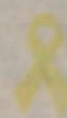

The election will be at Burnsville from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Sunday, February 14th, and city hall will be open to noon for absentee voters.

Lab Located Near Belmont Sunday

McRae Saturday night Tishomingo Sheriff's deputies located a meth lab in production in Belmont. The lab was located at 12:30 or 1 a.m. Sunday. Deputies were able to arrest at least four people in the lab. The lab was producing methamphetamine, said Tishomingo Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Jamie McRae.

Some of those charged with the lab were being held because of ongoing investigation, said McRae.

North Part of County Enjoyed Surprise Snow Monday

Monday morning dawned white and fluffy for part of Tishomingo County and much of north Mississippi.

By about 6 a.m., a steady, unexpected snowfall began blanketing the area in Iuka and Burnsville.

However, the snow seemed to stop at a line just south of Midway, Tishomingo and Belmont, and points south had a few flakes,

but mostly just rain and mud.

It caught many people by surprise; Sunday night there was no prediction of it, and when Tishomingo County School District's Joel Robertson, of Iuka, called Superintendent Malcolm Kuykendall around 6 a.m. to consult with him about whether they should run the buses, Kuykendall, who lives in Belmont, was puzzled.

"I didn't know why he was even asking," said Kuykendall.

But Robertson must have convinced him, because the very efficient school phone notification system was notifying students and employees by 6:20 that schools were closed.

The heavy, icy snow proved

perfect for snowmen, which also meant it was treacherous for travel. There were many minor accidents in the north part of the county during the morning hours.

Robertson Recognized as One of Top Two Youth Volunteers in Mississippi for Anti-Bullying Program

Student Noah Robertson named one of Mississippi's two youth volunteers by the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards, a national program honoring young outstanding acts of volunteerism.

An eighth grader at the school, and the son of Tonia Robertson, he implemented an anti-

bullying campaign that culminated in a rally attended by the entire student body at his school.

"My best friend is autistic, and I continually see people treating him in a bullying manner," said Noah. He has

seen many other students at his school suffer at the hands of bullies, too, and has even been bullied himself.

"I felt I needed to do something to help everyone in my school understand that bullying causes long-term damage, and we need to stand up for one another."

With support from school officials, Noah began researching all

aspects of bullying, and then developed a brochure explaining different types of bullying, the signs of bullying, and ways to prevent it. To get it printed, he persuaded a local organization to provide funding. Next, Noah created four performance skits and an audiovisual slideshow about bullying, which he presented at a school wide rally.

Afterwards, each student

was asked to sign a "no-bullying" contract that Noah designed and three drop boxes that he built were placed around the school so students can anonymously report incidents. His campaign struck such a chord that his school plans to continue it from year to year.

Wooten Wins Golden Rider Honors in Corinth Series



Tishomingo Elementary student Cody Wooten defeated about a dozen riders in his Class 65 dirt bike/motocross class this past weekend in Corinth to win the prestigious Golden Rider title.

As a rider in the 2009-2010 Fly Indoor Stadium Cross Series of racing, Cody competed against riders from Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia. In the final round this past weekend in Corinth at the Crossroads Arena, 10-year-old Wooten managed to defeat the other riders, including several who had already won the "Golden Rider" title, in ten rounds of StadiumCross.

As the new Golden Rider, Cody will enjoy the sponsorship of Fly, FMF, and Pirelli for the next year.

He will get two sets of Fly gear, four sets of Pirelli tires and two FMF exhausts.

Cody has been riding for about two years. It took

and other schools in the district have expressed interest in using it.

Noah was nominated for the award by Iuka Middle School. As one of two state honorees (the other one is Gabrielle Barrientos, 18, of Biloxi), he will receive \$1,000, an engraved silver medallion and an all-expense-paid trip in early May to Washington, D.C., where he will join the top two honorees from each of the other states and the District of Columbia for several days of national recognition events. Ten of them will be named America's top youth volunteers for 2010 at that time.

"People as caring and committed as these young students are critical to the future of our neighborhoods, our cities and our nation," said John R. Strangfeld, chairman and CEO of Prudential Financial. "By recognizing these honorees, we hope to encourage other young people - our future leaders - and all Americans to think more about the value and importance of volunteering in their communities."

All public and private

middle- and high schools in the country, as well as scout councils and 4-H organizations, were eligible to nominate students for the local Prudential Spirit of Community Award this past November. 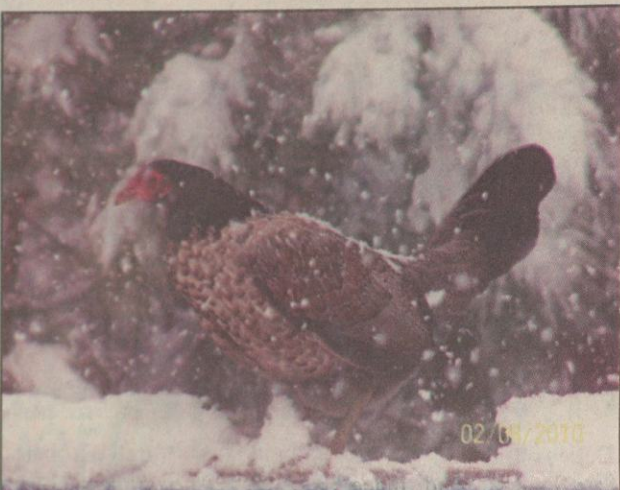
While in Washington, the 102 State Honorees will tour the capital's landmarks, attend a gala awards ceremony at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History, and visit their congressional representatives on Capitol Hill. In addition, 10 of them - five middle and five high school students - will be named National Honorees on May 3 by a prestigious national selection committee. These honorees will receive additional \$5,000 awards, gold medallions, crystal trophies, and \$5,000 grants from The Prudential Foundation for nonprofit, charitable organizations of their choice.



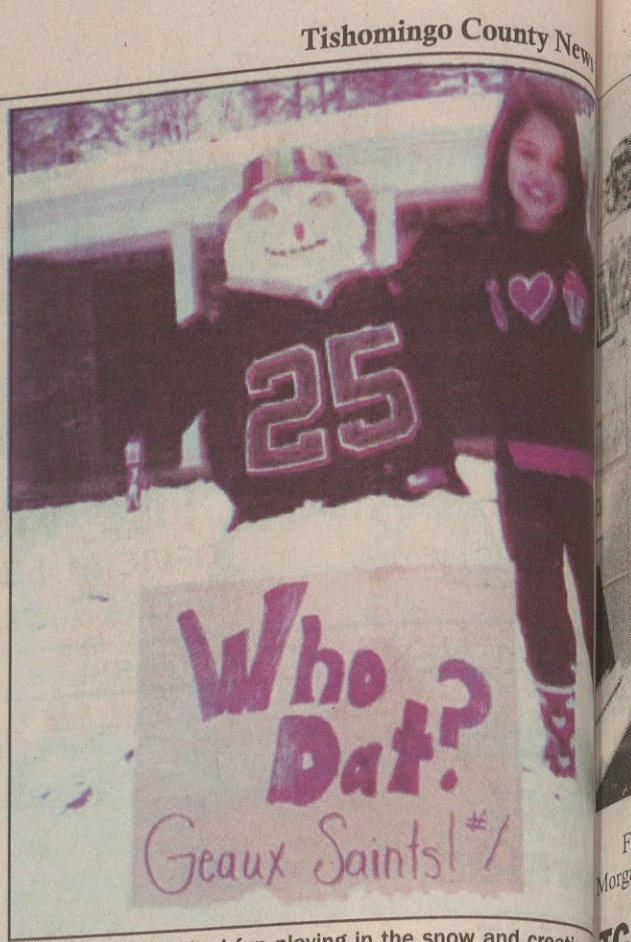

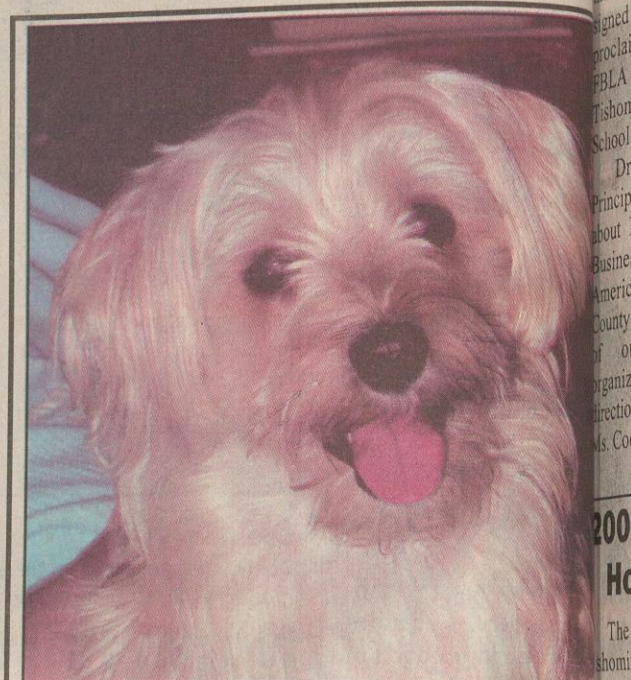

Remember Coach Dolan Owens

Tishomingo Elementary School

Thomas Dolan Owens took a job as a teacher at the Tishomingo Mississippi Elementary School for the school year 1940-41. He also served as the Basketball Coach.

Dolan had been teaching and coaching in the Paden, Mississippi School. Paden is just a few miles west of Tishomingo.

At this time I was in the fifth grade at Tishomingo Elementary School. I had been playing basketball since the 5th grade. We were well known as Coach Owens' outstanding ability as a coach because his teams usually tipped us.

Dolan was a small, slender young man in his twenties. He probably only weighed about 120 pounds. As I recall, he said that when he played basketball in high school he was called "Jay Bird Legs!" He was an excellent teacher and a fantastic basketball coach.

Coach's Magic Touch

The year before Dolan came our coach Tishomingo Elementary School won about two games and lost over 20 during the school year 1939-40. He took this group of boys and made them winners. I do not recall the exact win and loss record, but to the best of my memory we won over 20 wins and only lost three or four losses.

The starting five members of this team were: Wayne Anglin—Center, A. C. Carter and Jack Farris—Forwards; the twins Laskell and Skell Hamilton—Guards. I think J. O. Southward also played on this team. I worked with and practiced with this team.

This team played Cotton Springs in the Championship game of the County Tournament. The Cotton Springs players were: Ramsey; Cooney; Searcy; Bud and Walter Davis. Ramsey played center and pivot. But in this game he played guard because

we were determined to keep him from getting inside for close up crisp shots. We did this by setting up an air tight zone defense. So Ramsey played guard and started shooting long shots from not too far from the center line. At that time a field goal only counted two points. He made about 8 out of ten shots. I do not remember the exact score but Cotton Spring won by several points.

The Tishomingo Basketball Team could indeed be proud of what they had accomplished. Dolan had taught them how to be winners. He had a magic touch.

What Dolan Did For Me!

Wayburn Anglin was tall and an excellent player. He nearly always won the center jump at the start of the game. His play around the basket was great on both offense and defense. He graduated and went on to high school.

After the basketball season was over Dolan came to me and said, "Here is Wayburn's basketball suit that I want you to take home and keep it during the summer. Next fall you will play center and pivot on our team!" I was thrilled with the fact that I would get to try to fill the "shoes of Wayburn!" During the summer I would put on suit number one and practice playing pivot. It is a wonder that I did not wear out the suit playing in it.

I was only about six feet tall but I could get the job done. Usually I was not the leading point maker on our team. My primary duty was defense and feeding the ball to the other players.

Basketball Team Of 1941-1942

The Tishomingo Elementary Team was made up of Fairless Southward—Forward; Vaudry Carter—Forward; Fred McAllister—Guard; Jack Pennington—Guard; and Jerrell McNutt—Center and Pivot. This team also included Dwight Dean, David West, Ray and Fay Flurry and some others that I cannot

remember.

We were not a tall team but we were quick and fast. Dolan taught us to run set plays that would free up a man to shoot a crisp shot under the basket.

Day after day we worked on the full court press. This helped us to win many games. I do not recall our record for wins that year, but I do know that we won more than we lost.

Dennis the Menace

Our arch rival was the Dennis Elementary school Basketball Team. My left handed cousin Therman Epps was a member of this team. Dexter Byram and J. C. McClung were a part of their squad.

I was born on a farm near Dennis, Mississippi. I attended school there until I was in the 3rd grade. Thurman, Dexter and I grew up being the best of buddies.

Helen Carr was a very pretty little girl in our class, and I really did like her. I would bring her parched peanuts from home. I got very aggravated at Thurman because he would bring her pecans.

My family moved away and eventually I wound up in school at Tishomingo.

During the regular season Dennis beat us on their home court. Then when they came to our school we beat them. Both games were hard fought and very close.

In the county tournament Dennis and Tishomingo were in the same playoff bracket. So, in the second game we were forced to play Dennis. We should have been in separate brackets so that we could have faced off in the finals.

The game was nip and tuck. The games were very short. I think it was only about four or five minutes per quarter. Near the end of the game the score was tied at 12 all. Dexter had the ball of Dennis. Jack Pennington was guarding him. Jack fouled Dexter and Dexter got one free throw. With that foul Jack fouled out and had

to leave the game. Dwight Dean came in to the game to replace Jack.

Dexter shot the free throw and missed. Fairless Southward got the rebound and was headed down the court for a run away crisp shot.

Howard Reno a high school player at Tishomingo was the referee. He blew the whistle and awarded Dexter another free throw. He said that Dwight Dean did not report in to him when he came into the game replacing Jack.

Dwight Dean was a very quiet soft spoken young man. Before he came in game Dolan told him to be sure and report in to the referee. I saw and heard what took place. Dwight approached the referee and quietly said that he was replacing Jack Pennington. Howard Reno's (the referee) attention was distracted by someone else and did not hear what Dwight said to him.

Dexter Byram made the second free throw which gave Dennis a one point lead. Before we could get down the court again the game ended.

We lost and almost everyone fussed at Dwight for not reporting in to the referee. It was not Dwight's fault. We were a sad bunch. Most of us cried. Dolan did not fuss at

us. He said that he was proud of us. He made it possible for us to stay and watch the rest of the tournament which was eventually won by Dennis.

Watch Out For The Bear

On one occasion we were playing the elementary team from Golden. They were not very well organized and we were "running away" with them.

Golden had one big black headed player that considered himself to be very mean and tough. We nicknamed him "Bear!"

Bear had taken a "shine" to Irene Campbell, a very pretty girl on our school's girls basketball team. We wasted no time in reminding Bear about his friendship with Irene. He got rather mad and "riled up."

During the game I had the ball not very far from the basket and leaped to make a jump shot. The Bear tackled me. Of course I then picked myself up off the floor and went to the free throw line. My first free throw missed. Someone grabbed the rebound and kept playing. I stood at the free throw line waiting to get my second shot.

Then someone shouted, "You made the jump shot. Keep playing." That was the first time that I learned that the ball went in the basket af-

ter the Bear tackled me.

Fox Hunting In Bear Creek Bottom

Dolan rewarded our basketball team by taking us on a fox hunt in Bear Creek Bottom one Friday night near the end of the school year.

There were several excellent fox hounds. I guess the hounds were more eager than we were. The hounds jumped a fox or two and you have never heard such loud "baying" in all your life. We moved around in the woods several times but finally settled down in a wooded area.

From where we were located we could fairly well keep up with what the hounds were doing. I had experience in opossum and squirrel hunting. I knew about fox hunting but I had never been very involved in it.

We built a big bonfire. Made coffee and had a few good things to eat. Of course we stayed up all night listening to the hounds, swapping yarns, and watching out for "boogers."

Dolan helped us to have a good time. He helped us to learn that life is made up of more things than basketball. Once in a while a fellow needs to go "fox hunting."

Shirt Tails and Pocket Combs

One recommendation that Coach Dolan Owens made to us boys on the basketball team has stayed with me all these years. I did not think a lot of it then but I have come to realize that it was very significant.

A group of "rag tag" boys like us needed to hear what he had to say. Some team members lived in town but most of us lived out in the country.

Dolan said, "Boys when you are walking down the street in the other little towns where we are to play a basketball game TUCK YOUR SHIRT TAILS IN AND COMB YOUR HAIR. I WANT YOU TO LOOK LIKE SOMEBODY."

Martha Segars Recognized as One of Top 10 Businesswomen in Mississippi

Martha T. Segars says her husband of 57 years, Dr. Kelly Segars, has been her main confidence and supporter for all of her life's many jobs and positions in "picking peppers and raising cattle" to helping manage the First American National Bank in Iuka, a bank founded by Segars that has grown into a major player in the Northeast Mississippi banking industry. Segars was born in Red Bay, Ala., but her earliest memories are of the black town of Waco, Texas, where her family moved after her father lost his job during the Great Depression. "About the only thing I was voted to high school was biggest," Segars said.

Following high school and later college at the University of Alabama, Segars started a dietetic internship at Vanderbilt University. "I had an older friend that was in the field of dietetics plus

a great home economics teacher. In my rural school, I thought dietetic sounded glamorous and I loved to cook," she said. "I worked as a therapeutic dietician in Jackson for three years while my husband was in medical school. When he began his medical practice in Iuka, I began work as a dietary manager and therapeutic dietician. The hospital had never had a dietician, and I had to overcome the animosity of most of the dietary employees."

Segars learned to mix humor with sincerity and eventually became friends with most of her co-workers. She continued working at the Tishomingo County Hospital until 1988 when she made a radical career change. A co-organizer of the First American National Bank since 1964, Segars chose to help her husband out by taking a position as the bank's marketing director and administrative assistant. She also decorated of-

fices for the bank and served as administrative vice president.

"One of the toughest business decisions I have had to make is being the administrator of other people's money," Segars said. "To make the decisions that will make the bank profitable to the stock-holders, customers and to the communities that we serve." Segars said that another difficult decision in this economy is loans. "I would probably give loans to everyone that submitted a loan request," Segars admitted.

Segars has also become one of Tishomingo County's leading cheerleaders over the years. "Ask anyone in Northeast Mississippi what they know about Mrs. Segars and you will find only positive responses," said Austin Barbour of Capitol Resources, LLC. "Segars is a former president of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce and is a current board member of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and the Yellow Creek Port Authority Board. Segars uses her positions to promote everyone from workforce training at the junior colleges to real estate and industrial development."

"Mrs. Segars' defining moment this past year was her orchestration of one of the state's most successful tourist attractions and com-

munity involvement projects, the Tenn-Tom Trash to Treasures yard sale and antique market," added Deborah Bowling of First American. "This three-day event involved local citizens, merchants and vendors lining up along the route of the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway from Iuka to Demopolis, Ala. The outreach was spectacular and not only brought shoppers into the cities and towns, but it also showcased the natural beauty of northeast Mississippi."

Segars has also commissioned a "Fall Foliage Tour" on Pickwick on DVD and widely distributed it from local chambers to the recent Republican National Convention. "Living in a small town for 49 years leaves no surprises about me," Segars said. "My contribution to the business community is almost daily. In our community, tourism has a great impact on the area. It is an ongoing project."

Dr. and Mrs. Segars have three children and five grandchildren and enjoy gardening and traveling.

I am writing this letter on behalf of all the families on the water lines South of Highway 72 and East of Highway 25.

In my opinion, this has been handled very unprofessionally and irresponsibly about letting the people know the water was, and still is contaminated.

Everyone in this area has not had good water pressure and at times no water for hours, a some no water for weeks at a time.

This has been going on since before Christmas (and when you do not have good pressure you need to start checking it out) if you had water, you needed to boil it even to brush your teeth or wash your dishes. And if you called City Hall or the number for the Water Department, you get the run-

a-round or are told the notices have been posted in the City Hall, on TV, Water Dept., and in the newspaper. I for one do not go to City Hall or the Water Dept. every day to see if there are any notices, and I watch TV enough to say they have not made much of an attempt to

let the people know. And I checked with the newspaper, they were never told to print anything about the water problem.

They were given a dead line to get pressure or they were going to a lawyer. Well, the day or two before that dead line, two fire trucks were parked just North of Highway 72 on Pleasant Hill, they were transferring water from one truck to the second truck and the pump on the second truck was pumping back in to the water lines to add

pressure. I would like to know at whose cost was it?

I called them about a leak on CR 196 a little West of CR 427, right in the middle of the road. No rain for weeks in the summer, there is that wet spot, that tells me there is a water leak or something and the meter readers pass by at least once a month, why did he not ever notice this in the past 8 years that I have seen it? Any leak anywhere in the lines is taking water pressure away and causing contamination to our water.

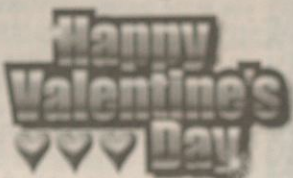

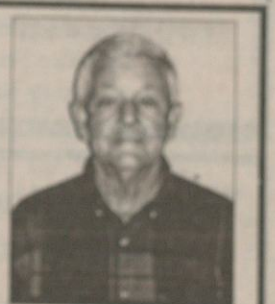

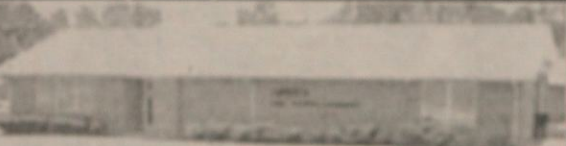
