Man Faces 20 Years to Life After Jury Trial Last Week

After a two-day trial last week, a Tishomingo County man faces twenty years to life in prison.

Jack D. Moore, Jr., of 468 CR 127, was found guilty on two counts of child molestation, and was immediately taken into custody by the Tishomingo County Sheriff to await sentencing on

The trial lasted from Tuesday to Wednesday afternoon and the jury deliberated a little more than one hour. Circuit Court Judge Jim Pounds presided.

According to Assistant District Attorney Tyler Moss, who prosecuted the case with ADA Arch Bullard, the molestation occurred several times between 2003 and 2006 and involved a female relative of the defendant.

The trial covered two spe-

cific incidents when the child was 11 and 12 years old, on December 19, 2003 and on May 10, 2003. The victim eventually told her mother and the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department started investigating the case.

"The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department did a great job interviewing the suspect and victim, and identifying specific dates," said Moss. Lead investigator on the case was Don Kirk, who flew in to testify from where he is stationed in Colorado, said Moss.

The victim also testified in the case, said Moss. Many of the family members were present in the courtroom.

Minimum sentence for the charges are 20 years per count and the maximum penalty is life, said Moss. There is also a fine of up to \$10,000.

Supervisors, Sheriff Hear Complaints About Disruptive Neighbors

But lack of county leash law or gun restrictions mean not much can be done

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors met Monday for their regular third Monday meeting, and heard complaints from a group of County Road 290 residents who are having trouble with their neighbors.

County Road 290 is off Coleman Park Road. According to Johnny Fay Croft. and two other neighbors who came to address the board, some of their neighbors have been shooting guns in a residential area, running an auto shop business that has caused the road to be congested and often blocked, letting their dogs run and terrorize neighbors, and one even assaulted a neighbor by hitting him in the head with a rock.

Croft said they filed for a warrant last Thursday, but nothing has been done. They are upset that "the law" has either not responded to their numerous calls for help, or been able to apprehend the alleged offenders.

Sheriff Glenn Whitlock responded that while it is dangerous to shoot a gun in a populated area, it is not illegal in the county. Nor is it illegal to let your dogs run loose, he said.

Whitlock said that he often only has one officer on patrol duty in the whole county, so it is difficult to patrol as well as some

citizens would like, and that most of his deputies are usually out on calls already - it takes some time to respond to calls.

First District Supervisor Brandon Grissom offered much the same response, but did say he would ensure that the roads were kept open and passable.

Jail Plans Discussed

In the afternoon, the board met in executive session with David Deaton, regarding the building of a jail to replace the current county jail building.

The county is under a court order (and has been for years) to construct a new jail, or make certain improvements to the current one, according to information from a recent interview with the

Tuesday, the board issued a request for proposals for architectural services for the "Jail Building Project." Proposals are due June 11th.

Other Matters

The board began the meeting thirty minutes earlier than the announced 10 a.m. meeting

During the early session, board president Grissom reported that the four board members present (Nicky McRae was absent) approved a change in assessment, and approved travel expense for Circuit Court Clerk Donna Dill for the circuit clerk's convention in Tupelo.

Information for Lead

Information for Lead levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Short Coleman Park Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead. Monitoring and reporting of compliance data violations

Monitoring and reporting of compliance data violations

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific constituents on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. Beginning January 1, 2004, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) required public water systems that use chlorine as a primary disinfectant to monitor/test for chlorine residuals as required by the Stage 1 Disinfection By-Products Rule. Our PWS #0710029 failed to complete these monitoring requirements in July of 2005, August of 2005, and May of 2008. Our PWS # 0710022 purchases water from the City of luka and this water system failed to meet these monitoring requirements in August of 2004, September of 2004, December of 2004, and April of 2007. Our PWS #0710008 failed to complete these monitoring requirements in December of 2007 and June of 2008. We did complete the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling that showed no coliform present. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

Did you know that the average U.S. household uses approximately 350 gallons of water per day? Luckily, there are many low-cost or no-cost ways to conserve water. Water your lawn at the least sunny times of the day. Fix toilet and faucet leaks. Take short showers - a 5 minute shower uses 4 to 5 gallons of water compared to up to 50 gallons for a bath. Turn the faucet off while brushing your teeth and shaving; 3-5 gallons go down the drain per minute. Teach your kids about water conservation to ensure a future generation that uses water wisely. More than 65 years ago, a, Miss. native Virgil Carleft his hometown—and high school—to fight the panese in the Pacific as a class ship fitter on the S.S. Willoughby. Today, war hero of the Greatest eneration will take his ace beside a fresh crop of shomingo High School duates and receive an norary high school diploin acknowledgement for sacrifice and service.

While his classmates Iuka were graduating om the local high school 1943, Virgil Carson was aduating from U.S. Navy ot camp in San Diego. e spent the next two years poard the Willoughby, an tegral part of the great attle of Leyte Gulf, the gest naval battle in the cific. Virgil Carson and e crew of the Willoughby corted U.S. patrol torpedo T) boats through the waerway, taking 24 such boats for the invasion of Leyte. Virgil Carson, planning retire from a successcareer as a mechanical intractor in the New Orans area, has purchased home close to the alma ter where he is slated receive his long overdue ploma. With the war seval decades behind him, he vidly remembers his years service onboard the Wilughby.

"It wasn't like the movies, with sailors going on shore leave, having a good time," Virgil Carson said. "We were on that ship 365 days a year and didn't go anywhere."

In the years that have passed since his days on the has raised a proud family with an equally proud military heritage. His son Lane, a platoon leader of the 5th Mechanized Infantry Division in Vietnam, currently serves as La.'s Secretary of Veterans Affairs. Secretary Carson's son Chris is serving his country as a 1st lieutenant in the U.S. Navy.

Beaming at the prospect of watching his father stand amongst today's eager graduates relishing a moment better than six decades in the making, Secretary Carson said, "I've always been extremely proud of my father and everyone who stood with him and defended our nation through such an incredibly tough time in history. Their generation lived through so much, and men like my father dedicated themselves to their nation, family, and future generations."

"The pride I feel today is an extension of the respect and admiration I've always felt for my dad," Lane Carson continued. "As his son and his biggest fan, I'm thrilled to be in Iuka, to stand with my hero and see him rewarded for his efforts.'

As with every great family, the Carsons have a compelling story. accompany the military legacy handed down from one generation to the next,

soldiers in the Carson family have a tangible tradition that has been passed from father to son time and time again—a "Roosevelt Bible," first presented to Virgil Carson during his service in the

Sailors signing up to Willoughby, Virgil Carson join the U.S. at war in the early 40s received a pocketed-sized Bible, covered with steel and inscribed with the words, "May the Lord be with you," as a token of appreciation from their Commander in Chief. Virgil Carson carried the Bible close to his heart for the two years he spent on the Willoughby. During the Battle of Leyte, he watched as the U.S.S. Mississippi plowed away at a mountain in San Pedro Bay with 16-

"You wouldn't think an ant could have survived the barrage," Virgil Carson said. "When the dust settled, the only thing left standing was one brick Catholic church completely unharmed. That church—divinely protected—and the Bible in my pocket assured me that God had not left my side."

When the time came for Lt. Lane Carson to lead a platoon in Vietnam, his father Virgil made sure the Roosevelt Bible went with him. And when many men in Lane Carson's platoon perished under heavy artillery at the hands of the Viet Cong, the young lieutenant lived to return home and recover from the shrapnel wounds that riddled the left side of his body and nearly cost him an arm. He credits the same God that brought his father through the Battle of Leyte—and the hand-

me-down Bible nestled in the breast pocket of his fatigues-with seeing him through his life-threatening injuries.

While all was not lost for Lane Carson on that fateful day in Laos, the Roosevelt Bible was lost. Medics cut the shirt from Lane Carson's body as they prepared to treat his wounds, and the lieutenant lost track of the family heirloom as he was whisked away to safety.

The Bible was recovered by New York Times journalist Gloria Emerson, who tracked down the Carson family over a year later and flew to New Orleans to personally return the treasure to its rightful owner. It now belongs to 1st Lt. Chris Carson, as it has again passed from father to son in what has become an honored tradition among the Carson men who continue to serve God and country.

'No doubt, God has been with me through the years, and with my family," said Virgil Carson-war

How Are Tassels Worn?

For High School graduation, and basic college graduations of a Bachelor's Degree, the tassels are first worn on the right, and then flipped to the left upon receiving the diploma or degree.

When do you flip? Normally, there is someone there to signal you. Some schools prefer to have the student flip right after the handshake, upon receipt of the degree. Others want them to flip their tassels just before walking off stage. It all depends on your school's tradition or rules.

The exception: If you are getting a Master's Degree, then the tassel starts on the left and is flipped to the right.

Also, the rule is that women keep graduation hats on at all times. The men are allowed to take the hats off during the singing of the National Anthem only!

The Class Ring...

The first class ring was developed in 1835 for West Point U.S. Academy. In the early 1900's, class rings came into fashion.

The first class rings were crude and were only a shank with a symbol (usually of the class pin which preceded the class ring by a few years) attached to the bezel of the ring. They quickly became popular and soon stones were added and more intricate dies allowing for greater details developed.

Today, class rings remain a popular tradition for high school and colleges. Class rings are seen as a combination of showing school pride while being an outward symbol of the diploma (but much easier to

Although tradition holds that a class ring is worn on the right hand, on the third finger, a class ring can be worn on any finger and sometimes on a chain around the neck

Pvt. Casillas Graduates At Ft. Benning, GA

Army Pvt. Johnathon J. Casillas has graduated from the Infantryman One Station Unit Training at Fort Benning, Columbus, GA. The training consists of Basic Infantry Training and Advanced Individual Training.

During the nine weeks of basic combat training, the soldier received training in drill and ceremonies, weapons employment, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, physical fitness, first aid skills, and Army history, core values and traditions. Additional training included development of basic combat skills and battlefield operations and tactics, and experienced use of various weapons and weapons defenses available to the infantry crewman.

The Advanced Individual Training course is designed to train infantry soldiers to perform reconnaissance operations; employ, fire and recover antipersonnel and anti-tank mines; locate and neutralize land mines and operate target and sight equipment: operate and maintain communications equipment and radio networks; construct field firing aids for infantry weapons; and perform infantry combat exercises and dismounted battle drills, which includes survival procedures in a nuclear, biological or chemical contaminated area.

Learn to be Credit Smart

Once you start paying bills, you start building a credit score. If you have a history of paying bills late, it will be reported and affect the interest rate you pay on your credit card or car, your apartment deposit — even your insurance. When you get a bill, pay it on time — every month.

A credit score is a number based on your payment history. Credit scores are used by lenders to help determine if people qualify for a particular credit card, loan, insurance or service. Generally, the higher your credit score, the less risk you represent.

Some people think you need a credit card to build a credit score. But if you open your utility accounts in your name instead of your parent's name, you can build a quite respectable credit score in six months.

Want to pay more for everything you buy? Easy. Open a bunch of credit card accounts, charge your credit cards to the limit, then miss or make late payments. Any late payment stays on your credit report for seven years, even after you've paid off the creditor. 

education.

Diplomas were made from paper-thin sheepskin, hand-written, rolled and tied with a ribbon until 100 years ago. A lot of documents were done on animal skins because paper-making was difficult. They changed to parchment, which was more practical, when the paper making techniques improved. It wasn't until the turn of the century that diplomas stopped being rolled up, but given out in leather binders. Rumor is because rolled up diplomas were hard to frame.
