Corinth Man at Coleman Park Only Victim of Tropical Storm Lee's Heavy Rains

A Corinth man who drowned Sunday night near J.P. Coleman State Park has been the only reported fatality from tropical storm Lee, which rolled through Mississippi Sunday.

John Howard Anderson, Jr., 57, of Corinth drowned in the waters of Short Creek, according

to authorities. Short Creek is the usually shallow branch that park visitors drive across to enter J. P. Coleman State Park.

But after tropical storm Lee dumped as much as 13 inches of rain in parts of the state on Sunday, Short Creek was deep enough (some estimates say 6-8 feet deep)

to sweep a mini-van and one of its passengers away in strong currents.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, Anderson was staying in a houseboat at Coleman, and was returning to the park with two other people, around 11 p.m. Anderson

took the wheel of the 2003 Chrysler minivan after the female driver refused to attempt to drive across the creek.

"Anderson took the wheel and got the front tires almost to the other side when the current caught the back and spun the van around," explained Wilemon.

"Everybody got out of the van and they were in the process of rescuing him with a rope when the current got him."

Searchers finally located Anderson's body around midnight, about 300 yards down the creek in a heavily wooded area of the park.

Pleas Heard in Circuit Court, Sentences Handed Down

Tishomingo County Circuit Court was in session this week, and the following pleas were heard, according to information from the district attorney's office:

Chasity Reeves pled guilty to one count of conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine. She was sentenced to ten years in the custody of the Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC), and all were suspended. She must successfully complete five years post-release supervision (PRS), and pay court costs and fines.

Larry Plew pled guilty to sale of morphine. He was sentenced to twenty years in the custody of MDOC, and all were suspended. He must successfully complete five years PRS, and pay court costs and fines.

Jason Wilson pled guilty to a count of prescription fraud. He was sentenced to five years in the custody of MDOC, and all were suspended. He must successfully complete five years of PRS, and pay court costs and fines.

Ricky Brownlow pled guilty to a count of possession of methamphetamine of less than two grams. He was sentenced to eight years in the custody of MDOC, with eight suspended. He must successfully complete five years

of unsupervised PRS, and pay court costs and fines.

Stacy A. Waldrop pled guilty to a count of forgery. She was sentenced to ten years in the custody of MDOC with credit for time served and the balanced suspended. She must successfully complete five years of unsupervised PRS and pay all court costs and fines; and repay restitution of \$850.

Monica Lynn Johnson pled guilty to two counts of uttering a counterfeit note. She was sentenced to ten years in the custody of MDOC with credit for time served and remainder suspended. She must successfully complete five year of PRS and pay all court costs and fines.

Frances Grindle, 41, pled guilty to one count of sale of hydrocodone. She was sentenced to twenty years in the custody of MDOC with twelve suspended. After serving the remainder time she must successfully complete five years of PRS and pay all court costs and fines.

James Paul Mattox, 33, 647 Grant Lane, Blue Springs, pled guilty to conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. He was sentenced to fifteen years in the custody of MDOC with fifteen

years suspended. He must successfully complete five years of PRS and pay all court cost and fines.

Seth Higginbottom pled guilty to possession of two or more precursors. He was sentenced to 20 years in custody of MDOC, given credit for time served and the remainder was suspended. He must successfully complete five years PRS, pay court costs and fines.

Sara Detherage pled guilty to two counts of sale of marijuana, one in Tishomingo County and one in Alcorn. She was sentenced to three years in custody of MDOC, all suspended, and must pay court costs and fines.

Kristy Dawn Blankenship pled guilty to sale of morphine. She was sentenced to fifteen years in custody of MDOC, twelve suspended and three to serve. She must successfully complete five years PRS upon release, pay court costs and fines.

Anna L. Allen pled guilty to possession of two or more precursors and was sentenced to twenty years in custody of MDOC, all suspended. She must successfully complete five years PRS upon release, pay court costs and fines.

Judy Dillard, pled guilty to possession of two or more pre-

cursors and conspiracy to manufacture methamphetamine. She was sentenced to ten years in custody of MDOC, with credit for time served and the balance suspended. She must successfully complete five years with the 1st District Drug Court program, pay court costs and fines.

Kenneth Sides pled guilty to two counts of sale of hydrocodone. He was sentenced to fifteen years in custody of MDOC; fourteen suspended. He must successfully complete five years PRS upon release, pay court costs and fines.

Timothy G. Crum, 24, pled guilty to malicious mischief. He was sentenced to five years in custody of MDOC with credit for time served. He must successfully complete five years of PRS, pay court costs and fines, and restitution of \$1,865 to Carly Marie Smith.

William Paul Crosby, 27, pled guilty to sale of hydrocodone. He was sentenced to ten years in custody of MDOC, in the ISP program. He must successfully complete five years PRS upon release, pay court costs and fines.

Pamela Sanders, 40, pled guilty to possession of two or more precursors, and possession of methamphetamine less than two grams. She was sentenced to 28 years in the custody of MDOC, all suspended, and she was ordered to complete the requirements and supervision of the 1st District Drug Court.

Sherry Jennings pled guilty to two counts of sale of hydrocodone and was sentenced to twenty years in the custody of MDOC, and must successfully complete the house arrest program, pay

Iuka Man Gets 50 Years in Child Abuse Case

An Iuka man was sentenced to fifty years with the Mississippi Department of Corrections last Friday in connection with a child abuse case that shocked area residents last January.

In Tishomingo County Circuit Court, Judge Jim Pounds sentenced Johnny Lee Massengill to a total of fifty years, with 25 suspended for one count of child abuse, one count of deprivation of necessary care, and one failure to report known child abuse.

The child's mother, Jennifer Hale Belue, remains in custody, but has not reached a plea agreement, according to Assistant District Attorney Arch Bullard. Massengill was living with Belue in the home at the time of abuse.

The case came to light last January when Iuka police, acting on a tip, found the then three-year-old boy with the mother in a home in Iuka, with injuries so extensive that he could not move. Officer Anita Mitchell arrested the mother, Jennifer Hale Belue, and arranged to have the abused boy taken to the hospital. Another child in the home was also placed in protective custody.

Later, the child was flown to LeBonheur Children's Hospital where he underwent surgery and skin grafts to repair extensive injuries, including some that were allegedly caused by burns and strikes to the head.

The mother, Belue, was charged at the time with child abuse and neglect. She was already on probation for a previous, non-violent conviction.

Massengill has had to be incarcerated away from Tishomingo County since the incident, confirmed Sheriff Glenn Whitlock.

108 Pounds of Marijuana Confiscated During Stop on Natchez Trace Parkway

Authorities continue their search for a person who jumped from a pickup truck after evading Natchez Trace Rangers Saturday afternoon. The abandoned truck contained more than 100 pounds of marijuana.

Chief Ranger Mike Foster says two rangers noticed a driver speeding on the Parkway near

milepost 307 near the Mississippi/Alabama state line shortly before 5 p.m. Saturday night.

When rangers attempted to pull the pickup over, the driver accelerated and pulled off the Parkway at Highway 30. He jumped from the truck and ran. Tishomingo County deputies, Highway Patrol personnel, and Alabama

deputies searched the area, but the person was not found.

Authorities say that the fugitive's truck, and 108 pounds of marijuana were impounded. The drugs, and the case were turned over to the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics, said Tishomingo County Sheriff Glenn Whitlock.

FerrouSouth to Install the World's Largest Stretcher Leveler

Ferragon Corporation, a Cleveland, Ohio, based toll processor of steel coils, has announced that it will upgrade its FerrouSouth plant in Iuka, with the installation of the world's largest stretcher leveler. Dubbed "The Eliminator" for its ability to eliminate memory in steel sheets up to 1/2" x 96", the line features 2,200 tons of stretching force.

The Eliminator will be installed in-line with a Herr Voss 1/2" x 96" precision leveler. The combination of one of the most powerful Herr Voss leveling lines in the country with the most powerful stretcher line will allow FerrouSouth to offer flat, memory free steel to the Southern market.

The new equipment will process hot-rolled carbon steel, hot-rolled pickled and oiled steel, and cold-rolled steel coils up to 0.5 inches thick by 96 inches wide at 92,500 pounds per square inch yield strength. The \$3 million investment will result in a finished product with equalized internal stresses and superior shape characteristics.

The new equipment should be operational in early 2012 and will complement the company's light and heavy gauge slitting and cut-to-length toll processing services.

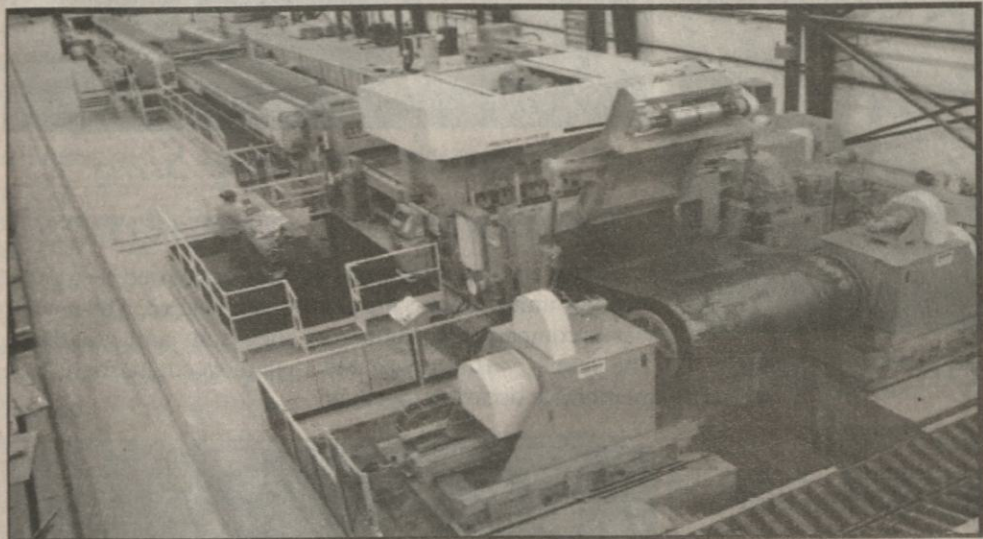
"We work very hard at meeting our customers' needs and controlling costs," said Ferragon Corporation President Eduardo Gonzalez. "The new equipment is state-of-the-art and will give FerrouSouth a significant cost and service advantage."

The Iuka facility is located at Yellow Creek Port, a strategically located port at the intersection of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway and the Tennessee River with water connections to the Gulf of Mexico and the Mississippi-Missouri-Ohio River navigation system. 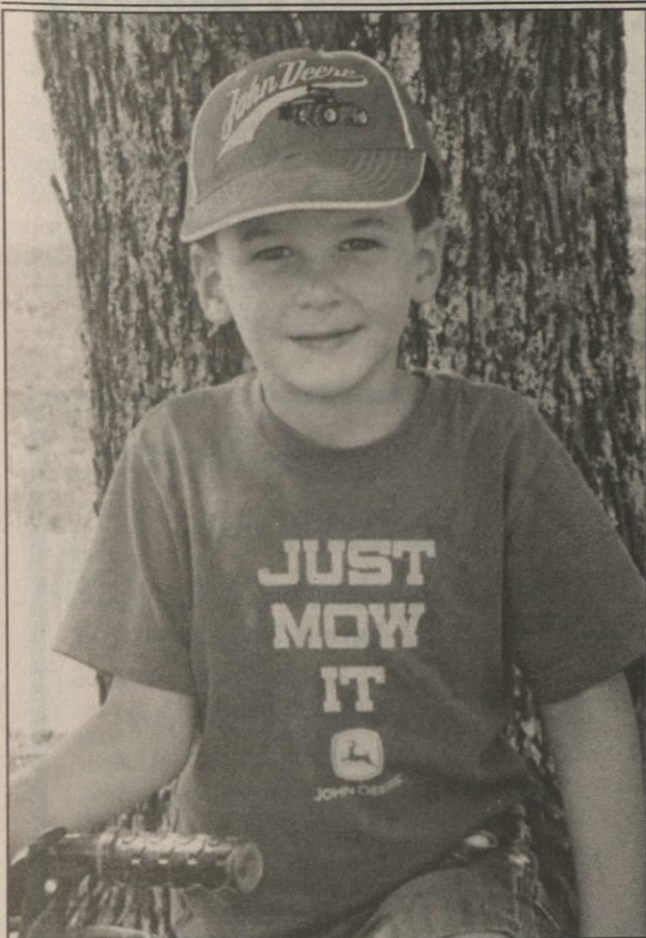

Singer-Songwriter Darryl Worley's Heart is at Home in Hardin County

Through six albums and eighteen chart hits, Darryl Worley has produced one of the most impressive and wide-ranging catalogs in contemporary music. He has for ten years been a mainstay of modern country, a distinctive singer and first-rate songwriter whose music has chronicled life, love and the world situation with equal facility.

He has topped the charts with singles including "I Miss My Friend," "Awful, Beautiful Life" and "Have You Forgotten," which accomplished the feat for one, two and an incredible seven weeks, respectively. He hit the Top 20 with the first three singles from his impressive major-label debut, *Hard Rain Don't Last*—"When You Need My Love," "A Good Day to Run" and "Second Wind"—and followed with smashes like "If Something Should Happen," "I Just Came Back From A War" and the iconic, "Tennessee River Run."

Worley jumped quickly back into the Top 10 with the single "Sounds Like Life To Me," a song as accessible as it is profound. Another of the album's real high points is "Don't Show Up (If You Can't Get Down)," a groove song that attracted an all-star cast of participants including Jamey Johnson, Bill

Anderson, Mel Tillis, John Anderson, Steve Harwell of Smashmouth, John Cowan of the New Grass Revival and Ira Dean.

Along the way, he has sold nearly two million albums, earned nominations for five major ACM and CMA awards, including "Song of the Year" and "Single of the Year," and has written songs for other artists including George Jones.

In 2011 Worley finds himself back in the studio working on a new album that encompasses the kind of tunes that got him into the business in the first place; good old fashioned, country music. It's the kind of music that Worley does best, and that comes most naturally to him. This album emotes the very basics of country music, never wavering from his love of family and his country, and his ability to have a good time with good friends. His travels overseas coupled with his role as a father have given him a new perspective on what is most important in life.

"I feel like my wife and little girl have breathed new life into me," he says. I've made trips to the Middle East for quite a while now, and the first five or six times I didn't have a child at home. Seeing their level of sacrifice and dedication changed me. And it's made

me want to be a better man, a better Christian, a better husband, a better role model. All of those things are reflected in this record."

His journey began in Hardin County, Tennessee, among people whose lives were defined in part by hard work, economic hardship, deep religious conviction and bootleg liquor. It paid to be tough and smart, and Darryl was both.

He was also musical - his grandfather played banjo and his mother sang in church, and he took after them. Tall and athletic, Darryl might have earned a sports scholarship to college, but lost the opportunity when he broke his back playing basketball. Still, he earned a degree in biology with a minor in organic chemistry, playing music in honky-tonks all the while.

He continued playing as he worked in the chemical business and taught school for a year, torn between the pressure he felt to establish a secure career and his deep-seated need to pursue music. Finally, his preacher father helped him sort it out.

A gifted and hard-working songwriter, he signed a deal with Fame Publishing in Muscle Shoals, Alabama, to write songs for \$150 a week. Years of hard living and honky-tonk nights made their way into his music, and artists like

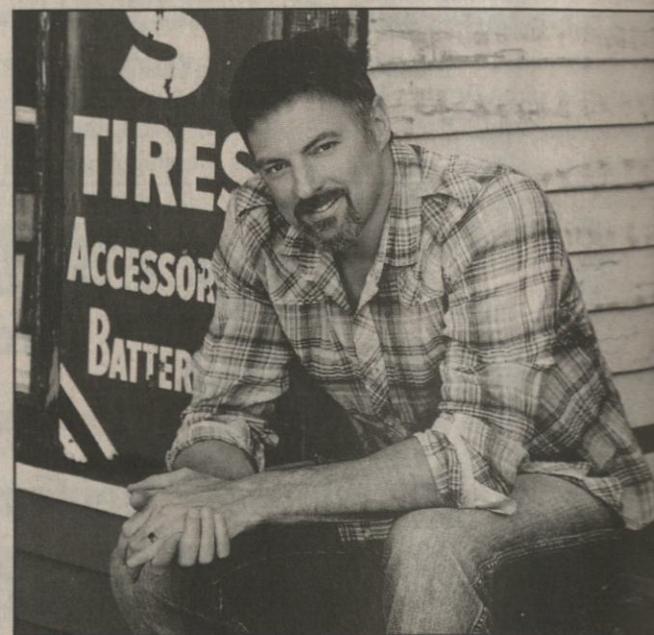
George Jones cut his early work. He was signed to Nashville's EMI Publishing and in 1994 made his way to Nashville. After half a decade of sometimes frustrating development deals, in 1999 he earned the label deal that moved his career into high gear.

It is telling that Darryl was quick to turn his celebrity to good purpose. He has been a tireless performer for troops here and overseas following a 2002 visit to Afghanistan, Kuwait and Uzbekistan that helped inspire "Have You Forgotten?" His "We've Not Forgotten" tour to Iraq that ended in May 2010, part of Stars for Stripes, was his eighth visit to the region. It included both full band concerts and special acoustic sets at remote Forward Operating Bases for troops who rarely receive celebrity entertainment.

Darryl has been honored with the VFW's Americanism Award, the USO Merit Award and the U.S. Army Appreciation Award. He has also been cited by the Tennessee House of Representatives for his contributions to country music.

His experiences overseas also helped spur him to launch major charitable efforts back home.

"Coming off some of those trips really made me want to dig in and do more

for my home area—Savannah, Hardin County, that whole Tri-state area," he says. "My parents said, 'You need to remember where you come from,' and the Darryl Worley Foundation became the way to do that."

What began as a way to provide assistance to people who might not be able to afford insurance who faced catastrophic losses has expanded over time. His Tennessee River Run, a weeklong festival capped by several major concerts, has raised money for all kinds of projects, including medical facilities.

"I've seen friends and family affected by cancer, and at one point I said, 'Can we do something here

in the county to help some of them?' We built this small outpatient chemotherapy wing on the Hardin County Medical Center and we were immediately overwhelmed by the people who just poured in there. They were literally in the hallways getting chemotherapy. In March of 2011 we opened the doors to the Darryl Worley Cancer Treatment Center, and our dream was realized. I'm completely overwhelmed and grateful."

Through all of Worley's experiences, his ability to draw on real life to make deeply moving music has made him one of country's most passionately appreciated artists.

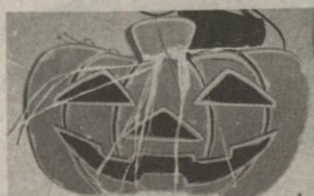

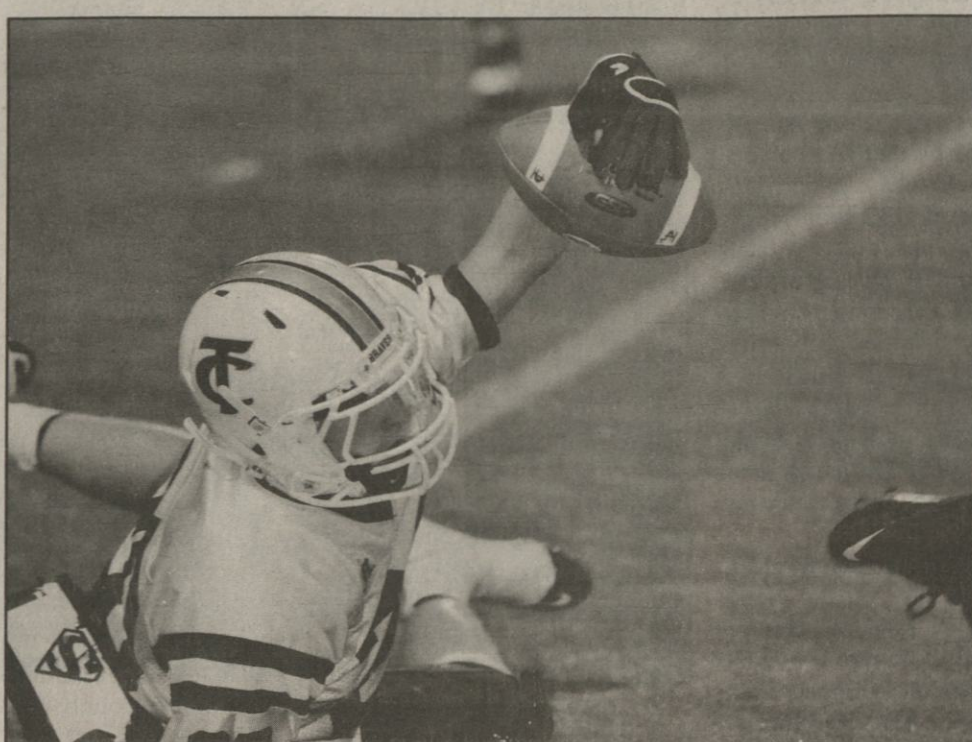
was a lot of hype for this game, and it was lived up to at the end.

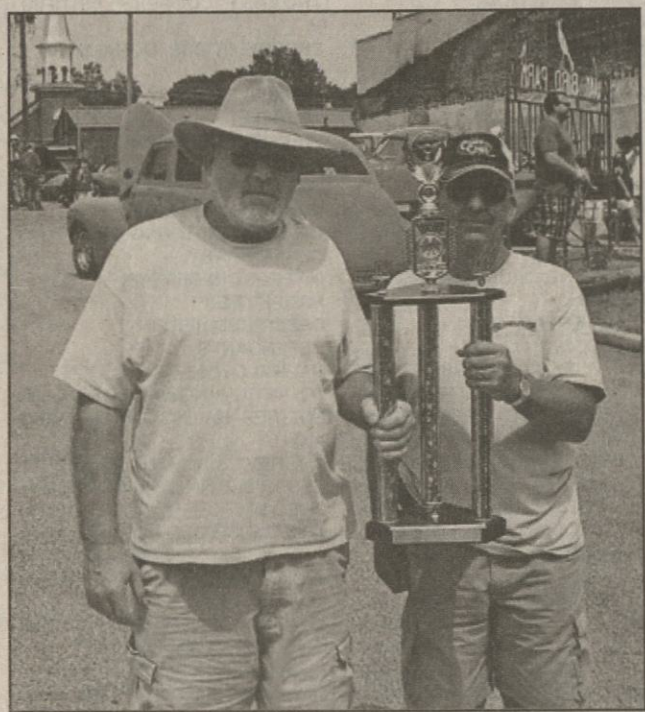
