**Tuesday's Rainy Runoff** His Waterway experience could mean great things for Tishomingo County

In Tuesday's runoff election for Northern District Transportation Commissioner, Mike Tagert beat John Caldwell, Sr. with 53 percent of the vote.

In Tishomingo County, with 19 of 19 precincts reporting, Tagert received 473 votes, to Caldwell's 228. Turnout was low, due to heavy rain most of the day; of Tishomingo County's registered, active voters, only about 6 percent voted, according to Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk Donna Dill.

Tagert will fill nearly the last year of a four-year term of Bill Minor, who died in October. In November, the commissioner post will again be on the ballot for a new four-year term.

Since they were both Republicans, it may have seemed there was not much difference between the two, candidates. But Tagert, is currently Executive Director

I spent the day with my young granddaughter at your park with friends. I love that there are places available for me to take her, but was a little disappointed that the park is not kept up. I found dog poop in the rocks right at the base of the slides where the kids can step in it, also on one of the oldest play equipment, the boards on the footings are loose and do not touch the ground, posing a hazard in the stability of the equipment. Also up on the "crows nest" part, there is an obvious crack that needs to be re-welded because it poses a problem for children who might eventually fall through. In the gazebo, the light is busted, and one of the boards on the rails needs obvious repair. There are electrical openings that are uncovered(children are quick to explore things and we can't always keep up if they should decide to stick something in them.

I think if one is going to have a park, then the least you could do is try for some routine maintenance. People should be respectful and pick up after their dogs and not walk them under the play equipment where children are exposed to it .. trash should be disposed of properly and not tossed on the ground. supervision post-release (PRS or probation). She also must pay court costs and related fees.

Audie Parker, 42, pled guilty to an Alcorn County charge of conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. He was sentenced to 20 years with MDOC, seventeen of which were suspended. He must serve the remaining three years, and upon release will have five years PRS. For breaking his probation from a previous conviction, four years will be added to the sentence, and he must pay court costs and fines.

Patsy Patterson Moss, 35, pled guilty to sale of hydrocodone, and obtaining a controlled substance by fraud. She was sentenced to 20 years with MDOC. ). If she successfully completes the House Arrest program, she will have five years postrelease supervision (PRS or probation). She also must pay court costs and related fees

Walter Franklin, 34, pled guilty to burglary with intent to commit assault. He was sentenced to fifteen years with MDOC, and was given credit for time served. The balance was suspended and he must complete five years of PRS, and pay court costs and fines.

Lou Dooley, 73, pled guilty to possession of more than 30 grams, but less than 250 grams of marijuana. She was sentenced to three years with MDOC, given credit for time served, and the remainder was suspended. She must complete two years of PRS, and pay court costs and fines

Thomas Clayton Havers, II, 43, of Iuka, pled guilty to two counts of fondling. The District Attorney's office recommended a sentence of fifteen years with MDOC, with eleven suspended and four to serve, and five years PRS. They recommended he be required to register as a sex offender, serve his sentence day for day, and pay court costs and fees

Sentencing on Havers was suspended until May, said Assistant District Attorney Tyler Moss. He remains free on the original bail.

Bettina "Brandy" Wilson, 34, of Belmont, pled guilty to two counts of illegal sale of Suboxene. She was sentenced to twenty years with MDOC, and was placed in the House Arrest program. When she successfully completes the program, she will have five years PRS. Wilson must pay court costs and fines Amanda Hicks, 33, of Corinth, pled guilty to conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. She was sentenced to fifteen years with MDOC, all suspended, and must complete five years PRS, and pay court costs and fines Charles Andrew Adams, 28, of Glen, pled guilty to aggravated assault. He was sentenced to twenty years with MDOC, all suspended, and will serve five years PRS, pay court costs and fines, and have no contact with the victim or family. Assistant District Attorney Moss said the victim and his family approved the sentence. Edward Sides, 31, of Ripley, pled guilty to conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine, and was sentenced to twenty years with MDOC. He was given credit for time served, and the remainder suspended, and he must serve five years PRS, and pay court costs and fines. Dustin Thomas Richardson, 20, pled guilty to burglary and larceny of a building (G&M Wholesale, Iuka). He was sentenced to seven years with MDOC, and if successfully completes he the House Arrest program, will have five years PRS. He must also pay court costs and fines John Quintero, 41, of Burnsville, pled guilty to two counts of sale of hydrocodone and was sentenced to twenty years with MDOC, and if he successfully completes the House Arrest program, will have five years PRS. He must also pay court costs and fines. For an additional plea to illegal sale of marijuana (less than 30 grams), he was sentenced to three years, all suspended, to run concurrent with the other sentence.

# **Conservation Corner**

The Pre History of Hunting and Fishing, Part 2 by James L. Cummins

the prehistory of hunting and fishing from \$,000 to 1,000 B.C. Now, let's review the period from 1,000 B.C. to 1,000 A.D., which is termed as the Woodland Period

Hunting, gathering and

fishing continued by the

Last week, we explored means mentioned last week for hundreds of years until around 700 A.D. when the bow and arrow were introduced and implemented in hunting. The ease of use and efficiency of this weapon made it the favorite of hunters and warriors alike. Let's advance to the pe-

riod of 1,000 to 1,542. which is called Mississippian. During this period, Indians learned how to hunt

fishing. As they became more dependent on agriculture and other fishing methods, hunting became more of a recreational activity.

Fish weirs and traps were made of wood. Sharpened stakes of pine, hickory and sweetgum were placed in streams and small rivers with the stakes forming a funnel. At the small end, which was downstream, a cane trap was placed to catch the fish.

Next, was the period of European Exploration. which occurred from 1542 to 1650. The Europeans brought with them devastating diseases that the Indians had no resistance to and their populations were decimated. It was also during this period that the Indians used deer drives to hunt. They would form a "U" shape and close the circle and then walk inward. forming a small circle. where the deer could be easily shot. Another method to hunt deer was to use the head and hide of a deer and stalk them with bow and arrow. Finally, fire was used to drive deer and other game to a river or over a

was the most esteemed. The flesh was cooked, dried or smoked. The skin was used for clothing. Antler tips were used for arrow points. Dried sinew and entrails were used for bow strings, thread for sewing and for fish nets.

Bear was also useful. The skins were used for winter robes and bed coverings. The skin was also good for moccasins and hunting boots. Bear oil, which was made from fat, was used for cooking, dressing the hair and as a body rub.

Fish were speared with a gig, somewhat resembling today's frog gig. They sometimes poisoned the fish by grinding up nuts from the Buckeye tree and placing this powder in the water. They had learned that this would kill the fish from lack of oxygen but would cause no harm to the meat

As you go out in the woods to hunt or on a lake to fish, try envisioning what it must have been like for our ancestors. You will realize just how far we have come. It is truly amazing.







How Many Disciples Said **They Would Die** With Jesus?

Often we hear people talk about Peter's denial of Jesus, which was definitely a wrong thing for a follower of Jesus to do. It may not have occurred to some people, however, that Peter was not alone in his commitment to go with Jesus all the way to death, if need be Matthew 26:35 says, "Peter said unto Him, Though I should die with Thee, yet will I not deny Thee, Likewise also said all of the disciples." Perhaps some people have never noticed that Peter was brought into the presence of the high priest by John (John 18:15 -18). Peter was put into a place to be asked whether he were one of Jesus' disciples, while the other disciples never faced this exact temptation.




