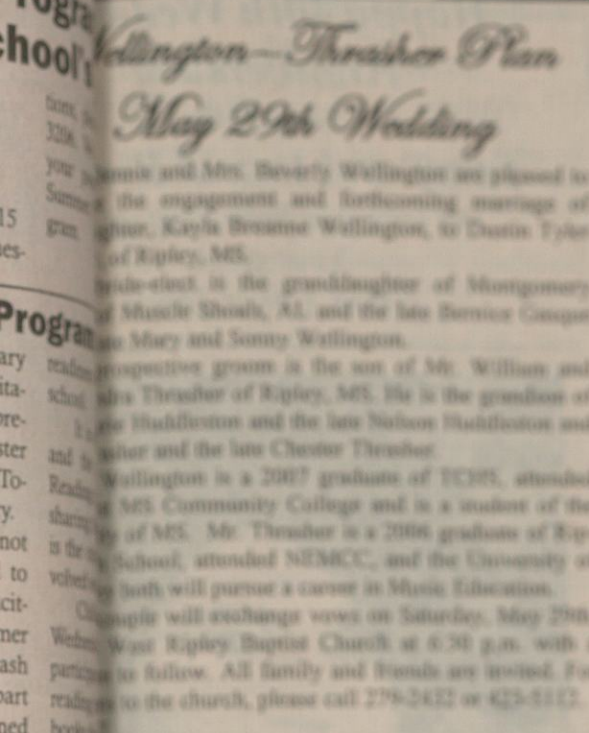

What Is Melanoma?

Melanoma is the most serious form of skin cancer. However, if it is recognized and treated early, it is nearly 100 percent curable. While it is not the most common of the skin cancers, it causes the most deaths.

For many years, the early warning signs of melanoma have been identified by the acronym "ABCDE": A stands for Asymmetry, B stands for Border, C for Color, D for Diameter and E for Evolving or changing mole. While the ABCDE rule helps detect early melanomas, there are a group of melanomas that do not resemble the ABCDE warning signs. Recently, several melanoma specialists developed a new method of skin inspection for skin lesions which could be melanoma.

The Most Basic Categories

Superficial spreading melanoma is by far the most common type, accounting for about 70 percent of all cases. This is the type most often seen in young people.

The second is the appearance of a flat or slightly raised discolored patch that has irregular borders and a somewhat asymmetrical shape. The color varies, and you may see some of red, brown, black, red, blue or white. The type of melanoma can occur in a previously benign mole. The melanoma can be found almost anywhere on the body, but it most tends to occur on the back of men, the legs of women, and the upper arms of both.

Nodular melanoma is similar to the superficial spreading type, but it also tends to be the skin surface to look a little more and usually appears as a flat or slightly raised nodule, brown or dark brown coloration. This type is found most often in the elderly, among or chronically sun-exposed, developed skin on the back, arms and upper legs.

Acral lentiginous melanoma also appears superficially but has a different color. It is quite different from the others, though, as it usually appears as a black or brown discolored area on the sole of the foot or palm of the hand. It is the most common melanoma in African-Americans and Asians, and the most common among Caucasians.

Subtype melanoma is usually found at the time it is diagnosed. The melanoma is recognized when it becomes a bump. It is usually black, but occasionally is blue, gray, white, brown, tan, red or pinkish.

The most frequent locations are the back, legs, arms and torso, as well as the head and neck. This is the most aggressive of the melanomas, and it found in 10 to 15 percent of cases.

Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. Beginning January 1, 2004, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) required public water systems that use chlorine as a primary disinfectant to monitor for disinfection by-products as required by the Stage 1 Disinfection By-Products Rule. Our water system passed all of these monitoring requirements. We did complete the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

The table below for all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the calendar year of this report. The presence of contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done in the calendar year of the report. The EPA and the State requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently.
