

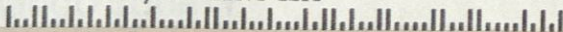

## HB 1551: Proposed Restaurant Tax Could Provide Much Needed Tourism Funding

A bill is on Governor Phil Bryant's desk that will allow the board of supervisors of Tishomingo County to call for an election to authorize a one percent tourism tax to benefit tourism efforts in the county.

According to House Bill 1551, county restaurants will collect a one percent sales tax if county voters approve it in an election, providing the county with much needed funds to promote one of the county's strongest growth sectors - tourism.

Originally, the bill, authored by Lester "Bubba" Carpenter, of District 1, and Randy Boyd, of District 19, requested a two percent tourism tax at restaurants, but many area governments collected for the purpose of funding tourism promotion efforts. According to First District Supervisor Brandon Grissom at a recent meeting, "they" asked the

Board to reduce its request to a one percent tax, and that is what was approved in HB 1551.

The governor has until May 18th to sign the bill, according to the legislature's website.

The purpose of the funds collected will be to fund tourism promotion efforts in the county, which are usually headed up by the Tishomingo County Tourism Council. Several times in recent years the Tishomingo County Tourism Council has requested that the county enact a tourism tax, similar to what many counties and or cities across the state use to fund tourism promotional efforts. According to Mary Ann Grant, of the Tishomingo County Tourism Council, this is the farthest the effort has progressed.

"It would be good for the county, for us to have some more resources to promote our beautiful county, and the events we are trying to promote to bring tourism

dollars here," she said.

Development and tourism officials have long suggested that tourism is one of Tishomingo County's most promising industries, with two lakes, two state parks, and an abundance of unique natural features that already draw some tourists. But compared to what neighboring counties spend, Tishomingo County does little to support the growth of tourism.

In 2010, the county spent \$793,355 in tourism "capital investment," according to combined state figures. Tourism brought in \$10,531,629 to the county in the same period.

But in neighboring Alcorn County, tourists pumped more than \$41 million into the economy, and they are investing \$1,254,257 in tourism promotion efforts.

The county does already have a two percent room tax, which brought in \$16,213 in fiscal year 2010, according to the Mississippi Department of Revenue.

But with advertisements in regional and national magazines costing several hundred dollars each, if not thousands, the meager budget that tourism survives on doesn't go far. And that is just one of the things that tourism officials spend money on.

In nearby Corinth, a two percent restaurant tax earned a gross \$909,317 in 2010, and Corinth

also earned \$57,453 from their hotel room tax. According to Corinth Convention and Visitors' Bureau, one percent goes to pay for the Crossroads Arena, and the rest helps them promote several festivals that draw people from all over the region to Corinth, and some will also help fund the Civil War 150th anniversary observances.

If the governor does sign it, the tax must still be presented to the voters of Tishomingo County before any tax is enacted, according to the bill's text.

## Two Sentenced in 2009 Holt Murder Case

A mother and daughter were sentenced Monday for the 2009 beating death of an elderly Burns-ville man.

Linda F. Holt, daughter-in-law of the victim, and Terri Sparks, her daughter, appeared before Circuit Court Judge Paul S. Funderburk in Tishomingo County Circuit court on Monday.

They originally were indicted on murder charges in the death of 84-year-old John Holt in December of 2009, but both pled guilty to the lesser charge of manslaughter last week.

Sparks pled guilty to manslaughter last Wednesday in circuit court, and was expected to testify against her mother, whose trial was set to begin Monday, May 7th. Linda Holt ended up pleading guilty to manslaughter the next day.

Monday, Judge Funderburk sentenced Linda Holt, 53, to prison for the maximum amount allowed for manslaughter - 20 years. Sparks was sentenced to 20 years, with 12 years suspended. It will run consecutive to a 10-year sentence she is already serving on a prior charge in Alcorn County.

"Forgiveness is up to the family, and you've been shown mercy in your sentence," the judge said during the sentencing.

Knowing the details of the case and the brutality of the killing, Judge Funderburk said, "I agree that 20 years is not enough for what you did and would give you more if the law allowed it. If I could send you down there and throw away the key, I would do it without a second thought about it."

John Holt was 84 years old when he was brutally bludgeoned to death in his home with a hammer on December 23rd, 2009. There was a lengthy investigation by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, but family members had no satisfaction of an arrest in the case, even though Linda Holt and Sparks were arrested in Corinth in January of 2010, for attempting to cash a \$200 check from the Holt account the day before he was murdered.

Investigators and prosecutors finally got a break when Sparks agreed to testify against her mother, and they were indicted 15 months after the murder.

Linda Holt had been married to John Holt's son, who is deceased.

Family members spoke briefly at the sentencing. Tuesday, some family members were unhappy with the lesser charge of manslaughter, and corresponding shorter sentence. They said that it had come out only the previous week that the two women had spoken of the plan to murder Mr. Holt when they were on their way to what would become the crime scene.

"That makes it premeditated, and that's not manslaughter, is it?" they asked.

## Iuka Middle School Beats Belmont for County Baseball Championship

Iuka Middle School took down the Belmont Cardinals 8-1, in Tishomingo during the recent county tournament.

Starting with three runs in the first inning, Iuka kept the lead the Cards throughout.

Collin Rone got a hit in each of his two at-bats. He singled in the first and third innings. Ty Rones held the Belmont Cardinals hitless over 1 1/3 innings, and allowed no earned runs, and struck out three.

Rone allowed one run over 2 2/3 innings. The IMS pitcher struck out three, walked three and surrendered one hit.

IMS's Rone, Matthew Brown, and Wheeler Brewster combined for six hits and four RBIs.

The lone run of the game for the Belmont Cardinals crossed the plate in the second inning on an RBI single by #28.

The Chieftains ended the season with a 19-3 record, and outscored their opponents 201-37.

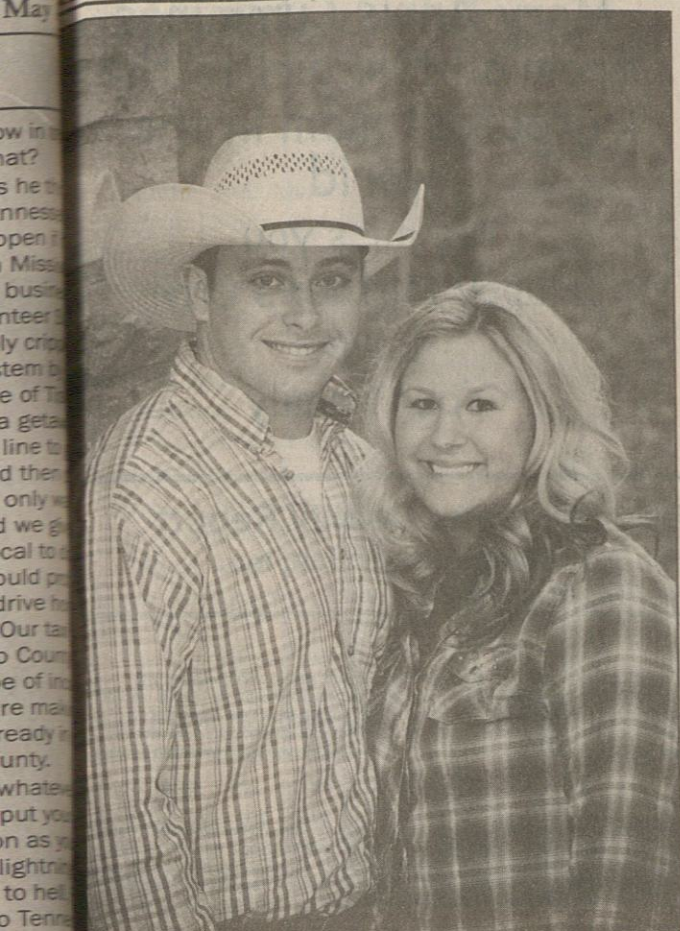

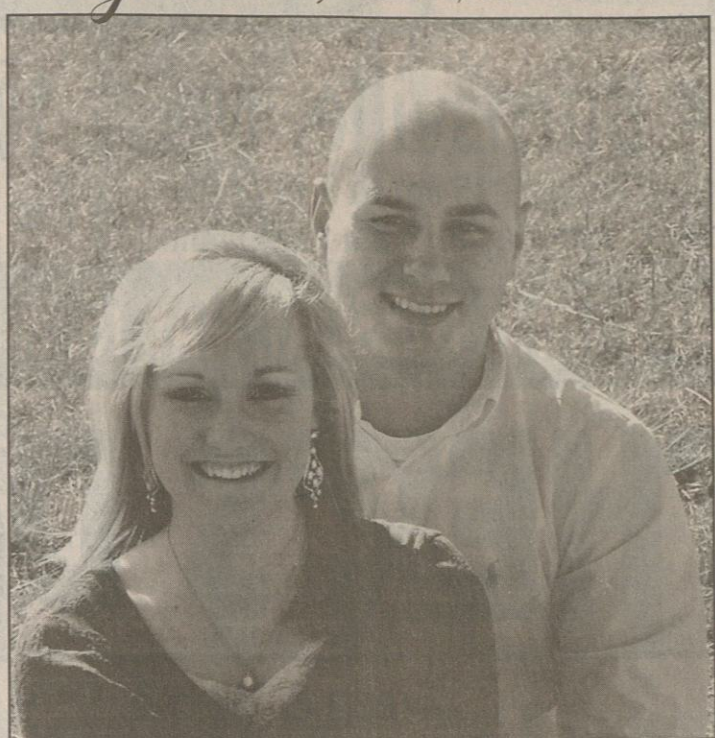

## Fifth Anniversary of Tishomingo County's Loss in Iraq

Jason died of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near the Stryker vehicle he was driving. He was on his second tour of duty in Iraq. The loss of Jason in the lives of his family and friends is a wound that never diminishes. However, we are forever grateful that he was in our life even for such a few short years.

Jason had a great appreciation for life. Whenever he wasn't playing a prank, he displayed maturity and insight far beyond his years. Born in Memphis, Tennessee, on October 31, 1977, Jason was 29 years old at the time of his death. After leaving the Memphis area where his mother grew up, Jason moved with his family to South America and then the Shoals area of Alabama. In 1990, the family moved to his father's hometown of Iuka.

Jason never met a stranger and religiously kept in contact with friends, both old and new. He was always considerate of the needs of his family and friends. He was passionate about his 1969 Chevelle, and he loved to hang out with friends, read, watch TV, or play video games. His optimism and love of life was enormous. We will

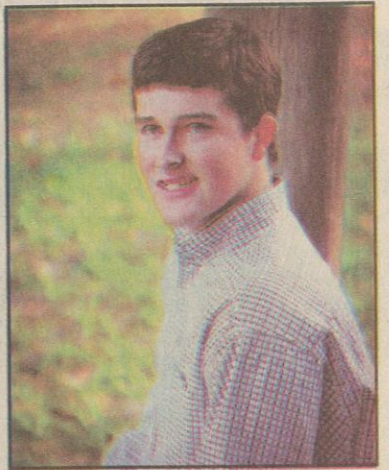

# MAYBE EVERYONE CAN UNDERSTAND THIS

I am sorry that some people misunderstood my letter that I posted in the Tishomingo County Newspaper and on Facebook last week. I hope that I have explained this article to where everybody can understand it. The Governor of MS passed a new law four weeks ago. It changed how elections can be held on legalizing alcohol. Up until now, no city could hold an election unless they had 6,000 or more people in it. The new law that the Governor just passed changes that. If a city has 5,000 people or more or if the county courthouse is located in that city then that city can hold an election on legalizing alcohol in that city. This means that all of the other cities that are located in Tishomingo County cannot hold an election on legalizing alcohol in their city unless this goes to a countywide vote only. The city of luka is the only city that can have an election to legalize the sale of alcohol in it. I am planning to do a city election in luka, MS if I do not get the signatures that the law requires for me to do a countywide vote. This is to let the people of Tishomingo County know that the petition to vote the county wet has not been stopped. The petition to vote Tishomingo County wet is still available for you to sign. If you would like to sign it, you can still sign it. When and if I do a city election on luka, MS it will have no effect on the county petition at all. If you live in the city or the county and you would like to sign or vote on the petition that is for the whole county you can sign and vote on it. As of now, I need 422 legal signatures to have a countywide vote. I have 25 signatures that I have not turned in to the courthouse yet. The city election that I plan on doing on the city of luka, MS does not pertain to the county petition at all. It will be a separate petition from the county petition. The city petition will only be for the people that live within the city limits of luka. You must be a registered voter at the luka City Hall. The only difference between these two petitions is that the people that live in the county cannot sign the city petition or vote on it. However, the people that live in the county or the city can sign the petition to vote the county wet. I would love for it to be a countywide vote. I feel like everyone that lives in Tishomingo County should be able to have his or her say-so on this. If I get 422 legal signatures by August 25<sup>th</sup>, 2012 then there would be no use in a city petition. If the people that live in the county cannot sign the petition to where I am able to have a vote on this then I will do a city election. I live inside of the city limits of luka, MS and I am a legal registered voter with the city of luka. Whether it goes to a city vote or a county vote, I will get to vote on it. If it does not go to a county vote then the county and all of the other cities are going to miss a lot of tax money, which could equal \$400,000 to \$500,000 thousands of dollars a year that is if this just goes to a city election only. I only have to have 517 legal signatures for a city election. If all of the people that have signed the county petition that live inside the city limits of luka come back and sign the city petition I will have plenty of signatures. I posted an ad on Facebook and in the Tishomingo County Newspaper last week that it would be my last petition for people to sign the county petition. Many people did not understand the way I worded this last week and it caused a lot of confusion. Many people believed that the petition to vote Tishomingo County wet was over. I am putting the petition in the Tishomingo County Newspaper so that the people of Tishomingo County will have another chance to sign it. I believe that is an opportunity to raise tax dollars and open doors for our county. Why let our tax dollars go to other counties and states?

## Southern Cornerstones

### James Headley Doan Home in Iuka

Among the earliest settlers of Iuka, Mississippi, were James Headley Doan and his wife, Emily Jane Tanner Doan. The couple moved to Iuka from Eastport, Mississippi. James was born 3 May 1830 in Lauderdale County, Alabama, the son of John and Martha Coburn Doan. As a child, James relocated with his parents to the vicinity of Farmington, Mississippi. By the time he was 19 years old, James and his father were merchants in Eastport. James later joined another early Eastport merchant, forming the firm of Matthews and Doan.

On 4 October 1854, James married Emily Jane Tanner in Athens, Alabama. She was the daughter of Samuel Tanner, the first mayor of Athens.

In 1857, the driving of a golden spike one mile west of Iuka marked the completion of the Memphis & Charleston Railroad connecting the Mississippi River and the Atlantic Ocean by rail. Both James Doan and A. T. Matthews joined a host of individuals and businesses relocating from Eastport to the "new" thriving town of Iuka.

Some accounts suggest that James actually moved his small Eastport house to Iuka for his residence while his new and larger home was being constructed. Most sources indicate that the residence at 203 W. Quitman Street was built in 1858 as the home for James H. Doan and his family. If this is correct, they had two young daughters, three-year-old Emma Jimmie (who later married Benjamin Franklin McRae), and one-year-

old Fannie Mae (who later married Clem J. Pointer) when they moved in. The next nine children born to this couple were born in this house.

The 1860 census lists both James H. Doan and his brother, John F. Doan, as merchants in Iuka. The Civil War of 1861-1865 had a marked impact on the young town with Union forces occupying Iuka. An interesting local account referring to this house reads: "From this home went the young husband and father to join the Confederacy in Roddy's command under Forrest." The story of his capture by the Union forces under Rosecrans, his imprisonment in a tent in the backyard of the old McDonald home which, at the time, was Rosecrans' headquarters, and his escape are a vital part of the lore of Iuka.

After the war, James continued in business in Iuka. He served as President of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County for a number of years, and it was in this position that he supervised and managed the building of the old courthouse which was erected in 1870. This courthouse burned in 1886.

James moved to Memphis in 1877 and established his cotton factory business located at 358 Front Street. Apparently, his wife and the younger children remained in Iuka for a short time and continued to reside in the Doan home. Even for several years after moving to Memphis, the family would travel, usually by train, between their two residences. In 1879, James joined Mr. Zenos N. Estes forming Estes-Doan Cotton Company occupying much more spacious

quarters at 11½ and 13 Union Avenue. On February 6, 1885, the Iuka residence was sold to the family of Capt. R. H. Watson, owner of the Iuka Springs Hotel. James Headley Doan died at his residence in Memphis on August 13, 1885.

Different members of the Watson family owned the Iuka home until June 20, 1916, at which time Mrs. Morella Watson Kuykendall sold it to Mrs. Mattie Watson Brown. The house later became known as the Dr. R. J. Brown home. Dr. Brown added iron dogs to the sides of the front steps leading locals to refer to the place as "the house with the dogs."

Mr. D. O. Jourdan of Iuka purchased the home from the Dr. Brown family on April 7, 1949. The house stood empty for several years until June 13, 1972, when it was sold to a family friend, Mrs. Ethel Childs, of Baltimore. Mrs. Childs, prior to moving in, had the house nicely restored including the addition of a "widow's walk" on the roof. Mrs. Childs furnished the home beautifully with her extensive collection of antiques.

After the death of Mrs. Childs, the home was purchased March 25, 1988, by Mr. and Mrs. David Bonds of Iuka who proceeded with an extensive remodeling. Their meticulous attention to detail has resulted in a magnificent show place which actually spans the history of the town of Iuka. The house has now been listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

An accident claimed the life of Mr. David Bonds in 2004, and, on May 12 of that year, Mrs. Cathy Jo Bonds sold the beautifully restored and maintained home to Dr. and Mrs. John Flexner.

Old Tishomingo County and the town of Iuka are blessed with a treasure trove of architectural and historic structures and sites. The James H. Doan Home is prominent among them.

A report containing detailed information on how the susceptibility determinations were made has been furnished to our public water system and is available at our office upon request. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity; microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, that may come from treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife; inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming; pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses; organic chemicals, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes, petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems; radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and activities. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) also establishes limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

### Additional Information for Lead

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Walker Switch Water Association is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. ### Monitoring and reporting of compliance data violations

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific constituents on a monthly basis. Results of monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. Beginning January 1, 2011, the Mississippi State Department of Health (MSDH) required public water systems that use chlorine as a disinfectant to monitor/test for chlorine residuals as required by the Stage 1 Disinfection By-Products Rule. In April of 2011 our water system failed to meet these monitoring requirements. During April 2011, we collected samples for bacteriological contaminants as required; therefore we cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water. The number of samples required was 2. We took 0. To correct this problem we will insure that all samples collected and submitted on the appropriate date. In an effort to ensure systems complete all monitoring requirements, MSDH now notifies systems of any missing samples prior to the end of the compliance period.

Although Walker Switch Water Association did not have any Significant Deficiencies, this system was not certified by the City of Iuka and that system had a Significant Deficiency so, therefore, we must list the below.

### Significant Deficiencies

During a sanitary survey conducted on 02/15/11, the Mississippi State Department of Health cited the following significant deficiency(s):  
Inadequate internal cleaning/maintenance of storage tanks  
Corrective Actions: This system is currently under a Bilateral Compliance Agreement with the MSDH to correct the deficiency by 12/31/2012.

### \*\*\*\*\* A MESSAGE FROM MSDH CONCERNING RADIOLOGICAL SAMPLING

In accordance with the Radionuclides Rule, all community public water supplies were required to sample for radionuclides beginning January 2007 - December 2007. Your public water supply completed sampling on a scheduled deadline; however, during an audit of the Mississippi State Department of Health Radiological Laboratory, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) suspended analyses and reporting of radiological compliance samples and results until further notice. Although this was not the result of inaction by the water supply, MSDH was required to issue a violation. This is to notify you that as of this date, your water supply has not completed the monitoring requirements. The Bureau of Public Water Supply has taken action to ensure that your water system be returned to compliance by March 31, 2013. 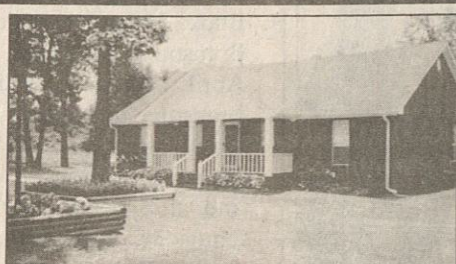

### How Will Idol Gods Finally Stack Up Against The True God?

Anyone who has ever read very much of the Bible has noticed several things that are worth noting concerning Who God is. One theme that constantly comes up, in even a casual reading of the Bible, is that God is the Creator and-



Owner of all the universe. I love this truth more than perhaps any other truth in the Word of God, for it gives me great consolation to know that Somebody made me and cares about what He has made! Did you hear what I just said? I visit the Tishomingo County jail and the Alcorn County jail on a weekly basis, when I

am not away from home preaching somewhere else. I have been doing jail ministries, along with pastoral work and evangelism for over 50 years, at least 23 years of which I have "been in jail" (ministering, of course). I love going to jails, but I notice a common cord that runs through many of the lives of those who are inmates. It is that they do not have a significant tie to either God Himself, a spouse, a family member or a true friend. One reason that I love to talk with those in jail (and by the way, they are just as important to God as any of the rest of

us) is that I can attempt to give them hope by trusting in Jesus Christ, either for salvation or restoration to fellowship.

On another note, however, I have also found that most people who are not in jail have the basic same problems as those in jail. They do not have the important ties that are necessary for a well-balanced life. In brief, our society in America is falling apart, chiefly because we have forgotten our Creator-Father, the One Who loves us more than anybody else! Most modern education and media, and a host of oth-

er things, have been busy for decades teaching us that we do not need the God of the Bible; that we are our own masters and that we can do as we please, as long as we do not get caught by the authorities or some significant person. The truth is that the God of the Bible is the only God; He literally hates idols, and He is not fond of those who take His name in vain, while bowing to a piece of stone; a human body; a bank account or an intellectual idea that some atheistic professor has spawn and tossed out. Jeremiah 10:10-11 says,

"But the LORD is a true God, He is the living God, and an everlasting King; at His wrath the earth shall tremble, and the nations shall not be able to abide His indignation. Thus shall ye say unto them, The gods that have not made the heavens and the earth, they shall perish from the earth, and from these heavens." This is what God thinks about idol gods!

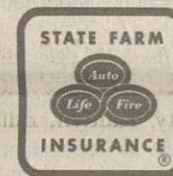

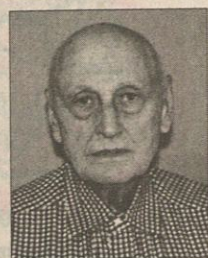

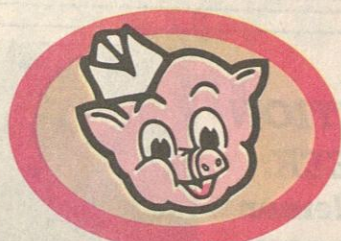
