Tishomingo Music Program Shows Fourth Graders are "In the Know" About Mississippi

The Tishomingo fourth grade, under direction of music teacher Jessica Robertson, presented a program Tuesday night showcasing their extensive knowledge of all things Mississippi - including everything from the state reptile (alligator) to famous performers like Faith Hill and Leontyne Price.

All year they have been singing the state in their regular classrooms with Mrs. Peggy and Mrs. Susan Bonds,

and the musical was a great way to not only tie it all together, but to make it memorable for the students, and parents who enjoyed the program.

They sang the state song, "Go Mississippi," including verses they had written themselves, and "The Watermelon Song," which included the line

"Just plant a water-melon on my grave and let the juice (slurping sounds) drain down!"

The audience was delighted when Madison Brock and Courtney Cox lip-synched the song "Bess, You Is My Woman Now," from the Gershwin opera Porgy and Bess, originally sung in 1952 by Mississippi-born soprano Leontyne Price. 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FEMA Now Open in County at Blue Springs Park

FEMA has arrived in Tishomingo County to administer assistance to any Tishomingo County business or homeowner who was affected by the recent tornado and storms.

They have set up headquarters at Blue Springs Park, in the building, and are accepting applications for assistance, according to Tishomingo County Emergency Management Director Strickland.

Hours for the FEMA office are 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., and the number to call is 1-800-621-3362. Information is also available on the Tishomingo County Emergency Management office in the courthouse at 423-7028.

Though the FEMA office is in town, there was considerable damage in the North Crossroads and Campground area near Coleman State Park, and affected property owners from anywhere in the county are encouraged to go to the FEMA office, said Strickland.

FEMA can help with reimbursement of money spent to repair structures or for contractor fees for removal of trees and debris, and they can help pay what insurance does not cover, said James McDowell, president of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors.

Strickland reported Monday to the Board that FEMA officials have already been in the area for preliminary assessments and have totaled at least 22,000 cubic yards of debris, just in the affected Belmont area, and that they thought that debris in the northern part of the county could be just as much, if not more, but so much of it is in the woods, it might be difficult to accurately account for.

Monday, Strickland reported there were 10 public roads that required repair, and that they already had been repaired, though three are only temporary.

FEMA Facts

68,000 individuals or households have registered for disaster assistance with the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

More than \$38 million has already been approved to help them.

But for some survivors, the status of their request for federal assistance is dependent on insurance settlements and the need for additional information. FEMA is prohibited from duplicating benefits from insurance companies and other sources. That is why FEMA asks applicants for insurance information - why some may receive a letter saying they are ineligible as their insurance company processes their claim.

Anyone who has questions about a letter from FEMA should call 800-621-3362 or go to a disaster recovery center, where they can get one-on-one help with responding to any correspondence from FEMA.

Though the goal is to surpass last year's total donations of \$35,000, it is also to celebrate the victories of cancer survivors and remember those lost to this terrible disease.

Beginning at 5 p.m. there will be music, provided by the popular fun SRX band; every kind of food you could want, inflatable jumping toys for kids, and even horse-drawn carriage rides around the park!

The theme of Relay for Life this year is TV Land - the teams have named themselves after classic television shows. The Iuka Middle School team is "I Dream of Jeannie," and they are honoring their fellow colleague Jeannie Perkins who recently lost her hard-fought struggle against cancer. The 20th Century Club is the "Golden Girls." Seeing how each team represents the theme should add a little extra fun to the evening.

A great new addition to the evening will be horse and carriage rides around the park, provided by Darryl and Jonathan Nunley. Survivors ride free, and others for donations.

The Iuka Middle School "I Dream of Jeannie" team will have a "Libby Lu" styling booth for girls of all ages, and face painting for boys, too.

Iuka Flower Shop will have hairbows for sale.

Other teams that are participating, or have already had fundraisers for Relay include Tishomingo Living Center, BancorpSouth, North Mississippi Medical Center-Iuka, Sparks Team, Walmart, Ershigs, First American National Bank, the Banco Belles, and the Dirty Dozen Banco group.

In case of rain, the entire event will be moved to the Tishomingo County Fairgrounds.

Supervisors Deal with Several Issues at Regular Meeting

Items of discussion at the May 16th Board of Supervisors meeting included:

The board tabled discussion about providing a vehicle at the Tishomingo County Airport for the use of pilots who fly in there. It would allow the pilots to reach their destinations from the airport.

The board approved a new sign at the Extension Service office in the Medical Arts Building on Kaki Street, near the health department. The Extension Service moved their office there recently, and it would allow people to more easily find them.

At 10 a.m. there was a public hearing on a \$1,348,000 CAP loan for an expansion to the International Converter Building in Iuka. No one responded after three calls for public comment. The expansion is supposed to provide 12 new jobs at the IC location in Iuka.

The board discussed storm damage to the Eastport Marina pier, and damage to Building 2028 (Turbine Building) at Tri-State Park.

Pastor Doug Christie sent the supervisors a notice that he would be requesting, under the public records act, after it was submitted to and certified by the circuit clerk, a copy of the petition currently being circulated to allow county voters to determine if liquor, wine and beer should be sold in the county. The board said that was perfectly within his rights, and it had nothing to do with it - that Christie would handle it through the circuit clerk and pay the reproduction cost, per the law.

They tabled a petition to

mining County Fairgrounds.

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lay out as a public road County Road 431 in the First District, as requested by Brandon Grissom, pending legal review by the board attorney.

The Third District was approved to buy a John Deere tractor from Scruggs. There were no local bidders, as the horsepower requirements were not available locally, according to the clerk.

The Fourth District made a request for \$10,000 additional state aid funds to complete the Dennis Bridge project.

The Board approved McNeely Plumbing and Electric's \$34,740.40 low bid to provide water to County Road 68, per recommendation of engineer Dean McRae. The public service commission approved the project May 5th.

The Board approved APAC's bid of \$74,458.65 for work on County Road 8, as recommended by engineer Dean McRae. Fifth District Supervisor James McDowell said it would help fix one of the most dangerous roads in the county.

The board approved the Second District to help with work for the Tishomingo County Historical & Genealogical Society regarding the relocation of the Barnerville Colored School.

First District Supervisor Brandon Grissom requested two new tractors for the Tri-State Commerce Park, as the ones they are currently using are in poor condition. McDowell said that the Tri-State funds are "strained" and could be get by with something less?

According to the report, the truck apparently rolled into the lake about 2 a.m., but the call to 911 was not made until 5:30 a.m. Because of alcohol and drugs that were being used by this mother and her friend, this little boy never had a chance to live and grow up. The paper said that both the mother and her friend were charged with public drunkenness. She was also charged with possession

of a controlled substance.

The beer and liquor advertisements never show the families that are wrecked by these awful things. Yes, the sale of beer, wine and liquor would bring in plenty of revenue, but the money that is spent for court appointed lawyers; housing of inmates; extra law enforcement; medical expenses and food, to name a few things, would far out weigh what the liquor sales would bring to Tishomingo County.

I want to urge the citizens of this county to think long and hard before they sign this petition. It might be your child, grandchild or someone you love dearly that will become addicted to alcohol or drugs. The only way to keep this from happening is to never take that first drink. You or I may be the next one who gets a call, or has a policeman come to our door, to inform us that a loved one has been hit and killed by a drunk driver. We have friends who had this very thing happen to them some years ago. Their two daughters were traveling home from college to visit at Christmas, but they were hit head-on by a drunk driver on the interstate. The

drunken man was traveling at a high rate of speed on the wrong side of the interstate. A policeman was chasing him, trying to get him off the road.

My husband and I have been trying for almost 50 years to help young people to make the right choices in life and not to get involved in drug and alcohol consumption. We all come to a crossroad, and sometimes more than once, and we have to decide which road to take. Many, like this mother and her friend, have chosen the wrong one. Are You A Felon? Can You Vote?

This is to the people that have a felony record. In some cases if you have been committed with a felony you lose your voting rights. In some cases you do not lose your voting rights. If you have been committed with a felony and you don't know if your voting rights have been taken away from you or not, then here is a list of the things that will take your voting rights away from you:

Aeson; armed robbery; bigamy; bribery; embezzlement; extortion; felony shoplifting; felony bad check; forgery; larceny; murder; obtaining money or goods under false pretense; perjury; rape; receiving stolen property; robbery; theft; timber larceny; unlawful taking of motor vehicle; statutory rape; carjacking; larceny under lease or rental agreement.

If your voting rights have not been taken away from you, you still have the legal rights to vote. If you don't know whether your registered to vote or not, you need to register to vote. If you have never

registered to vote and you are 18 years or older, you need to go register to where you can vote. That's the only rights that you have left in this world.

That's what all of our men and women have fought for in the wars and lost their lives where you'd have the right to vote. So we need to exercise that freedom. The reason I am putting this in the paper is I don't know how many people have told me "I will sign this petition, but I can't vote because I have a felony record". I told all of them what I just told you. Some of them went and checked it out and found out they still had their voting rights. Then they came back and signed the petition. I turned in 40 more signatures on Friday, May 13th. Donna Dill told me I would have to have approximately another 120 signatures than what I additionally thought I would have to have because they have been a little over 600 more people registered to vote this time. I have to have 20% of the registered voters. That is the reason the number has risen.

Additional Information for Lead

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Iuka is responsible for providing high-quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During 2010, we cannot be sure of the quality of your water because we did not monitor or test for bacteriological contaminants properly. We were not required to take samples but the system has been mandated to go to 4-log monitoring permanently and maintain the required records.

According to EPA CFR 141.21(a)(6), public water systems that are required to collect 5 or more routine bacteriological samples monthly may not collect all samples the same day. Our system collected 5 routine bacteriological samples per month. During August, 2010 we collected all 5 samples in the same day and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water. To correct this problem, we will insure all samples are collected and submitted on the appropriate date.

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the calendar year of this report. The presence of contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done in the calendar year of the report. The EPA and the State requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently.



I. My water safety?

Our water is purchased from the City of Iuka which consists of four (4) wells, three that draw from the Patoka Aquifer and one drawing from the Fort Payne Clay Aquifer.

Source water assessment and its availability:

The source water assessment has been completed for our public water system to determine the overall susceptibility of the drinking water supply to identify potential sources of contamination. A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available for viewing at our office upon request. Listed below are the ratings for the wells of the City of Iuka where Walker Switch purchases water.

Why are there contaminants in my drinking water?

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-422-4791). The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity, microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. Contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming, pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses. Organic chemicals, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems, and radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

How can I get involved?

We encourage all customers with concerns or questions to meet with us. Our foundation will conduct an annual membership meeting on Thursday, August 18, at 7:30 PM at the Iuka Church. We will answer any questions about this report at that time. This is a very important meeting in which we encourage all members to attend.

Additional information for Lead:

Present elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and fixtures. Testing Walker Switch Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water. Lead cannot enter the water unless it comes from your water line. If you know or suspect that your water line contains lead, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water testing methods, lead sample sizes, and sample collection can be obtained from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-422-4791. The Mississippi State Department of Health Public Health Laboratory offers lead testing for \$10 per sample. Please contact 662-324-7702 if you need to have your water tested.

Monitoring and reporting of compliance date violations:

It is required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a monthly basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During January 1, 2010, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) required public water systems that use chlorine as a primary disinfectant to monitor for chlorine residuals as required by the Stage 1 Disinfectant & Ozone Rule. Our water system passed all of these monitoring requirements. This did not meet the monitoring requirements for bacteriological sampling that showed no coliform present. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now requires systems of any size to monitor prior to the end of the compliance period.

This system purchases water from The City of Iuka and (using 7100011), we cannot be sure of the quality of our water because The City of Iuka did not monitor for lead or bacteriological contaminants properly. They were not required to take samples but the system has been maintained to go to 3-log monitoring successfully and maintain the required records.

According to 21 CFR 161.27(a)(6), public water systems that are required to collect 8 or more routine bacteriological samples monthly may not collect all samples the same day. The City of Iuka collects 8 routine bacteriological samples per month. During August 2010, they collected 8 samples in the same day and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water. To correct this problem, we will insure all samples are collected and submitted on the appropriate dates.

The table below list of the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the calendar year of this report. The presence of contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done in the calendar year of the report. The City and the State require us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently.

ish but have eternal life", John 3:16, NIV Study Bible. Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit is our way to peace.

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

Paul's Athletic Activity

I Corinthians 9:24-27 says, Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air; But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway."

Paul was not necessarily an athlete in the sense that we may use that term today, but he was an athlete in keeping his body under subjection to his spirit, as well as to God's Spirit. Notice that all do not receive the prize in athletic events, neither do all receive the prize in spiritual "athletic efforts". Paul is not speaking about salvation here, rather, he is speaking about service that brings glory to God and souls to salvation by preaching the gospel, accompanied by godly living. The athletes in physical feats seek to obtain a crown that will fade away, a wreath of flowers in Paul's day, but the good apostle was seeking to obtain an incorruptible crown from God.

Paul's efforts to keep his



body under subjection was more than shadow boxing; it was a real battle against the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes and the pride of life. The apostle was aware that his preaching of the gospel was not a guarantee that he would not be rejected from service, should he fail to discipline himself concerning the physical body. This may seem strange to some people, but our physical bodies are a part of the equipment needed to carry the message of the cross of Christ. If we misuse the body, or if we allow its desires to get in our way, we will not get the job done for God that He has assigned us! The word "cast-away" in our verses does not indicate a loss of salvation but a rejection from service. Those who have been chosen of God for His service should have a healthy fear of being put out of that service by disobedience and lack of discipline!



Belmont High School's Valedictorian for the 2010-11 school year is Zackary Whitehead.


