Mid-Day Burglary at Woodall Mountain Home Shocking

Ransacked while children upstairs

Authorities are looking for the suspect in the shocking midday burglary of a Woodall Mountain home.

Monica Whitehurst went to work around 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, on errand and get lunch for her son, who were home for the break holidays. Her daughter and friend went to Luka with them, they left the two boys upstairs playing video games, said Whitehurst.

When she returned home around noon, she found her living room a wreck - someone had broken into her audio-video equipment from its cabinet. Monica just couldn't believe that someone had come downstairs and mess like that, I thought they were trying to hook up their system downstairs!"

When she asked the boys about it, the boys said they had heard something downstairs, thought it was Monica and the burning home. When Monica went back upstairs, she found her and her son's bedroom ransacked. All her jewelry was taken, other personal belongings, and wasn't like the house empty," said Monica. There were still two cars in the driveway.

The incident is still under investigation, said Sheriff Glenn Whitlock.

"We're still gathering preliminary information, but we hope for a speedy conclusion," said Whitlock.

Luka Burglary Foiled

In a separate incident, an Luka man and his wife were able to foil an attempted break-in in the middle of the night Saturday.

According to Ben Burns, of Luka, he and his wife heard noises several times on their deck, and when they went to investigate and make sure all was secure, they didn't find anything.

Satisfied all was well, his wife, Selena, went toward the back of the house to check on the children in their rooms. She saw someone through a window trying to get in the door. Her scream frightened the would-be burglar away, said Burns.

The suspect looked short, and was wearing an oversized, hooded coat, said Burns.

"This is getting crazy," said Burns. He explained that they have had items stolen out of their cars in their driveway.

"He's lucky I wasn't the one who saw him, because I had a loaded gun in my hand," said Burns.

An Luka Police Department spokesman said the Luka incident is still under investigation.

Fire Damages Rental Home on Redbud Lane

About 3:15 Monday afternoon Ms. OraLee McManus looked up from feeding her horses to see one of her rent houses, above, with smoke billowing out

from under the west side of the roof. She quickly contacted 911, and Luka and Midway firefighters responded to the fire. No one was in the house at the time, said McManus.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation, according to Tishomingo County Fire Investigator Jetse Jones.

Development Foundation Warns of Possible Advertising/Telephone Scam

Citizens and businesses in Tishomingo County need to be cautious when asked to provide credit card information by unsolicited callers.

Tishomingo County Development

Foundation, in conjunction with Southern Engineering, GPF, Inc. of Glen, is preparing to publish a new map of Tishomingo County, similar to ones done in the past - the familiar blue and white ones seen in area businesses.

Together, they are visiting businesses personally, asking them to help sponsor the cost of producing the maps, and, in turn, including their business' advertisement on the maps. TDCF and the Tourism Council include the maps in promotional packets, and distribute them to businesses, realtors, visitors, retirees, etc.

Another entity, calling itself Premier, has also been telephoning businesses selling advertising for a map, but they ask the business owner to pay up front by credit card, in exchange for an added perk, like additional maps when they are published, or a 20% discount.

"They may also be doing a map, but we just want people to know it is not TDCF, and they are not affiliated with us," said TDCF Administrator Theresa Cutshall.

"We will not ask for any credit card information, and we visit you in person," she stressed.

Authorities urge you to NEVER give out your credit card information over the phone to people who call you. Legitimate operations or causes will be glad to send you an invoice, and not ask for advance payment.

School Board Approves 7 Extended Days to Make Up Last Snow Day

The Tishomingo County School District has announced it will add time to seven school days to make up a snow day students had to miss due to inclement weather and its associated risks.

State law dictates that schools must be in session a minimum of 180 days each school year, and the Tishomingo County School District has five snow days to make up and meet the state requirement. Four make up days were already built into the calendar, which called for students getting out May 26th, and teachers on May 27th (designated a "staff-development" day on the calendar).

Making up the fifth snow day by adding another day would mean students would attend until Friday, May 27th, and presumably a staff development day May 31st, the Tuesday after Memorial Day.

In a letter sent out to parents before Spring Break, Superintendent Malcolm Kuykendall explained that the Governor has signed HB 1156, which authorizes the state board of education to make a determination of altering a school district's calendar on a case-by-case basis.

The Tishomingo County

School Board approved, at the Thursday, March 10th regular board meeting, the District's plan of adding 55 minutes to seven days to make up the last snow day.

Kuykendall said, given the choice, state tested (MCT2 and SATP2) principals and teachers would rather add fifty-five (55) minutes to seven days before the state tests, instead of going one more day.

The extended days will be on March 22, 23, 24, 28, 29, 30 and 31; or Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday next week, and Monday through Thursday the final week of March.

Information on when during the day the time would be added seemed to vary by school, so parents can ask administrators at their students' respective schools.

Extended Days

These days will be extended 55 minutes to make up for the last snow day.

"What many people in our state don't realize is that every family should carry flood insurance on their home, even if they don't think they are at risk of flooding," said MEMA Executive Director W. Mack. "Many of the areas impacted by flooding are outside

of the special flood hazard areas."

The entire state of Mississippi is a mapped flood zone with more than 3 million acres that fall within the "High Risk Zones" which means we all share some risk.

Since the creation of the NFIP in 1978 there have been 42 Presidential Disaster declarations in Mississippi. 36 of those declarations were for flooding at a cost of nearly \$3 billion.

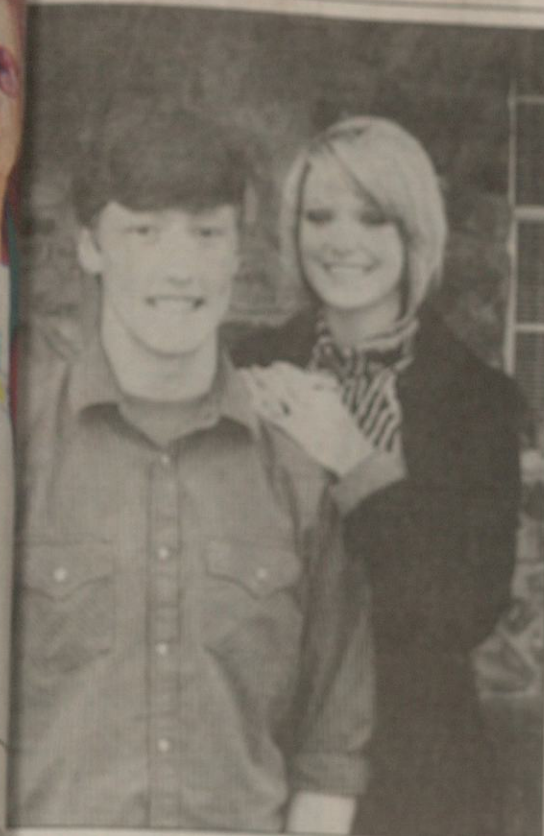

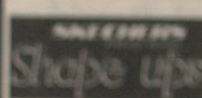

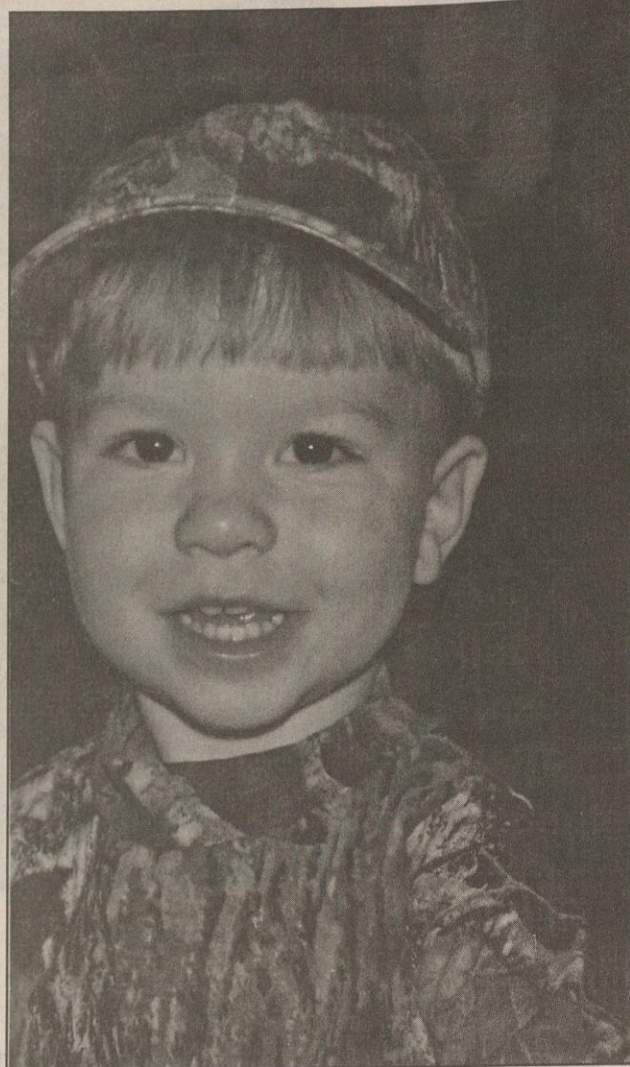

Tishomingo County Youth Prepare to Kick Butt

On March 23rd, Mississippi youth in Tishomingo County will join kids in other counties and states to voice their opposition to big tobacco companies during 2011 Kick Butts Day.

Kick Butts Day is an annual nationwide initiative in which kids lead the effort to snuff out youth tobacco use. As part of this year's Kick Butts Day celebration, the Mississippi

Tobacco-Free Coalition (MTFC) of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties is working with students at Burnsville, Tishomingo County, Belmont, Tishomingo, Iuka Elementary and Iuka Middle to help them educate their peers about tobacco companies' deceptive marketing practices.

"The tobacco companies refer to kids as 'replacement smokers.' Kick Butts Day is an opportunity for participating youth to speak out and tell others they are not going to be influenced by pressure to use tobacco products," said Melissa Nash, Director of the MTFC of Prentiss and

Tishomingo Counties.

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of death in the United States, killing more than 400,000 people every year. Every day, more than 4,000 kids try their first cigarette, one-third of whom will die prematurely as a result. Each year, 4,200 Mississippi kids under the age of 18 become new, daily smokers. Sixty-nine thousand Mississippi kids now under 18 will ultimately die prematurely from smoking, according to the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids.

"Mississippi's kids play a huge role in helping to reduce youth tobacco use in our state," said Roy Hart, Director of the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) Office of Tobacco Control. "The kids participating in Kick Butts Day 2011 are sending two very important messages: they want the tobacco industry to stop targeting them with advertising, and they want elected leaders to do more to protect them from tobacco."

Through MSDH, young advocates take in a variety of tobacco prevention activities throughout the school year, including working with officials to develop programs that reduce youth tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke, and educating their peers about the dangers of tobacco use.

The MTFC of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties is a community-based organization that works to promote the initiation of tobacco among youth, reduce exposure to secondhand smoke, promote tobacco cessation services, and eliminate tobacco-related disparities.

Make Money Recycling

Is your backyard or barnyard loaded with old rusted metal objects that have not been used in years, perhaps never? Some may have been there since grandfather or Dad turned the farm over to you. Old appliances left from bygone days out on the carport or stored on the back patio. Tanks, fences, buckets, plows, tin cans, cast iron bathtubs, old siding, old metal bikes, tricycles, even vehicles can be turned into hard cash. The big metal recycling center, SMC on Harper Road in Corinth, will take your metal garbage, as well as tin cans and pay you immediately after disposal. This will help clean up our county and give you some money to spend in these times of economic pressure.

We took our second load of metal "stuff" there today. I am so happy to have our property cleared. I'm sure the neighbors are too. We live on a farm that has been handed down for several generations. Nothing was ever discarded.

Last week, when Larry invited me to drive with him to a major recycling center to get rid of a load of metal "junk" and some old batteries. I declined, but the man can be persistent. And how I did love the idea of getting rid of these old things that have been cluttering the barnyard for years and years. After the third or fourth, "Are you sure you don't want to go with me?" I relented, grabbed a sweatshirt, and climbed into the truck. I didn't expect too much from this trip.

Upon arrival at the dump we were directed

to a line leading to a scale which weighed the truck, trailer and metals we would be unloading. A huge green plastic number was set on top of the cab. We were then pointed to the appropriate line for our load to be dropped. There were cars, trucks with trailers and pickups waiting so it took about thirty minutes or so before we were unloaded. I took this time to watch all that was going on. It was interesting, in fact amazing. They are very efficient there handling tons of disposable waste, making our Earth a greener place.

After the metal was unloaded we were sent to another line to dispose of three old batteries. These brought about \$10.00 each. Some are worth more than others. Tin cans are unloaded and crushed here too.

I was astounded by the vast area this facility covered. More so by the mammoth, unending, piles of metal items. It was similar to arriving at Cape Canaveral a day before take-off. Or an ant hill where every one knows their job and does it efficiently. Trucks, bobcats, earthmovers, crushers, tractors, front-loaders, and equipment with gigantic magnets, picking up metal as easily as a chicken handles bugs, all moving metal discards industriously in all directions. Conveyors running every which way were actively sorting all this debris into categories. Crushers were smashing cars at an amazing rate. There were dumpsters full of stainless steel, whopping bales of aluminum siding, immense piles of crushed cars, steel and other alloys.

Our load consisted of old metal plows, unknown metal wheels, old bikes, big wheels, and some unrecognizable items, long since their prime. I asked Larry if we could take all those old metal things along his garden. He was dismayed that I did not recognize these collectibles as plows, etc. for his two tractors. Looks like junk to me.

After we had unloaded the truck we were sent back to the line at the scale and weighed again. They reclaimed the big plastic number. Then "lo and behold," Larry was given a check for more than \$200 for our metal garbage. They pay approximately \$10.00 for a 100 pounds of metal. Our first load was more than 1700 pounds.

I'm suggesting everyone take advantage of this amazing phenomenon by taking all your pop cans, old toys, appliances, cars, old trailers, metal things that are just collecting rust, abandoned batteries, including vehicles abandoned, and old unused farm equipment over to this recycling plant to exchange for cold hard cash. You don't need a truck to do this. Many of the patrons had their disposables in the trunk of their automobiles.

A visit to a recycling center could be an interesting field trip for any school class.

Now if there was only a place that paid for all the paper litter along our highways and roads.

Ok, it is your turn, lets load up all those old metal items to trade for a few extra dollars today. Everyone will benefit from your efforts.

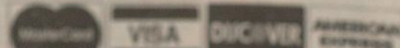
