Mother of Drowned Child Leads to Manslaughter

The mother of a child who drowned in Pickwick Lake in 2009 faces 30 years in prison after pleading guilty to manslaughter last Thursday in Tishomingo County Circuit Court.

Brandy Lee, now 32, was sentenced to 40 years, with ten suspended, as a result of her pleas to one charge of manslaughter and one charge of possession of a controlled substance related to subsequent injury.

Through the tragic events of April 4th, 2009 have never been explained, according to attorneys involved in the case, the child was that four-year-old Peyton Sims drowned, alone in a car that apparently rolled into Pickwick Lake around 2 a.m.

Peyton was on a weekend vacation with his mother, Brandy Lee, and they were at the area near the Steel Bridge on Highway 1 in the northernmost part of Tishomingo County with the help of Lee's, Bobby Lee Thompson.

They reported at the time they were "camping" said Glenn Whitlock whose assistant handled the investigation.

At 10 a.m. April 4th 2009, Tishomingo County 911 operator received a call that a car was in a vehicle in the water near the Steel Bridge. At the time it was thought that Thompson had taken a nearby house to call but the facts later revealed that he had called a friend at home, waited for her to arrive, then called 911.

Rescuers arrived, and under duress the child might be alive, began to search the lake. They soon realized that there was no hope of the child still being alive.

Both Lee and Thompson were charged with public drunkenness and released shortly after the results of that sad morning, toxicology test results pending.

Assistant District Attorney Arch Bullard said that Lee had tested positive for Valium and

Jones Renovating Braves Football Program

New coaches, new uniforms, locker room renovations, new track around the field, and a new season.

Everything will look a lot different for the 2011 Braves football program, but the changes go further than skin deep, according to new head coach Lanny Jones.

Coach Jones recently took the reins of a Braves football program that has struggled in recent years, but has some promising talent coming along. He described his afternoons of spring training as a time of evaluation, but also an opportunity to "let the players enjoy playing football."

"We are playing a physical type of football, and building a program, not a specific player," said Jones in an interview Tuesday. "We are working to change the mentality, build commitment, and get them thinking about find-

ing ways to win games, not how to keep from losing."

Fans, parents and the community are invited to come see for themselves this Friday evening, at a meet-and-greet event beginning at 5 p.m. The freshmen will have an inter-squad scrimmage that night, too.

For a sneak preview of the Braves varsity, they will participate in a spring jamboree at Colbert County High School in Leighton, Alabama on May 20th beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The varsity and junior varsity will play a quarter each against teams from Red Bay, and Colbert County.

Jones has his coaching staff

together now, with the hiring this week of defensive coordinator Lance Canoy from Richland High School. Canoy will come out at the end of spring practices, but will really start working the defense in the summer.

Jones said he will head up the offensive coordination.

Coach Jason Randolph, whom Jones praised for doing a great job in the weight room during the off season, will head up the junior varsity, along with Coach B.J. Nunley.

Dustin Jones is also joining the staff as a full time volunteer assistant, and probably knows

Circuit Clerk Checking Signatures on Alcohol Vote Petition

A petition to allow county citizens to vote on legalizing alcohol sales has been turned into the Tishomingo County Circuit Clerk's office so officials can start verifying signatures.

According to Circuit Clerk Donna Dill, the petition organizer, Charles "Tubby" Aldridge turned in 2,364 signatures he has so far received on the petition, which has already been determined to be legal and valid. The petition

was prepared by an attorney, said Aldridge, and meets the requirements according to the secretary of state's office.

The Circuit Clerk's office will be verifying if all the signatures are those of registered voters, while Aldridge continues his pleas for the 300 or so more he needs. Aldridge said he plans to get more than he needs, anyway, just in case some were disqualified.

When the signatures are validated, Aldridge will present the

petition to the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors who will determine if it gets put on the county ballot.

Aldridge maintains that Tishomingo County is losing hundreds of thousands of tax dollars on the sale of beer and alcohol, because county residents simply go to nearby Alabama, Tennessee, or Corinth businesses and purchase them there.

"We're the wettest dry county there could be!" says Aldridge.

"We have all the bad things about drinking, and none of the income and economic development - jobs - that other counties have."

There are two petitions circulating together - one is for beer and light wine sales, and the other for alcohol sales, in accordance with state law for the process. If successful, the petition will launch the first county wide vote on legalizing beer, wine, or alcohol sales since the 1960s.

Campground Resident Satisfied

We live in the Campground area where the storm hit pretty heavy last week. My own home was not damaged, some flooding in our basement, but lots of destruction around us and on neighboring homes.

We had camping equipment, and got along quite nicely. My only concern was not being able to charge up my husband's wheelchair so he could get around. I called our First District Supervisor and told him my concern. He said he had a generator I could use and within the hour brought it out, filled with gas. I was very appreciative.

My neighbor had a huge tree fall on his house with several down in his yard and across his driveway. Another neighbor had his driveway blocked with two huge trees and all over his yard. Campground church had trees down in the cemetery and one in the graves. Every tree along the cemetery was uprooted, across the street, people had trees down in their yards. Power lines and phone lines were down. We were lucky that there were no injuries or deaths.

I spoke with Kathy, a dispatcher at the Sheriff's Office and she said they were fielding so many calls that it was all she could do to get the

information out to the Officers. She said they had been watching the storms all evening and when the weather service let them know that a storm was going to hit Tishomingo County, she immediately put it out on the radio and within three minutes it hit. I know Glenn Whitlock had all his officers and himself and some inmates working in Belmont and all over Tishomingo County.

The Power Company was called out at 4 a.m. and worked long hours and are still working in this area getting trees off power lines. They also had Ace Electric out of Corinth help with the clean up. I saw the Pastor of Mt. Evergreen Methodist Church out with his chain saw, helping to cut up trees. A group from First Methodist Church was out with a group of people helping on clean up. There were people from other churches and other organizations helping and rounding up donations to help out. We are blessed with a caring community. The county workers and elected officials were out getting trees from across the roads so emergency vehicles could get through. There were huge trees down on Coleman Park Road and on Hwy. 25.

I believe these workers were doing what they are paid to do and the elected ones doing what they were elected to do. I saw the First Dist. Supervisor with a crew cleaning out the ditches to keep the roads from flooding. We had a lot of flooding in this area. Let's look at the positive and not be too quick to criticize. We can be very thankful that we didn't get hit like Tuscaloosa.

These workers deserve a "THUMBS UP, JOB WELL DONE" and should be shown appreciation for their hard work. Thank you.

marijuana. Lee was also evaluated psychologically, but an insanity issue was not part of the plea process, said Bullard.

At the plea hearing Thursday, Lee did not speak. Bullard spoke for the family, Vickie (Peyton's aunt) and Jerry Black, who were raising Peyton at the time of his death. His father was deceased.

In addition to the prison time, Lee had to pay court costs and fines, and have no contact with Vickie or Jerry Black, or their family.

how best to work with Coach Lanny, as Dustin is the older Jones brother. For spring, seventy players are working out. The first day of full pads was last week - Friday was a show and tell of pad rash, and sore necks!

He's talked to, and met numerous times with all the eligible players, but the ones who are playing now will be the ones playing this fall. Some who sat out last year have rejoined the program, but Jones has no soft spot for johnnie-come-latelies - the boys who are working out now are working hard and it wouldn't be fair for someone to come on at the last minute and not put in the work.

Jones feels good about the future, too. He said he believes in building a program, and with that in mind, he has games already scheduled for not just the varsity and junior varsity team, but five games for a freshman team, as well. Freshmen will also play on the junior varsity team.

"They do everything we (the varsity) are doing, they do every drill," he said.

Jones played as a full-back at Itawamba Community College, and Mississippi State, and started as a head coach when he was 23. Last year, he was assistant head coach at Leeds High School, the undefeated 3A state championship team in Alabama. Before that, he

was head coach at Iuka High School in Maplesville, Alabama, and for two years headed up the program at Calera High School, Alabama.

Lanny and his wife, Angela have two preschoolers and are renovating a house in Iuka to move into at the end of May. From originally, they have been staying with family there.

The Steel Bridge

Mike Robinson of North Crossroads is sharing this old photo with our readers. It is a photo of the old steel bridge that was located near the Hubbard community and crossed Yellow Creek. Known as Red Sulphur Road, it connected the area with Tennessee before TVA flooded the Tennessee River in the 1930's and covered the bridge with back water. According to Art Bonds, who remembers the bridge as a child, there was a fish trap under the bridge and he remembers his uncles wading into the water to get fish. Today the area is referred to as "The Steel Bridge Boat Dock and Camping Ground."

Source water assessment and its availability:

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of its drinking water supply to identify potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing at our office upon request. Like above are the ratings for the wells of Short Coleman Park Water Assoc.

Why are there contaminants in my drinking water?

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791). The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential use. Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems. Radon, a radioactive gas that is found in some groundwater sources, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In an effort to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Additional Information for Lead

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Short Coleman Park Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Monitoring and reporting of compliance data violations

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific constituents on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. Beginning January 1, 2004, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) required public water systems that use chlorine as a primary disinfectant to monitor for chlorine residuals as required by the Stage 1 Disinfection By-Products Rule. Our water system passed all of these monitoring requirements. We did complete the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling that showed no coliform present. In an effort to ensure systems compliance with monitoring requirements, MSDH now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the calendar year of this report. The presence of contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done in the calendar year of the report. The EPA and the State requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently.

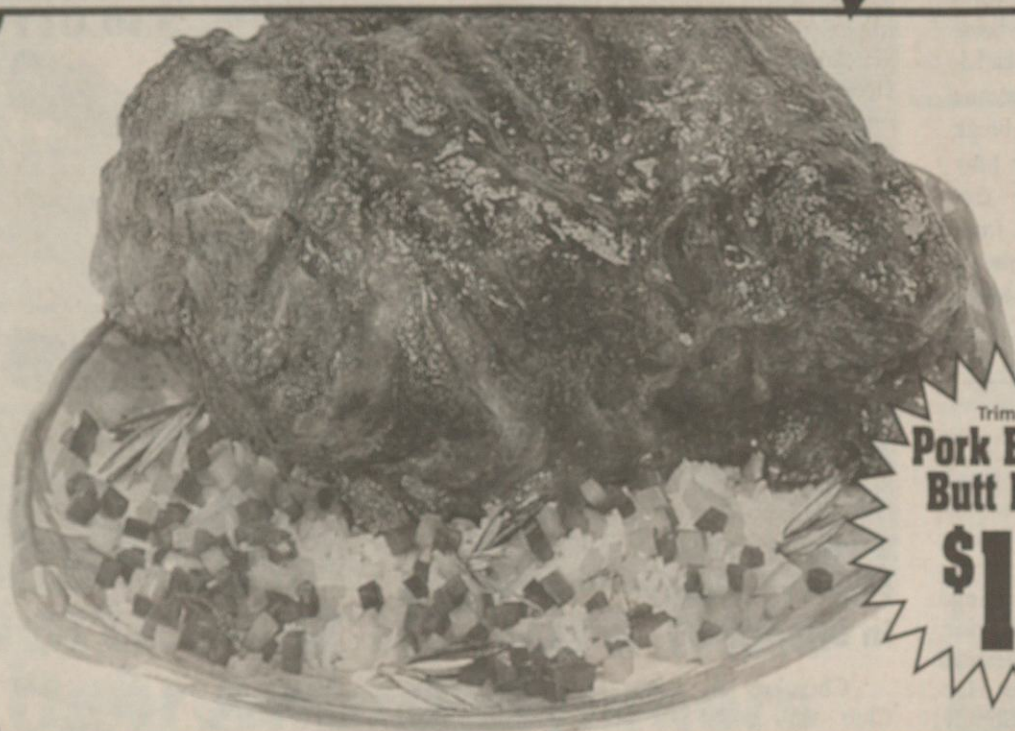



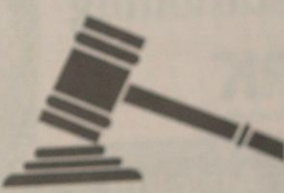

God's Word for Today

Life After Jesus' Resurrection

At evening of the first day that Jesus arose from the grave He appeared to His disciples that were shut in a room, fearing being arrested by the soldiers who had arrested Jesus. Jesus had not ascended back to His Father, God, at that time; John 20:19-23, NKJV. During forty days before His ascension He would appear to His various followers; Acts 1:1-3. He would at one moment be in His spirit form (divine form) and at another moment He would be in His human form. After the forty days He ascended back to heaven to be with God; Acts 1:9-11, NKJV.

Jesus had previously told the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well that God was Spirit; John 4:23, 24. He told her the time was coming when those who worship God must worship Him in spirit and truth; ibid. This time has been from the time of Jesus' ascension until this very day. We must worship God and His Son Jesus with our spirit and with truth.

That first evening following the resurrection Jesus appeared to His disciples. In His divine form He passed through the closed door where they were staying. He then took on human form showing them His hands and His feet; John 20:19, 20, NKJV. Seeing His nailed pierced hands and feet, they knew Jesus was with them. Jesus commanded them to be at peace, saying to them, "As the Father has sent Me, I also send you"; John 20:21, NKJV. Then He breathed on them, saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained"; John 20:22, 23.

Believers, those who have received Jesus as their Savior, are to receive the Holy Spirit into their very

being. This happens when a person accepts Jesus as his or her Savior, loving and obeying Him; John 14:23. If the person is not made aware of the Spirit's presence, then one must pray that the Holy Spirit makes His presence known to them. One must believe and receive the Holy Spirit as he or she has believed and received Jesus. Our abiding in Christ and His abiding in us is an act of our faith. Jesus said to Thomas, John 20:29, "Thomas because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." God exhorts in Psalm 46:10, "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations; I will be exalted in the earth!" In Galatians 5:16, Paul states, "Walk in the Spirit, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh." The fruit (result of walking in the Spirit) is love, joy, peace, longsuffering (patience), kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control; Galatians 5:22. These are for the believer who is filled with the Holy Spirit of God. Read all of Galatians. John the Baptist spoke of Jesus, "He shall baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire"; Matthew 3:11. With Jesus' and God's Holy Spirit in a person, the person will have all the spiritual blessings to live an abundant life; Ephesians 1:3. This baptism of the Spirit is the act of being immersed or filled with God's, Jesus' Spirit. The fire signifies the cleansing power of God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. They do the removing of sin as one gives his or her will to them.

Jesus had previously explained to His disciples that when He returned to His Father, His Father would send the Holy Spirit in His Name to be with them to teach them and bring to remembrance all that Je-

sus had said to them; John 14:26, NKJV. Further, Jesus, told them that the Holy Spirit would be their advocate, helper, their guide. (Study John 14, 15, 16, 17 for information on the Holy Spirit). He is the One who gives us power to live the Christian life. If we do not have the Holy Spirit we are not a part of God's family; Romans 8:9-11, NKJV. We do not see Jesus in flesh in this age. He and God the Father make their abode, in their Spirit form, in each person that comes to accept Jesus as their Savior. Galatians 2:20 explains the act best in Paul's statement: "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."

Remember God evidences Himself as God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, One in Three, the Trinity. In 1 Thessalonians 5:23 we see and understand that humankind is also a trinity of spirit, soul, and body. According to the Greek definitions: Our spirit is likened to breath. It is the part of us that is able to commune with God's Spirit. Our soul consists of our mind and heart which are the seats of

our will, emotions, intellect, and thinking. The soul, mind and heart, is the midpoint between humankind's flesh or human nature and his or her spirit. The spiritual experience must be translated from God's Spirit to our spirit through the soul. The body is brought under control by our mind. (Key Word Study Bible, NIV, New Testament Lexical Aids, spirit #4460; soul #3808; body #4922) With our total being, spirit, soul, and body, we either serve God's Spirit or Satan's spirit. It is our choice. We have been created as creatures that have to make choices.

Jesus commissioned his apostles to preach in His Name to all nations telling them of the repentance and remission of sin; Luke 24:47. All ministers are to do likewise in this day and time. Everyone will know of Jesus. Read Romans 1. Study the scriptures to know about Jesus and the gracious gift He offers to each and every person.

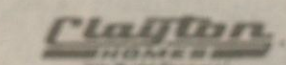

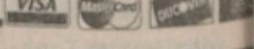
