New Officials Take Office, New County Board Meets

The county prepared or the business of the next our years last week, when Il the recently elected ounty officials, including a ew election commissioner, nd a new supervisor, were worn in at the Tishomingo ounty Courthouse.

The new Tishomingo county Board of Superviors, with newly elected 5th District Supervisor Greg collier, met Tuesday for heir regular meeting, and lealt with the usual first-ofhe-year business, including onsideration of bids from uppliers of asphalt and equipment onstruction nd materials.

The Board's first action vas to elect a new board resident. Second District Supervisor Nicky McRae vas elected with a 3-2 vote; with Brandon Grissom (1st) and Danny Ryan (3rd) votng against. Steve Thorne (4th) was nominated by Collier for vice-president, and then, Ryan nominated Grissom, for vice-president, and Thorne won with a 3-2 vote.

Since last term there has been a divided vote on anything regarding the new jail, (McRae and Thorne do not support the jail construction) and the first vote of this term seems to indicate that the split continues.

The board voted to reappoint purchasing clerk Lynn West and inventory clerk Peyton Cummings. Comptroller duties were retained by West and Cummings; and board attorney, Phillip Whitehead was reappointed.

In a switch from last term, the board voted against keeping hundreds of thousands of county tax dollars of county engineering work with a local, county firm. In accordance with last term's vote, Cook Coggins Engineering of Tupelo does the state-aid road engineering for the county, but all other engineering, including industrial development engineering, was done by local firm Dean McRae Engineering, of Iuka (no relation to the

board president).

Thorne moved to keep the status quo, and Collier seconded it.

Then Ryan moved that Cook Coggins get the state aid work, and that each supervisor get to choose their own engineer for work in their district. Ryan said that it could potentially save money if they "bid" each job out, which would allow him to choose who he wants.

On the first motion, the vote was 3 (McRae, Collier and Thorne)-2 (Ryan and Grissom) supporting the local firm get the industrial development and the Tupelo firm get the state-aid work. Then, in an interesting turn on conventional meeting rules, Chancery Clerk Peyton Cummings said they should also vote on the other motion, which was supported 3 (Ryan, Grissom and Collier) to 2 (McRae and Thorne), also, since Collier voted affirmatively for both.

The board accepted the bid of First American

National Bank for county banking; they were the only bidder.

The board accepted (4-1) to continue the contract with Booneville Trucking to haul garbage from the landfill to Prairie Bluff for \$424.48 a load. It was the only bid.

They tabled a bid from Jon Tapp to split scrap metal salvage from the landfill with the county 60-40 percent. They said they would consider it because they didn't want to lock in the percentage.

The board met throughout the afternoon, until 4 p.m., though most all the business on the agenda was handled in the morning open session. There was an executive session scheduled to meet with TCDF's Gary Matthews.

Battle of luka 150th Anniversary Plans In Action for Celebratio

Planning now begins in earnest for the 50th anniversary celebration of the Battle of Iuka on Labor Day weekend of this ear, and the Iuka Battlefield Commission s heading up efforts to make it a day to renember.

According to Chairman Harold Lonenick, the Battlefield Commission is working in conjunction with the Tishomin-30 County Archives and History Museum o coordinate activities to commemorate he September 19th, 1862 battle.


They have a planning meeting this Frilay with the Heritage Day organizers, to let them know what the plans are for the reenactment, so they can be coordinated with Heritage Day plans - since both events will be on Labor Day weekend, explained Lo-

Battlefield Commission plans for the weekend include a reenactment on a scale not seen in many years, on parts of the actual battlefield site near the intersection of Highway 72 and Highway 25. They also hope to use some of the historic homes in Iuka for living history exhibits. There are plans for two large encampments of re-enactors - one near the battlefield site, and one near Mineral Springs Park. Organizers hope to involve students in the activities, to refresh a pride in local heritage.

The battle reenactment will be Sunday, September 4th beginning at 2 p.m., according to current plans, said Lomenick.

There will be another meeting in January to begin organizing all the aspects of the celebration, and rally the many volunteers it will require to host an event that has the potential to not only honor Iuka's rich Civil War heritage, but draw in some of the many "heritage tourists" that are taking advantage of the sesquicentennial visit Civil War sites.

The Battlefield Commission and Tishomingo County Archives and History Museum's focus is, as always, local history and the preservation of it, and they hope to add Iuka to the list of hundreds of Civil War battlegrounds that have been enjoying a boost from the growing industry of Civil War tourism.

ment officials, Main Street experts, and tourism reports have said that Tishomingo's strongest asset is its natural beauty, lakeside living and recreational activities. More attention should be paid to tourism opportunities and drawing into towns the many affluent visitors who spend weekends, or retire to, the Pickwick Lake

"What are the plans for your 150th," asked a Main Street speaker last year at an IDEA (Iuka Development and Economic Association) meeting. "You can be sure that Corinth has plans and is already hard at work getting ready for Civil War tourist visitors, and dollars."

"What it boils down to is blue and gray makes green," said Kevin Langston, deputy commissioner for the tourism division at the Georgia Department of Economic Development.

Tourism officials say visitors interested in history bring a lot of money to the area and there's room to attract more.

Langston said history buffs, known as "heritage travelers" in the hospitality business, stay longer and spend more money than typical travelers. A typical heritage traveler spends nearly \$1,000 a trip, onethird more than other trav-

He said tourists spent \$20 billion in Georgia in 2009 and nearly threefourths of them went to historic attractions or museums.

Runner Urges Courtesy, Safety by Drivers & Runners

My friends and family know my greatest passions: faith, family, educating children, and running. This letter is intended as an appeal for safety awareness for my passion of running.

For almost three years I have enjoyed the personal benefits such as stress relief, lower blood pressure, weight loss, strength, flexibility, endurance, and elevated energy levels that "pounding the pavement" have provided. Tishomingo County communities host several charity races throughout the year, so it's obvious others in the area are equally as passionate about it as I.

I prefer to run outside as opposed to a treadmill, and enjoy daily treks at J. P. Coleman State Park. The park staff is accommodating and friendly, and I feel very safe there. However, I have experienced a few close calls with cars and trucks. Therefore, I'm asking for motorists and runners to follow a few simple safety and courtesy measures, not only at the park, but on any of our roadways where runners and motorists may share space.

· We all know that distracted driving has increased with the use of cell phones. Is there a text or email so important that you place lives at risk? A human is no match for an automobile.

· Runners should run facing traffic. There are exceptions

to this when the runner is approaching a curve or hill where you will be on a motorist's blindside.

· Runners should wear bright or reflective clothing, and always use a light if running after dark. The runner's goal should be to dress so you will be seen from the front and


· Motorists should give runners at least three feet of road space when passing. Often times there isn't enough space on the side of the road for the runner to move over, or the space isn't safe for the runner. Therefore, the motorist should take the initiative to move over. If another car is approaching, the motorist should wait until the car passes to pass the runner.

· Runners should select areas for running that do not

contain heavy traffic. The ideal running places are walking/running tracks, but they are not always available or conducive to training for long

My aim in writing this letter is to promote awareness and the need for runners and motorists to respect one another as we share the road. Those of us who have made this lifestyle change appreciate the consideration of the motorists who watch out for us. 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

During 2011, Troop trave (Alcorn, Benton, Union, Tippah, Prentiss, re. Con Tishomingo, Itawamba, ours n Pontotoc, Lee) reported 36 traffic fatalities on the highway. This was an increase of over 50 percent Sadly, we also saw 52 percent of all the fatalities in the district were unbuckled.

"It's senseless to see over half of your fatal crashes involve unbuckled drivers," said Trooper Ronny Hall. "It's proven that seat belts save lives. Our focus this year will be to drive down the fatality rate in this district by strictly enforcing the seat belt laws.

In the next few months there will also be more Troopers on the road throughout the State due to Cadet Class 60 graduating December 16. This will give us more visibility and more man power and will hopefully help decrease our fatal crashes."

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



The holidays are a great time to spend with family and friends, exchange gifts and enjoy holiday treats. In addition, it is a time to reflect on the past year and make resolutions for the upcoming year. If you are a tobacco user, make plans to become healthier by deciding 2012 is the year you become tobacco-free. Whether you are a smoker or a smokeless tobacco user, there are many benefits to quitting.

"Nicotine is an incredibly addictive drug and the cravings and withdrawal symptoms can overpower even the strongest will," said Roy Hart, Director of the Office of Tobacco Control at the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH). "Those who seek and receive professional help are twice as likely to quit for good."

Nearly 509,000 Mississippi adults smoke cigarettes and 69,000 Mississippi kids under the age of 18 will die prematurely from smoking. Every year, over 500 Mississippians die from the exposure to secondhand

Seven and a half percent of Mississippi adults and more than 16 percent of Mississippi male high

school students use some form of spit or chewing tobacco.

"Many people mistakenly believe using spit or chew tobacco is healthier than lighting up," said Hart. "This isn't true. There are actually 28 known cancer-causing chemicals in spit tobacco." Hart said using spit tobacco may increase a person's risk of cancers of the lip, tongue, cheeks, gums and mouth. In addition, there is also some evidence that spit tobacco may cause cancer in organs other

than the mouth. "Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in the United States," said Melissa Nash, director of the Mississippi Tobacco-Free Coalition of Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties. "The best way to protect yourself is to stop using tobacco products immediately. Make a plan, enlist the help of family and friends and seek professional help."





Ringing In Your Heart?

The music of our era, in most cases, is a far cry from what God commanded in the Bible! In my thinking, this is a big part of the problem of low self-esteem, divorce, theft, lack of respect for authority and even suicide. We cannot have the lyrics of the devil's songs in our minds and expect to have peace with God and with ourselves. It is so interesting to me that God has given us the formula for joy and happiness in the Word of God, but, alas, most people are spending very little time seeking out that formula! Ephesians 5:18-20 says, "And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit; Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.' For all those who are

always pushing for liquor by the drink and other forms of alcoholic beverage, I need to say that God has clearly condemned drunkenness. Moreover. I have a hard time finding any drunk who has ever had more than "a couple of beers", according to his own statement! My advice is that we should leave it all alone. Most Christians never think much about this command, but it is just as clear as the command against drunkenness!

Now follows what the Spirit-filled Christian will do. He will speak to himself in psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. He will make melody in his heart to the Lord. This is not my opinion; it is what the Bible says in the above verses! Christian, the world's songs will knock the psalms, hymns and spiritual songs right out of your heart! You do not have time to sing the world's song about fornication, lusts, liquor, drugs and a host of other things that God condemns! What melody do you have ringing in your heart right now? If it is not the melody that can cause the heart of God to rejoice in you, you have the wrong melody!

Notwithstanding in this rejoice not, that the spirits are subject unto you; but rather rejoice, because your names are written in heaven."



The Battle of Iuka, Mississippi September 19, 1862

By G.W. Dudley Editor The Vidette 1896


(Editor's note: Through the courtesy of the Dudley family and Mrs. Lyla Merrill McDonald the following is Dudley's account of the Battle of Iuka which appeared in the July 4th, 1957 Centennial Edition of The Vidette).

Copied as written:

Through the courtesy of the Dudley family I give Dudley's account of the battle: The position of the two armies on the 18th of September 1862 was as follows: The Federal Column under Rosecrans had reached Jacinto, and preparations were being made for an early forced march on the road to Iuka. General Ord's command under the immediate supervision of Gen. Grant skirmished all day on the Burnsville road, making demonstrations as through an attack was imminent. On the Confederal side General Maury's division and two brigades of Gen. Little's division were in line of battle on the Burnsville road, while Armstrong's Cavalry brigade was occupied in guarding the flanks. General Price's headquarters were in the building occupied by Mrs. Lyle on the south side of town and on the road leading west into Jacinto road. The plans of the federal commander seemed to be working admirable. The confederate General seems to have had no suspicion of an attack from any direction except Burnsville. He had not the slightest information of the massing of Rosecrans force at Jacinto. All his cavalry except Falkner's regiment of Partisian Rangers and an unknown battalion or squadron was in the flanks looking toward Burnsville. Falkner's regiment was near Burnt Mills on the Fulton road, while the battalion before referred to was somewhere south of Iuka, tho this command showed up next day on the Jacinto road, infantry pickets were on the Jacinto road, the outpost being about three

miles from Iuka. When the sun when down on the 18th, Herberts brigade was camped just north of town, near the cemetery; while Green's brigade was located on the hill back of McKinney's residence. During the night the former was marched down the railroad to the Peel place where it was placed in line of battle. Thus stood everything on the day preceding the great battle. It was 4:00 on the morning of September 19, 1862 that the Federals under General Rosecrans left Jacinto and took the Tuscumbia road to Iuka. A cold rain had commenced falling about midnight, the roads were muddy which made heavy traveling on the artillery and wagon train.

The 3rd Michigan Cavalry was placed in front and the whole army moved forward with celerity. No sign of the Conferderal was seen until the head of the column readed a point one half mile west of Barnetts where the roads forked. As the Federal cavalry reached the crest of a hill they were greeted by a volley from a force of Confederate cavalry stationed in a steep ravine. As soon as the Federal were fired into they halted; a squadron dismounted and drove back fighting, leaving one dead and one captured. The Federals reached Barnetts at 12:00. After passing Barnetts and taking the Iuka road there was no skirmish-

ing until the head of the column reached a branch of Cripple Deer Creek, near the residence of Mrs. Moore. Here the Confederate Cavalry had again taken a stand and as the Federal clumn came in sight fled a volley which killed Lieut. Schraum, a member of General Hamilton's staff. This infuriated the Federal commander who ordered a torch applied to the handsome residence of Mrs. Moore and it was in a few minutes reduced to ashes. This deed of vandalism was totally without excuse, as Mrs. Moore was not responsible for the fact that the commander had chosen to make a stand in front of her home and the burning of her home was an unworthy and disgraceful act.

Here for the first time since they had left Jacinto the Federal infantry was uncovered. The 5th Iowa being deployed as skirmishers and pushed to the front.

No further mention of the squadron of Confederates is to be found in the official report of the Federal officers, and their existence is omitted from Price's report. It is not known whether they communicated to the Confederate Commander the alarming news that a heavy body of the enemy was moving to assail his flank or not. Two men were on the picket post, one was killed and the other made his escape covered with the blood of his slain comrade, and it was he who brought to General Price the first intimation that the movement was a serious one.

It was fortunate indeed that Herberts brigade was in striking distance. These brave men were encamped on the north side of town and received orders to double quick in the direction of the enemy. In an incredibly short space of time they were formed and started in a trot. On reaching the top of the hill they moved steadily forward covering both sides of the main road. This brigade consisted of 3rd Tex., Whitfield's Tex. Legion, 3rd. La., 40th Mississippi and 14th and 17th (consolidated) Arkansas regiments. Herbert's men had moved forward only a few hundred yards when they met the Federal skirmishers whom they drove back. Meantime the St. Louis Battery under Capt. King had been put in position just west of the Jacinto road and had been pouring a heavy fire of grape and canister into the

Federal column. The first volley killing six men of the 48th Indiana. In a short time the Federals pushed forward the 11th Ohio Battery and placed its six guns near the forks of the road.

This Federal Battery was a noted one having participated in several bloody engagements and been unsuccessfully charged eight Reinforcements were necessary to enable the Confederates to resume the offensive. These began to arrive now in the shape of two regiments, the 36th Mississippi and the 37th Alabama of the 4th Brigade which was commanded by Col. Martin. The two regiments were placed in position, they were followed by the 37th and 38th Mississippi of the same brigade. General Little had now reached the field and at once made disposition for an advance on the Federal line. It was now 5:00 p.m. Gen. Price, upon his mule and attended by his staff, reached the field at this time. He, at once, sought out General Little whom he found about 100 yards to the left on the road, telling him to bring forward the other two brigades at once. General Price and General Little being distant only a few feet. Before General Price finished speaking a minie ball pierced General Little through the head. Perceiving that he was mortally wounded Col. Celsus Price, son of General Price, hastily caught the form of General Little as he fell from horse. Life was extinct, thus perished Henry W. Little, the right arm of Price.

In addition to the battery at the forks of the road the Federals had placed a battery at or near the Yow house. On swept the Confederate line of battle, brave men fell at every step. As the Confederates advanced it obstructed the fire of the St. Louis Battery which was forced to cease firing, from danger of hitting their own men, but the Federal artillery redoubled its fire. Whitfield's Texas Legion covered both sides of the main road. Reaching the summit of the hill the road veers almost at right angles toward the east. It was here that the line of brave Texans first came under the enemy's artillery and infantry fire. They poured a volley into the regiment of the enemy immediately in front of the 48th Indiana, which cause the later to give way.

The Third Texas was on their left, immediately

in front of the Federal Battery. It was evident that the battery must be taken or else the two regiments would soon be swept from the earth. Col. Whitfield ordered a charge, in a moment the whole line swept forward. At the crest of the hill they were greeted with a storm of grape and canister that tore a big gap in their ranks but did not check their advance. Before the few surviving Federal artillerists could reload the Texans were upon them and the battery captured. Lieutenant Wynn of the Texas Legion was the first man to place his hand upon a Federal cannon, just as he did so he fell pierced by a mortal wound. Perceiving that the 48th Indiana, which had fled before the first fire of Whitfield's men, had now partially rallied, and was advancing on his right, Capt. Whitfield acting as major, ordered three companies to drive them back, which they did. In this fight Lieut. W.W. Townsend shot Col. Eddy commanding the Indiana regiment. Along the settlement road, which led to the Yow home, were stationed the 4th Minn., 17th Iowa, and 10th Iowa regiments. The attack on this portion of the Federals' line was made by the 36th and 38th Mississippi regiments of the 4th (Martin's) Brigade. The 17th Iowa stampeded and fled at the first fire, but the 10th Iowa under Co. Perczell supported the battery with great bravery and being favored by position were enabled to drive back the Confederates. Meantime, the Federals driven back from the Battery were partially reinforced by Sullivans brigade of fresh troops.

The Confederate line retired slowly as the enemy advanced. At the brow of the hill the Confederates reformed and pressed forward at the same time the two regiments on the left, 37th Miss., and 38th Alabama also moved on the enemy, thus the whole Confederate line was now again in action. The Federal line began to fall back leaving the battery again in the hands of the Confederates. Lying around the battery within a radius of a hundred yards were not less than a hundred slain, possibly more of both sides, besides three times as many injured. Three of the cannons were so badly damaged as to be in no condition for removal and these were spiked but

the other three were moved

after dark by the detail from the 40th Miss. The ambulances were set to work at once bringing the wounded to town where every home was made a hospital for their reception and every possible attention given them by the citizens.

them by the citizens. The 1st and 3rd Brigades of General Little's division reached the battlefield just as the battle closed, had they reached the field an hour earlier a partial victory would have been converted into an overwhelming triumph and the destruction of Rosecran's army. Too late to join in an aggressive movement they relieved the brave men who had borne the brunt of the terrible struggle. All through the battle General Rosecran and other officers strained their ears to hear the report of artillery on the Burnsville road as the column under Ord advanced but they listened in vain. There is a tradition that Grant was drunk in Burnsville and incompetent to command. Grant says himself he did not hear the noise of battle at Iuka. This seems an incredible statement.

We now return to the battlefield where two fresh brigades of Confederates had relieved the battle scarred veterans. Pickets were pushed out in front of the battery while the main line of battle was retired to the rear. Here details were made and set to work, ostensible engaged in fortifying the line and preparing for a renewal of hostilities but in reality to deceive the Federal commander, for Price had decided upon a prompt retreat. Two reasons conspired to make such action imperative. In the first place he had received word from General Van Dorn to join him at Ripley where they would consolidate for an attack upon the Federals at Corinth. In the second place his command was unable to cope with combined armies of Rosecrans and Ord, so even before the smoke of battle had lifted preparations for a retreat were underway. The wagon train was gotten in readiness as soon as possible and begun moving down the Fulton road, guarded by calvary. By 3:30 o'clock in the morning every wagon was on the way.

There was some firing between the pickets of the two armies during the night and few men were killed and wounded. Just before daylight the Confederate pickets were drawn in and

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

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

Cummins

Despite the root of its name, Spanish moss is not biologically related to either mosses or lichens. It is an epiphyte - a plant that lives upon other plants, absorbing nutrients and water from the air and rainfall. The pineapple is in this same family. It is not a biological parasite as is mistletoe, which actually burrows into the tree and sucks out nutrients. Spanish moss uses the tree's structure to gather sunlight that would otherwise fall on the host tree's leaves.

Nicknamed "graybeard," Spanish moss has grayish-green leaves which can measure up to 2 inches in length and are covered with silvery-gray scales. Spanish moss is a fibrous perennial herb. It hangs from trees in long, thick masses that reach up to 20 feet in length. Lightly fragranced and formed in the axils of the leaves, the flowers of Spanish moss are tiny, inconspicuous blooms of pale greenish-blue that blossom in late spring/ early summer. The seeds of Spanish moss develop in tiny capsules after the appearance of the flowers and these capsules eventually split open to release the seeds for fertilization.

Spanish ranges from Texas east to Florida, north to Virginia along the Coastal Plain and south to Argentina. Though it grows well in partial shade, it prefers moist environments, flourishing when near bodies of water. Most commonly adopting oak and cypress trees, Spanish moss is found on other species too.

At one time, tons of Spanish moss were harvested and used in the United States alone. Sometimes bought for use in arts and crafts and beddings for flower gardens, Spanish moss has also been researched for use in medicines to treat type 2 diabetes, heart disease, hemorrhoids and edema.

Though commonly thought to be a habitat for chiggers, it only collects these mites after it has touched the ground. Along with chiggers, Spanish moss is also known to shelter other creatures such as lizards, frogs, rat snakes and three species of bats. Birds, such as chickadees and the prothonotary warblers, use the moss to construct or conceal their nests while the Parula warbler actually makes its nest in the hanging clumps. Other animals also use Spanish moss for nest bedding, including mockingbirds, egrets, squirrels and owls.

A collection of Spanish moss taken by the U.S. Department of

Spanish Moss by James L. Agriculture from May 1985 to May 1986 at Leroy Percy State Park in Washington County, Mississippi, netted 600 spiders which were represented by 13 families, 22 genera and 29 species. Other insect counts from this study included 600 beetles, 500 chalcidoid wasps and 300 miscellaneous species. Therefore, it is a good idea to inspect the moss before taking any home.

Your deduction usually will be the assets' fair market value and you'll get a charitable deduction for the year the assets go into the DAF.

The rules about charitable giving can be tricky. If you want to make a large gift to Wildlife Mississippi, consult a tax expert or Certified Public Accountant who can help you to perform a good deed and receive a tax deduction at the same time.
