Tishomingo Man Killed in Wreck Last Thursday

A young man from Tishomingo died last Thursday as a result of a collision in Burnsville. According to the Mississippi Highway Patrol office in New Albany, Craig Henderson, 20, was traveling westbound on Highway 1 at 5:34 a.m. near Burnsville when his 1998 Chrysler Sebring collided with the rear end of an 18-wheeler driven by Charles Ray Phifer of Iuka.

The cause of the accident is under investigation, said Officer Horace Kitchens.

Henderson died at Magnolia Regional Health Center as a result of injuries sustained in the wreck.

He was currently employed at Magnolia Regional Health Center, but worked previously at McMillan's DVD Express in

Train Hit Truck Tuesday Night

An 18-wheeler was hit by a westbound train at McKinney Crossing at about 6:15 Tuesday night in Iuka. The truck was headed north on Spring Street when it got stuck on the tracks at the dangerous crossing. According to personnel at the scene, the moving truck was delivering furniture to an Iuka address. The driver got outside the truck and attempted to flag down the train. Another passenger was also unharmed in the collision. The train made an attempt to stop, but cut the truck's 53-foot trailer in half, leaving furniture and household goods scattered along the tracks.

Supervisors Purchase MEMA Generators for Emergency Water Service

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors approved bids Monday for five new generators to run water systems throughout the county in case of electrical failure.

The five generators are being paid for by a \$123,714 Mississippi Emergency Management Agency grant, with a five percent county match. Their purpose will be to keep water services running in emergency situations, like an ice storm or other times of disaster, explained MEMA Agent

Bill Strickland, who reviewed the three bids for the Board of Supervisors.

The low bid of \$94,395 from Taylor Power Systems, of Richland, Mississippi, for 20-, 30- and 50-kilowatt trailer-mounted generators was accepted by the board on Strickland's recommendation.

Delivery of the units will be in about 20 weeks, the board confirmed. They discussed going to get the trailers themselves, to avoid delivery costs.

The units will be on trailers

that can be moved where ever the county needs them, but they will be stored and maintained at the towns (Iuka, Belmont, Burnsville, Golden and Tishomingo).

Yellow Creek Port Board

In other business, the board spoke with Ted Day, who came to ask for their consideration for the county-appointed position on the Yellow Creek Port Authority Board. Day said he was a governor appointee on the board years

Supervisors Clamp Down on Illegal Dumping in County

Before coming in to the board Monday morning to decide over the county Board of Supervisors, First District Supervisor Brandon Grissom had to go up and collect roadside garbage.

In fact, he picked up fifteen bags of garbage along Coleman Road, near County Road 1. And then he brought it to the courthouse, where he filed charges on those responsible.

"There is no excuse for this, we are no longer going to tolerate it," Grissom said Monday. Effective immediately, this county-wide problem will be actively monitored by the county and supervisors, Grissom announced.

"If we catch you dumping, we can trace anything that was dumped back to you, you will pay the price," announced Grissom.

som. "You will have the option to go pick it up, and if you don't, you will be charged for littering in the county justice court. And I'll put your name in the paper."

Fines for littering range from \$200 to \$250, said Grissom.

The centrally-located county landfill at Midway is open from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays and 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturdays, and there is no charge for dumping for vehicles with a Tishomingo county tag, said James McDowell, supervisor of the fifth district.

The problem is getting out of hand, agreed the supervisors. Just last week, Grissom's crews picked up dumped mattresses three times and delivered them to the dump. Recliners, fast food

Resort Status Faces Battle in Conference

Friday, February 20th, the Mississippi State Senate passed House Bill 1441, which included resort status authorization for the proposed Bay Springs Resort in Tishomingo Co. and a referendum for the City of Flowood to only serve alcohol by the drink (not at packaging stores). But, they amended the bill, adding

two more locations, and a lot more politics to this already controversial bill.

According to Representative Mark DuVall (D) of District 19, the Senate amended it to additionally include an area around the Mississippi Braves Baseball

field in Pearl, where the citizens of Pearl have voted against liquor by the drink, but in favor of beer.

It also added some residential neighborhoods both existing and proposed in Pearl River County to serve liquor by the drink at clubhouses in these areas. Pearl River County has also voted recently to remain under the dry law.

DuVall reported the bill was held on a motion to reconsider the vote by which it passed the Senate as amended, and on Tuesday the 24th, this motion was tabled, sending it to the House to concur or seek conference.

On Friday morning the Chairman of Ways and Means made the motion to concur, and the Representative of the City of Pearl (Ray Rogers) made a substitute motion to send it to conference wishing to have the ball park in his district removed from the bill. The representatives of Pearl River County wanted their county removed so that their county could decide by ballot whether liquor could be served by the drink in just these specific neighborhoods.

So as a result, the only vote in the House on the bill on Friday was in favor of sending it to conference, which the Chairman disagreed with, thinking this was the best chance at getting the Bill on the Governor's desk for him to sign was to go ahead and concur.

Sending the bill to conference in effect killed the bill, says DuVall, but, it is still alive.

"If the bill is in conference too long and the governor vetoes the Jackson sales tax increase, then the legislators that represent Jackson will not want to share the current monopoly they have on liquor sales with neighboring Flowood and Pearl, so even more support could be lost," predicted DuVall.

Furthermore, the conferees may not be able to find a consensus between the House version with only Tishomingo and Flowood, and the Senate version with the additional Pearl and Pearl River Co.

"So a bill this controversial, faces an uphill political battle in conference," said DuVall. "Unfortunately, I understand the Lt. Governor may be appointing the Senator for Pearl River County as a conferee and he will probably make sure his amendment stays in without a referendum, and that will be hard for the House to stomach."

waste and other furniture is particularly a problem.

"This looks bad to not only those who drive by it every day, but also to visitors to the county, and especially to industrial prospects, which we have visiting quite often," said Grissom.

The alleged litterers on Coleman Park Road had been notified that they could go pick up the garbage, but after a few days, they did not, explained Grissom, who received several calls from people complaining about the garbage while he was waiting for those responsible to pick it up.

ago, and would be interested in serving the county's economic development interests on the Port board again. The county-appointed position comes open this May, said board clerk Lynn West.

The state owns the economically flourishing Port, and four counties (Alcorn, Prentiss, Tishomingo and Itawamba) each have two representatives on the Board that regulates it: one appointed by the Board of Supervisors, and one appointed by the Governor. The Governor has another, at-large position, as well.

Nicky McRae made a statement concerning his effort to change the Justice Court/Constable system so that citizens in the North Half of the county would be served by only North Half elected officials, and South Half by South Half elected officials. He said he in no way was making any statement about the quality of job performance in the Justice Court office, but was simply trying to have the system work so that the citizens were judged or served by the ones they voted on themselves.

"I think they are doing a fine, job, I was just responding to the concerns of people who have asked me to look into it," said McRae.

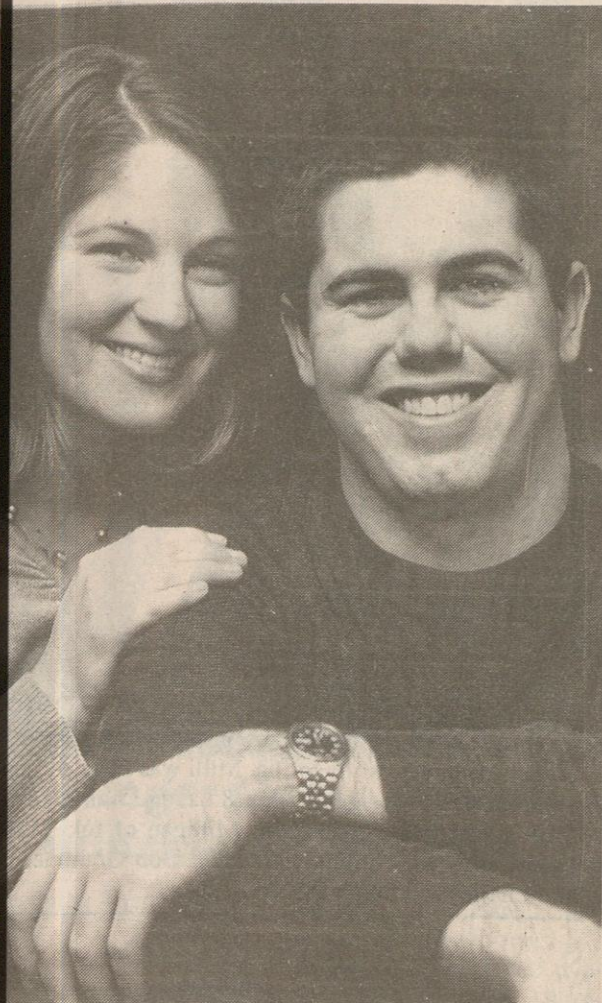

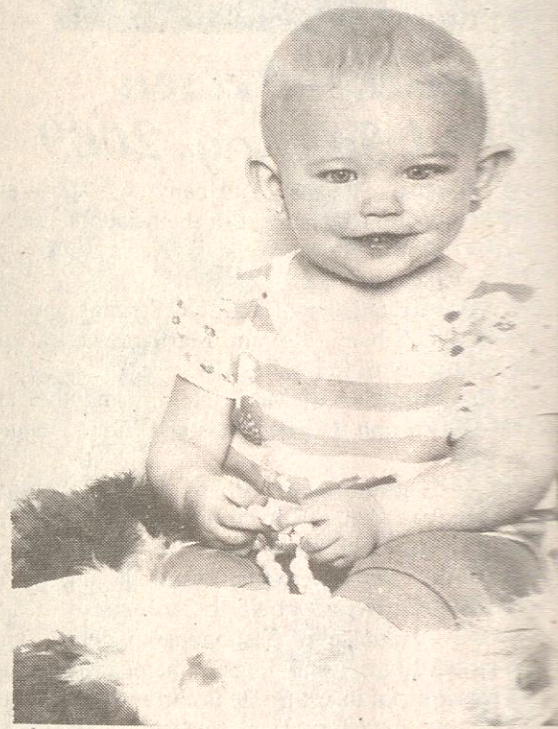

They brought him on board for the assistant boys

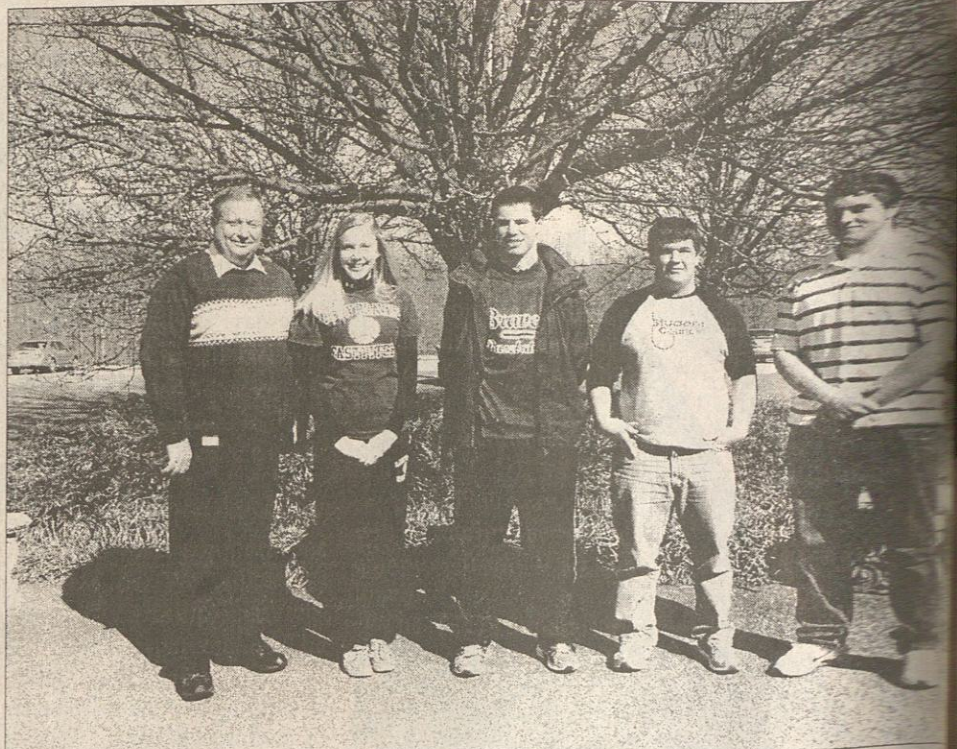
varsity basketball coach position last year. When Chip Johnson resigned last spring, Borden stepped up and had a great year with the Braves.

Mac McAnally And Fred Knobloch To Perform At The Delta Music Institute Grand Opening

Award winning singer-songwriters Mac McAnally and Fred Knobloch will perform a two-hour acoustic music show on Saturday, March 7th at 7:30 p.m. in Delta Music Institute's Studio A in the historic Whitfield Building on the Delta State campus.

This concert is one of several events that are part of the Grand Opening weekend for the Delta Music Institute (DMI). Joining McAnally and Knobloch will be DMI Director Tricia Walker, who spent over 25 years in Nashville as a performer and songwriter before returning to Delta State in 2006 to lead the DMI program.

A Belmont native, McAnally is the writer and featured guest vocalist on Kenny Chesney's new single, "Down The Road," which scored the #1 spot on the Billboard/R&R and USA Today charts last week. The song was nominated recently for the Academy of Country Music's Vocal Event of the Year award. McAnally is one of the most accomplished songwriters, musicians and vocalists of his time. He has written literally dozens of hit songs, including chart-toppers for Alabama "Old Flame" and Sawyer Brown "Thank God For You."

McAnally continues to tour as part of Jimmy Buffett's Coral Reefer band. As a producer, he's worked with Sawyer Brown and Little Feat, and was named 2008 Musician of the Year by the Country Music Association.

As an artist, McAnally has released 10 albums, and was the first artist signed to David Geffen's legendary Geffen Records. He owns and operates his own recording studio, in addition to his ongoing work as a writer, publisher, producer and musician.

Knobloch, a Jackson native, has been performing since the age of thirteen. In

1973, he left school to play music full-time; he began performing solo at nightclubs across the south and landed a few dates as a session guitarist at MALACO Studios in Jackson. While working for such R&B notables as Dorothy Moore, Eddie Floyd and Anita Ward, he met drummer James Stroud and pianist Carson Whitsett. The hit single, "Why Not Me," co-written with Whitsett, reached #1 on the Billboard AC chart and #18 on the HOT 100.

On the heels of that success, Knobloch moved to Los Angeles to pursue an artist's career, but it wasn't

long before the South started calling him home and he relocated to Nashville in January of 1983.

After moving to Nashville, he made a name for himself as an artist, session musician and songwriter. With his good friends, Thom Schuyler and Craig Bickhardt, who formed the group SKB, he recorded two albums for MTM Records, including the hits "No Easy Horses" and the #1 "Baby's Got A New Baby", co-written by Knobloch with fellow Mississippian Dan Tyler.

Knobloch's lists of cuts include artists such as Faith Hill, George Strait, Delbert McClinton, Etta James, Ray Charles, John Anderson, Trisha Yearwood, Sawyer Brown, Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and Kenny Rogers.

The Delta Music Institute began with a generous donation by Fred Carl of the Viking Range Corporation in 2003. The focus of the DMI is to provide students with a broad and thorough education in the technological, business, and creative areas of the music industry.

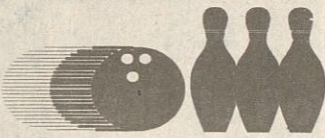

"Momma"

Few people are lucky to have a mother as loving and as caring as ours. We grew up in a home where both of our parents truly loved one another. They always referred to themselves as "Darling" and "Little Darling". We have been very lucky to have Momma as long as we have after losing the love of her life 18 years ago. There was always a piece of the puzzle missing from her life after he passed that could not be replaced. We believe that each of us has been lucky to have that perfect puzzle piece in our life. We try to think of the things Momma told us before we married, such as, never got to bed angry. No matter what is said during the day, at night you should go to bed with love in your heart and no anger. We must admit sometimes that is easier said than done.

One of our early childhood memories is that we would always ask her to tell us about the "Olden Days" when she was a child. She would make things sound as though there was so much fun and entertainment going on at the farm. It wasn't until we were older that we realized just how hard the times really were on the farm. She would show us how to make a playhouse out of leaves and dolls out of sweet gum balls. Momma would tell stories about all of her siblings sitting around the dinner table trying to be quiet (because Poppa Owen would not allow any racket at the table), but of course with 10 kids that was impossible. Of course many of those meals were only cornbread and buttermilk. She talked about how Uncle Milton used to carry her around when she was little because of the polio in her leg, and the love she had for him for doing that for her.

Another one of our early childhood memories started with Momma washing and ironing our Sunday dresses, as well as getting our hair ready for church. She would wash our hair and then dry it over the floor furnace. She would then roll each of our hair as tight as possible to make sure the curls lasted till Wednesday night for church. She once mentioned to us after Daddy died that this was the best time in her life with her girls. She even had etched on their tombstone the three of us following Daddy and Momma to church. We went to church every Sunday morning, Sunday night and Wednesday night, and I (Sara) didn't know anything except Baptists existed until I entered junior high school.

We will always remember Momma with either a rake or a broom in her hand. She would always be whistling while she was working (not that she ever whistled a tune or in tune). Daddy wanted us to help her out with the housework, but

she told us the time would come and we would have our own home, and then our work would never end.

We went to Coleman Park for our family vacations many years with our cousins, Tony Ford and Kay Harrison, and friends

from Beverly Hills Baptist Church in Memphis. Momma would never leave the house without her makeup on and hair done. She would even go to the beach at Coleman Park and have her hair in rollers and her face made up. Momma would be the only one at night at the park that looked like she just came from a beauty parlor. Eventually, Daddy and Momma bought some land near the park and began coming to Coleman Park every weekend. Sometime near the time that Daddy retired they opened the antique store and made their home, Iuka.

When our children, Gina, Leslie and Michael, were born we knew that we could leave them with Momma and know that they were in loving hands. There was never any crying or complaining from the kids when they knew they were going to be staying with Mema. If she had had the opportunity and would have been well enough, she would have enjoyed giving the same attention to Gina's daughter, Taylor; Leslie's children, Troy, Jake, and Sara-Kate; and Michael's children, Mackenzie and Logan.

Momma and Daddy were married in February, and they both went to heaven in February. They say that February is the month of love, so it is very appropriate that they are now together in heaven on this month of the year. We will always have a special place in our hearts for them forever on Valentine's Day.

At night, Momma no longer has to feel in her bed for the warm spot where Daddy used to sleep, because we believe that Momma is now in her Darling's arms in heaven.

BLO Land Book Index (Bureau of Land Management General Land Office Record) - This document contains land patents sold at the Pontotoc Land Office in old Tishomingo County, Mississippi, which includes Ranges 6 East to 11 East, and Townships 1 South to 6 South. Some land patent records listed as being in Alcorn and Prentiss Counties may also be found. Tishomingo County's section of Township 7 South is included.

The museum also, much to the delight of the community, continues to share some of the great strengths of its collection through its displays. The strength of the museum's collection is something staff and volunteers do not take for granted. It represents the cumulative efforts of dedicated staff, volunteers, and directors and, even more significant, the sustained commitment of a community of citizens who have understood the value of acquiring, retaining, and sharing their antiquities and history with the public. That commitment is continually honored today through the focused development of a collection that is proudly displayed and remains the museum's single most important resource.

Visitors to the museum and genealogical library include tourists, genealogical researchers, and County residents. School children also tour the museum's exhibits, including Boy Scout troops and Girl Scout troops, to learn about the County's heritage. A total of 746 visitors toured the museum during 2008, not including 80 library researchers. Over 350 visitors toured the facility for the first time. In the last six months of 2008, the historical courthouse museum hosted visitors from Colorado, Georgia, Kansas, Louisiana, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas; Illinois, California, New York, Indiana, Wisconsin, Tennessee, Nevada, Missouri, Maryland, Idaho, Wyoming, and Arizona. The Society boasts a membership

from at least 22 states and throughout the State of Mississippi. Many of these people desire to visit Tishomingo County to view the geographical area where their ancestors settled and to perform genealogical research; however, it is not always feasible or cost effective to visit. Therefore, the Society is in place to represent visitors, including County residents, by supplying research assistance. More than 200 visitors who live within Tishomingo County have visited the historic County courthouse since January

2008. When current and former Tishomingo County residents return for a visit, they are enthusiastic about the historical courthouse museum. They reminisce and share positive memories about their Tishomingo County experiences. Usually some special memory stands out - a great teacher, a close friendship, family members now deceased, old family customs, or former places of residence. These visitors display the same pride that is shared by staff and volunteers.

A planning session was held during the month of January to plan for 2009. "We have some new and exciting events in store for the County," says Jan Anglin, Executive Director of the historic museum. Events include a genealogical workshop in March, a Woodall Mountain Run in April as a fundraising event, the 3rd Annual Family History Fair in May, Camp Courthouse programs for local children in June and July, and a special Native American program.

As the economy worsens, the historic courthouse suffers economically as well. High heating bills necessitated the closure of the facility on Saturdays during the cold winter months. The archives and history museum is in need of more volunteers to assist in its library and gift shop or to assist in greeting visitors. The historic courthouse is a source of pride for Tishomingo County. The archives and history museum housed inside the facility is not available in many counties across the State of Mississippi. Take pride in your heritage with your

donation of time or money.

The museum's gift shop, the Woodall Mountain Market, is stocked with lots of unique items, including souvenirs from Tishomingo County or one-of-a-kind gift items. The museum staff has

been told that the gift shop has the best collection of Tishomingo County souvenirs available in the area. Genealogical and research books, booklets, etc., are also sold in the gift shop for a nominal fee. Sales of these items assist in keeping the archives and history museum open to the public.

The Society is always in need of more volunteers. Volunteers may offer to work on any project in which they have interest. They may offer to serve as receptionist at the history museum from time to time, visit various County locations to obtain information, survey a cemetery, or use their typing skills to benefit the Society. In fact, our newest volunteer lives in California, but she is busy transcribing obituaries for our obituary project. At the present, a volunteer is needed to interview and acquire oral histories from aging veterans.

The museum anticipates many more "firsts" in 2009 and looks to the County's continued support as staff and volunteers preserve our County's history and create a remarkable learning environment for young children, their families, and their communities. 2008 Highlights Of The County's Historical Society

2008 was an ordinary and productive year at the Tishomingo Historical & Genealogical Society (THGS) and its history. Last year may most be described as a year of "firsts" for the Society. Some of the "firsts" mentioned above, TCHGS shared expertise in 2008 in how to clean tombstones, prepared and offered a booklet on the County's legendary Dr. Claude C. Cromeans, prepared and offered a booklet on the Marlar surname, compiled and offered Tishomingo County's Civil War pension applications on CD, re-surveyed several cemeteries, photographing each tombstone, and offering the finished reference on CD; scanned many of the County's school yearbooks, making them available on CD as well; transcribed several volumes of Cutshall Funeral Home records; and worked on compiling church histories, County obituaries, death records, etc. School involvement has also increased phenomenally. Students from Mr. James Monroe's history class are encouraged to volunteer at the courthouse museum, and the Tishomingo County High School began offering its first county history class. Mrs. Sheila Thorne, the assigned instructor, used the history museum's resources to assist her in developing the curriculum for the class.

While much progress was made, there is always more work to accomplish. If the museum's members, supporters, and visitors expected progress to slow down as the renovation project proceeded, they were more than pleasantly surprised by everything staff and volunteers were able to accomplish while still operating under what can only be described as difficult circumstances. Some of the Society's projects that are currently in progress are listed below. Many of these projects began in previous years, and they are not in any specific order.

Death Records - The State of Mississippi began compiling death records in 1912. TCHGS has begun indexing the County's death records dating from 1912 to 1943. Eventually the actual death certificate will be acquired to correspond with each death record.

Cemetery Locator Map - Once completed, this locator map will uniquely pinpoint the location of each cemetery in Tishomingo County.

Sen. Cecil Lamar Sumners Collection - Cecil Sumners practiced law, served as Chancery Clerk from 1952-1960 in Tishomingo County, and then was elected as a Mississippi State Senator in the 4th Senatorial District. He died in Iuka in 2002, and after his wife's death, the archives and history museum received many books, photos, and personal memorabilia from his estate. An inventory of

the collection is still in progress.

Church Histories - Many County church histories have been acquired, but many more are still needed. These histories offer a wealth of historical and genealogical knowledge.

Re-surveying Cemeteries - Cemeteries within the County were surveyed about 10 years ago, and they are now being re-surveyed. The cemeteries are offered on CD, displaying photographs of the tombstones.

Memorial Scholarship - Awarded in honor of a citizen killed in action during World War II, the memorial scholarship was awarded in 2008 to a student from the Tishomingo County High School.

Genealogical Library - The museum's genealogical library is a source of pride for Tishomingo County. The archives and history museum housed inside the facility is not available in many counties across the State of Mississippi. Take pride in your heritage with your
