One Charged with Murder after Shooting near Tishomingo

A shooting during a domestic disturbance near Tishomingo last Thursday left one dead, and one charged with murder.

According to Tishomingo County Coroner Mack Wilemon, Kevin Douglas Long, Jr., 28, died as a result of a gunshot wound to the chest, following an altercation on July 19th at a manufactured home on Hill Road just west of the town of Tishomingo.

Tishomingo Police Chief

Mike Kemp said officers responded to a call around 9 p.m., where they found that Long had apparently been shot by Christi Knight, 47, with a 20-gauge shotgun after a disagreement involving her daughter, Stephanie Trulock, who was living with Long in a trailer next to Knight.

Knight was charged with murder, said Kemp.

Chad Reed, who was living with Knight in one of two trailers where the incident took place,

was also charged at the scene with failure to comply/disorderly conduct.

Stephanie Trulock was charged with child neglect in connection with her 9-month-old child that was left alone in the other trailer, while the four adults were in the Reed-Knight trailer, apparently drinking, said Kemp. The child was taken from the scene by Department of Human Services personnel.

Downtown Landmark Demolished to Make Way for Progress

One of downtown Iuka's landmarks will soon be demolished to make room for progress.

Most recently the home of Iuka Baptist's youth ministry, the building at 114 Pearl Street was the headquarters of First American National Bank from 1964 until 2003.

The building was built sometime in the late 1950's to house a doctor's office where Dr. Lewis George, Dr. Bobby King, and Dr. Kelly Segars practiced. In 1964 the clinic moved to Quitman Street near the hospital and the

old clinic was remodeled to house the newly established First National Bank. The dental office of Dr. Joe Barlow was north of the original building and later became part of the bank structure.

The church bought the building in 2005 when First American built a new building on First American Drive, near Walmart.

Used for several years for youth activities, the building was already in poor shape even before the bank left, explained one church member. It leaked badly, there were mold and mildew issues, and the leaks would have

started damaging an adjacent building (known as the old Western Auto building) where Iuka Baptist operates its thriving AWANA program.

The demolition is Phase I of a long-range plan to build a multipurpose building on the site, possibly integrating the AWANA building. At the same time as the demolition, the AWANA building is being remodeled with walls for classrooms. It will house both the Youth ministry and the AWANA program, said a church member.

So Who Won?

Battle of Iuka Basics for the Battle-History Challenged

For those of us who are not Civil War scholars, or those who might not have lived in Iuka all our lives, (and apparently a good many of those who have), all the carryin'-on about the 150th Battle of Iuka might seem a bit overwhelming.

Well, at our house, we've got Shelby Foote's Civil War trilogy and *Shiloh* on the bookshelf (together they take up about 18 inches of the shelf-exhausting just to look at), and we live in a house built by the son of a Civil War veteran, but this actual Battle of Iuka - well, it's always been a bit of a mystery to me.

So for those of you who might not have spent time actually studying the battle, here are some things you need to know:

When was it?

During the late summer of 1862, Confederate forces attempted a three-pronged strategic advance into the North. The outcome of this offensive—the only coordinated Confederate attempt to carry the conflict to the enemy—was disastrous. The results at Antietam and in Kentucky are well known; the third offensive, the northern Mississippi campaign, led to the devastating and little-studied defeats at Iuka and Corinth - defeats that would open the way for Grant's attack on Vicksburg.

Who fought?

Actual fighting was between the forces of General Sterling Price on the Confederate side, and those of Union Major General William Rosecrans. The Federal troops were supposed to have been supported by those of Major General E. O. C. Ord,

who was nearby, and ordered by Union Major General Ulysses S. Grant to join in the fighting when he heard it, but due to an "acoustic shadow," neither he, nor Grant (reportedly in Burnsville) ever heard the fighting.

About 6,000 men made up the combined forces, and of those, about every third man died, making it one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War up to that time. Confederate General Henry Little was killed in the fighting and temporarily buried in the rose garden at Twin Magnolias.

The troops who fought were mostly not from the Iuka area, but included Confederate divisions from Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Alabama, and four Mississippi infantry units.

From the North, troops were from Iowa, Ohio, Missouri, Indiana and Minnesota.

Who won?

Well, technically, the Union carried the day, and they occupied Iuka after the battle, but Price's army was able to escape during the night and join forces with Major General Earl Van Dorn for an assault on Union forces at Corinth a few weeks later.

Where was it?

The simplest explanation has been one offered by Harold Lomenick, who heads up the Iuka Battleground Commission.

"The easiest way to understand is that the Union forces were up on the hill where the current Sunset Motel sits, and the

Confederates were entrenched in ravines where the new Jack's restaurant is," explains Lomenick.

Much of Iuka was involved in the considerable task of housing two armies over a short period of time - there were nearly 14,000 men in Price's army, according to accounts.

The McDonnald house, was where the Iuka Middle School gym is currently located, was the headquarters of first Price, and later Rosecrans, according to local references.

Many other homes in the town were used after the battle to house soldiers, and Iuka United Methodist Church was used as a hospital to the many casualties from the Battle.

Iuka's Battleground Heights was an area where many of the Confederate forces were camped.

What's Shady Grove?

Shady Grove is a cemetery where many unidentified soldiers from the Battle were buried in a mass grave. Some are identified, and available through documents from the Tishomingo County Archives and Historical Museum.

Want more?

TCDF Compiling a Shop-at-Home Guide

The Tishomingo County Development Foundation is producing a long-needed Shop-at-Home Guide to serve existing county businesses and help local consumers too.

According to Mississippi Department of Revenue figures, approximately one-half of the income of citizens of Tishomingo County is spent outside of the county.

"We realize that we cannot change some life-long shopping habits, but we feel that we need to put forth the effort to help our merchants and service providers and to encourage the creation of new small businesses," said TCDF Chairman Neil Davis. "We all shop outside of Tishomingo County, but if we could spend a minimum of 10 percent more at home, this would create new jobs and help to create new small businesses. We feel that the Shop at Home guide may help all of us to remember to shop at home first."

"The average spending on

goods and services per capita is \$4,907 for a total of \$91,132,000 per year. Although this sounds like a huge number, if citizens would spend just \$41 more locally each month, that would increase local sales by 10 percent, or approximately \$9 million per year, according to a U. S. Bureau of Economics analysis provided by TCDF Executive Director Gary Matthews.

The TCDF office gets calls for this type of information often, and it's just not available anywhere, not even the phone book.

For now, the Guide will be available electronically from the TCDF office, until the budget allows it to be printed.

"Small businesses have never had to work harder to survive and it is vital that our businesses continuously advertise and strive to offer competitive pricing, good quality, and extraordinary service," said Matthews.

Proof of Residency, 7th Grade Vaccinations Necessary for School Registration

Proof of residency is required for all Tishomingo County School students, and you can take it by the schools anytime before school begins. Two forms of proof can be any of the following, and must be in the student's parent or legal guardian's name: homestead exemption form, mortgage documents, property deed, apartment or home lease, utility bills, driver's license, voter precinct ID, or automobile registration. These documents are required before students

can register and attend any Tishomingo County School.

Mississippi will join 41 other states in requiring a recent Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis) vaccination for all students entering the 7th grade, beginning with the 2012-2013 school year. 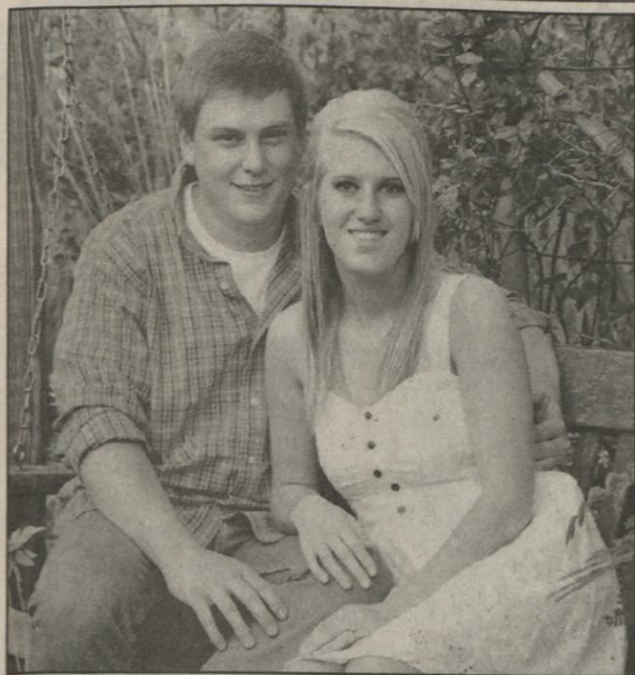

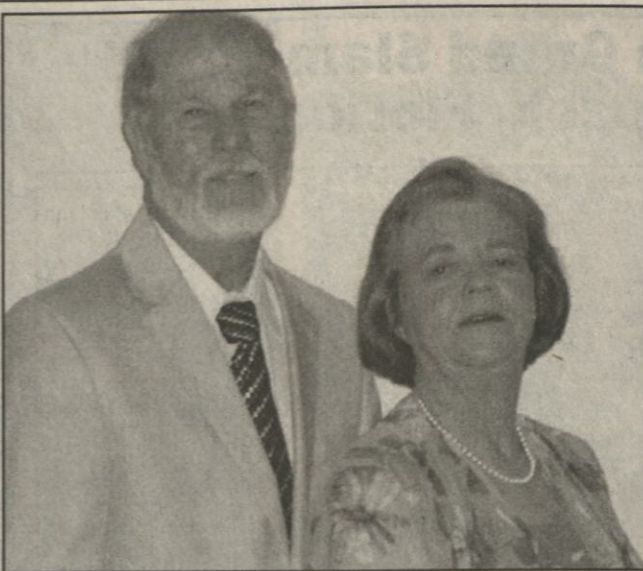

FINANCIAL FOCUS Even with Low Rates, You Can Invest for Income

Not long ago, the Federal Reserve (Fed) announced that it plans to keep short-term interest rates near zero until late 2014. The Fed initially pushed rates to that level in 2008, in an effort to stimulate economic growth. Clearly, low interest rates have a wide-ranging impact — but what effect will they have on you, as an individual investor?

If you need income from your investments, then the continuation of ultra-low interest rates may be a matter of some concern, particularly if you own certain types of fixed-income investments, such as certificates of deposit. While CDs are insured, offer return of principal at maturity and provide regular interest payments, they are not risk-free. With low interest rates, you risk losing purchasing power. - **Build a bond ladder.** Long-term bonds, by their nature, are more subject to interest rate risk than shorter-term vehicles. To help lower this risk, you may want to build a "ladder" of bonds of varying maturities. - **Consider dividend-paying stocks.** You can find companies that have paid dividends for many consecutive years — and in some

cases, increased their dividend payout each year. In 2012, companies listed in the S&P 500 are on track to pay out more than \$252 billion in dividends, a record amount, according to data compiled from Standard & Poor's. (Keep in mind that the S&P 500 is an unmanaged index and is not available for direct investment.) Of course, stock prices will fluctuate in value, and you may receive more or less than your original investment when you sell. Historically, dividend-paying stocks have been less volatile than non-dividend-paying stocks. Be aware, though, that companies can lower or discontinue dividend payments at any time without notice. - **Refinance your mortgage.** Today's low rates are good news for borrowers. With tougher standards in place, it may not be as easy to refinance a mortgage as it once was, but if you qualify, you may want to think about refinancing. You may be able to save quite a bit of money on your monthly payments — and lower payments can translate into a greater cash flow. Plus, if you don't need all the savings, you can put some of the money into an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) or another retirement savings vehicle.
