Mississippi voters Tuesday defeated a ballot initiative that would have declared life begins at fertilization, a proposal that supporters sought as a way to prompt a legal challenge to abortion rights nationwide. The "personhood" ini-

tiative was rejected by 58 Court decision.

percent of statewide voters, but in Tishomingo County 58 percent supported the amendment. If it had passed it was assured to draw legal challenges because of the conflicts with current abortion law, as directed in the 1973 Roe v. Wade Supreme

The measure divided Voter ID the medical and religious communities and caused some of the most ardent abortion opponents to question the overwhelming effects that were possible if "personhood" was defined as from the moment of fertilization.

County Loses Powell in Senate, DuVall in House as GOP Gains Ground in Legislature

Tishomingo County will be represented by Republicans in three of its four Legislative seats after two incumbents were upset in Tuesday's election. Senate District 4

In the State Senate District 4 race, Republican Rita Parks Potts narrowly defeated incumbent Democrat Eric Powell by about 284 votes in unofficial districtwide totals. Powell said he suffered from widespread negative advertising from the Republican party.

"I just hate that the Republican Party got as nasty as they got," he said. "I could have gone very negative, but I chose to take the high road and not go negative."

Powell said he has strived to work across party lines during his time in office. Indeed, though he lives in Corinth, he represented the northern part of Tishomingo County, and, as a much-loved native son of Tishomingo, worked to support all county issues. Tishomingo County gave

him 52.33 percent of their votes.

Parks is from Corinth, and appeared at several events throughout the fall in Iuka. She stressed her conservatism in campaign advertising.

House District 1

House Representative Lester "Bubba" Carpenter (R), of Burnsville, won his district with 66 percent of the district wide vote, defeating Democratic challenger Thomas McCarley, who had 34 percent district wide. In county, Carpenter had 65.9 percent of the vote.

Senate District 5

With all precincts reporting, incumbent Democrat J. P. Wilemon, Jr. of Belmont won 56 percent of the vote, to hold his District 5 Senate seat. Republican challenger Jerry Don Keith earned a respectable 44 percent. In Tishomingo County, Wilemon got 59 percent of the vote, and Keith received 40.8 percent.

These ancient trees Alco can be seen from a beautiful boardwalk through the forest canopy. Some of the Baské largest trees adjacent to the New St board walk are over 16 feet in diameter, over 46 feet in circumference and are over Holida 1,000 years old. At least two roachi of the trees along the board-

walk each contain enough lumber to build 5 or 6 me-

dium-sized homes. "Rarely does a First Lady have the unique privilege of seeing a dream come true in her state. As Chair of Wildlife Mississippi's Advisory Council, I had the opportunity to be in on the ground level of this amazing project. It has exceeded my expectations. The formally hidden treasure of these ancient forest giants is now easily accessible, making it possible for generations of Mississippians and tourists to appreciate and enjoy their beauty and grandeur,' said Marsha Barbour.

Cypress are in the same family as the giant sequoia and redwood of California, and some of the Sky Lake giants approach the diame-

ter of the famous sequoias. According to Clarke

Reed, Chairman of Wildlife Mississippi, "The extreme scarcity of old-growth cypress forests only heightens the value of Sky Lake as an educational resource and tourist draw for the citizens of Mississippi and this nation.

In addition to the boardwalk, also constructed were restrooms, an amphitheater, a pavilion with picnic tables, a walking track and a canoe/kayak trail through the ancient cypress. The canoe/kayak trail will be available for use in February after the winter rains. Interpretative signs exist all along the boardwalk.

Wildlife Mississippi played a key role in promoting the acquisition of Sky

Lake and constructed the Sky Lake Boardwalk.

The project was a cooperative effort by Wildlife Mississippi, the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks, the Federal Highway Administration and the Yazoo-Mississippi Delta Levee Board. The project was designed by Pryor & Morrow Architects and built by David Smith Construction.



Do you Know God, Or **Does God Know You?**

Often we hear people say, "Oh, I know God". What do people mean by such statements? Do they mean that they know Who God is? Do they mean that they have heard some Sunday School lessons about God? The important thing is not that we say that we know God, rather it is that we are known of Galatians 4:8-11 God! says, □ Howbeit then, when ye knew not God, ye did service unto them which by nature are no gods. But now, after that ye have known God, or rather are



known of God, how turn ye again to the weak and beggarly elements, whereunto ye desire again to be in bondage? Ye observe days, and months, and times, and years. I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed upon you labor in vain." The letter of Paul to the Galatians was actually a letter written to a number of churches in the region called "Galatia ". Those who received this letter had some problems very closely related to some church problems today; they were holding to things that had been outdated by the death and resurrection of Christ. They were observ-

ing special days, months, times and years, which had been proper observances in the Old Testament, but had become of no significance, since the Christ they pictured had come to earth and died to complete the picture! People who are so meticulous about observing the things mentioned here have never come to understand the cross and the grace of God.

Paul said that the Galatians might claim to know God, but the really important thing was that God knew them as His children. I am not saying that they were not saved, for most likely most of them were. Paul had a fear, however, that he had wasted his labor among them, if they were truly still trying to be justified by the observance of Old Testament days and customs. Some Judaizers

were teaching new Christians that they had to keep the law of Moses to be saved, so Paul was combating that teaching here. My dear friends, if you are trusting anything for salvation other than the shed blood of Jesus and His resurrection vou are not vet "known of God" as His child! My plea to such people is that they will come to Christ and trust His sacrifice alone as the means of their justification! Paul said that any ties to the observance of days, months, times and years was only the cords that brought bondage to those who followed such teachings! Are you free in Christ? We are not free to sin, but we are free from sin, as well as Old


