People in the mid-South eard warnings all last week bout a snow fall with possible acumulations of 8-10 inches - and unday night, all the predictions ame true.

Beginning around seven 'clock Sunday night, January th, snow started falling, heavy, and by morning, most all of ishomingo County, along with n area from Arkansas to southvestern Virginia, was covered in what many sources are saying vas the most significant snow acumulation since 1988.

Tishomingo County schoolhildren were notified Sunday ight of a school-free Monday, and hat extended to at least Wedneslay, as low temperatures in the 0's were predicted all week.

Monday, many Tishomingo Countians spent the day enjoyng the powdery, beautiful snow hat was from 7 to 10 inches deep ill over the county. Temperatures

predicted to not exceed freezing all week ensured that the snow would be around longer than usual, as well.

By Tuesday, most of the major roads and highways were clear enough for safe driving, but lesserused roads in many parts of the county were still treacherous and covered with snow and ice.

Local law enforcement and emergency services reported no serious accidents due to the snow, and power remained on as nor-

In addition to school being canceled, some athletic events, and the county chess tournament, were also rescheduled. Be sure to check with your school for details on rescheduled events. Former Burnsville Clerk Pleads Guilty; Must Repay \$62,893

A former Burnsville town elerk pled guilty in Tishomingo County Circuit Court last week to embezzling more than \$60 thousand dollars from the Town from January 2004 to January 2007.

Elesha Dailey pled guilty to seven counts of embezzlement, and will be sentenced in May, according to Assistant District Atorney Tyler Moss. She will repay tolen funds, a \$1,000 fine, and tate auditor investigative costs, which are being determined by a pre-sentencing investigation. She emains free on the original bond intil the sentencing, he said.

She pled "open" because the wo parties were unable to come o an agreement on the investigaion costs, said Moss. The amount tolen is agreed upon, he said. udge Paul Funderburk presided.

The embezzling was identiied by an auditing process instiuted by Mayor David Nixon in 2005, the first year he took office.

At the end of 2006, the accountant identified discrepancies in the finances, and they called in the Mississippi State Audit Department, explained Nixon.

Dailey took \$62,893.82 over a period from January 2004 to January 2007, according to the indictment. The seven counts are for seven six-month periods in which the amounts taken varied from \$2,807.19 the first period, to \$12,764.56 in the January-June 2006 period.

The funds were taken from various monies Burnsville Town Hall collects, including town taxes and utilities payments.

Nixon said that the auditing process for the town is now more stringent. There are several different checks and balances, and everything is checked on a monthly basis, he said.

"This has been a long process, and I'm glad it's coming to a close," said Nixon.

The Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors took care of irst-of-the-year business during ts rescheduled meeting Tuesday norning, January 4th.

Bids were opened for the Isual opportunities to provide the County with mostly road-making naterials and supplies - culverts, sphalt, concrete slabs, etc.

The board chose to reject some bids, saying that they would father buy and haul crusher-run imestone using local companies on an as-needed basis for individlal jobs. They also opted to use local suppliers of heavy equipment on a case-by-case basis.

For road-building materials he board opted to reject bids, and llso go on a case-by-case basis for hose. They accepted the low bid or hot mix from APAC (\$79.50 per ton), in an effort to lock in Prices that could be affected by petroleum price fluctuations.

The board approved an addition to the ATK building, which ATK is building at no cost to the

The board voted to restore Dean McRae Engineering, of Iuka, to do all the county work, which generally includes the engineering work for industrial prospects and tenants of county owned property. Cook Coggins, of Tupelo, will continue to perform state-aid road jobs and administration. Since a decision earlier this year, each supervisor could choose what engineer they used for emergencies. On a motion of Steve Thorne, they removed the emergency clause.

Patricia is a bridge builder





Managing Horse Pastures To Prevent Soil Erosion

seen a small pasture with bare ground mixed with small patches of tall grass and weeds, plenty of mud during wet weather, and gullies forming? I'm sure most of you have, and can guess what kind of livestock is being pastured there, a horse of course. If you are a horse owner you know how destructive a horse can be on a pasture's sod. Here are a few facts and tips to help you maintain a healthy horse pasture while preventing soil ero-

The reason horses are so destructive on a pasture's sod is due to their grazing habits and the way they eat grass. A horse is inclined to graze in the same place every day much worse than other livestock. After the grass gets very short in that area, the horse has the tendency to pull the remaining grass up by the roots permanently destroying the sod which starts the soil erosion

The first thing to do is to soil test the pasture and then lime and fertilize accordingly to maintain a healthy sod and maximize forage production. Weeds should be controlled to prevent competition for the soil nutrients. If possible, divide larger pastures into smaller pastures and practice controlled grazing. Having smaller pastures will cause more uniform grazing within the pasture and allow for a period of rest and recovery for the grass so stand losses will be minimized. Controlled grazing means letting the Norses graze for a period of

time and then removing them from the pasture to a

> wasting usable forage. The biggest factor in maintaining a healthy horse and pasture is the pasture carrying capacity. The average carrying capacity for this area is two to three acres for a mature horse. With a properly maintained pasture the carrying capacity can be as low as one to one and a half acre for a mature animal.

A sacrifice area is a small area set aside and used to keep horses if using controlled grazing or as an exercise area for stabled horses. These areas should be only a temporary area and used in conjunction with pastures or stables. They need to be located well away from any streams or ditches and have a vegetative barrier to catch any runoff from them. The area should be covered in some sort of material to prevent mud and erosion from occurring. If these areas are used continuously (no other pasture or stables) for a period more than 45 days, they could be considered a continuous animal feeding operation (CAFO) or if they pose any threat to nearby streams or surface water, it may have to be permitted by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and a manure management plan be implemented.

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

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CONSERVATION CORNER

Hypothermia by James L. Cummins

While for the most part we live in a warm state, Mississippi can get very cold, especially when considering our high humidity. For example, a few years ago a friend came to visit from Colorado and wanted to go for a jog early one January morning. I told him it was cold - about 35 degrees Fahrenheit - and he reminded he was from Colorado and could handle it. When he returned, he said if felt much colder than what he was familiar with out West.

When we are in a cold environment, our bodies can lose heat faster than it can generate it. The body will adjust by constricting blood vessels at the surface of the skin, shutting down perspiration and increasing muscular activity, which we call shivering. This is the beginning of hypothermia. Hypothermia is one of the leading causes of death among outdoorsmen. Wind □ chill can also greatly reduce the time it takes for

hypothermia to set in.

Some symptoms of hypothermia (defined as body temperature of less than 95 degrees Fahrenheit) may also include slurred speech, incoherence, numbness and impaired gait. Shivering is valuable clue, but hypothermic individuals whose body temperature is lower than 90 degrees Fahrenheit may not shiver or even feel cold. The individual may appear corpse□like due to the pale color of his or her skin, lack of spontaneous motion and a faint pulse.

Odds are, medical attention is needed, but until that can be accomplished, you need to begin gradually re warming the affected person. First, remove all wet clothing and place the victim in dry blankets in a warm environment. Offer warm, non alcoholic fluids. Movement involving the victim must be limited and done gently. The goal should be to get the victim to a hospital as soon as possible, for the potential complications are many and some can even be fatal.

To help prevent hypothermia from happening to you, wear suitable clothing and protect your exposed areas. Mittens are preferred over gloves. Wear multiple layers of loose clothing. Wearing two pairs of socks - cotton next to skin, wool on top will help protect your feet. Wear a scarf or head covering.

Remember that certain persons are very susceptible - the elderly, those with circulatory problems (peripheral vascular disease, diabetes, peripheral neuropathy, Raynaud's syndrome) and those on certain medications such as beta blockers (for hypertension and/or heart problems). You certainly want to stay on your medication, but be aware that it may put you at increased risk for cold injury should you have prolonged exposure to the cold. James L. 


