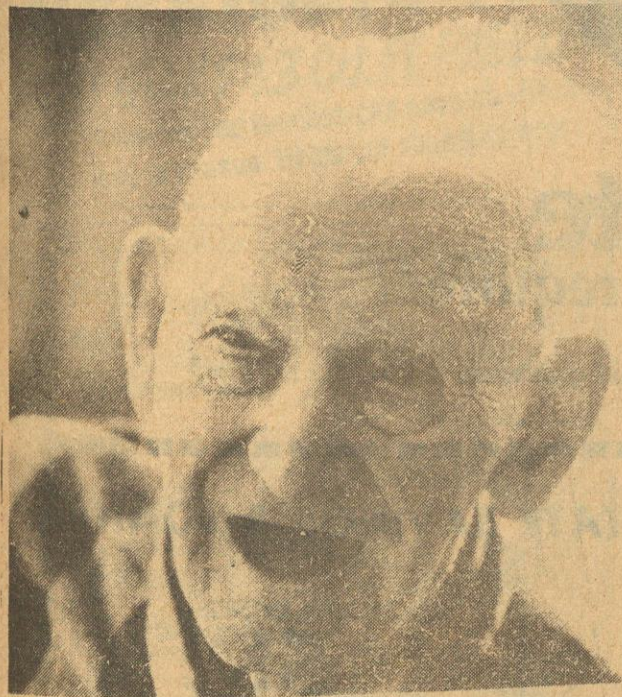

Tishomingo County Native, William Franklin Wright, Celebrated 105th Birthday



On August 27, 1978, a very special party was held in the lobby of the Oak Crest Nursing Home in Florence, Ala. to honor the 105th birthday of William Franklin Wright, a native of Tishomingo County.

Mr. Wright, a retired blacksmith and farmer, has lived in Oak Crest for one year. (He lived with his daughter, Mrs. Mary Carson, in Iuka, until he was 103 years old).

"The doctors say he's in excellent health considering his age," said Mrs. Carson. "Occasionally he has slight hardening of the arteries, but when we admitted him, his medical records indicated that the only thing wrong with him was an ingrown toenail."

Mr. Wright doesn't have much to say to people he doesn't know, but he does communicate periodically with relatives.

"Every now and then he'll ask about a member of the family. Sometimes he has a lot to say and sometimes

he hardly talks at all," said Mrs. Carson.

Born near Paden, Miss., Mr. Wright is the oldest of nine children. One sister is still living, Emma Mock, in her 90's, who lives in Corinth with her daughter, Mrs. Mitchell. He also has one brother living, the youngest child, Elton Wright, 85, who makes his home in Paden with his wife.

The 105 year old gentleman was married to the former Fannie Elizabeth Martin, who died 40 years ago. They raised five children in the South Crossroads Community of Tishomingo County - three daughters, Mary Carson, of Iuka; Mae Carson, of Iuka; and Genie Phillips, of Dennis; and two sons, Tom and Drew Wright, both deceased. He has 10 grandchildren, 16 great-grandchildren, and six great great-grandchildren.

As a special tribute to Mr. Wright, a birthday dinner was held at the nursing home with a host of friends and relatives on hand to help

celebrate. Everyone brought food and the meal was enjoyed by all, especially the honored guest. The highlight of the party was a colorfully decorated birthday cake with a huge "105" on top, baked by Celeste Scruggs.

Mr. Wright received several gifts and flowers were sent from the Rocky Springs Church.

Dedication Ceremonies Held Tuesday For First Completed Tenn-Tom Bridge

The new bridge on Hwy. 25 -- the first to be built across the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway -- was dedicated here Tuesday by the Mississippi Highway Commission.

Present were Highway Commissioner Bobby Richardson, Chairman; W. H.

"Shag" Pyron and Sam Waggoner, Commissioners; and Karl S. Bowers, Federal Highway Administrator.

First District Congressman Jamie Whitten, who wrote the language amending the Federal Highway Act and then steered funds through the Congress to make

the bridges possible, said that the Tenn-Tom project puts the development of the Southeast on par with the rest of the nation.

"Its benefits will compare favorably with the irrigation and reclamation of the Southwest, the Bonneville Power Administration

which has so greatly developed the Pacific Northwest, and the Northeast with its St. Lawrence Seaway and its miles of Federally-funded railroads," Whitten said.

"This project," he said, "not only will open up two-thirds of the U. S. coal supplies, our sure supply of fuel for the next 20 years, but will develop all facets of industry in the Southeast, including the railroads and truck lines."

"With the U. S. population expected to reach 300 million by the year 2000, the waterway will be vital to the future development of the nation," according to the First District Congressman.

The group toured the deep-cut through the divide which will open the waterway from the Yellow Creek Port on the Tennessee River to Mobile on the Gulf.

CARPET QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I want to buy a good carpeting which will last a long time. Can you tell me which fiber is best for durability?

A. Carpet's durability cannot be determined on the basis of fiber content alone. Three things mainly account for the service you will get from a carpet or rug: its basic quality, the use it receives and the care you give it. Different fibers perform differently, but most carpet quality is determined by price, too.

Q. What is the best way to determine carpet quality?

A. Several factors should be considered, but probably the best single clue to carpet quality is the density of the pile surface, the height of pile in cutpile design, the closeness of the tufts in other designs. In other words, look for "yarn coverage" in greatest density for good quality. The backing should be closely woven, too.

Q. Are the manmade fibers used for carpets the same as those used for clothing and other household furnishings?

A. No. Fibers must be engineered for carpet use, generally in a heavier weight because of the wear imposed on them. They may be of the same generic type but not the same construction.

Q. My wall-to-wall carpet shows wear only in a few spots -- at the entrance to the living room and

around chairs. How can I avoid this?

A. Protect such areas with a soft-backed area rug or a runner over the carpet. Shifting furniture, even slightly, will change the traffic pattern and help avoid wear in the same areas around chairs and tables. Clean these areas often to remove soil that changes the color of carpet.

Q. We have small children and would like to buy a practical carpet. What should I look for?

A. Color and texture are important. A medium shade or color combination, a close texture or patterned design -- are all available in great variety and will disguise daily soil and traffic. Medium and darker colors do get as dirty, but usually don't show soil as bad as light colors. The short pile or loop pile carpet with high and low weave may be more practical for small children.

CRISP BAKED CHICKEN

equipment ready before harvest time. Also, operators of this equipment should be made familiar with proper operating procedures.

SOYBEAN SEED STORAGE:

Breakdowns in seed handling equipment and dirty storage facilities can cause costly delays during soybean harvesting. You need to clean your grain bins and warehouses to be used for seed storage and make sure they are usable. Also, check your seed handling equipment and make needed repairs now so you will be ready when harvesting begins this fall.

use the 1979 program as well as they did this year, we believe that farm wheat prices will be maintained," the secretary said. (ASPC). The agreement provides for USDA to withhold part of any wool incentive payments that might be made to producers on 1978-81 marketings. The ASCS Office will conduct the referendum. Producers may cast their ballots, by mail or in person, at the county office by the close of

SECRETARY BERGLAND ANNOUNCES SET-ASIDE PROGRAM FOR 1979 WHEAT CROP:

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced on August 15, a 20 percent set-aside program for the 1979 wheat crop, identical to this year's highly successful program. By complying with the announced set-aside, wheat farmers will be eligible for a wheat loan of \$2.35 a bushel, and a target price of \$3.40 per bushel, also, the same as the 1978 program. Secretary Bergland called the 1979 program a "stabilizing measure designed to benefit both producers and consumers." "If farmers

LIME NOW:

You need to make plans to lime as many acres of your acid soils as possible. Lime is the number one investment needed on most Mississippi farms. It's estimated that a good liming program would increase the value of the state's crops by as much as \$100 million.

More than half of the lime used by Mississippi farmers is applied from August 1 to December. Many lime vendors are stockpiling now to avoid shortages this fall.

CHECK SOYBEAN SEED FIELDS:

If you are growing soybean, rice or cotton crops for seed, you need to in-

spect your fields for off-type plants and weeds. In soybeans, check the bloom color for off-type plants. A particular variety has either a purple or white bloom; the presence of any other bloom color indicates off-type plants. Red rice plants will be easy to see now. Weeds in all fields also can be easily spotted, especially cocklebur in cotton.

COTTON HARVESTING:

It's not too early for you cotton producers to start thinking about how you will harvest this year's crops. If you plan to use rick compactors and module builders, you need to get your

Dove Season Opens

Anxious hunters around the state are awaiting the start of Mississippi's first dove season set to open at noon on Saturday, Sept. 2, in areas north of Highway 84. If state wildlife biologists are correct, shooters should have a bumper crop of birds on state and private lands during the first hunt that continues thru September 24.

During the 1976-77 season, some 119,000 hunters harvested almost 3.5 million doves, according to Game and Wildlife Coordinator Edsel Chiburn, of Brandon. Citing a recently completed survey on hunting, he estimated that about 60 percent of the total doves taken during the year came during the first season in the north zone above the Highway 84 dividing line.

Hunting pressure and enthusiasm are the main reasons why so many birds are taken during this first season," Chiburn said.

"The first season is the first real hunt of the year, and in many cases it turns out to be a social occasion with old friends getting together and reminiscing. Probably there are good concentrations of birds then."

State shooting hours on doves are from noon until sunset. The daily limit is

12 and possession limit is 24, with no possession limit on opening day.

According to Game & Fish Commission figures, the average dove hunter takes

some doves on any one day of the approximately five days he hunts during the year. Dove hunting biologists say, make three in popularity among shooters behind squirrel and deer hunting.
