Iuka Police Make Arrest in String of Robberies

Iuka Police have made an arrest in a string of break-ins dating back since at least January 2010. Skylar Bennett, 25, of Iuka, was arrested last Saturday night, when Officers Cory Wilson and Jamie Stuart caught him attempting to hide in the woods behind Sandy. Someone had knocked a hole in the back of the Sandy Sandy building in an attempt to enter, explained Iuka Police Chief Randy Stringer. Bennett is being held in Tishomingo County Jail on \$10,000 bond for a charge of attempted burglary. Through continuing investigation with which Bennett is cooperating, authorities have identified at least 29 other burglaries and break-ins, of schools, vehicles and businesses, dating back to eighteen months ago in which Bennett has allegedly been involved, said Stringer.

A small number of items have been recovered and returned to owners, said Stringer. In most of the cases, little of value was taken, and the damage done during the attempted break-ins was more significant. Around eighteen months ago, Iuka Police had identified Chris Martin as a possible suspect in a

string of unsolved break-ins, but when they called in the U.S. Marshall Service to help locate him, Martin disappeared. He is still at large, reported Stringer. "I can not tell you how many nights officers with the Iuka Police Department have spent trying to catch these two individuals," said Stringer. "A lot of time was spent on their own because they take pride in their profession and they care about their city. I appreciate the job they do, and the sacrifices they make to get the job done," he said.

After a Year of "Sudafed Law," and Task Force Participation, Some Progress Made in County Fight Against Drugs

After a year of the new "sudafed law," aimed at reducing the availability of pseudoephedrine, and the county's active participation in a regional drug task force, authorities have made nearly two hundred drug arrests.

During the past year, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department has initiated 193 felony drug cases, according to a recent release.

The total represents 93 drug cases beginning June 15th to late October 2010. June 15th of last year, the "Sudafed Law" went into effect. That state law is aimed at reducing the availability of pseudoephedrine, a major component in the manufacture of methamphetamine, by making the formerly over-the-counter drugs that contain pseudoephedrine available only by prescription. Then, October 28th, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department joined other area law agencies on the North Mississippi Narcotics Task Force, which aided in an additional 100 cases, according to the sheriff's department.

The task force is solely funded by the federal government and provides the two narcotics agents with vehicles, money for the purchase of evidence and payment for information. The task force also pays for all crime lab fees and any attorney fees associated with

any of the drug cases or seizures.

Prescription Medication #1 Problem

Of the 193 drug cases, prescription medication abuse, fraud and sales are the number one drug problem in Tishomingo County, said Sheriff Glenn Whitlock. In the past year, the TCSD has initiated 119 cases that include charges of sale of controlled substances, felony possession of controlled substance, obtaining controlled substances by fraud, and conspiracy to distribute controlled substances.

Prescription medications that are illegally sold and distributed locally mostly include "nerve pills" and "pain pills" including narcotic pain relievers like OxyContin or oxycodone, percocet, lorcet, and, hydrocodone (pain reliever combined with cough medicine, usually). Area doctors regularly prescribe these medications to treat pain, but they find their way into the increasing network of illegal drug distribution in the county. Pills are often sold for \$10-\$20 each on the street, according to authorities.

33 Meth Cases

Cases involving methamphetamine numbered 33 in the past year. Suspects in cases related to this dangerous, highly-addictive drug are arrested for every stage of production - from possessing the necessary ingredients, like an unusual number of pills containing pseudoephedrine, to actually running a "meth lab," where the suspects are actually combining the ingredients necessary to make the drug.

While it used to be common for a "meth lab" to include large amounts of ingredients, and a 55-gallon drum to make it in, current methods of production can include little more than a plastic soda bottle, explained Sheriff Whitlock.

Other Drugs

Twenty three of the past year's cases involve marijuana, and the manufacture (growing), sale and distribution of marijuana.

The Sheriff's Department has initiated fifteen cases involving crack or powder cocaine.

Apparently not as common as was once feared, only three cases were initiated for possession of MDPV, or bath salts. Though the number of cases is low, officers tell frightening stories of how paranoid and erratic suspects under the influence of bath salts behave.

The Sheriff's Department is using three of the 15 vehicles it has seized as a result of the past

Eleven Teens Charged with Vandalism of More than 100 Mailboxes in North Part of County

One 18-year-old and ten juveniles have been charged with malicious mischief after a spree Monday night that resulted in the vandalism of more than 100 mailboxes in the north part of Tishomingo County.

The 18-year-old was charged with fifteen counts of malicious mischief in connection with the mailbox destruction event that destroyed more than fourteen county roads.

The crime of malicious mischief is a misdemeanor, in these cases, based on the cost of the

damaged property. Each count carries a penalty of a fine up to twice the value of the damage, explained Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock.

Also identified and charged with malicious mischief are ten juvenile men just slightly younger than eighteen. Their charges are the same, but they will be dealt with in the juvenile court system.

At least three different vehicles have been identified as being involved in the vandalism spree, which included damage done in the past few weeks, in addition to the Monday night activity. The

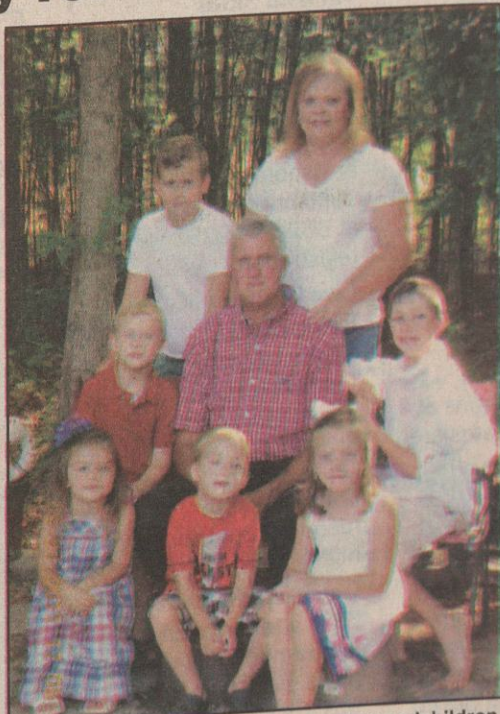
damage was done with a stick or baseball bat, said Whitlock.

Damage of mailboxes can be a federal crime, if the U.S. Postal Service chooses to prosecute, said Whitlock. At this time it is being prosecuted only locally, he said.

County roads with damaged boxes include 173, 176, 177, 178, 992, 193, 283, 244, 956, 957, 274, 31, 169, and 196, said Whitlock. If anyone has a damaged box not reported, they need to file a report with the sheriff's department to get compensation if available.

year's drug cases, which has been a cost savings for the department. It helps the force to have more vehicles available, said Whitlock.

Cutting Off Supply

Cutting off the head of drug distribution organizations is always a major goal, and the task force and sheriff's department has targeted several subjects believed to be responsible for distributing large quantities of controlled substances in the county.

One of the organizations targeted were responsible for distributing approximately one pound of methamphetamine ice weekly in Northeast Mississippi and north west Alabama, say task force members. Ten subjects were arrested in this investigation, including subjects in Alabama and other counties in Mississippi. The

investigation concluded with the arrest of the main supplier in Birmingham. That arrest resulted from the joint operation of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, North Mississippi Narcotics Unit, Tishomingo Police Department, Alcorn County Sheriff's Department, Itawamba County Sheriff's Department, Unites States Marshal's Service and the Birmingham Metro Narcotics Task Force. Over one ounce of methamphetamine was seized at the time of arrest.

Another major methamphetamine organization was dismantled and officers seized approximately one ounce of methamphetamine in a buy/bust operation in Belmont, explained Jeff Palmer, of the North Mississippi Narcotics Unit. This particular investigation also targeted the source

of supply in Alabama and two subjects have recently pled guilty to the charges. One of the subjects arrested confessed to trafficking several pounds of methamphetamine in Alabama and Mississippi over a two-year period.

Task force investigators worked with Colbert County (Alabama) Drug Task Force to target a major OxyContin distribution organization, and arrested five suspects. The bust resulted in the seizure of over \$15,000 worth of OxyContin and other prescription medication.

The sheriff's department also targeted two major crack cocaine dealers in Tishomingo County. One of the subjects recently pled guilty in circuit court and is currently in custody with the department of corrections. The other subjects were re-

cently indicted by a grand jury for sale of cocaine.

Bureau of Justice Statistics show that over 80 percent of all crime is drug related in some way.

This year, 143 high school seniors applied for the scholarships. Scholarships are awarded based on the student's high school grade point ratio, ACT/SAT test scores, participation in school and community activities, honors, work experience and statement of goals.

The TVA Power Distributors Scholarship Program was created in 1996 to reward excellence in academics by providing

financial assistance to college-bound children of TVA power distributor employees. The \$4,000 scholarship is paid in two increments during students' freshman year.

Since 1996 when the TVA/Power Distributor Scholarship Association was launched, 357 awards totaling over \$1.4 million have been awarded to dependents of distributor employees.

The Tennessee Valley Authority, a corporation owned by the U.S. government, provides electricity for utility and business customers in most of Tennessee and parts of Alabama, Mississippi, Kentucky, Georgia, North Carolina and Virginia — an area of 80,000 square miles with a popula-

tion of 9 million. TVA operates 29 hydroelectric dams, 11 coal-fired power plants, three nuclear plants and 11 natural gas-fired power facilities that can produce about 34,000 megawatts of electricity, delivered over 16,000 miles of high-voltage power lines. TVA also provides flood control, navigation, land management and recreation for the Tennessee River system and works with local utilities and state and local governments to promote economic development across the region. TVA, which makes no profits and receives no taxpayer money, is funded by sales of electricity to its customers. Electricity prices in TVA's service territory are below the national average.

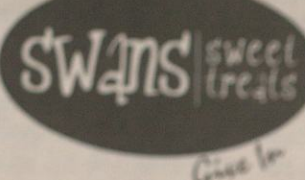

Harrelson was the Tiger pitching coach in 2008 and helped lead the Tiger baseball team to a 32-18 record alongside Northeast coach Kent Farris.

During Harrelson's year with the Tigers, Northeast coached a Mississippi Association of Community/ Junior Colleges (MACJC) North Division runner-up team and appeared in the National Junior College Athletic Association's (NJCAA) Region XXIII Tournament.

"We are very excited to have Coach Harrelson returning to the program after being at USM the past three seasons," said Farris. "He has been vital to the success of the Golden Eagles for the past three years which included a trip to Omaha and College World Series participation in three

Following a successful stint with the Tigers, Harrelson helped guide the University of Southern Mississippi to its first-ever Super Regional against the University of Florida and thanks to a 7-6 win against the host Gators, the Golden Eagles also claimed their first-ever College World Series appearance.

Prior to his 2008 season with the Tigers, Harrelson was a successful varsity coach helping to guide the Lafayette County High School Commodores to a 105-80 record during

his time there including 14 postseason victories and the 2006 Mississippi High School Activities Association's (MHSAA) Class 4A State Championship.

During his final year at Lafayette County, Harrelson led the Commodores to a 23-11 record while reaching the MHSAA postseason for a fourth straight year before falling to Neshoba Central in the Class 4A North State semifinals.

Harrelson made his mark on the northeast Mississippi baseball community during his prep career at Luka High School in Tishomingo County.

During his high school career (1989-92), Harrelson put himself among the nation's best.

Harrelson is still listed in the National High School Baseball Record Book for career hits (236), career runs batted in (226) and career wins (35).

"Coach Harrelson brings a great deal of energy, enthusiasm, and knowledge of the game with him and we are extremely ex-

cited about him returning to this area and Northeast," Farris said. "He is a very familiar face to this area and we know that he will be a positive influence for us in all aspects of our baseball program and Northeast."

Harrelson began his coaching career as an assistant with the University of Mississippi in 1997, before moving to Hillcrest Christian School in Jackson in 1998 where he was assistant baseball coach, assistant football coach and taught world history until 2001.

During his time at Ole Miss, Harrelson was a third baseman and pitcher for the Rebels from 1993-96. He also played a season in the prestigious Cape Cod summer league in 1994 and one season as a professional in 1997.

At Southern Miss, Harrelson oversaw the Golden Eagle outfielders, worked with the USM hitters and coached first base. Harrelson also ran all of the Southern Miss baseball camps and private lessons.

Reward Increased to \$5,000 for Information Concerning Bald Eagle Shooting in Mississippi

The Humane Society of the United States and the Humane Society Wildlife Land Trust are offering a reward of up to \$2,500 for information leading to the identification, arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for illegally shooting a bald eagle in the North Crossroads area of Tishomingo County. The HSUS reward adds to an existing Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks and U.S. Fish and Wildlife reward of \$2,500, for a total of \$5,000.



to bring these criminals to justice."

Shooting a bald eagle is a violation of the federal Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act which is punishable by up to a year in prison and/or up to \$100,000 fine.

Poaching:

- Wildlife officials estimate that for every wild animal killed legally — tens of millions of animals per year — another is killed illegally.
- Every year, thousands of poachers are arrested nationwide; however, it is estimated that only one percent to five percent of poached animals come to the attention of law enforcement.
- The HSUS and HSWLT work with state and federal wildlife agencies to offer rewards of \$2,500 for information leading to arrest and conviction of suspected poachers.

The second day of the bass tournament is planned for Saturday, Sept. 17. The final event of the Tennessee River Run will be the country concert featuring Montgomery Gentry and Worley at Pickwick Landing State Park that evening. Worley established the Tennessee River Run to serve the region he calls home. Ehart discussed Kansas' longevity by saying, "We have the best fans in the world. New fans are discovering us everyday — thanks to video games, movies and TV shows that use our music." Williams also added, "[The songs] have retained a relevance through the years that only a small percentage of recordings do."

On Saturday night Montgomery Gentry and Worley will headline the country concert at Pickwick Landing State Park. This was out of my realm of experience, I quickly asked Larry if being armed to the teeth was legal. He assured me that it was. The guns were for sale. It still did not feel right to me. For the rest of that day, I tried to stay out of the line of fire. Just in case.

Right there along with every kind of cute animal: kittens, puppies, yellow baby chicks, goats, lambs, rabbits and the like, as well as adult farm animals of every imaginable kind were booths with funeral flowers, religious artifacts, liniments and vitamins, hand made and manufactured jewelry, t-shirts, hats, belts, jeans

(brand names and not), other words, lots of stuff. As I looked over knives, scissors/etc., I saw a book store. Imagine a book booth in the middle of all this excitement. I walked inside to take a look. My first book I picked-up was an old Burnsville School Annual from about 35 years ago. Looking inside I found Larry's Mom, Pauline B. Cham, Head Start teacher. His daughter also appeared in it. What a coincidence. I paid my \$2.00 to walk away with this treasure.

Another surprise, I found one of my brothers selling chickens that day also. He said his farm was overrun with fowls and was a good place to get rid of the excess and make some money too. We talked a few minutes until the next customer came striding along.

There were several places to purchase food throughout the property. The fare seemed to be burgers, fries, hotdogs and snow cones. I elected to skip the lines and go elsewhere for the area to eat.

Larry sold his offerings of the day; rabbits, Beagles, a few ducks and a mule. More often, he sold his livestock at the H. J. Din Co. weekly sale or to a wholesaler who takes care of about any animal he has available. Today was my benefit.

Like wagon trains, H. J. Din County Sale, and a recycling plant, this turns out to be a very interesting day but not one I am likely to repeat soon. Don't me wrong, I did enjoy the experience but I'm more home in a discount store mall.

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

Holcut Class of 1957 Takes Trip

The tour then began to follow the bus route through far-flung communities to the east of Highway 25, including Pennywinkle, Midway, Rutledge, Salem and surrounding areas. At noon time, sack lunches reminiscent of school days were eaten at the Tishomingo State Park Lodge, a place

The afternoon was spent primarily traveling the backroads to the west of Highway 25, through the communities of Padon, South Crossroads and areas where many of the classmates had grown up. Driver Marion Crawford even took the van up Woodall Mountain, recalling spoken and unspoken memories of teenage adventures in years long past. A highlight of the trip was a visit to the Holcut Memorial Overlook, where looking across the waterway afforded but a glimpse of the site of the former Holcut school, now only a sad, deserted hillside.

As the tour drew to a close, the group traveled to the Pickwick State Park Inn for a delightful evening and a sumptuous dinner. This uniquely close-knit band of classmates and best friends has already begun planning for their next get-together, perhaps in the fall of 2011.

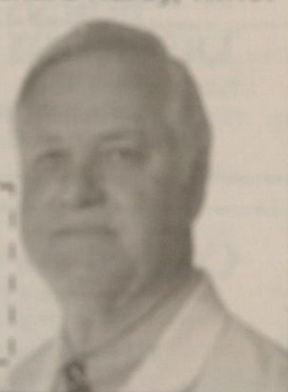

Is Money Really The Root Of All Evil?

Have you ever heard anyone say, "Money is the root of all evil?" This is not really true. The Bible says something almost like this, but it is vitally important that we pay close attention to the exact wording of Scripture.

I Timothy 6:10 says, "For the love of money is the root of all evil..." I really want to back up and give the context of this statement from I Timothy 6:5-10: "Perverse disputings

of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the truth, supposing that gain is godliness: from such withdraw thyself. But godliness with contentment is great gain. For we brought nothing into this world, and it is certain that we can carry nothing out. And having food and raiment let us be therewith content. But they that would be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and hurtful lusts, which drown men in destruction and perdition. For the love of money is the root of all evil: which

while some coveted after, they have erred from the faith, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows."

Context is a wonderful teacher of Bible truths! Verse 5 shows us that some men are perverse, therefore their reasoning is off, so that they think godliness can be gauged by how much we gain in material possessions. In Luke 12:18, Jesus gave us a word on our subject: "And He said unto them, take heed and beware of covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." Jesus said that life is more than what we own! I am amazed at the gullible people who follow the gullible preachers who say that those who live in poverty are under God's curse; that is not

a Bible truth! It is great if God allows us to have more than the bare necessities of life, but we cannot be sure that He will allow that. See Hebrews 11:35-39 for God's perspective on some poor people who were very godly and had great faith. Our verses from Timothy tell us to be content with the supply of our needs. They also show us that those who "would be rich" set themselves up for a fall into temptation, a trap and many foolish and hurtful lusts! Those who covet money err from the faith and pierce themselves through with many sorrows.
