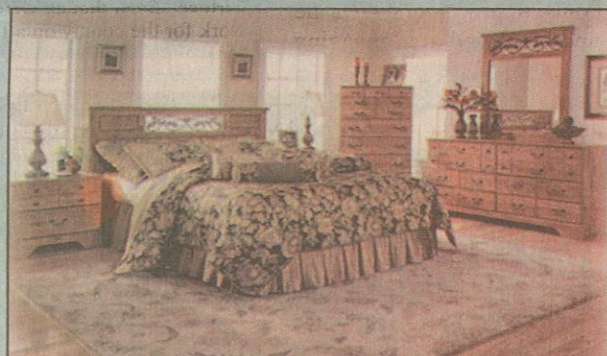

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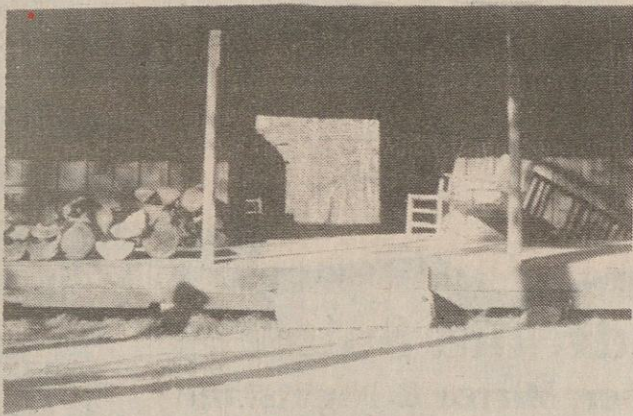

Irene Barnes' Letter About Robinson Creek

Recently Irene Barnes wrote me a long letter relating what she knew about Robinson Creek. I told her that it was better than anything I could compose and asked her permission to include it here as follows:

Dear June,

It's good to know you are "still at it." I am, too, trying to record all the history I can find. I'm 87 now and not able to do much - just what I can sit and do with my hands. I am on a lot of pills, blood pressure, thyroid, osteoporosis, emphysema, enlarged heart and congestive heart failure which means a faulty valve and makes me collect fluid in feet and legs, making them swell big. But that's enough of that complaining. I'm thankful to still be alive.

Justine Robinson Hudson called me and we had a long talk on the phone. I still remember that family but would probably not recognize her. She says she is coming to visit me and was interested in helping you find info on Robinson Creek. So far, I don't know all the details, but here I go with what I've got. As you know Robinson Creek runs into the Tenn-Tom where Kinnie Robertson lived up the hill. I have a picture of his house - the open hall, front porch with stacked wood, and chimney, all this

looks very similar to houses built in that time. Kinnie died February 19, 1982, age 84 years.

My son Danny and I enjoyed hunting Indian arrows. Kinnie told us when they thought nothing much of keeping them, he used to pick up buckets of them, sit on the creek banks and pitch them into the water and wash them down the creek. He agreed to show us about the creek and went with Danny and me. After he went back to his house, I only found a broken piece for each of us. When we compared them, we had both pieces of the same one. Danny glued them together and has it on his framed glass collection of Indian arrows.

When Danny operated a backhoe on the Tenn-Tom, he had to clear out Robinson Creek where it ran into the canal. He unearthed the Robinson gristmill completely buried on the bank. The engineer gave it to Danny and it is still in my backyard. Rusted, of course, but there were wooden spokes, still sound and he put some oil on them to preserve the wood. There were many arrowhead spots down the Tenn-Tom. One was staked off and forbidden for people to search. There were so many spots close to Burnsville and if they found out about it, they held up the digging. They got to keeping it quiet when they found them and went ahead. Danny wasn't

lucky to collect them. He dug them out with his machine, and the foreman collected what he dug.

I talked with Imogene Davis and found out more about Robinson Creek. She said it started up above where her mother's sister, Aunt Hattie and Uncle Crane Robinson lived and on down across the bridge near Imogene's and farther near the Parnell Place where there was an Indian mound, on down below Uncle Charley Biggs' and winding near Kinnie Robertson's into the Tenn-Tom.
