

## Burglar Strikes Again at Cozy Corner-Simply Elegant

Iuka police had to deal with yet another report of a burglary early Tuesday morning - this time a repeat break-in at Cozy Corner.

No money was taken from the coins in the cash register, said Ben Burns, owner of the Cozy Corner, which shares space with Simply Elegant for-

"They broke through the sheet rock, it was a small person; they came right under where they broke in last time, didn't take anything but change [which was] that was in the register, it's just like the last time," explained Burns, referring to the November 30th burglary, when someone pushed an air conditioner into the store from the outside, and crawled through the hole.

That time the burglar took about \$200, but "we've all learned not to keep any money on the premises," said Burns, referring to several merchants around town that have been broken into since late fall. Some damage was done to the formal gowns of the Simply Elegant, which the burglar pushed off racks on the floor.

Some of the businesses affected since fall in-

clude Bluebird Discount and Variety, Handy Sandy, Circle L Restaurant, Subway, and the Style Shop. All the incidents reportedly happened after closing hours, except a daytime armed robbery at Cherry's Creative Touch.

In April, Iuka Police released the photo of a possible suspect, Chris Martin, hoping to gain leads as to his where-

abouts, and other law enforcement agencies have helped in the investigation, but no arrests have been made.

"I just hope they will find whoever it is soon," said Selena Burns, co-owner of Cozy Corner.

## Jail Bids Come in Close to Budgeted \$5 million

CIG Contractors of Corinth again had the apparent low bid for the construction of a new jail for Tishomingo County, according to information stated at the bid opening Monday.

At the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors' regular first Monday meeting, three contractors bid on the redesigned jail project. The bids were taken under advisement, and given to the architect to review for contractual requirements. The architect will then recommend a bidder to the board.

CIG, of Corinth, had the apparent low bid with \$5,245,000, and the next lowest bid was from Worsham Brothers Construction, of Florence, Mississippi, for \$5,247,000. Also bidding was Burton Contractors, of Belmont, with a bid of \$5,949,000. The time spans given for construction varied from one to nearly two years.

In November, the board rejected eight bids that came in at \$7.3 - \$6.9 million - several million dollars over the \$5 million they reportedly expected. After that, the board requested the architect, Ferguson and Associates of Jackson, Mississippi, to modify the design, and rebid the project at no extra design or administrative cost, which they agreed to do.

Monday, the architect did not have a new estimate, but said the bids "came in very close" to what he thought the architect's estimate was.

The new jail is being

built to replace the existing county jail, designed and built in the 1970s to hold 28 inmates. The new one will hold 150 inmates including some state inmates, which, in years past, the state has paid counties \$20 a day or more to house.

The county is under court order to build a new jail to ease crowding.

The planned location for the new county jail facility is the former location of the Genesco Shoe Factory, on Bettydale Drive in Iuka.

In other business, the board spoke to Mrs. Barlow, who came to inquire about the status of repairs on her road, near Brown's Hollow. Neither board attorney Phillip Whitehead nor First District Supervisor Brandon Grissom were in attendance at the meeting when she was there, so she gave her name and number to the clerk so they could contact her later.

The board approved tax exemption applications from RollForm, Ferragon Corp., Golden Manufacturing and Industrial Finishes, with the concurrence of Tax Assessor Diana Turner.

The board approved the documents necessary to allow federal monies to pay for the resurfacing and striping of Turnpike Mountain Road in the Second District.

The board authorized Board Attorney Phillip Whitehead to prepare a lease agreement between the county and Harold Bullard, to legalize him occupying space in Building 1000 for storage of equipment.

The board approved the replacement of the current

DARE officer with Ryan Glover, and authorized the appropriate signature authority for the DARE account at the bank.

Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock reported to the board that he has identified a federal Secure Our School grant to help fund the school resource officers program in the county schools. The county will match the grant 50-50, if the grant is approved. The board authorized Whitlock to apply for the grant.

The Tishomingo County School District advised the board a few months ago that they would not be able to pay for school resource officers at the schools, due to some federal funding issues. They may get the funding back in December.

The board met with Roland Humphries of Cook Coggins Engineering of Tupelo regarding the repair of County Road 321, where a culvert washed away during the floods of May 2nd. He said that State Aid funding would be available to reimburse the emergency repair of the road, in case FEMA does not come through with all the funding.

FEMA officials were reportedly inspecting County Road 321 Monday morning, as the meeting was going on, according to County Emergency Manager Bill Strickland who addressed the board before they opened the meeting. Strickland has said that FEMA will reimburse repairs made to the roads damaged May 2nd.

## Pulmonary Rehab Unit at Segars Helping Patients Breathe Easy

The new pulmonary rehabilitation unit at Segars Clinic is helping people breathe easier.

Open since last November, the rehab unit at the clinic helps about 30 patients who have lung diseases like asthma or COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease) to get their lungs back in shape through breathing exercises and aerobic exercises that help increase lung strength and endurance, according to Mickie Wooten, a registered respiratory therapist who runs the clinic.

"This class is the best thing that's happened to me. Before I started [this respiratory therapy program] I could not make it through a store without stopping to rest," said respiratory patient Robert Montgomery, of Iuka.

Montgomery quit smoking in 1997, but his weakened lungs still suffer from asthma, and he was only able to walk for six minutes on the treadmill when he started the pulmonary rehab program. Now he says he does 30 minutes on the treadmill, and 30 minutes on the stationary bike, and a lot of it is due to the encouragement of therapist Wooten, and respiratory technician Lisa Wooten.

Montgomery, 55, said

he walked with a cane and felt about 100 years old when he started, but the program has given him new life. An additional benefit is that he has lost 18 pounds, and he only has to take reduced medication by sublingual.

Patients are evaluated with a computer that tests their breathing before beginning the 16-week program, and monitored each week. They attend the rehabilitation sessions two or three days a week, and are under the supervision of Mickie and Lisa, who encourage them as they fight to increase their lung strength.

Those interested in getting respiratory help need to see a doctor at Segars Clinic, or check there for more information.

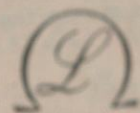

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS OF SAID MUNICIPALITY IN THE MAXIMUM PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF TWO MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,775,000) FOR IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID MUNICIPALITY, CONSISTING PRIMARILY OF IMPROVEMENTS, REPAIRS AND EXTENSIONS TO THE WATERWORKS AND WATER SUPPLY FACILITIES OF SAID SYSTEM; AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "Municipality"), as for and on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines and declares as follows:

1. The waterworks, water supply, sewage and sewage disposal facilities of the Municipality have heretofore been combined and operated as a combined system known as the combined water and sewer system of the Municipality (the "System").

2. It is necessary and advisable and in the best interest of the Municipality and its inhabitants to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Two Million Seven Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$2,775,000) for improvements, repairs and extensions to the combined water and sewer system of said municipality, consisting primarily of improvements, repairs and extensions to the waterworks and water supply facilities of the System (the "Authorized Purpose") for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand.

3. The Governing Body has employed Cook Coggin Engineering, Inc., Corinth, Mississippi, a competent engineering firm, to study the System, determine the nature and extent of the improvements and repairs and extensions necessary thereto, and make an estimate of the cost thereof.

4. Said engineers have determined the nature and extent of the necessary improvements, repairs and extensions to the System and have made an estimate of the cost thereof. Based on the information, the estimated cost thereof is the aggregate amount of Two Million Seven Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$2,775,000).

5. Said improvements, repairs and extensions are necessary and are economically feasible and would be in the public interest and benefit to the Municipality, and the findings of said engineers, hereby adopted, including the estimate of the costs of the improvements, repairs and extensions.

6. Under the provisions of Sections 21-27-11 through 21-27-13 Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Act"), the Municipality is authorized to make such improvements, repairs and extensions and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion thereof, such costs, by and through the issuance of bonds, the principal interest of and on which shall be payable from the revenues of the System.

7. The Municipality reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the aforesaid purpose prior to the issuance of bonds and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse the expenditures made in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds.

8. A sum not exceeding Two Million Seven Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$2,775,000) must be provided and raised by the issuance of special obligation bonds in said amount, payable both as to principal and interest from the revenues of the System authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Governing Body does hereby declare its intention to issue combined water and sewer system revenue bonds of the Municipality in the maximum principal amount of Two Million Seven Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$2,775,000) "Bonds" for the Authorized Purpose. Pursuant to Section 1.156 of the Treasury Regulations (the "Reimbursement Regulations") the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse the expenditures made for the Authorized Purpose prior to the issuance of the Bonds with proceeds of the Bonds to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations.

SECTION 2. Said bonds in the amount, for the purpose of the aforesaid will be authorized to be issued at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the City Hall on July 6, 2010, 7:00 o'clock p.m., which date so fixed will be more than ten days after the third (3rd) date of publication of this resolution directed by Section 3 hereof. If a petition signed by not less than twenty percent (20%) of the qualified electors of the Municipality filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of such revenue bonds issue on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election shall be held on the question of the issuance of such bonds shall be called and as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds shall be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof, and may be sold under the regular procedure for sale of such bonds.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be published once a week at least three (3) consecutive weeks in the Tishomingo County News, a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the Municipality, and being a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972. ## CONSERVATION CORNER

Research Project Studies Alligator Gar  
by James L. Cummins

A fish longer than 7 feet, heavier than 200 pounds and able to survive out of water for 2 hours sounds like a fictional animal. However, this is not a fictional animal, it is the alligator gar and researchers at Mississippi State University (MSU) are working to protect it.

The population of the alligator gar is in decline, primarily due to loss of spawning habitat and overfishing by anglers. Scientists and graduate students in MSU's College of Forest Resources are hoping to reverse this trend.

"The alligator gar was once thought to eat only game fish, so anglers set out to remove them from slow-moving rivers and reservoirs," said Daniel Schwarz, a graduate student in MSU's Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Aquaculture. "Now we know that alligator gars are opportunistic feeders and will eat anything from fish to birds."

This species of gar is one of the largest freshwater fish in North America. It gets its name from the two rows of sharp upper teeth in its long snout. This makes the gar look like an alligator. Once common from Illinois to the Gulf of Mexico, the monstrous fish is now concentrated only in the Southeastern United States.

While scientists understand the feeding habits of these fish, they know little about their habitat. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is currently tagging

alligator gar with acoustic transmitters to determine their preferred habitat.

While the government agency is tracking the gar in its natural habitat, Schwarz will work with the fish at the university's South Farm aquatic facility. He will use an experimental system of

large, drainable tanks that simulate real-life conditions but easily allow manipulation. He is trying to determine the saltwater needs of this elusive, aquatic vertebrate.

"I will expose alligator gar at two different ages to different levels of salinity to determine the effects on their growth," Schwarz said. "The alligator gars will be kept in each treatment for 30 days."

"We will take numerous measurements, including their weights at the beginning and end of the 30-day period, food conversion ratio, drinking rate and the concentration of salts in the fish," Schwarz said.

Studying the fish in a laboratory is somewhat unconventional. Most studies examine the species in its natural habitat of rivers and reservoirs. The knowledge gained from the study will improve management practices for protecting this species of gar.

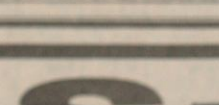

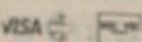

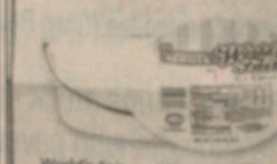
