Page & Hammock Sign with Northeast

Northeast Mississippi Community College women's basketball coach Ricky Ford was able to sign some of the best basketball players who will enter his 30th season at Northeast, inked five in-players. Anna Brooke Page and Zoey Hammock from Belmont County were named Class 3A champions. Bree Harris and Carling from Class 2A running from Booneville all signed to play for the Lady Tiger basketball team starting in the fall of 2010.

Page and Hammock signed to play basketball with Northeast Mississippi Community College last week, accompanied by family, and coaches from Belmont and Northeast. During her senior season, Page was named to the Class 3A All-State and All-North Half teams and was recognized as the Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal's female Player of the Year for 2010. Page was also named to the Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal's All-Area team. While leading the Lady Cardinals to the Class 3A state championship, Page was named the 2010 Cellular South Most Valuable Player for the Class 3A State Championship and was also the 2010 Cellular South Scholar Athlete of the championship game. Page has excelled off the court as well as on it. The daughter of Stanley and Terry Page of

Tishomingo will graduate as her high school's valedictorian for 2010 and has carried a 4.0 grade point average all four years of her high school career. Zoey Hammock, a 5-4 guard, will join Page in the second Belmont Cardinal on the 2010 team when the Belmont senior brings her 13-point, 2.5-assist average to the Lady Tiger basketball program. Hammock, who helped carry the Lady Cardinals to the Class 3A state championship, was named to the Northeast Mississippi Daily Journal All-Area third team in 2010 as well as being named to the Division 1-3A All-Division team. Zoey is the daughter of Mark and Tammy Hammock of Belmont.

Matthews Recognized as One of Most Influential People in South

Gary Matthews is one of the most influential people in the South. He is the executive director of the local economic development group in Tishomingo County. Gary's big catch in 2009 was ATK, which announced an expansion of its plant in Tishomingo County that represents 650 new jobs and a minimum investment of \$175 million.

Over the past 35 years, Gary has earned over three dozen certifications in economic and community development and has been involved in the creation of over 11,000 new jobs in Mississippi. Gary has received numerous awards and was named national "Dealmaker of the Year" in 2000 for putting together \$470,000,000 in deals in one year. A native of Neshoba County, Mississippi, Gary has worked in Washington, D. C., Harrison County, Jackson County, a nine-county region in East Central Mississippi, Kemper County, Atlanta County and, since the end of 2003, Tishomingo County. Tishomingo County has ranked in the top ten counties in new and expanded industrial projects for four of the last six years, and, in 2009, was ranked number one in the south for new and expanded projects for communities under 22,000 population. Tishomingo County also received a national honor recently from Trade & Industry Development journal which selected the county from over 1,000 communities in North America.

"This is a great honor for Gary, and for the county," said TCDJ Chairman Dan Young. "We really don't appreciate him enough." In an interview last week,

Matthews discussed the current economic development status in the county. Matthews: What does it take to be a successful economic developer? Personal sacrifice is key. Economic development requires so many skills that you must train and remain committed, mostly on your own time. The hours are long, the requirements of prospects always unreasonable, the expectations of the public always unrealistic, and you must work thousands of details, any one of which can kill a project. Additionally, conscientious developers often have to tell local leaders things that they may not want to hear. That is why so few local developers last more than five

Iuka Teacher Held for Grand Jury Review

Circuit Court Judge Jim Pounds determined Monday there is enough probable cause for an Iuka Middle School coach/teacher to face a molestation charge. Following Pounds' decision, a warrant was issued for Iuka Middle School teacher Tim Yeager and he was released on \$1,000 bond, according to County Prosecuting Attorney Nick Phillips. One witness, and a law officer took the stand at the hearing,

and Phillips. Yeager's case is expected to be presented to a Tishomingo County Grand Jury next month to determine if there is enough evidence to hold a trial. According to persons at the school, Yeager has not been at work since February 25th. Tishomingo County Schools Superintendent Malcolm Kayserfeld said he could not comment on Yeager's status, since it is a personal issue.

Board Gets EMA Update

Board meets Thursday to accommodate conference

County EMA Director Bill Strickland met with the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors last week to provide an update on issues his office handles. Along with Strickland, Hannah Hamn, Deputy Administrator of Floodplain Management, was present and they gave the Fourth District a sign to place at an occasionally flooded roadway. If the sign is posted, and documentation is sent to the Flood Plain Management officials, additional signs can be provided to the county for no cost, explained Strickland. Strickland and Hamn also requested a new laptop for the EMA/Flood Control office, with enhanced memory capabilities to hold GIS mapping information and programs. The board asked Strickland if the county would again be participating in the storm shelter program, but he said that was not available at this time, and had no indication it would be anytime

soon. In the program that ended last year, more than 250 applications were received for the program that reimbursed 75 percent of the cost of installing a storm shelter. The shelters and installation averaged \$3,600, and 175 were installed throughout the county. Shelters with a capacity of about 32 persons each were installed at Carter's Branch, Padon, Dennis, Tishomingo and Midway Fire Departments for community use, and the county was reimbursed for them through the same program. Strickland also advised the board on a situation in which MEMA is having some difficulty meeting that they are supposed to reimburse the county for fire emergency generators. The board announced they would meet Thursday, April 15th, at 10 a.m., because they would be meeting to the state supervisors' conference the work of the 19th, their regularly scheduled meeting.

years in the profession.

McRae: What is holding back the economy of Tishomingo County?

I hope you are not expecting an easy and short answer. This is probably one of those responses that most people don't want to hear.

The most serious problem in Tishomingo County is attitude. After 40 years of major construction projects such as the Tenn-Tom Waterway, the TVA nuclear power plant, and the NASA facility, many citizens feel that economic development is a freebie, that there is no cost and no effort involved.

Economic development in reality is more competitive than ever with over 30,000 communities competing for a handful of industrial projects each year. Communities must work hard and invest real dollars in competing.

To make matters worse, the local economy for decades has been based on low skill manufacturing jobs in branch plants, and most of those jobs have now moved out of the USA. Many replacement jobs are skilled jobs for which our workforce is not prepared.

Another impediment is too many "experts" in economic development. Some people are more willing to listen to a coffee shop "expert" who has never created a single job than to a professional economic developer with decades of experience and a successful track record. I certainly do not have all the answers, and I am not always right, but I do have enough cruel experience to understand what might and might not work. Professional economic developers deserve to be heard just as one would listen to the advice of an attorney or engineer.

Another impediment is the belief that recruited industry is the only worthwhile source of new jobs. This is not true. The communities that have the most vibrant economies are those that have a mix of economic activities. The wealthiest communities in the USA are often retirement communities; the poorest communities are often agricultural or manufacturing based communities. Citizens need to understand and appreciate small business owners, agri-business owners, tourists, and retirees.

Tishomingo County is just beginning to make economic progress but continued progress is dependent upon a positive attitude and real investments to prepare the county and our citizens for the future.

There seems to be division

between the north and south ends of the county. How does this impact our economic development effort?

There are some who feel that one part of the county might be getting more economic development attention than another. Remember that taxes collected from projects in the north end of the county pave just as many county roads in the south end as in the north end. Conversely, taxes collected in the south end buy just as many school books in the north end as in the south end. New jobs are available to qualified applicants regardless of where they live. Tishomingo County is too small and has too few people to be divided.

Approximately 85% of our extremely limited marketing dollars over the past two years has been spent on Belmont-Golden. Even six years ago, we knew Belmont-Golden would be a particularly difficult area and put over 65% of our marketing dollars into this area.

McRae: Some complain that there is nothing going on, especially in the south end of the county? How is it that Tishomingo County is winning awards and so many local citizens don't know what is going on?

Tishomingo County is 40 miles long and some of the industrial projects are out of sight at Yellow Creek Port or Tri-State Commerce Park. Tri-State is a secure location. Some do not appreciate or recognize home-grown industry, although some home-grown industries were just as difficult to accomplish as recruited industry. Although TCDF has spent about 85% of its marketing efforts just on Belmont and Golden over the past two years, the dollar amount is woefully inadequate. Most modern industries need water and rail transportation and proximity to four-lane highways so this puts Belmont and Golden at a disadvantage. Additionally, there are no more publicly owned industrial buildings in Belmont and Golden, and this is a hurdle when marketing to industrial prospects, most of whom are seeking publicly owned industrial buildings that they can move into quickly and cheaply. Belmont, on the other hand, is the entrepreneurial center of Tishomingo County and home-grown jobs are the best jobs because profits stay in the community and home owned companies are not as likely to relocate to China. We feel that Belmont and Golden have a bright future.

Belmont gets rave reviews for its clean and neat

appearance. Can you think of another community the size of Belmont with as much entrepreneurial activity or as many millionaires as there are in Belmont? I cannot think of one.

Some complain that we need a huge project that creates thousands of high paying jobs. Why don't we have a big project?

Tishomingo County bids on big projects often, but, being such a small county, we do not have the money to put on the table that larger communities have. For example, to match the bid on a recent large project, taxes in Tishomingo County would have to be increased by 325% to add to the incentives offered by the state. How many taxpayers would want a tax increase, regardless of how many new jobs might be created?

There is not a penny of local tax money in the industrial projects we have landed over the past six years. Tishomingo County has one of the largest industrial projects in the USA for 2009 with over \$82,000,000 in incentives, \$175,000,000 in private investment, \$30,000,000 in new grants, and over 600 new jobs in the pipeline. Again, not a penny of local tax money goes into this project. How long will the state and others continue to fund local projects when local taxpayers invest little or nothing in economic development projects?

I might add that for every one person who complains that we need more jobs, there are five who complain that we don't want outsiders moving in. This is a mixed message for new and expanding industries, tourists, and potential retirees.

Some say that everything we try to do in Tishomingo County is a failure. Why do so many projects seem to fail?

Only about one out of every 130 projects actually happens. That is about the same average as in other active communities. Whether a one person business or a corporation employing hundreds, most projects fail due to lack of private financing, legal, engineering or, environmental issues, workforce issues, the company does not pass a background check, or hundreds of other reasons. It is so complicated nowadays, that it is virtually a miracle when a project does happen.

On top of the increased complexity of projects is the time factor. Projects that 15 years ago could begin construction within six months now take up to three to five years. Projects that 15 years ago could begin hiring hundreds of workers immediately now take three to five years to reach full employment, or longer in some cases.

We hear complaints that most of the new industries don't employ many workers and that most of these new jobs go to people who live outside of Tishomingo County.

In order to compete globally, industry must adopt technology. If lots of workers are needed, companies go where the labor is cheap—China or Mexico, for example. So, technology is essential for any company to survive in the USA. Technology means fewer jobs, more skilled jobs, and greater training needs. A manufacturing worker today can produce as much as 100 workers 20 years ago due to technology. I know of one factory in a small town in central Mississippi that employed about 300 workers 15 years ago. Now, this same factory employs three workers, but these three workers are robotics technicians making six figure salaries who work on the several robots that produce more product than the 300 human workers.

Where workers live is outside of our power to control. Federal law prohibits discrimination in hiring based on where you live. Most of

the companies that locate here are making a good faith effort to hire as many local people as possible.

State officials have for years debated putting so much money into border areas where everyone knows that out of state workers will be employed. Fortunately for Tishomingo County and other border counties, the state has continued to pump in millions of dollars in grant money. What would happen if citizens of Tishomingo County could not work across state or county boundaries? Money and jobs do not recognize political boundaries.

We also hear complaints about new workers at Tishomingo County industries who chose to live outside of the county. We need to do a better job of informing new hires about the advantages of living in Tishomingo County. On the other hand, the most common complaint we hear from new hires is the difficulty in finding affordable housing, especially in the northern one third of the county.

The most common complaint we hear from employers is the difficulty in finding qualified applicants and the lack of work skills, especially in younger workers. We need to do a better job at encouraging workers to improve job skills. I think the county's commitment to pay for community college is a big step in the right direction. Northeast Mississippi Community College has done a superlative job in offering training opportunities to Tishomingo County citizens. A high school graduate can no longer expect to earn a living wage without additional training and education.

Why don't we know more about what the development foundation is working on?

Most business and industrial projects demand confidentiality nowadays and I often have to sign non-disclosure statements that are legally binding. Keeping projects secret is the most distressing part of economic development to me, but it is a requirement for most projects that is outside of our control. The development foundation also gives the credit for successful projects to others because we work behind the scenes with the thousands of details required to create a successful project. Also, most of the funding we use comes from other sources—we have no money ourselves to make projects happen. Another problem, again, is the dispersed nature of the population. We hear that over 1,000 new jobs are in the pipeline. When will these jobs be available to citizens? What if these jobs do not materialize?

Companies like Skyline Steel, G&G Steel, Wood Industries, JAMCO, Meridian Furniture, Max Home, and others have hired a few workers recently, and we are hopeful that the global economy will continue to improve and substantial hiring will crank up before the end of summer.

Since we are part of a global economy, the worry I have is that some seemingly insignificant event on the other side of the globe can have dire consequences on the economy of Tishomingo County. One of the problems with globalization, other than the loss of manufacturing jobs in the USA, is that local companies are exposed to much greater risk compared to the era before free trade.

With this increased global risk, there is always the chance that a project may not meet hiring commitments. Keep in mind that companies are thoroughly researched, financial records examined, and a background check run before any incentives and financing packages are offered. Companies must sign legally binding commitments of jobs and private investment before the state will invest in

the project. Usually, there are multiple sources of funding for projects and each source has a separate commitment requirement. Failure to meet job commitments can result in financial penalties, demands to repay grants and loans, and termination of leases or purchase agreements.

In short, we do everything possible to make sure that projects will materialize, but globalization adds much risk that is out of our control. There are no simple and easy answers.

How does the future look in Tishomingo County? Are there any red flags?

We are already seeing skilled job openings with no locally qualified applicants and no applicants willing to relocate to this area. Fortunately, we see more and more citizens going after their GED's and attending vocational and technical training. The county and a local foundation guarantee that anyone who wants to go to college or technical school can afford to go.

We feel that the unemployment rate will come down toward the end of this year and continue to drop to historic averages by the end of 2012.

There are some red flags in Tishomingo County's future. Here are some more facts that most people may not want to hear.

The public and private sectors are not engaged significantly in the local economic development program. The county is not investing the amount authorized by state law and most businesses are not members of the development foundation. A membership in TCDF costs less than a chamber of commerce membership in most counties. An economic development effort cannot succeed long-term without the involvement of the private sector.

To keep progress going, you must market and improve your community consistently and continuously. The development foundation has exhausted its extremely limited resources. I must say that Tishomingo County has the smallest budget of any development organization that I have ever worked for and there is not enough marketing money to keep the momentum going. Tishomingo County will slide backwards from this point, especially as we enter a new phase of economic development without available publicly owned industrial buildings.

It takes real money to pay for marketing—there are no other options. If you cannot afford to market your community, you don't need to be in the economic development business.

It does not matter what you have if no one knows about it. Whether you are marketing a community or toothpaste, you cannot expect to tell people about what you have in one or even a few messages. Marketing researchers have documented time and time again for over 80 years that you must market to potential customers many times (up to 12 times) before the message sinks in; then, you must reinforce this message frequently over a long period of time in many formats to keep the message alive.

Future progress is dependent on four factors:

- Increased public and private sector funding for greater marketing efforts via TCDF and the tourism council;
- Education of the public that a job is a job regardless of the source;
- Greater effort on growing home-grown jobs;
- Greater effort on improving job skills; and
- Getting citizens actively engaged and involved in improving their community and county.

In conclusion, the people of Tishomingo County can create a prosperous future with the help of partners. Our ancestors worked hard to create a county we could be proud of, and we must continue that tradition of investment and hard work to create a county that our children and grandchildren will be proud to inherit. No one will do it for us.

IUKA, Miss. — The U.S. Surgeon General has said, "Smoking cessation represents the single most important step that smokers can take to enhance the length and quality of their lives."

North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka is offering assistance for people who want to quit smoking. Beginning April 15, NMMC-Iuka will be the official site for a new ACT Center Tobacco Treatment Program. Sign up for the program will be held at the hospital from 4-7 p.m. Classes will start the following week.

Respiratory therapist Stephanie Carr and Regina Pyle will serve as coordinators of the program. The program is evidence-based and helps clients stop tobacco use through effective use of medicine and counseling.

Anyone who wishes to sign up for the program should bring a list of all medications and allergies, as well as the name of their primary care doctor, if they have one.

"We're excited to be able to offer this program," said Fred Truesdair, NMMC-Iuka administrator. "This is something that is much needed in our community, and I know it will go a long way toward improving the health of the people of our region."

Insight Into Eyesight

Night Myopia

Many people who
 have perfect vision in
 daylight have difficulty
 in focusing clearly upon
 distant objects at night.

Known as night myopia,
 this problem often be-
 gins with headaches and
 fear of driving after dark.

The trouble is that vision
 is usually tested either in
 daylight or in strong arti-
 ficial light - conditions
 under which night myo-
 pia cannot ordinarily be
 detected. Of course, if
 patients tell the eye doctor
 that they are having diffi-
 culty in seeing after dark,
 appropriate tests can then
 be made.

Night myopia must
 not be confused with
 night blindness, a tempo-
 rary disorder of the retina
 due to a deficiency of Vi-
 tamin A. Night myopia is
 permanent and occurs in
 those who, even by day,
 are almost, but not quite,
 in need of glasses for dis-
 tant vision.

When the lighting is
 poor, the lens has more
 difficulty changing shape
 to focus on distant objects.
 Night myopia is easily
 treated with spectacles to
 be worn only when driv-
 ing after dark.
