Steadfast Sweethearts: Happily Wed for 58 Years (and counting!)

It's nearly 7 a.m. and right time, Ted and Sue Castleberry walk into the Iuka Wellness Center together. He greets everyone with a hearty "Good Morning!" and she heads straight to the treadmill.

He tries out all the equipment - rows a few minutes, rides a bike a couple minutes, gets on a stretching mechanism and gives the attention-getting groans. He walks briskly as he brings a message to the other people as he leaves the room.

"He's 91, you know," someone nearby says. Hmmm, pretty impressive!

They have been members at Iuka Wellness Center since it opened about 10 years ago. Sue had bypass surgery, and they joined together to improve their health, and have been at it faithfully ever since.

Their steadfast participation in the Wellness Center is indicative of their married life. They are members of the Iuka United Methodist Church, and they participate in senior adult outings and trips. She also helps with caring for flowers to sick friends, and is a bridge regularly.

They have been married since 1951, though Ted says when he met Sue (then she was Sue Cutler) at a dance shortly after he moved to Iuka in 1948 he "knew" she was the one.

It just took him a little while to convince her of that, he explained during a visit this week.

He was a mail carrier as a profession, first in Tusculum, then in Iuka, from which he retired. She has always been a homemaker in what is still a home on historic Eastport Street. The sight of candles lining the windowsills warmed many a winter over the years.

Together they raised two children, John Castleberry, a local banker, and Susan Barrett, a teacher at Iuka Headstart, who praised their example of commitment.

"They have just always been an anchor, a blessing, for me, through some really tough times, and I have loved watching them together all these years," she said.

Her tough times were some of their roughest, too, explained Sue. The hardest thing they ever faced was the death of their grandson in 1993. Susan's son died of brain cancer at age 8, on Easter morning,

after they thought he had beat the disease doctors diagnosed in him as a toddler.

Sue said their faith helps them not only through the most difficult times, but every day. Their little dog Macy, who is "spoiled absolutely rotten," says Ted, surely helps them keep their spirits up, too.

These days they still spend most of their time together, tending to each other and watching over each other.

Commitments like the Castleberry's will be honored at a special reception at the Families First Center on the TCHS campus this Friday at 1 p.m. in honor of this week being designated "Healthy Marriage Week" for the state.

Meth Operation Busted in County

An Iuka man who is already awaiting sentencing on drug charges has been charged again following a stolen property investigation in the north part of the county.

According to Investigator Jason Williamson of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, James Corbit Rippie, 40, has been charged with possession of stolen property and possession of two or more precursors for manufacturing methamphetamine after officers searched the house he was renting for a stolen television.

A 26" flat-screen television was reported stolen from a vacation home in Pickwick Pines Resort, said Williamson. When they received a warrant and searched the rented house at 39 Conner Circle where the suspect was living, they found what investigators described as "a lot of precursors," (ingredients used to manufacture methamphetamine,) and evidence that meth had been cooked and used in the house.

Rippie is already awaiting sentencing for similar felony charges related to a January 2008 arrest.

Williamson said the investigation is ongoing, and there may be additional charges pending.

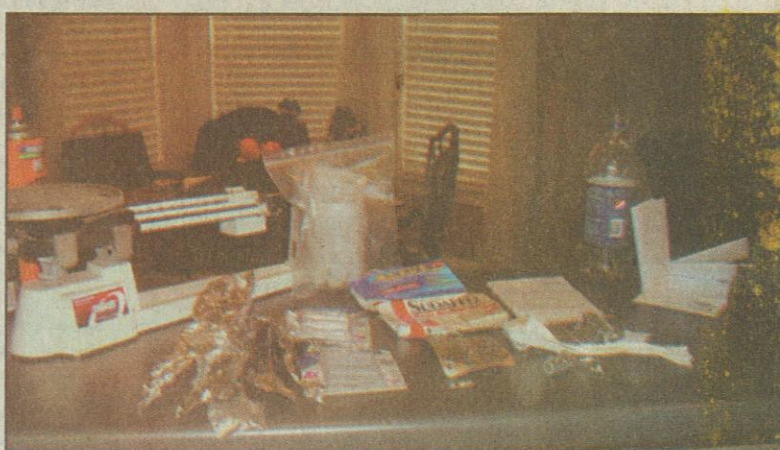

Pleas Heard in Circuit Court

In the January term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court the following pleas were heard, and sentencing announced.

Under Judge James Seth Andrews Pounds:

Curtis Lee Teague, 39, of 5 Lomenick Dr. in Iuka, pled guilty to one count of burglary and larceny of a building, and one count of possession of a stolen firearm. He was sentenced to fifteen and seven years, to run concurrent, with the Mississippi Department of Corrections, with twelve years suspended and five to serve for each, concurrently, and five years of probation. He was ordered to attend alcohol and drug rehabilitation during incarceration, and to pay \$1,399.50 in costs and fines.

Lawrence W. Jones, 59, of 1103 Adams Street, Iuka, pled guilty to driving under the influence - third offense and was sentenced to five years with MDOC and ordered to participate in the house arrest program, with four years post-release supervision (probation) upon release. He was ordered to enter a payment plan to pay \$2,570.50 in costs and fines.

Under Judge James Lamar Roberts, Jr.:

Almous McCoy, 20, of 940 Mockingbird Lane, Iuka, pled guilty to one count of accessory after the fact grand larceny, and received a sentence of five years with MDOC, all suspended, and was placed on probation. He was ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$12,009.98 with a co-defendant, and \$899.50 in fines and costs.

Mark Douglas Tidwell, 43, of 35B CR 23, Dennis, pled guilty to two counts of selling marijuana, and was sentenced to 20 years and three years to run concurrent, all suspended with five years of probation. He was ordered to pay \$2,099 in costs and fees, and \$340 in restitution.

David Franklin Byrd, 47, of Burnsville, pled guilty to one count of burglary and larceny of a dwelling, and was sentenced

to fifteen years with MDOC, ten suspended, five to serve, and five years of post release supervision. He was ordered to pay \$1,540.50 in costs and fines, and \$6,000 restitution jointly with a co-defendant.

John Scott Miller, 28, of 63 CR 260, Burnsville, pled guilty to one count of possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute and was sentenced to 20 years with MDOC, with eighteen suspended and two to serve, and five years probation. He was ordered to pay \$2,454.50 in fines and costs, and \$35 in restitution.

TCHS Braves Advance in District Tournament

The TCHS Braves beat Itawamba AHS 79-78 Tuesday night in an exciting last minute victory on Itawamba's home turf.

The win in the first game of the district 1-4A tournament assures the Braves of a spot in the North Half tournament next week, probably on Tuesday night. A win against Pontotoc Wednesday night will mean a home court advantage.

Late in the fourth period, senior standout Tyler Pritchard (who already scored 25 for TC) fouled out, and sophomore Luke White went in for him.

"I told Luke," said Coach Donald Borden, "You are a good shooter, don't be afraid to make the shot."

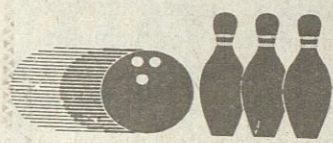

Insight Into Eyesight

Sudden Flashes And The Retina

If you've been disturbed by sudden flashes in your eyes, this may be caused by an irritation of the retina. The retina is a layer of light-sensitive cells located in the back of the eye. When it is stimulated (or in this case irritated) it is capable of sending only one sensation to the brain: light. Just as the nerves in other organs have specific purposes - the ear for receiving sounds, the nose for smell and so forth - light is the only sensation the retina can transmit. Even if the retina was pricked with a sharp pin, the only sensation it would transmit to the brain would be a flash of light.

Even a tiny pull on the retina or a momentary stress on a tiny blood vessel caused by a slight rise in blood pressure may result in a flash of light to the brain. An occasional flash may be harmless. But it may also be an early warning of detachment of the retina, which can cause serious vision problems. Only an examination by your eye specialist can determine the cause and how it can best be treated.

NMMC-Iuka Selects Employee Of The Quarter

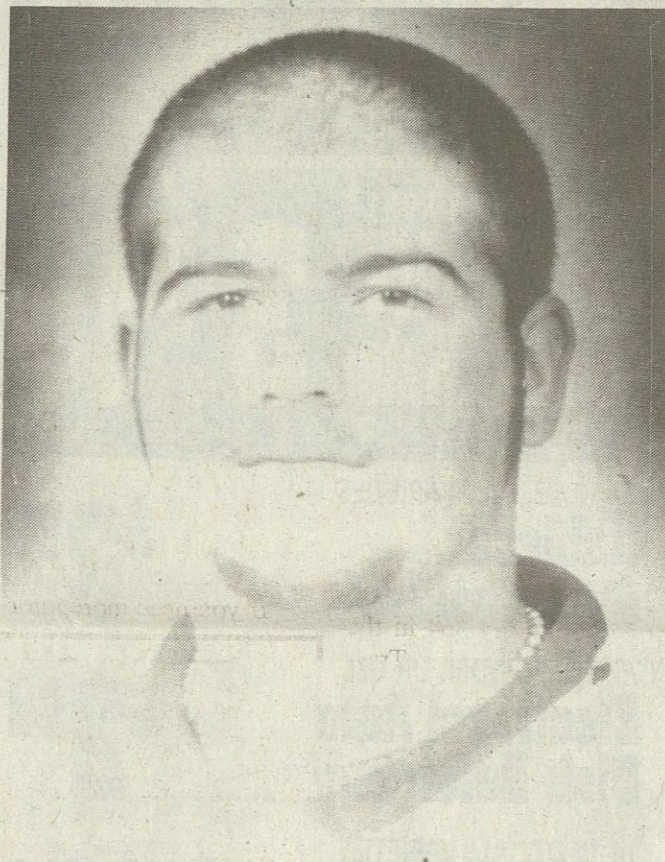
Jayne Davis has been selected as the most recent Employee of the Quarter at North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka.

Iuka Native Makes \$2.5 million Donation to Lawrence Technological University

Southfield, Mich.—A Memphis, Tenn.-based musician and entrepreneur has donated \$2.5 million to name the Department of Mechanical Engineering at Lawrence Technological University in Southfield, Michigan.

The donor is Iuka native A. Leon Linton, the founder and CEO of Southfield Systems Inc. (SSI) of Memphis, which designs, builds and installs custom conveyor systems for manufacturing and distribution facilities. He received a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Lawrence Tech in 1962.

"The education I received at Lawrence Tech has been the backbone of the activities I have done throughout my working life," Linton said.

"We are delighted that the Department of Mechanical Engineering, one of the university's largest departments will now be further distinguished by carrying the name of one of its most successful graduates," Lawrence Tech President Lewis N. Walker.

Leon Linton was born in Iuka, Mississippi on the Tennessee River about 90 miles from Memphis. His parents, Julius and Levetah Linton and family, moved to Michigan when he was

12 years after his father—a World War II veteran returned from Okinawa—took a construction job in Milford. After his father was transferred to another construction project, Linton finished high school in Ypsilanti. Because Linton was the eldest grandson, he was enlisted by his parents to return to Iuka for the ninth, tenth and eleventh grades to live with and care for his 72 year-old grandmother (Ethel Laxson) and his 94 year-old great-grandmother (Brandt). He helped his grandmother with the family's small corner grocery, learned to operate the attached gristmill to make many varieties of cornmeal and performed various other areas of work previously done by his recently deceased grandfather. As a side activity, he started his own "stove wood business" for spending money. He says some of his most enjoyable

memories of Iuka include taking his grandmother and great-grandmother fishing on Thursday afternoons at Mill Creek, when the Iuka stores closed for a half day; also, participating in Sunday School, Church, Choir and BTU at Iuka Baptist Church. He adds that while at IHS, he received much inspiration from "Mamie Clark", who taught history, English, and lectured us on opportunities available to us in this land of America, and from Professor Davis, who taught mathematics.

"I was most proud of my IHS training when returning to live with my parents in Michigan for my senior high school year and being able to compete with fellow students at the limited enrollment high school on the Campus of Eastern Michigan University," states, Linton. "The IHS Yearbook, for my junior year, had the caption 'Most Studious', one of the best high school honors anyone could have received, and also, pictured me as a very 'skinny' 6 foot boy. The desire to study has stuck with me, It is hard to believe that 'skinny' ever existed."

While in high school in Michigan, Linton began a millwright craftsman trade apprenticeship and worked the night shift at a Lincoln

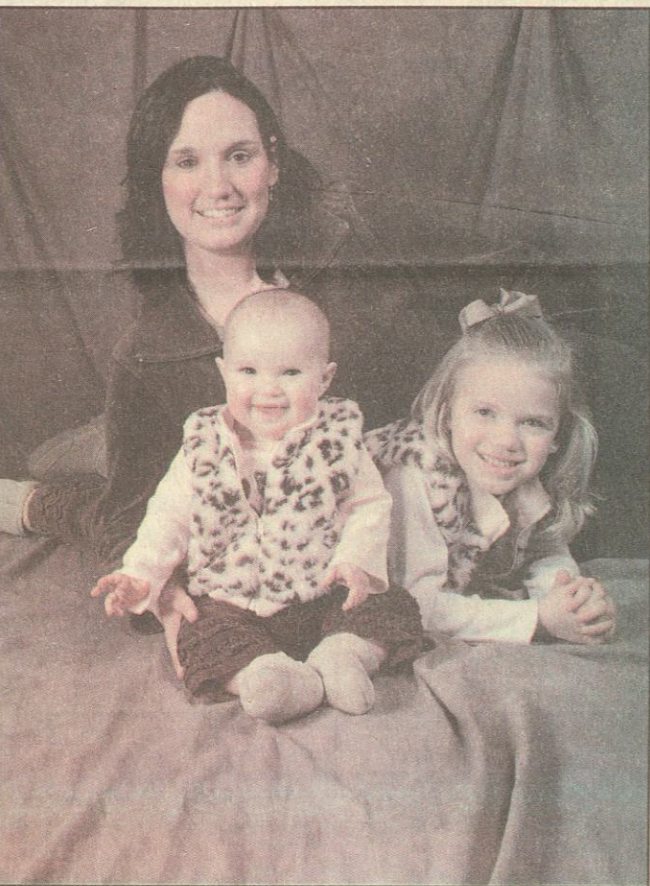
Mercury assembly plant. He expected to be called by the Army to serve in the Korean conflict following high school graduation, and in the interim worked in the millwright trade on the construction and installation of conveyor systems, machinery and automation equipment. When the Army call hadn't come after two years, Linton took the advice of his mentors and enrolled in the mechanical engineering program at Lawrence Tech.

Continuing to work full-time, he took Lawrence Tech classes at night and on Saturdays. By the time he completed his bachelor's degree at the age of 28, he was a project engineer for Jervis B. Webb, now based in Farmington Hills, working on conveyor system installations in automotive plants.

After college graduation, Linton persuaded his employer to let him return to Tennessee and open a one-man office in Memphis. Five years later he went out on his own, and SSI quickly developed a niche market for the heavy-duty conveyor systems utilized in the manufacture and production of heavy trucks, construction equipment, military tanks, oil field pipe, aircraft, furniture, appliances and package handling.

The Bulk Handling Division of SSI operates as a general contractor in many states, from California to Florida, and is one of a very few companies in the United States capable of slip form, continuous-pour concrete construction of massive silos and related equipment associated with ethanol production, cement manufacturing, pet food processing and coal handling and storage.

In 1968, as a young engineer, Linton received the LTU Alumni Achievement Award and today as a senior engineer, the Mechanical Engineering Department at Lawrence Technological University will be called A. Leon Linton Department of Mechanical Engineering, in honor of one of the college's most successful yet humble graduates.

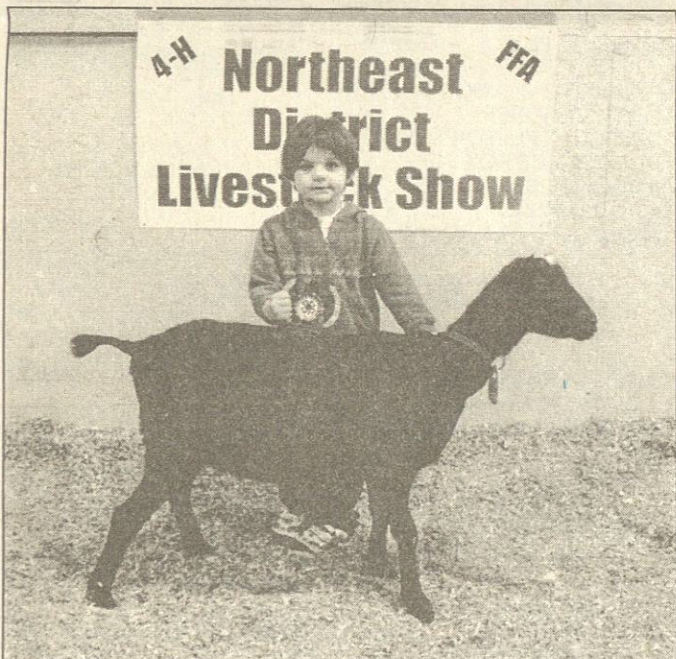

Community Blood Drive Set to Help Avoid Winter Blood Shortages

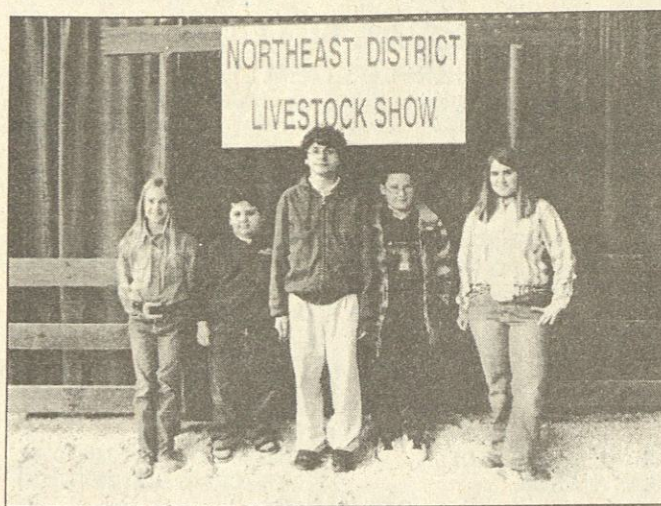

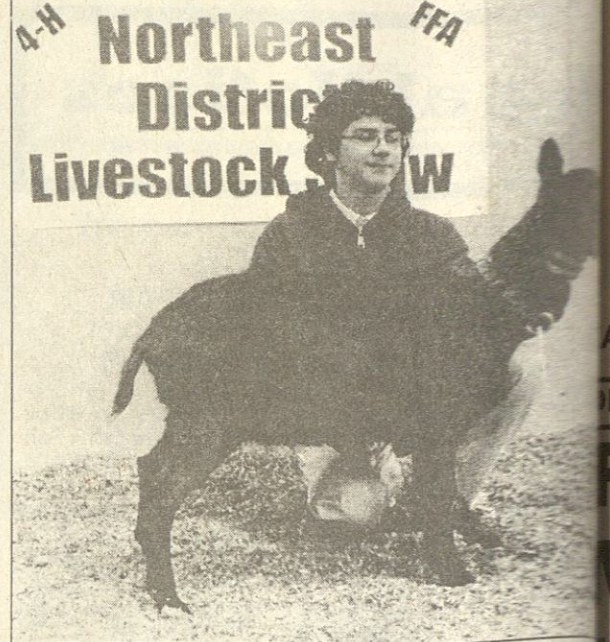
