

Eastport predated Iuka, and was a critical strategic location during the Civil War as a thriving port, explained Harold Lomenick, of the Iuka Battlefield Commission.

Dr. Kitchens has donated all future proceeds from the sale of the new edition of Gunboats, and another soon-to-be-re-released book, Rosecrans Meets Price: The Battle of Iuka, to the Iuka Battlefield Commission, in conjunction with the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society.

New River Homes Second Factory to Close in Two Months

Meridian Furniture Closed Last Month

New River Homes announced this week that they were closing the business, making the second county employer to shut down in a month.

Meridian Furniture announced it's closure about a month ago, along with 35 jobs.

New River has employed as many as 300 in it's Burnsville facility, but recently about 60 workers were on the payroll, according to Tishomingo County Development Foundation statistics.

"The average family cannot borrow money nowadays to purchase a manufactured home," said owners Jack and Brad Beard in a statement released by Tishomingo County Development Foundation Tuesday. "The demand is great, but the money is non-existent."

'We are grateful for all the hard work by our former team

members," said Brad Beard. The state's rapid response team was in town August 25th to meet with former New River Homes team members to help them transition to a new job or retrain for another job, according to the release.

New River occupied a 100,000 square-foot facility that is owned by Tishomingo County. It consists of two buildings on a 39-acre site adjacent to Northeast Mississippi Waterfront Industrial Park, a 900 acre industrial park owned by Yellow Creek Port Authority.

The company has always been community-minded and not long ago built the band stand for Burnsville's Waterway Festival and other local events, stated the release. They donated eight computers and a copier from their offices to the Tishomingo County

"We thank the county board

of supervisors and the mayor and board of aldermen of Burnsville for all their help and support over the years," said Jack Beard. "We feel that with the pro-business attitude of local officials and workers, Tishomingo County's economy will do well once the recession is over."

Meridian Furniture opened with a ribbon cutting November 2009, complete with an appearance by Lt. Governor Phil Bryant. It specialized in upholstered furniture, and it's shutdown leaves only two furniture manufacturing companies operating in Tishomingo County, where there were once many.

Both companies claimed that the poor economic climate in the country, and the inability to borrow capital for expenses contributed to the shutdowns.


NOTICE OF TAX INCREASE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI

The City of luka Mayor and Board of Aldermen will hold a public hearing on its proposed budget for fiscal year 2010-2011 on Tuesday, September 7, 2010 at 6:30 p.m. at luka City Hall. At the meeting, a proposed advalorem tax revenue increase in the proposed budget will be considered.

The City of luka is now operating with a projected total budget revenue of \$5,671,000. \$224,000 of such revenue is obtained through advalorem taxes. For the next fiscal year, the purposed budget has total projected revenues of \$4,325,000. Of that amount \$243,000 is proposed to be financed through a total advalorem tax levy.

This increase in advalorem means that you will pay more in advalorem taxes on your home, automobile tag, utilities, business fixtures and equipment and rental property.

Any citizen of the City of luka is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed advalorem tax revenue increase in the budget and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken. If the Board of Aldermen passes this action, the city millage rate would go from 13.37 to 14.00.

This iten was written by ne Barnes and transcribed by aNae Vaugh. It was originally ublished in the Tishomingo County Nevs (Iuka, Miss.), December 9, 976.

All ghos towns are not in the west Eastpor, Mississippi, located at the head ofsteamboat navigation on the Misissippi side of the Tennessee Fiver in Tishomingo Tounty, is atinct. The river port anding there is now flooded by the waters of Piccwick Dam Reservoir.

Eastpct, so early citizens ave told, was in two separate ocalities. The first settlement was made on the water's edge and a disastrous lood came, sweeping away mun of the town, but indaunted the citizens built a hetter towron the hill, overlooking he bend of the river with Bear Creek in the distance

A rore beautiful location ould nevr have been found! Here n this boutiful bluff, overlooking ne sceni Tennessee Rive r, was built a town of good homes, brick churchessidewalk. Methodis and Baptist—a Masonic Lodge, anotel called The Mansion House, nd a female college in which were taught higher mathemtics, mental and moral philosophy, Latin, French, fine sewing, he making of wax and hair flowers and various other subjects.

Te school record of the Eastpor Female Institute in 1857 with Mss J. B. Lindsey as teacher, shows he following students: M. Sander, E. Sanders, L. E Whitaler, L. E. Rose, L. Barrett, B. Barret F. Winn, R. Winn, Charles Wamrack, J. Hughes, E. Biffle, F. Robinon, Jn. Wammack, R. L. McDaniel, McDaiel, Simcu, T. Simcox, Ida Christian, L Courn, and P. Coburn eastport was given its name

because it served as the port of contat with other towns and villags. It was to this shipping and suppy port that plantation owners and armers brought their produce for sipment to market and it was from this port that manufactured goos and supplies from other part of the country were obtained. Waon trains traveled by day and carped at well-known camping grands at night. A trip from Tuelo to Eastport usually required tre days and nights. Five or six semboats at a time would often wied up at Eastport, unloading achandise and reloading with cymodities for shipment to

An old timer once told of a in he made to Eastport when he ws 10 years old with his Uncle on from Itawamba County, Ississippi, in a steer wagon. It tok six days to make the trip, crying six bales of cotton in an od homemade tar wagon. The old sores with enormous stocks of oceries and hardware. After incle John sold the cotton to a Mr. linggs and was buying supplies to arry home, he noticed Uncle John equently visited the open barrels whiskey stored in a side room. It as raining that day and Uncle ohn had worn buckskin pants. As hey got wet and stretched, he kept utting off the legs with his knife. When they stopped to camp that

light, Uncle John's britches got ry and crawled up to his knees. He had to go back to Eastport and buy

im another pair. As the last of the Chickasaw ndians left in 1837 for their new ome in Indian Territory, many white families moved into the new ountry to establish homes and ake advantage of the newly pened territory. Although no data as been found on record to prove population, tradition says Eastport was a thriving town of ome 2,000 people. There were anufacturers, carpenters, shoe nakers, saddle makers, tanners, illers, merchants, cabinet makers, hysicians, druggists, farmers, and raders of all sorts who came to ttle at Eastport.

Two Governors of the State Mississippi first settled at astport. Governor John M. Stone ame to Eastport about 1854 from Milan, Tennessee, where he had been a school teacher. He clerked a store in Eastport for a time before moving to luka to become lation agent for the Memphis & Charleston Railroad, later known as the Southern Railroad.

Governor Robert Lowery noved from South Carolina with his father to Eastport in 1840 when he was nine years old. He then went to Smith County at the age of 0 years to live with an uncle, and om Smith County, he became

Governor in 1881

George Price Hammerly, born in Athens, Ala., in 1829, came to Eastport, Miss., at the age of 21 years and accepted a position as a salesman for A. T. Matthews. Mr. Matthews came to Eastport from

John H. Doan, a merchant, was born in South Carolina. Mr. and Mrs. Doan located at Eastport where they reared 10 children.

Among others at Eastport were: J. M. Nelson, merchant from S.C.; Thomas Billings, grocer, Tenn.; John Briggs, merchant, Ireland; George Wingo, saddler, Wheelock, carpenter, Mass.; W. B. Terry, planter, Tenn.; J. H. Hill, trader, England; John Barnett, farmer, S.C.; W. H. Muse, merchant, N.C.; Samuel Dewoody, druggist, Tenn.; R. T. Rutledge, merchant, S.C.; H. S. Brown, merchant, Va.; George Shehan, clerk, Ireland; Amber Bugg, farmer, Ga.; A. M. Scruggs, physician, Tenn.; J. B. Moore, physician, S.C.; Dan Castleberry, farmer, Ga.; J. McMahan, farmer, Ireland; G. W. Harvey, physician,

Eastport had her part in the Civil War. In one instance, after the Battle of Shiloh, the Federal gunboats pushed up the river and assembled at Eastport. A report from Brig. Gen. Sherman's headquarters at Shiloh, dated April 2, 1862, says "Eastport Landing during the late freshet must have been about 12 feet water, but at the present stage the landing is the best I have seen on the Tennessee River. The levee is clear of trees and snags, and a hundred boats could land there without confusion." His object was to dislodge the enemy from batteries recently erected near Eastport. The old "breast works" thrown up throughout the hills surrounding Eastport are still plainly visible and souvenir hunters still rake the hill sides for relics of the Battle at Eastport.

A detachment of 500 men and three cannons had been sent from Gen. Forrest's headquarters in North Alabama to Eastport. They took a position on the hill overlooking the river landing and at daybreak opened fire on the Federal gunboats lying at anchor in the river. The Federals cut loose from anchor and pushed off to drift out of range of the cannon fire. This left the Union soldiers in camp near the landing in panic. Many Negroes had attached themselves to the Union forces, and remembering what had happened to the Negroes in another battle a short time before, they were seized with consternation. A great number of Negroes plunged into the river and tried to swim to the retreating gunboats and hundreds drowned, according to the report. Forrest's men, who were Union forces, soon withdrew, having accomplished their mission of putting fear into the Union forces. The main struggle at Eastport occurred October 14,

The first post office was established at Eastport on May 30, 1842, with John Buttrill as postmaster. Those who followed were: Samuel Dewoody, Sept. 23, 1850; Wm. C. Phillips, April 30, 1856; Joseph S. Leake, Feb. 12, 1857; Wm. C. Phillips, Aug. 6. 1857; James H. Gillespie, May 5, 1858; John B. Alexander, Nov. 9, 1865; Benjamin Bence, Aug. 18, 1869; Wm. H. Banner, June 15. 1877; John W. Price, Aug. 18. 1879; Pinckney H. Davis, Sept. 13, 3 1880; Wm. H. banner, Oct. 12, 1881. The office was "discontinued to luka" on Dec. 18, 1883, but was re-established April 28, 1887, with Amelia Price as postmaster. It was discontinued again to luka on Nov. 9, 1889, but was re-established Feb. 20, 1892, with Rufus Skinner as postmaster. The post office was finally discontinued on Dec. 12,

Mr. Skinner was also the last merchant left after Eastport had met its doom. In 1892, he still conducted a general mercantile business in an old rundown shanghaied building, some 30 feet wide and 75 feet long. A number of similar buildings were along what had been "Main Street," but they were being used by colored families who had taken possession of them for living quarters. A few comparatively nice dwellings still remained at this time and were occupied by local farmers.





I recently read a book that made me think about how easy it is for a child to be abducted, and what a tragedy that can be. The book (Magic Hours by Kristin Hannah) was intriguing. A two year old and her mother had been abducted from home by a criminal. The mother died leaving the two-year-old child out in the wilds with a monster. Three years pass before the child is recovered.

I searched the internet for information on missing children in the USA. There are thousands upon thousands. The numbers should put fear into all parents with small children. From "National Incident Studies of Missing, Abducted, Runaway, and Throwaway Children" I obtained a wealth of information. These are children removed from control of the legal custodian without the consent of the custodian. Some facts reported, include:

- 800,000 children go missing every year in the USA · 200,000 are abducted by other family members
- · 58,000 are taken by nonfamily members
- · 2,000 children go missing every day
- 115 children are abducted by someone the child does not know who transports the child 50 miles or more,
- · kills the child, demands a ransom, or intends to keep the child permanently.

· More young girls are taken than males. Females are far more susceptible to a stranger's overture than are boys. Not all missing children's names make it to the databank.

Many children are found unhurt. Runaways may make themselves visible hoping to be returned to families. Authorities may force the issue when the child has been taken by a parent, grandparent, or other member of the child's family. Throwaway kids are simply left, most often, with a relative willing to take on the responsibility of care-

These persons, leaving the child, simply lack parental skills and emotions. Children taken by the mentally disturbed - sometimes, someone known to the family - may be recovered in time. A disturbed person or sexual predator may watch the family at church, at home when they are unaware, on the way to/from school, at school activities, or on the playground. Most children found are within a few miles of home where the abductor may also live.

Some things you can do to help protect your child

· For the younger set, mark you children's clothing with their name and a telephone number where you can be reached in case of an emer-

Make sure your child knows his/her first and last name, address, and the telephone number where you can be

· Instruct them to stay away from pools, rivers, creeks, branches without adult supervision.

· If the child is left home alone, advise that they are not to open the door.

· Instill in your child that he/she must never get into a vehicle with any unknown person, be cautious of known drivers. Tell them about the old puppy dog

- Choose babysitters with extreme care.
- Encourage background screening for all individuals supervising sports, and other activities.

Report your missing child to your local 9-1-1 number, or authorities, as soon as you are relatively sure the child cannot be located. Stay calm but be ready to provide the police, or local authorities, the following information:

- · Description of the child including the clothing worn that day.
- Provide a current (within last 6 months) photograph.

· Provide a list of friends, teachers and family members including telephone numbers that might help locate your child.

If the child is not found within 24 hours, you may be required to provide dental and or medical records. DNA samples may be required. It has been suggested that parents should - before your child goes missing - take a used toothbrush, ask the child to lick the seal of an envelope and store the 4. toothbrush away for possible future use. Fingerprint-

ing is also a good idea. If there is concern, and circumstances indicate that the child is likely to have been abused or sexually exploited, the FBI may be called in. The FBI has no jurisdiction outside the USA. They do, however, cooperate in handling 1,200 Hague and non-Hague cases annually where children are being held illegally in other countries.

As soon as it can be done, ask local authorities to put your missing child on ; Amber Alert, and that the child's name be entered in the National Crime Information Center Missing Person File.

Children are our nation's most precious asset. We must do everything possible to protect them. The fact that 800,000 go missing each year is astounding.

Strawberry Plains Audubon Center Hosts Annual Hummingbird Celebration

Holly Springs, MS - At about a tenth of an ounce, the Ruby-throated Hummingbird appears far too small and vulnerable to survive its annual fall migration from eastern North America to Mexico and Central Mexico. Visitors to the Hummingbird Migration Celebration in Holly Springs, Mississippi will have a chance to see hundreds of these tiny titans up close and hear their amazing story, as the birds pause at feeding stations to fuel up for their daunting journey, which includes a nonstop 500-mile flight over the Gulf of Mexico.

The celebration, one of the largest Audubon-sponsored nature festivals in the country, coincides with the peak of the Ruby-throated Hummingbird's southward migration. Nature enthusiasts of all ages are invited to the Strawberry Plains Audubon Center at 285 Plains Road, in Holly Springs, Mississippi to observe birdbanding demonstrations, learn more about the unique Mississippi ecosystem, and enjoy seeing hundreds of hummingbirds.

"We all look forward to the Hummingbird Celebration as much as our visitors do," said Madge Lindsay, executive director of Audubon Mississippi. "When you see one of these tiny birds, and gently hold it in your hand before it is released, you can't help but be inspired by the amazing diversity of life on our planet. Hummingbirds may be small in size, but they are mighty in their impact as ambassadors for nature and conservation."

The festival will once again enthrall observers with informative bird-banding sessions led by renowned hummingbird experts Bob and Martha Sargent of the Alabama-based Hummer/Bird Study Group. The Sargents and their banding crew will provide an up-close view of Rubythroated Hummingbirds in

all of their colorful glory, and some visitors will even have a chance to release the newly-banded birds back into the wild. Banding is an important tool for studying birds; small numbered leg bands enable scientists to monitor the birds, noting locations where they are observed and using this information to track migration and other life cycle information. As each bird visits one of the Sargent's enclosed feeders, it will be caught, banded, and released. At the 2006 festival the Sargents and their crew banded over 250 individual hummingbirds, a record for Strawberry Plains Audubon
