Braves Pitcher Faces Long Recovery After Wreck

Senior Braves pitcher and running back Matt Davis faces an extensive recovery process after a single vehicle accident last Friday morning on the way to school.

Davis' 2002 GMC truck left the road as he was driving south on Highway 25 just north of Dexter Bottom at about 7:20 a.m.

"We didn't see what happened, but we could still see the dust floating around," said Davis' sister Ashley, who was one of the first ones on the scene. She was driving with her mother just behind Davis.

The truck was right side up, and in a driveway with the passenger side open, said Ashley. She thought he was just having car trouble, but then saw that both the driver's side wheels had been broken off. She found Davis where he was thrown 40-50 yards from the truck.

According to his mother, Sandy Davis, Matt suffered injuries to his pelvis, and spent several days in North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo, to where he was airlifted from the scene.

Monday night about midnight, he was taken by ambulance to University of Alabama-

Birmingham Hospital. He was in surgery to repair the pelvis Wednesday morning at press time, and faces an extended time of recovery.

He is in great spirits, said Sandy, and hopes to be able to go to the school and get his diploma in person, and someday play ball again. He may be home by next week, she said, if all goes well.

"We thank everyone for the visits and calls, and ask for your continued prayers through the recovery," said Ashley.



Whitfield, Finds Closure Vet, Avon **World War**

Many veterans bring home emories of battles, devastaon, death, and gloom that stay th them for a lifetime. One lo-I hero has lived 64 years with goal to seek personal closure, d bring happiness to another ilitary family.

Avon V. Whitfield was one the hundreds of young men om Tishomingo County that rved in World War II. Avon as born and raised in Tishomgo County, Mississippi, the son Joseph and Flarra Whitfield. e was barely 20 years old when joined the U.S. Army on Nomber 3, 1942, at Camp Shelby. e was transferred to Ft. Riley, ansas, for basic training. A rawny 150-pound young man, had no idea what war atrocis he and thousands of others ould endure.

Avon, assigned to the 9th Arored Division, 89th Calvary Rennaissance Squadron, fought Ider General Patton in the attle of the Bulge over the winmonths of 1944-1945, which as the last major Nazi offensive ainst the Allies in World War This battle was a last-ditch at-

mpt by Hitler to split the Allies

in two in their drive towards Germany and destroy their ability to supply themselves. Due to the many lives that were lost



sent to Germany as replacements. It was at this time that T/5 Whitfield met and became friends with Pvt. Garland Lee Loudermilk.

Another battle of significance during World War II was the Battle for Remagen Bridge. This battle marked the beginning of the end of World War II in the west of the German Reich. The Germans intended to destroy the Remagen Bridge, which crossed the Rhine River into Germany, but they were unsuccessful. Several attempts failed; therefore, the Americans obtained clear passage over the Rhine River, altering the course of the war. Though the Americans held the bridgehead from early March 1945, the Germans were still not ready to give up their efforts to destroy the bridge at Remagen. German bombers were flown in to attack the bridge, but they too were unable to destroy it. Hitler then ordered divers from the German Navy to attempt underwater attacks, though they arrived too late to finish off the weakened structure. Shortly after 3 p.m. on the afternoon of March 17th, 1945, with a sickening roar of torn steel, the bridge at Remagen finally collapsed and fell into the Rhine River. Twenty-seven American Army Engineers were killed when the bridge collapsed while repairing artillery damage. The destruction, 10 days after it was liberated by the 9th Armored Division, did not, however, alter the American advance east of the Rhine, as a pontoon bridge had already been completed.

It was cold in Germany, and the Army issued each driver a Mackinaw, a coat of thick, woolen material. Avon didn't particularly like his coat; it was heavy and cumbersome. T/5 Whitfield loaned his Mackinaw to Pvt. Garland Loudermilk, the young soldier who had joined the unit earlier. Shrapnel hit Pvt. Loudermilk, cutting a hole in his left arm pit and across his chest. Garland

told Avon that the Mackinaw saved his life, and Avon told him to keep the coat. A few weeks later, on March 8th, 1945, Garland Loudermilk was killed in action. He was still wearing T/5 Avon Whitfield's Mackinaw. Eventually, Avon's coat was returned to him by a buddy, and inside a pocket was a wallet belonging to Pvt. Loudermilk. The wallet was devoid of any information, and Avon thought that Pvt. Loudermilk had

received it as a gift from his wife that very day. Avon intended to return the wallet to Pvt. Loudermilk's family, but life got in the way.


He was honorably discharged, came home, and in December 1946, married Louise Curtis Whitfield. They have three children, three grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. After working with TVA for several years, he is now suffering from asbestosis.

Society president, RaNae Vaughn, quickly agreed to assist in the endeavor. Pvt. Loudermilk's military record stated that he originated from Greenbrier County, West
