Three-year-old Fighting for Survival After Severe Abuse

Two Charged with Child Abuse and Neglect

A three-year old Iuka boy underwent surgery Tuesday to repair damage done by severe abuse; his mother and her friend are in custody of the Tishomingo County Jail, charged with child abuse and neglect.

The case of the child came to light when a family member his mother visited the home, and became suspicious of why the mother did not want her to see the boy, to whom she was. She managed to enter the home on Ash Street in Iuka Monday, according to family members, and what she found there made her fall to her knees.

A three-year old boy lay on the sofa, so badly abused that he was motionless. When she pulled back covering that was on him, extensive injuries were revealed that made her beg the mother to get medical help. The mother allegedly would not allow the child to be taken to the hospital, but would allow a certain nurse to check him. When the family member left the house to find the nurse, she called the Iuka Police. When Officer Anita Mitchell arrived at the scene, she arrested the mother, and arranged to have the child taken to Iuka Hospital, and another minor child placed in safe custody.

The three-year-old (name withheld on minors) was flown to LeBonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis, where he was stabilized and on Tuesday afternoon underwent surgery to repair extensive injuries, including some that were allegedly caused by burns, and strikes to the head, said family members. Skin grafts were neces-

sary to make repairs that could not otherwise be repaired in surgery, said a family member.

Wednesday morning at press-time, he was awake and doing ok, said Melinda Whited, who has been granted custody of the children, to whom she is related on their father's side.

Whited, who is in the law enforcement field, said, "I've seen a lot, and the wounds are the worst I've seen in my life."

Doctors estimate that the oldest wounds on the three-year-old were about three days old, said Whited. They told her that in a few more hours, without medical attention, he would have died.

Jennifer Hale Belue, 30, is in the Tishomingo County Jail charged with child abuse and neglect. She was already on probation for a previous, non-violent, conviction.

Johnnie Lee Massengill, 27, of County Road 127, was apprehended by Iuka Police Tuesday about 5 p.m. He also reportedly had been living in the home since September, said family members, but was not home when the initial arrest was made.

Massengill was taken to the Tishomingo County Jail, where he got in a fight with the other inmates, because they lost television privileges as a consequence of him smuggling cigarettes in, said Sheriff Glenn Whitlock. He didn't require medical attention, said Whitlock.

The case is still under investigation by the Iuka Police, said Chief Randy Stringer Wednesday morning.

Tenn-Tom Waterway Celebrates 26th Year in 2011

Time Capsule from 1985 Presented to Archives & History Museum

At a ceremony held December 9th at the new Tenn-Tom Waterway Museum in Columbus, Mississippi marking the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, time capsules were opened that include 1985 memorabilia from each of the counties bordering the 234-mile long man-made waterway.

Martha Segars, a member of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, and Tishomingo County resident, was given the Tishomingo County box, and plans to donate the time capsule to the County Archives and Historical Museum in Iuka.

Mrs. Segars brought the time capsule to show John Biggs, who was mayor of Iuka at the time, and a board member of the Tenn-Tom Waterway Development Authority from 1972-1976, during the planning and Congressional approval stages.

After 12 years of construction, and one of the largest earth-moving projects in history, the Waterway opened to commercial traffic in January 1985. Mr. Biggs, and Mrs. Segars were at the dedication ceremony at Yellow Creek Port in May of 1985, which was reported in newspapers included in the time capsule.

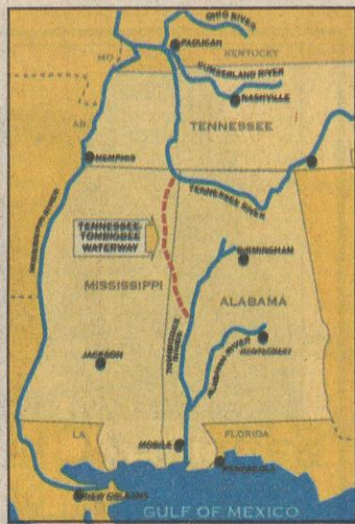
The time capsule contains many interesting items that local folks chose in 1985 as representative of Tishomingo County. There are arrowheads, and copies of newspapers of the time. There is

a jar of seeds of agricultural products grown in the county, and items from area students. A picture and history of the New Lebanon Free Will Baptist Church of the Cairo community showing their new sanctuary building being built, and other photos showing people, buildings and churches of the time are also in the collection.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway is a connecting link between established water transportation routes that serve shippers and producers in the South and the Midwest as well as deep water ports along the eastern Gulf of Mexico. This unique feature has already benefited commercial interests in 18 states since it opened for business in 1985. It's location through Tishomingo County helps to attract industries that need water transportation to move products - often very, very large objects weighing several tons, that can't move over land feasibly.

The 234-mile waterway begins at its northern end at Pickwick Lake on the Tennessee River, flows through northeast Mississippi and west Alabama, and connects with the established Warrior-Tombigbee navigation system at Demopolis, Alabama. From there, commerce travels northward as far as Port Birmingham, Alabama or south to Mobile, Alabama, and other destinations along the Gulf coast.

The main features of the Tenn-Tom are 10 locks and dams and a 29-mile man-made canal, one of the largest earth moving

projects in history. The 10 locks raise or lower barges and boats a total of 341 feet, the difference in elevation between the two ends of the waterway. There are some 40 recreation areas that provide easy access to nearly 44,000 acres of water - related sports and other activities. In addition, marinas are located along the Tenn-Tom and connecting waterways to meet the needs of local as well as transient boaters.

Over 110,000 acres of land were acquired for the construction and operation of the project. Some of these lands are available for public hunting. Also, another 88,000 acres, mostly bottomland hardwoods, have been purchased from voluntary sellers and managed by the two state conservation agencies for wildlife habitat.

No Trespassing Please

December 31, 1910, my great-grandfather Redmond purchased the tract of land that I have now inherited. Less than three years later he died, leaving a house in Iuka and some other nearby properties to my great-grandmother, my grandfather and my great-aunt.

To provide for the family, the other properties were gradually sold, and all who knew why this one parcel was held onto for so long are now gone. For most of a century the only use my family had for this property was selling the trees from it to keep ahead of taxes.

On a handful of family excursions to "the farm" over a lifetime, all I saw was a bleak, harsh, forsaken place near a nice town where some relatives lived. After my mother's death, I visited again this summer to decide what would become of it. In advance of that trip, I contacted TVA to clarify my rights and obligations concerning their right-of-way, and discovered that the organization which I had supposed was responsible for the damage and erosion associated with the power lines area, was actually a great ally.

Now that the fate of this property is in my hands, and I have seen for myself vehicles and their operators leaving erosion and trash in their wake, I am determined to do whatever is in my power to stop and reverse the damage and to exercise better stewardship of the land, now, than my family has in the past.

To the parents of children with new 4-wheelers: I hope you will be considerate and restrict their use to your property. They are trespassing if they ride under the power lines on the east or the west side of CR197

north of Snowdown.

To all who have felt entitled to use the land belonging to me because no one, until now, has corrected them: the past is forgiven, but you must stop now. It is private property; it is not a public playground. No one has my permission to ride there, to hunt, or to pass through.

Violation of this is trespassing, and anyone who claims to have asked for my permission is attempting to mislead you if he does not also say that I refused it.

To my neighbors: I am grateful to all of you who have kindly stopped to ask if I needed help.

Please wave or stop and chat if you see me working or resting as you drive by on CR 197.

I am removing trash and planting cover crops that should gradually make visible improvements along the road, if 4-wheelers, litterbugs and other trespassers will stay away. Since I have no shelter, electricity or farm equipment of my own, this tiring, labor-intensive work is all being accomplished in baby steps. If you see people undermining these efforts in my absence, please speak to me next time I am there, or notify the sheriff, depending on the severity of the offense.

It is written that the meek shall inherit the earth, but another, unwritten truth is that such an inheritance may change the meek. No one could have predicted that I would ever become involved in a confrontation, if it could possibly be avoided, or that such a city girl would ever choose to undertake the taming of such a piece of wilderness. But, however unlikely a pioneer I may be, by these actions I am embracing the opportunity to leave at least a small part of the earth greener than I found it.

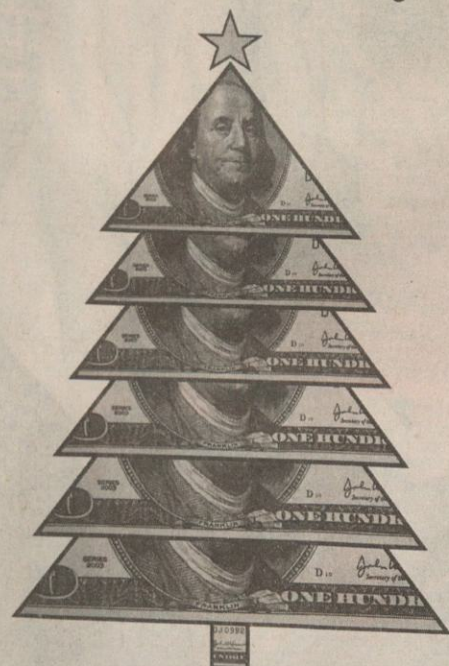

Master Gardener Classes Begin February 15th

Do you want to be a Master Gardener? Applications are being accepted in Tishomingo County for anyone who wants to sharpen their horticultural skills and share that knowledge with others. Mississippi State University's Extension Service is conducting the Master Gardener training program on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. beginning February 15th and ending Mar. 24th at the Extension Office at our new location at 238 Kaki Street, Iuka.

Enrollment will be limited to 25 participants, who, following training, are required to donate 40 volunteer hours to the County Extension Service. We have an active group in the county and would be glad to have more gardeners share their knowledge and talents. Many of our current members have said, "The really great thing is you learn so much from each other." Training begins with instructions on the Master Gardener program concept, basic botany, and soils. Other training sessions include vegetables, ornamental plants, home fruit and nut production, and lawn care.

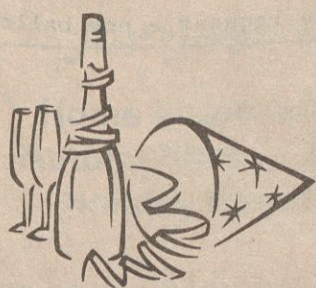

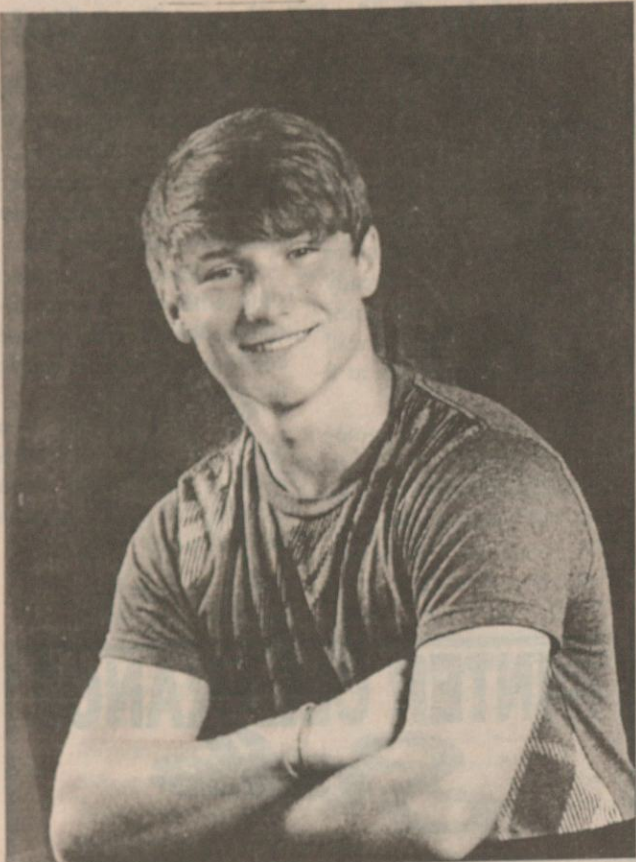

Safety Tips During
an Earthquake

PEARL-- The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency and local emergency management directors would like to remind citizens that although the greatest risk of earthquake damage is in the northern portion of the state, all of our citizens should learn what to do to stay safe if an earthquake strikes.

- Learn to DROP, COVER and HOLD ON! Practice the drill at least twice a year with your family to drop under a sturdy desk or table and hold on to one leg of the table or desk.
- Pick a safe place in every room of your home, such as under a sturdy table or desk or against an interior wall away from windows, bookcases or tall furniture that could fall on you.
- Wait in your safe place until the shaking stops, then check to see if you are hurt. Be ready for additional earthquakes called "aftershocks."
- Talk with your insurance agent. Different areas have different requirements for earthquake protection. Study locations of ac-

tive faults, and if you are at risk, consider purchasing earthquake insurance.

- If you are in a car during an earthquake, stay in the car with your seatbelt fastened.
- If you are outside during an earthquake, stay outside. Move away from buildings, trees, streetlights and power lines. Crouch down and cover your head.

Governor Haley Barbour has declared this week as Earthquake Awareness Week in Mississippi.

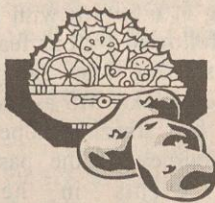

Dennis Grisham is a Tippah county native where he is a long serving county supervisor. He also previously served as president of the Mississippi Association of Supervisors.

Joey Hood

Joey Hood is a native of Itawamba county and a 17-year veteran of the Department of Transportation and had been an assistant to Minor since 2008.

"I've got lots of hands-on experience. I started my career at the very bottom and worked my way up through the ranks," said Hood at the December 20th Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors meeting. "I've done everything as far as the com-

mission is concerned except vote in a commission meeting. ... I've seen it from the ground up."

Larry Lee

Larry Lee lives in Grenada and is a businessman, and says a personal dealing with the DOT cost him nearly \$100,000 in a deal involving land where his business was located.

shall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

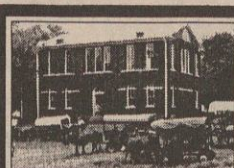

Southern Cornerstones

Mount Evergreen United Methodist Church (Toenail)

Back in 1918 after Bennett's Chapel School House was built, ministers of every denomination from the Primitive Baptists to the snake-handling "holy rollers" preached at the church. Teachings and doctrine became so confused that R. L. Roler, Billie Sanders, and John Grissom, as trustees of the school, met with Bro. Will Phillips to discuss having a gospel meeting in the vicinity. Bro. Phillips went to Bennett's Chapel and held three to four days and nights of revival services. After the last sermon was given, a vote was taken on whether or not it was feasible to organize a Methodist church in the community. The families got together and began having box suppers, egg hunts, and ice cream suppers to raise money for a church building. Mrs. John Grissom

and Mrs. R. L. Roler visited most every house in the community and obtained a hen. With these efforts, a church fund was started. The Mount Evergreen Methodist Church was organized in the summer of 1920 during the meeting that was held in the old Bennett's Chapel School House by Bro. Will Phillips.

Money came in exceedingly slow, but the fundraising efforts continued. On December 3, 1921, R. L. Roler paid J. C. Jourdan \$106.36; on January 4, 1922, the Iuka Lumber Company was paid \$45.00; and on February 12, 1922, a \$200 bill was paid. After those initial payments, the church construction was paid as it was built and no credit was needed.

Although the church building's construction was

not completed, a dedication service was held on the first Sunday in April 1921. Bro. Jacob assisted by District Superintendent Bro. W. L. Robinson and Bro. J. H. Holder dedicated the building to the Lord. The building was completed soon afterwards and stood until the spring of 1945.

The second church facility was built in 1948 when Bro. J. H. Holder was the pastor. It was dedicated at 9:30 a.m. on May 19,

1951. Bishop Franklin and District Superintendent W. L. Robinson, along with Bro. J. H. Holder and Bro. Jacob, were at the dedication service. Trustees in December 1951 were Sam Brown, Bobbie B., and Frank Williams. The third church building was constructed in 1965-1966 when Bro. Jodie Morris was pastor.
