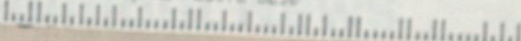

Crow's Neck will host two weeks of Operation Purple camp in 2011. Week 1, for 7-15 year olds, begins Sunday June 12 and goes through Friday June 17. 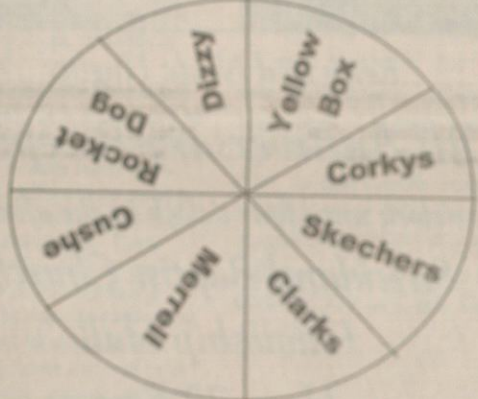
He is the son of Jack R. Alred, and brother of Matthew Alred, both of County Road 214, Glen, Miss.

God's Word for Today

Jesus the Christ; why did He have to die?

"For the love of Christ impels us, because we judge thus: That if One died for all, then all died; and He died for all, that those who live should live no longer for themselves, but for Him who died for them and rose again. Therefore, from now on, we regard no one according to the flesh. Even though we have known Christ according to the flesh, yet now we know Him thus no longer. Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new. Now all things are of God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Jesus Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation, that is that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not imputing their iniquities to them, and has committed to us the word of reconciliation.

Now then, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were pleading through us: We implore you in Christ's behalf, be reconciled to God. For He made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.

We then, as workers together with Him also plead with you not to receive the grace of God in vain. For He says: "In an acceptable time I have heard you, and in the day of salvation I have helped you." Behold, now is the accepted time, behold, now is the day of salvation."

II Corinthians 5: 14-21 NKJV

Why did Jesus the Christ have to die? First of all, God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. John 3:16. We all live in the world. That includes you and me. The scripture says "whosoever," who chooses, to believe can be saved. It's our choice. The price was paid for all at one time. The sad part is that not everyone chooses. Many are too prideful to accept the gift. Many cannot bow their head and say, "Father forgive me, I do want to be saved." Salvation is that simple. Yes, we have to walk out that commitment, but Jesus helps all along the way. He will see that we do not fail.

Secondly, Jesus wanted us to forget about ourselves, to live for Him, to worship Him, and to serve others. In other words, we are to stop being self-centered.

Thirdly, Jesus died that we might not look on people as worldly people, but as people made in the image

of God the Father and Jesus the Son. In viewing people this way we can begin to love them. Love is the vehicle in which we are to move in.

Fourthly, Jesus died that we would become new creatures in Him. This means we are to abide, make our abode in Him, and we are to let Him abide in us, live in us. With Jesus living in our hearts, we become new creatures. We act different. We think different. All we have to do is open our hearts to Jesus and let Him come in. We say, "Come in Lord Jesus, come in today."

The fifth reason for Jesus' death is that we might be reconciled to God. God will not accept sin. It has to be destroyed. Humankind does not have the power to live a sinless life, but, Jesus does. Therefore, God allowed all the sin of the world to be put upon Jesus. Jesus was willing. He took our sin, and went to the Cross. to as "the little Episcopal church," on May 14th. The proceeds will benefit Iuka Heritage, Inc., which is the group responsible for maintaining the historic church on Eastport Street.

Tishomingo County Museum Geared Up for Civil War Anniversary Research

April 12th marked the bicentennial of the beginning of the Civil War.

When Abraham Lincoln selected to the presidency in 1860, mounting tensions over slavery came to a head. In February 1861, even before President Lincoln took office, seven states had seceded from the Union. Another six states seceded by the end of the year. On April 12, 1861, Confederate forces attacked Fort Sumter in South Carolina. This ignited the war.

The Civil War, also referred to as the War Between the States, is the historic event often researched and written about. More material also collected about the war compared to any other event. Over 150 years later, the story of that war is still a brother against brother and everyone's interest, especially in reference to genealogical research. If

any branch of your family tree was in the United States during the early 1860s, they were somehow affected by the Civil War. More than 3.5 million Americans fought in the Civil War; more than 2 million for the Union, some 1.5 million for the Confederate States. The Union side suffered more than 350,000 deaths, both battle and non-battle related. The Confederate forces saw some 160,000 battle and non-battle deaths. It is fascinating to locate an ancestor who was in the military service during the war.

To help commemorate this event, Tishomingo County's historic courthouse museum is taking some time to remember 1861. For starters, the genealogical library will be displaying Civil War research books for those that need a little help in finding their Civil War ancestors. RaNae Vaughn, volunteer librarian at the museum's John

Marshall Stone Research Library, explains: "there have been many books written on Civil War battles and its leadership, but we will be displaying 'how to' books on finding your Civil War ancestors."

In the 1860s, the U.S. and Confederate governments generated millions of documents. Many of these records still exist today, safely preserved by the National Archives. However, in order to see the documents, it used to be necessary to travel to Washington. Records from the Civil War are now searchable online with the help of the Internet. Nearly 300,000 of the war's most researched documents have been digitized and are now available for everyone to see. Many fee-based services offering these records are making these records available at no cost during the month of April for a few days.

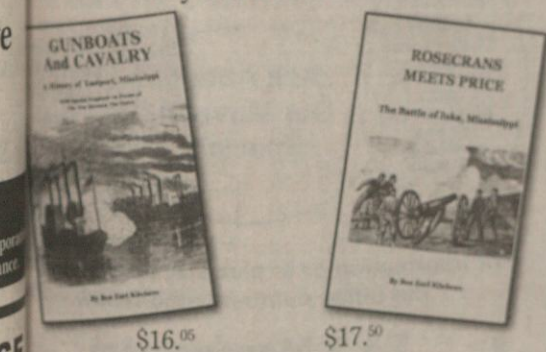
