Historic Mississippi Constitutional Amendments on Tuesday's Ballot

There will be three very important potential constitutional amendments on the November ballot. Eminent domain, personhood, and voter ID are all hotbutton issues that are being put to a state-wide vote next Tuesday.

Tishomingo County voters need to understand what these initiatives are all about, and then make an educated decision in the voting booth.

(Mississippi voters have never approved a ballot initiative, according to the Clarion Ledger.) **Initiative No. 31: Eminent** Domain

Initiative #31 deals with the reform of Mississippi's Eminent Domain law. It would leave in place the government's ability to compel a property owner to sell their land to the state for infrastructure projects, such as rightof-ways for roads, utilities, hospitals, airports and even dilapidated buildings...for a predetermined fair market value. What initiative 31 would change, if passed, is the state's ability to force someone to sell their land to the state and then have it transferred to a private individual, company or industry within ten years.

Initiative No. 27: Voter ID

Voter identification has been debated for years. Should you be required to show some sort of identification such as a driver's license before you are allowed to vote? The belief is that an ID will reduce voter fraud.

Opponents say that it might intimidate older voters who may have felt victimized by the racist voting procedures of the past.

Initiative No. 26: Personhood Amendment

Initiative Measure No. 26 on the ballot reads:

"Should the term 'person' be defined to include every human being from the moment of fertilization, cloning or the equivalent thereof?"

Countless evangelicals, churches and anti-abortion advocates across the state see this proposed amendment as the beginning of the end for abortion rights as established under the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark Roe vs. Wade ruling, according the Jackson Clarion Ledger.

But some medical and legal experts say the initiative could have unintended consequences that reach beyond outlawing abortion.

"Part of the concern is that it's not entirely clear what will happen if this passes," said Mississippi College School of Law professor Jonathan Will, who leads MC's Bioethics and Health Law Center.

The language of the measure is pretty clear, but even proponents say that it will be up to the Legislature and the courts to decide what the amendment means in practice.





pervisor. One deputy will patrol the south end of the county and the other will patrol the north end of the county. I will also have two investigators and one chief investigator.

2011 Hunting Season/Dogs

Attention all hunters. the Fall 2011 Hunting Season is here. A seasonal right will bring fellow hunters from all over the USA to gun for squirrel, rabbit, deer, quail and wild turkey in Northeast Mississippi. Time is running out for getting equipment ready and dogs trained for this annual event which will run into spring of next year.

I grew-up in Tishomingo County with six brothers and a Mom who "could shoot as good as any man." My sisters and I never completely acquired these skills. We did learn a lot about hunting, dogs, and the great outdoors.

Hunters love to tramp through the wilds with their dogs in pursuit of these machismo activities. The hunt is everything even when it ends up around a campfire where passing around the hot beverages may be part of the hunters' ceremony After leaving, sleeptoo. ing female companions to their own entertainment, at the crack of dawn; they will be returning from their battle with the wilds late in the evening. The colder the temperature outside, the better bragging rights these guys have.

There are more than 300 breeds of dogs (most live next door and bark all night). The most favorite is the Beagle. The least favorite is the dog next door that barks all night. In between there are boxers, bulldogs, Chihuahua(the Aztecs bred Chihuahuas to lead them across the great river of the afterlife), bloodhounds, foxhounds, dachshunds, Gerhave the name of the entries man shepherds, retrievers, Labradors, Maltese, terriers. or sides of the floats so that A wealth of information about dogs and hunting can be found on the Mississippi Hunting Dog Association's website. Adults and children will enjoy the large picture book, The Nature of Dogs, which has a rendering of each breed, complete with a brief history, by Mary Ludington. There are more than 30 videos of rabbit hunts - very vivid details - found under the category "Rabbit Hunting" on the net.

> Another tribute to hunting dogs is Coon Dog Cemetery in nearby Alabama. My favorite hunter is a little older than he used to be so he has taken hunting rabbits with his grandson to a new level. He loads up his dogs (approximately a dozen at last count), drives over by the Waterway, lets the dogs out and sits in, or hangs out around the truck, complete with beverages and snacks until he is sure the dogs have treed something and their barks can be heard faraway. When boredom sets in after an hour or two, the guys head for one of the local restaurants where they have lunch, and catch up on the latest news and gossip. Back at the Waterway they make sure the dogs are still running. Eventually they will collect

several of the dogs. Almost every time they hunt it takes several days before all the dogs are located (usually by neighbors calling after 11:00 p.m. or before 7:00 a.m.) to say a dog has been spotted or is at their house. Only Old Belle knows the way home

Don't forget to get your hunting license before the "big event" - one year for locals - three days for visitors or those less avid about sports. The dogs should be wearing identification so neighbors can report to you. Otherwise, they might be headed for Ripley before you know it. Good hunting dogs are expensive.

We women do understand that the kill is not half as important as sharing the experience. Hunters rule the season.




Development Foundation **Schedules** Annual Meeting


